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

Mr. Hentges brings his own unique approach to his religion and English courses.







Coach Mintner still holds the distinction for being Lillis's most versatile teacher. This year Coach divides his time between Social Studies and Drivers Education.


Another member of the English Department, Mr. Nevau also doubles as a Religion teacher.


Efficient Secretaries

The general plan of the system was to have the students take Composition or Literary Types the first semester. Then, at mid-year, they could choose from such interesting and varied courses as Related Arts, World Novel, Interpretive Reading, or American Poetry.

The staff was an exceptionally fine one this year, with Sister Bede as chairman of the department. Sister Bede, who initiated film study at Lillis, taught Composition, Speech, Related Arts, English Poetry, and World Novel. Responsible for all Literary Types classes, and a beneficial course on research papers, was Sister Rosaria. Sister Ruth taught Freshman and Senior Reading, and Mr. Hentges divided his time among Freshman Reading, Biography, and American Poetry classes. Mr. Nevue, another member of the staff, taught Sophomore and Junior Reading, and English and American Short Story. A newcomer to the staff was Miss Thompson, who specialized in speech, drama, and acting.








Physical Education Shapes Up Life at Lillis

Fresh air and chill winds make running a necessary out-of-doors exercise for the girls' P.E. classes.




The practical arts department includes printing, drafting, and Driver's Education.



tories) an institute funded by the US Government for developing new learning programs.


Sr. DeMontfort teaches both Chemistry and Physics. These subjects too, are learned through the avenues of discovery and experimentation.



As the parade started moving, Seniors wave good-bye to envious underclassmen.













Categories and Retreat Score as Challenges Well Met


Interest and Solemnity prevailed at the general sessions of the Retreat.

Through the French and Spanish Clubs interested Lillis students are able to learn about and experience various facets of cultures other than their own.











Coach Periera Guides Varsity Through Successful Season




