



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

















#### Foreward





The home room is the center of all activity at Lillis. It is just what its name implies—a home away from home for its members. At 3:30 students return to their individual home rooms for prayers. They spend their noon study hours there. They look to their home room teacher for guidance in personal problems as well as school affairs.



An assistant leader is elected to preside if the leader is absent. In the case that the leader elected is a boy, a girl is chosen as co-leader. The success of the home room as a group depends largely upon the character and leadership of the elected. It is their

duty to organize their home room members for participation in both spiritual activities and other school projects.

Problems confronting students are brought up in meetings. Issues are voted upon and presented to the student council. Projects such as the Bishops' Relief Campaign, amateur hour, carnival, and homecoming are undertaken in the home room. Each room thinks of its own plan to make the project successful.








## Homecoming







# Girls Athletic Association


