

Ut In Omnibus


Glorificetur Deus





Civics, a freshman subject, was taught by Sister Egberta and Sister Fabiola, and, during first semester, by Sister Eileen.


"Students, meet St. Thomas!" said Father Francis to his senior sociology class last fall and the pupils themselves admit they met St. Thomas!














Now there is left for the seniors just one more of the "big" days —May 27—Commencement Day—and with it the beginning of the years beyond.




Grid Glances


The Infant Irish





Despite much stiff competition in the non-league games Lillis came out ahead with six wins and five losses to total 368 points to the opposition's 326 in eleven starts. Two new trophies were lined up on the first-floor shelves by the varsity squad, both being gained outside the league. First contributor was the annual Blue Springs tournament, which added a good-sportsmanship award to the Irish collection and paved the way for more to come.

From the sub-regional tournament, which saw Center and De La Salle fall before the victorious march of the Green and White, came a second-place trophy, plus the pleasure of wiping out De La Salle's league advantage of eight points by a 41-20 whipping. Advancing to the finals to face North Kansas City and envisioning a trip to the regionals at Warrensburg, the Irish were bumped hard by the new champions, coming out three points short in the final score.

Probably the most exciting non-league game of the season was the 26-24 victory over a hot Pem-Day team in the Irish gym. Only double defeat of the year in non-league ball was that administered by Immaculata of Leavenworth.


