### Historical Sketch

The Pickwick Hotel, located between 9<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> streets and McGee in Kansas City, Missouri, is on the National Register of Historic Places. The 500-room hotel, built in 1930, was also the location of radio station KMBC in the 1930s. The opening scenes of the 1967 film "In Cold Blood" were shot in the hotel's lobby, and Harry Truman stayed there during his senatorial days. The hotel was converted into government-subsidized housing in 2003 and closed in 2009. In 2013, redevelopment began to convert the building to upscale apartments called Pickwick Place.
