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


Dedication







He even bettered the situation by developing a championship basketball team with a nucleus of only two reserves from last year's squad.

Coach Glennon and his '49 edition of Lillis basketballers won twenty-eight and lost four to post the best record ever made on the hardwood at Lillis. Traveling far and wide to compete in games and tournaments, Coach and his boys managed to hang up this enviable record against some of the finest competition in the state. The 1948 football season began with a bang as Lillis defeated Rockhurst to the tune of 7-0 in the C. Y. C. Extravaganza, Bob McMullen going over for the Irish. McMullen, who should have had one of his best seasons, was hampered by an ankle and knee injury for the greater part of the season. However, Mac was still going strong till after the Pem-Day game, as he scored the only touchdown against the Raiders in a thrilling 7-0 victory. Responsible for the two extra points was Charley Hogan who was known as the boy with the "golden toe". Chuck was probably the best place kicker in Kansas City schools.

Hayden came down from Kansas and beat the cocky Irish 6-0 at C. Y. C. In the third game of the schedule, the highly-favored Lillis eleven just squeezed past the high-spirited De La Salle 7-0 on the banks of the C. Y. C. Rain had poured onto the field for three days. LeRoy Coulter scored in the second period on his famous line "squash". The next affair was the Glennon tilt which saw the Irish push the Eagles everywhere but in the grand-stands and still not score. One touchdown was called back, however, on an off side penalty. This cut the Irish chances to a possible tie for the championship.

Springfield and Lee's Summit were right in order for the Irish but they dropped a thriller to the Springfield Bears. The Irish went down to a 6-0 default early in the contest but the Lillis gridsters came back and tied it on Charley Hogan's end run. Hogan again put the pigskin through the crossbar for a 7-6 halftime lead. Harold Schleicher blocked a punt in the third quarter and Bob Loschke fell on it to increase the lead to three points. Fighting fiercely to the end the Green and White held the Bears.


Lee's Summit fell before the strong Irish 19 to 13 as the two ends accounted for all the points, LeRoy Coulter having a great day with the throwing arm. Bob Loschke brought down 13 points and Harry Schleicher 6.

Hogan was the next victim, bowing 26 to 6, as LeRoy Coulter had another good day in running up 12 points and passing for two more, one T. D. flip to Schleicher and the other toss to Loschke. Hogan booted two for four. By tying the Irish, Rockhurst handed the first place Catholic League trophy to Glennon.

The Irish line held the opponents to a mere 37 points in nine games for a four point average per game. This line was one of the biggest and probably the best forward wall that ever represented Lillis on the gridiron.

Honors for the season went to Dave Griffith and Bob Zahner who made first team Catholic All Star. Bob McMullen, Bob Loschke, and LeRoy Coulter pulled down second team honors.





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
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
