Our new priest, Father Garnett, gives the students a new attitude towards Religion.

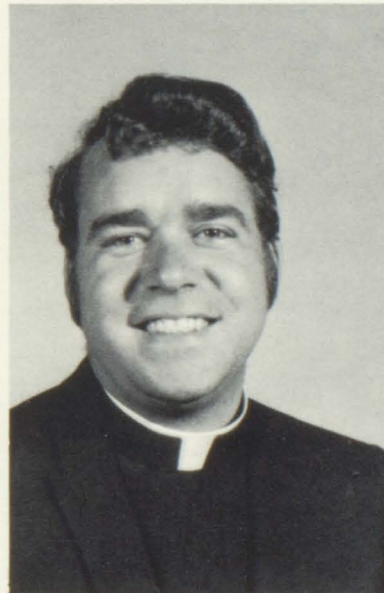

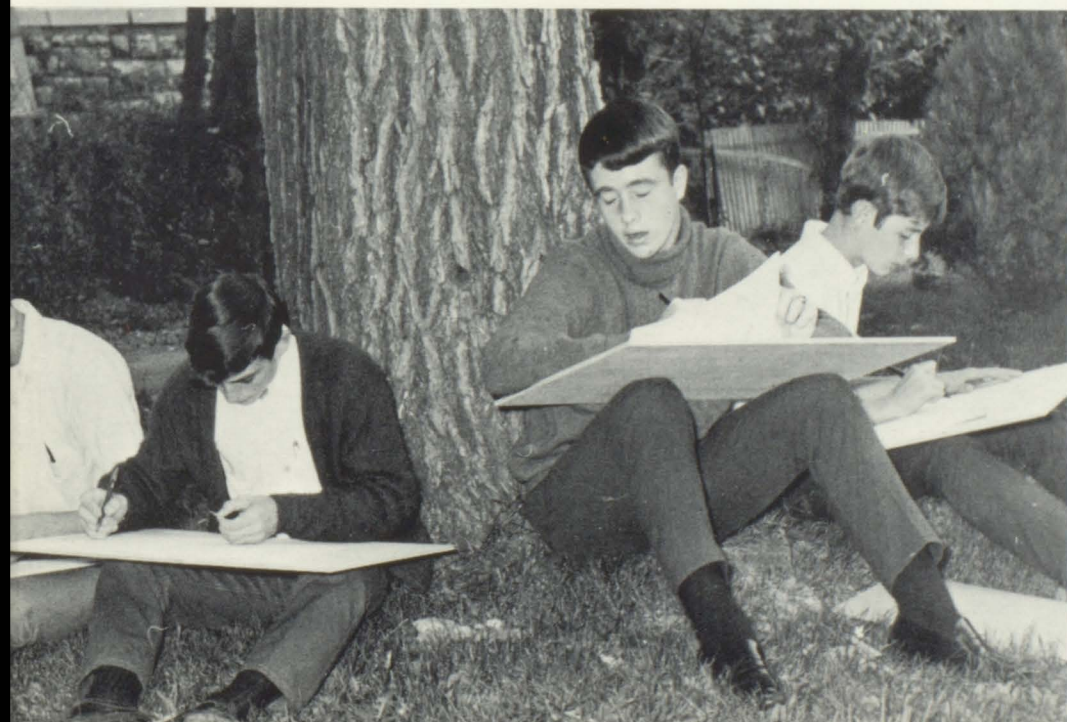

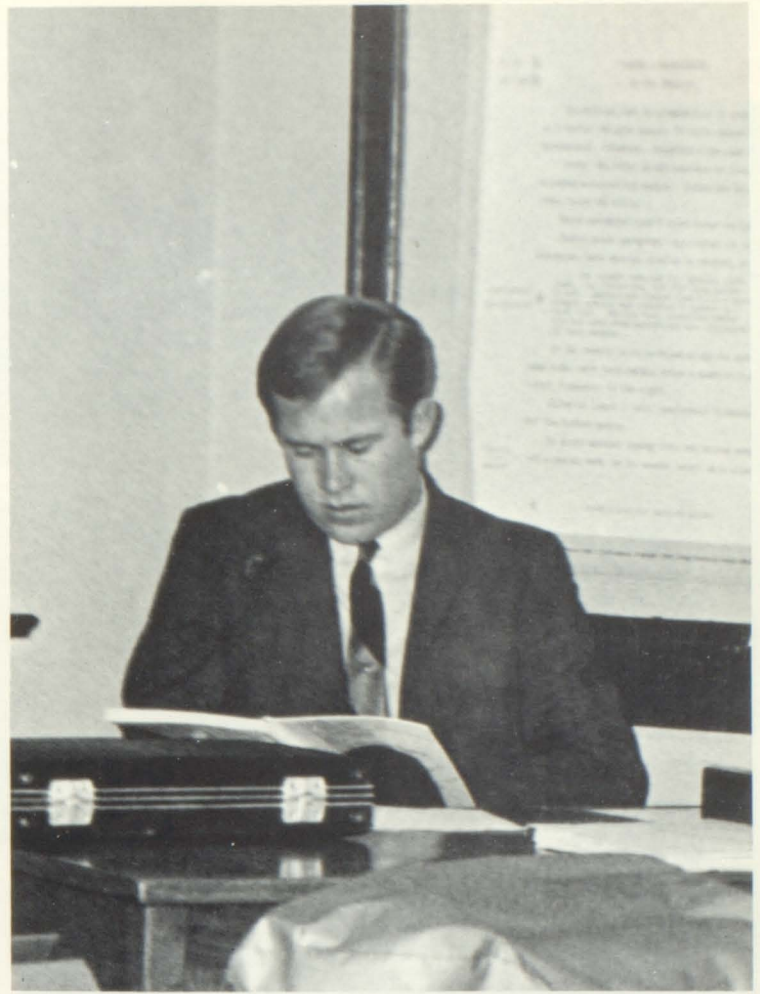
## *Efficient Secretaries*

Mr. Nevue, another member of the staff, taught Sophomore and Junior Reading, and English and American Short Story. A newcomer to the staff was Miss Thompson, who specialized in speech, drama, and acting.

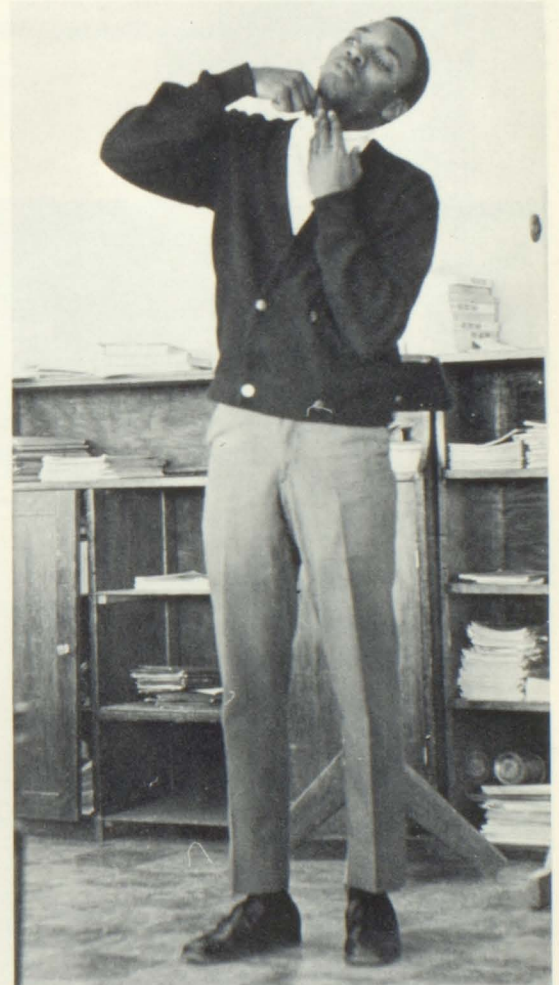

## *Home Ec Updated to Include Boys*

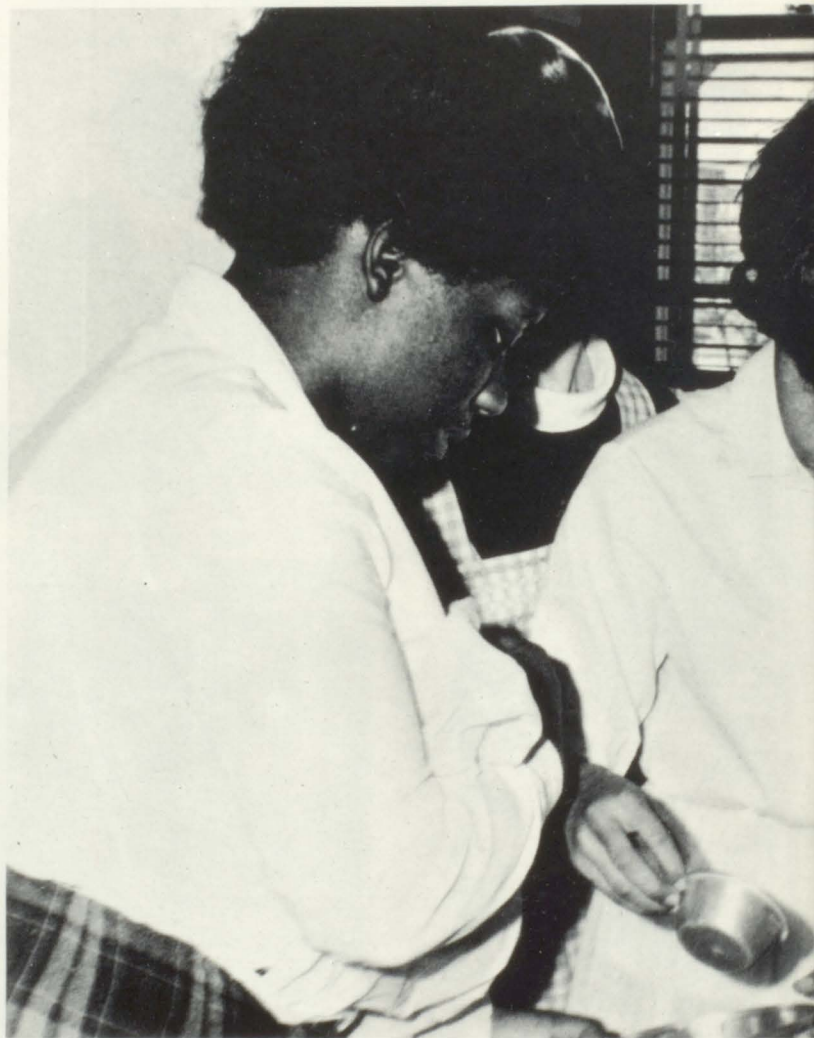

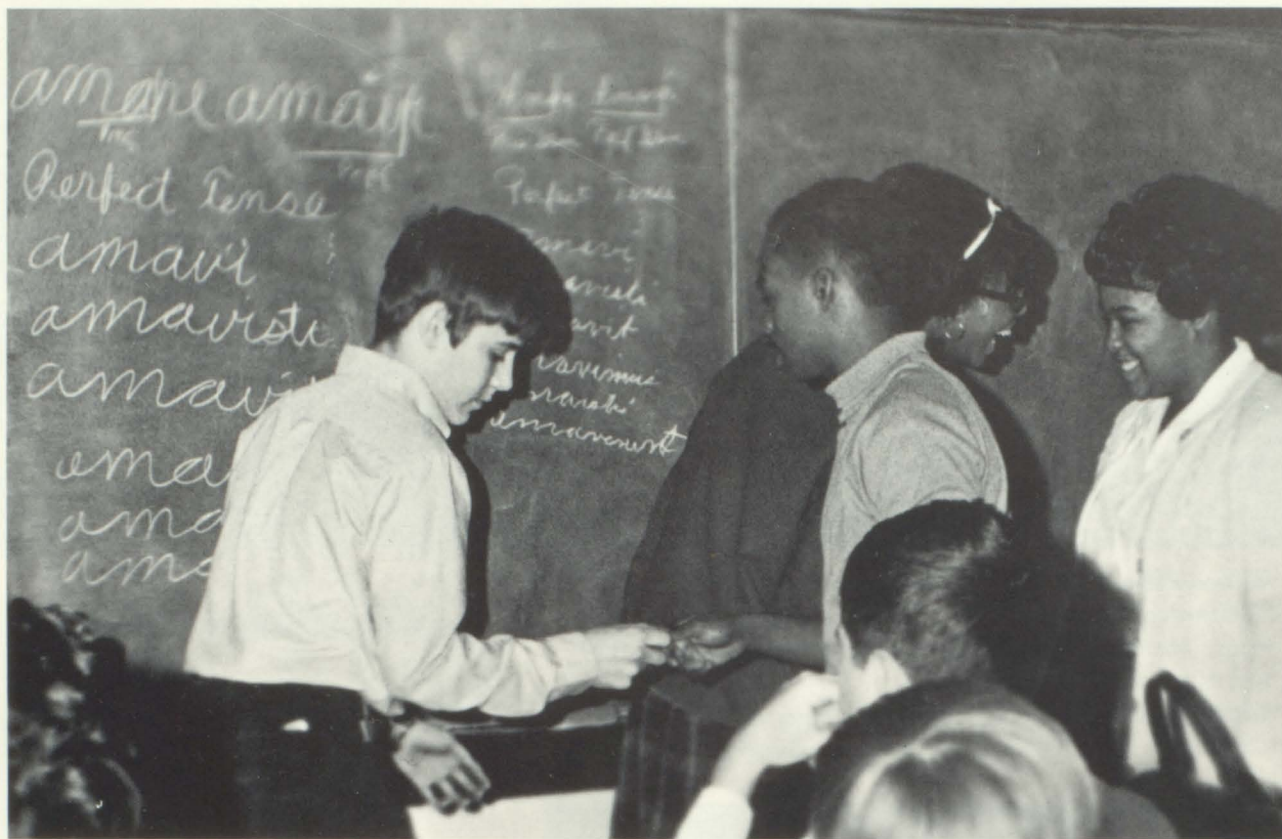

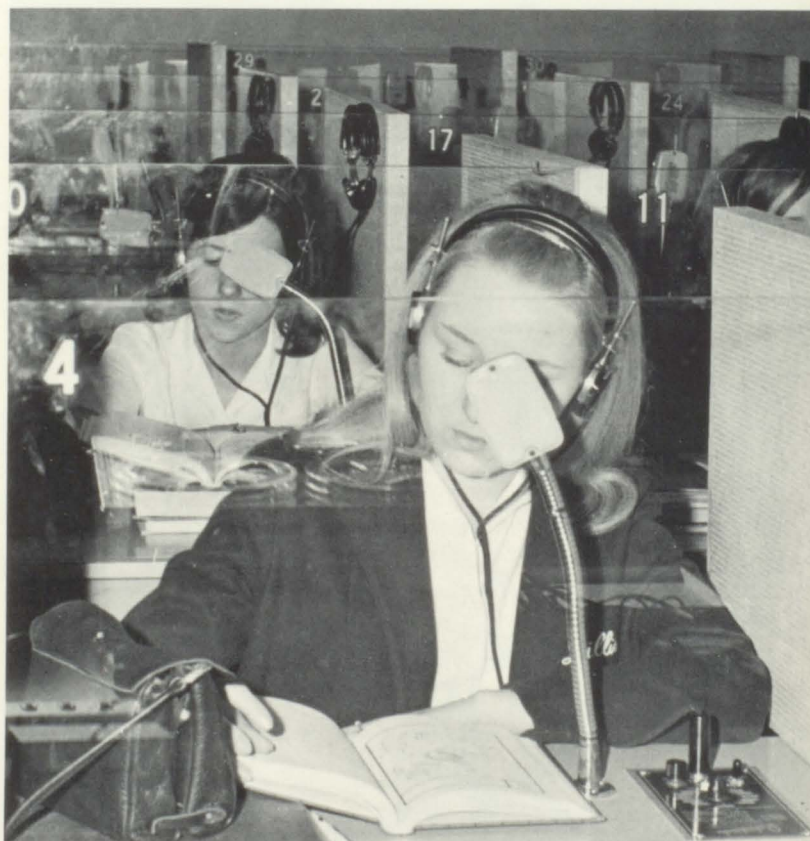

As head of the math department, Sister DeMontfort encourages students to continue in the field of math. The math enthusiasts find the four year math course well-staffed and a great preparation for college.

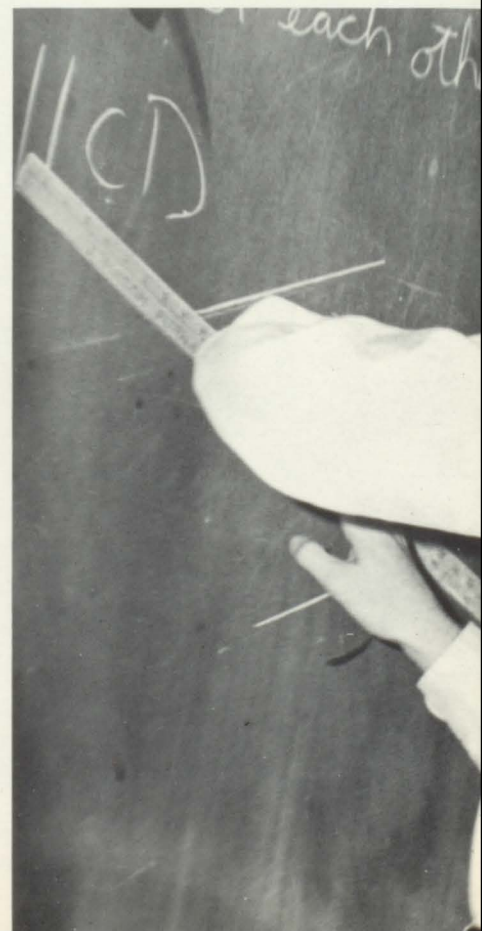
Entering the world of mathematics as a Freshman, Algebra I was the course of study. It gave students new ideas and prepared them for future courses. General Math was another choice for the less daring.

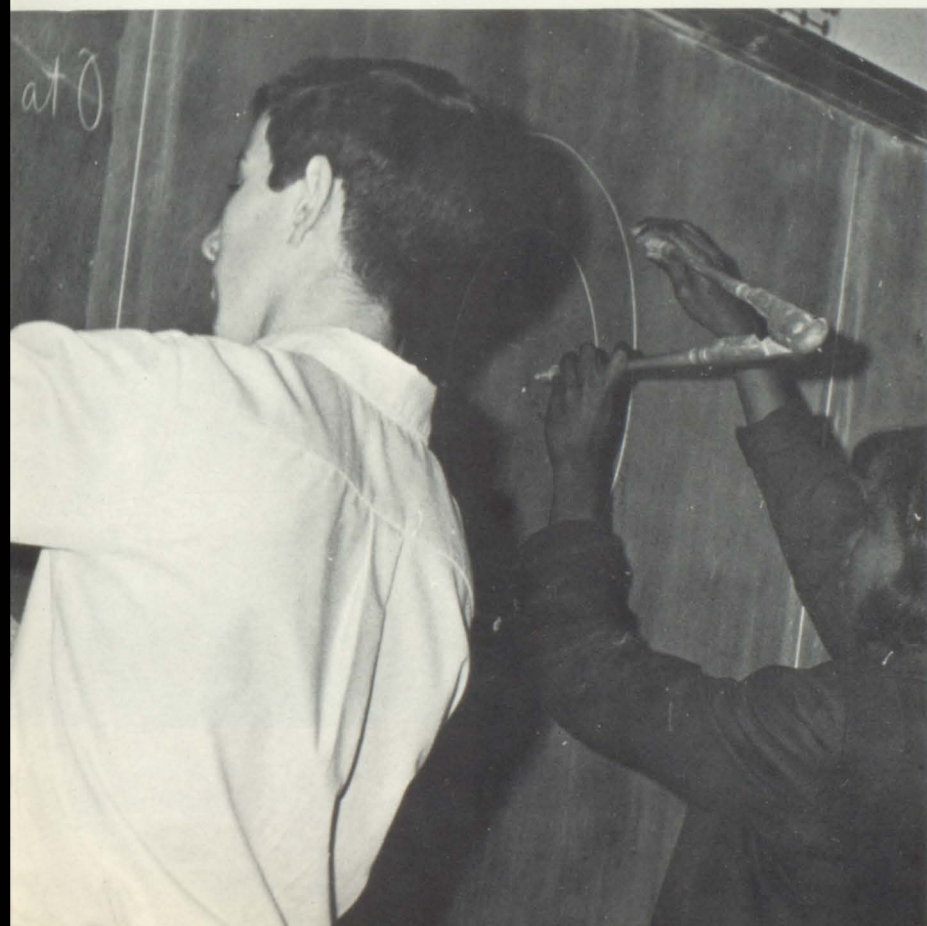

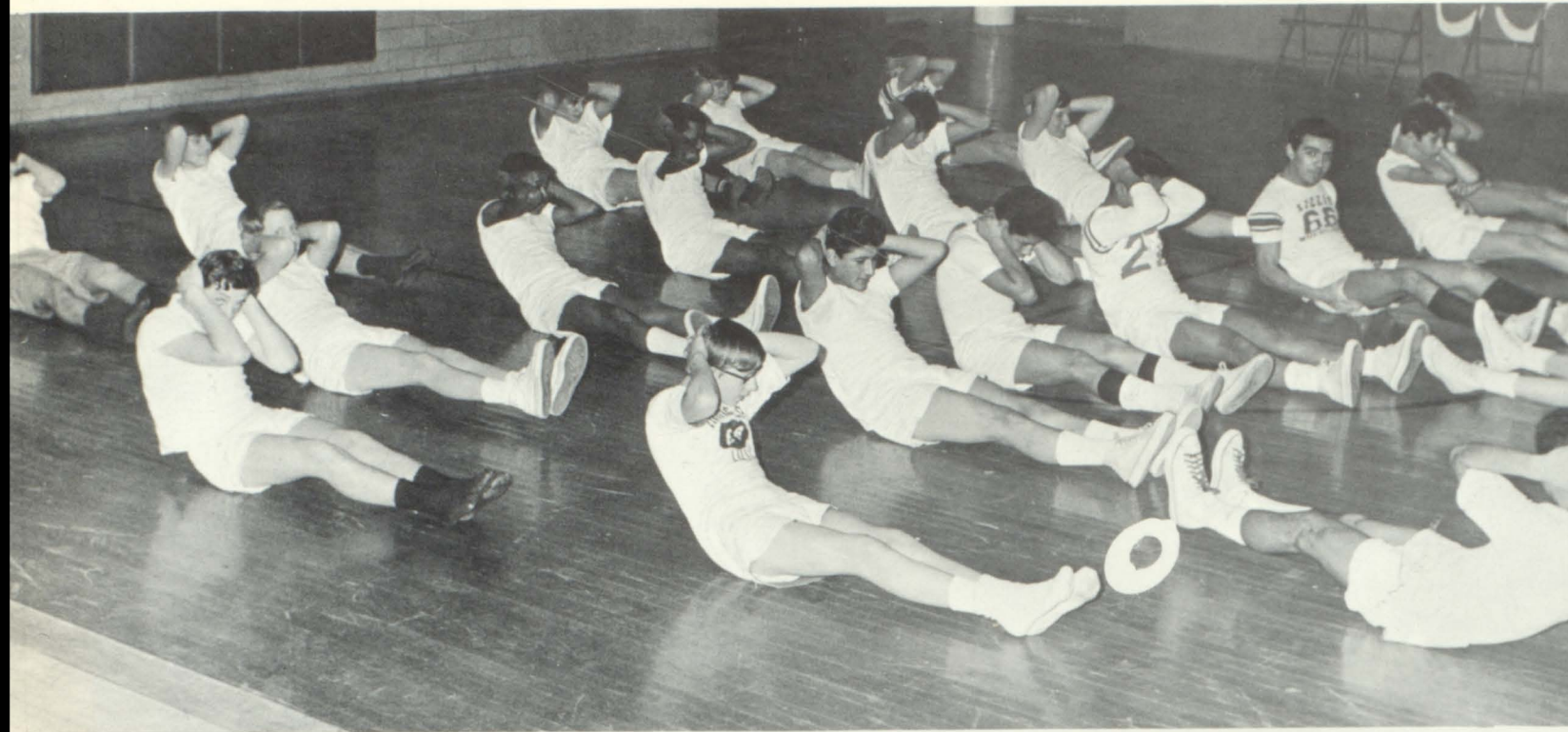

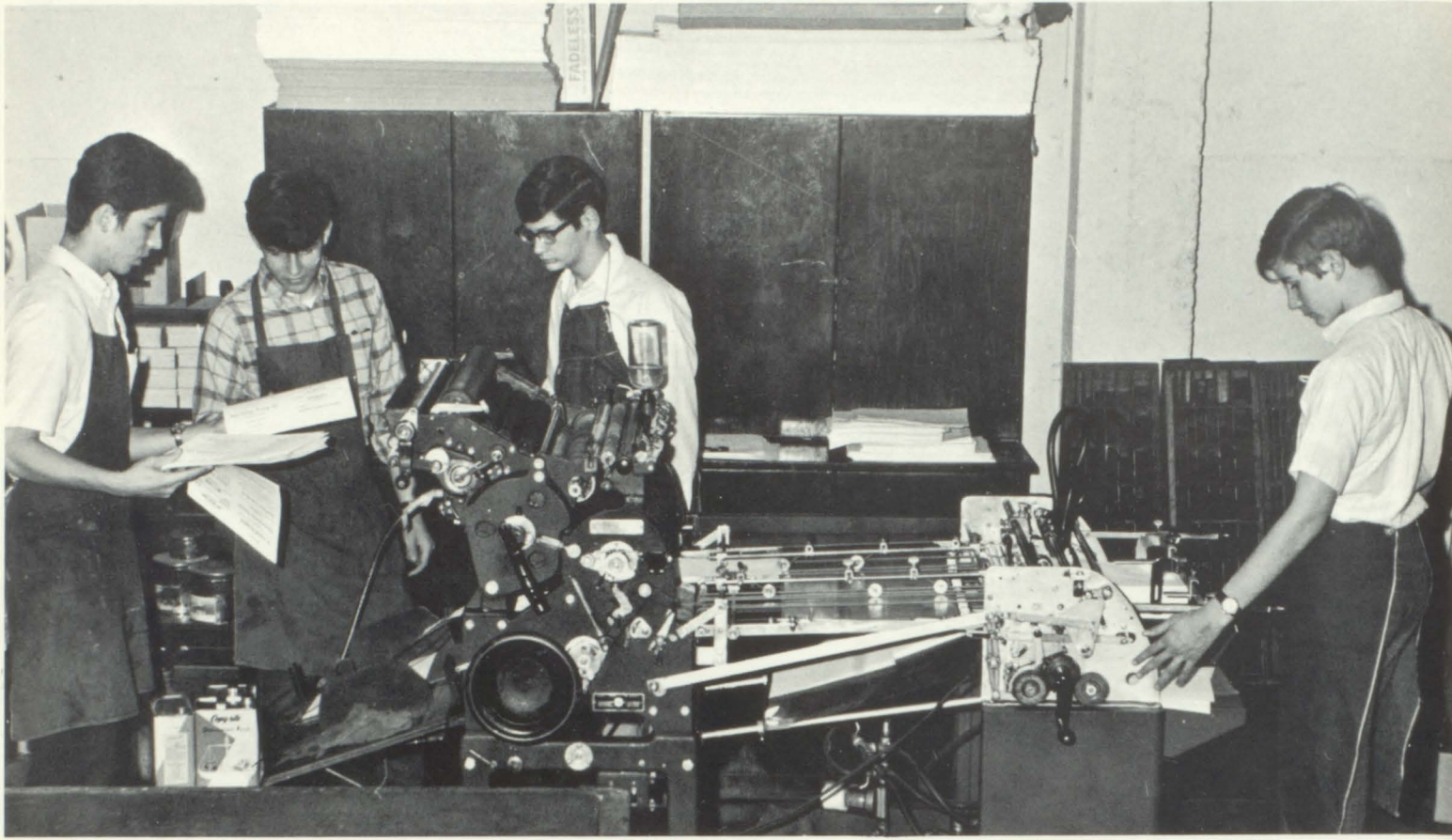
## *Physical Education Shapes Up Life at Lillis*

Sister Mary Ruth instructs students in printing, which can be a valuable art, if developed properly. Some of the skills taught are type setting, letter press and offset printing.

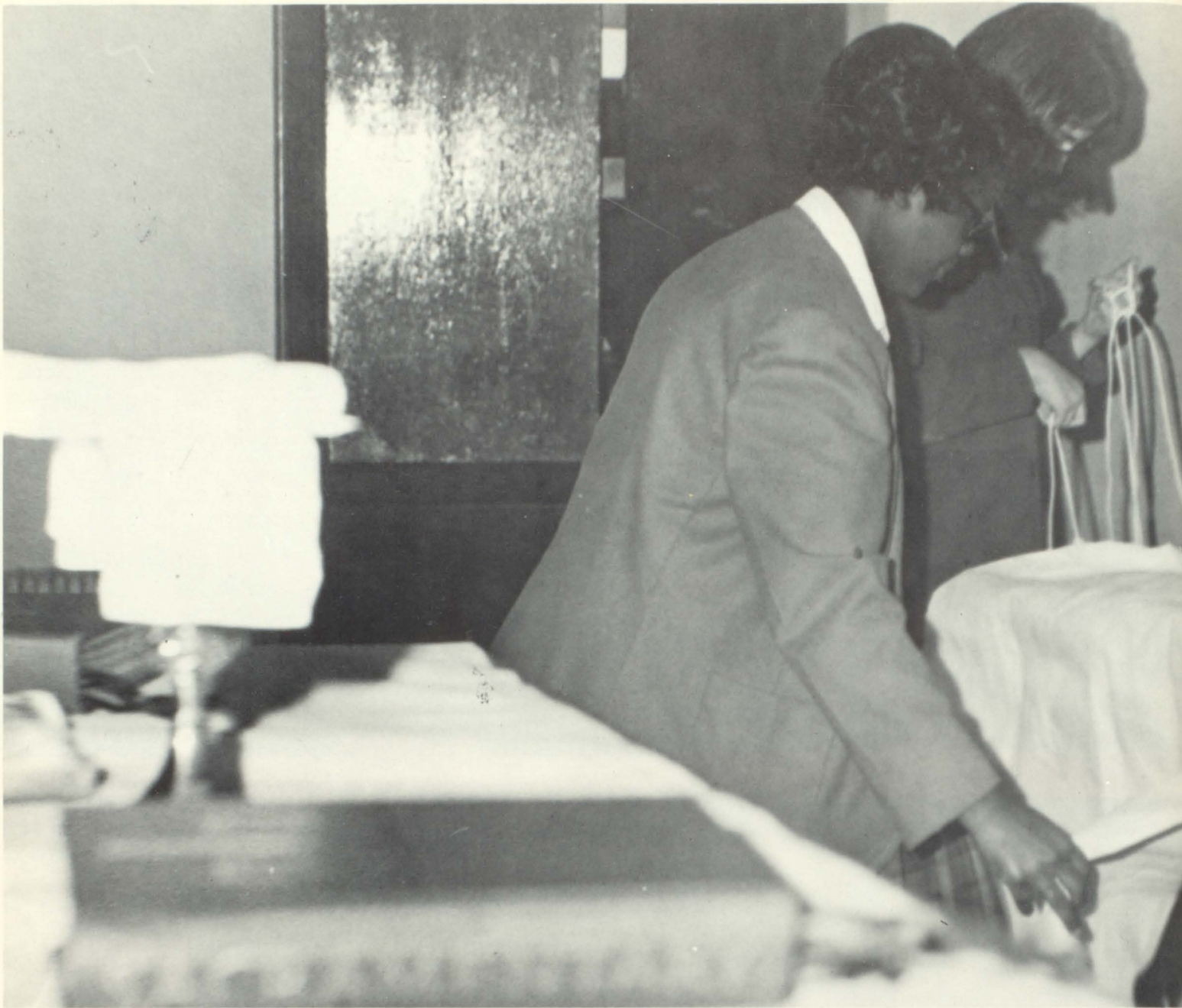
Drafting, taught by Coach Mintner, enables the student to visualize in three dimensions, to think precisely, and to gain experience in making working drawings according to modern commercial practice.

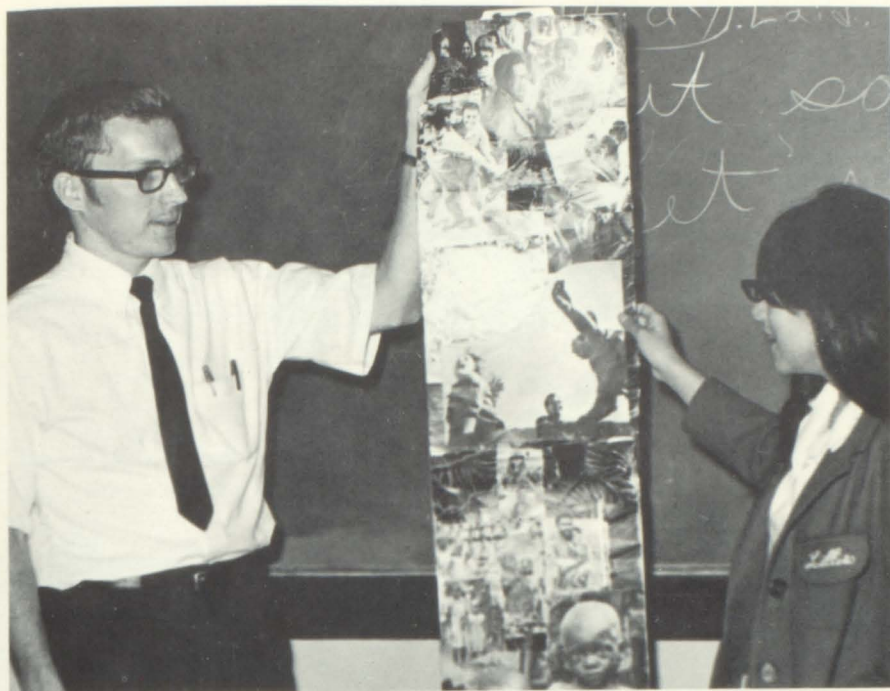

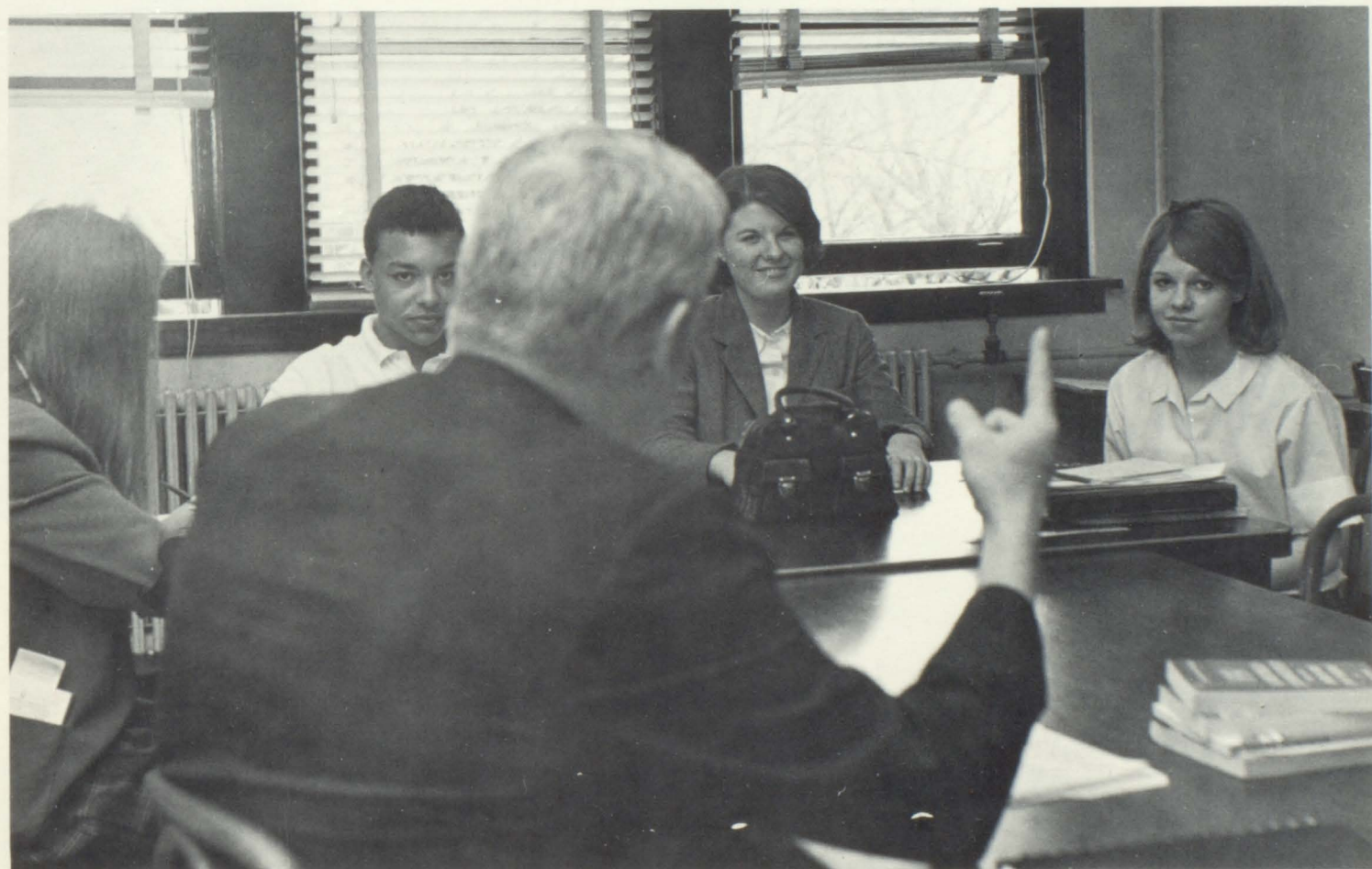


## Religion Curriculum Includes Social Action

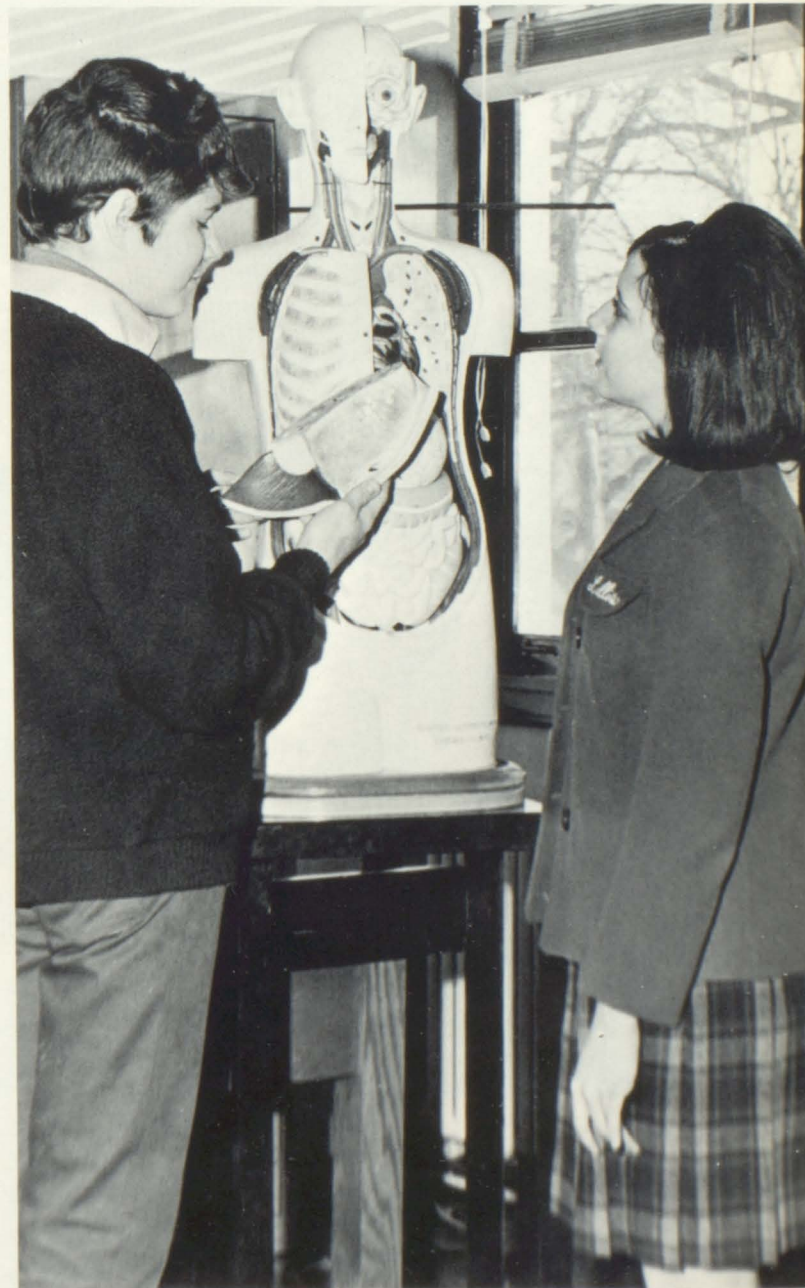

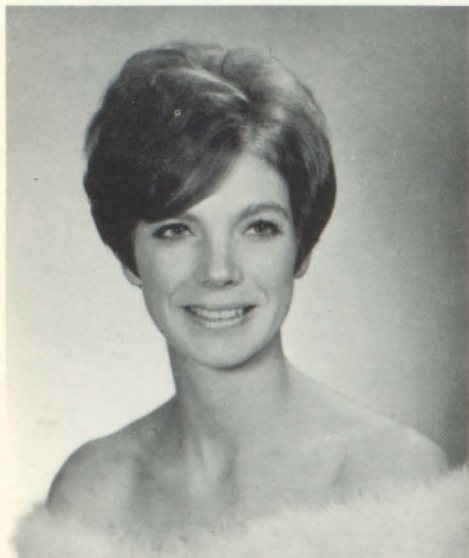

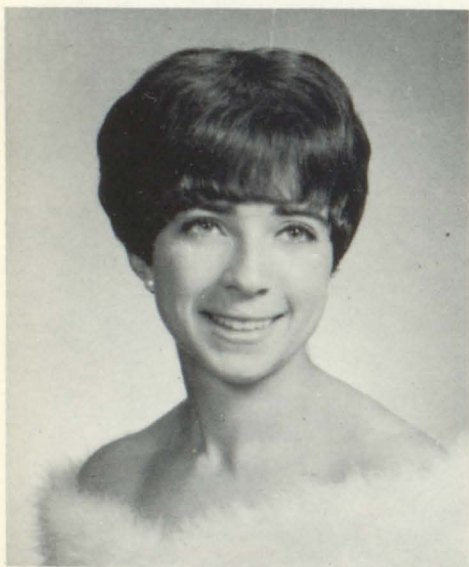

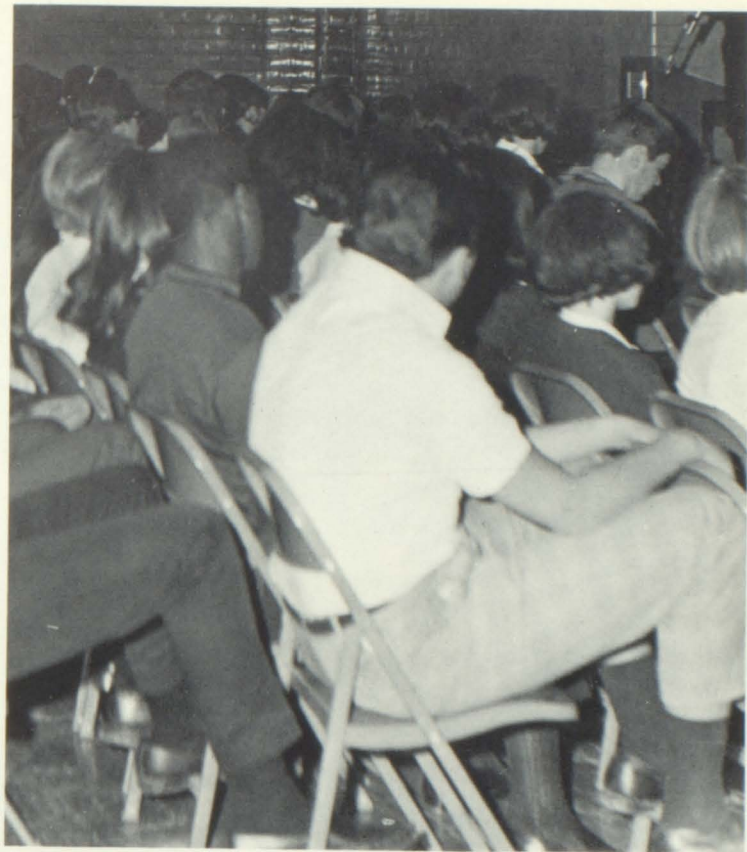

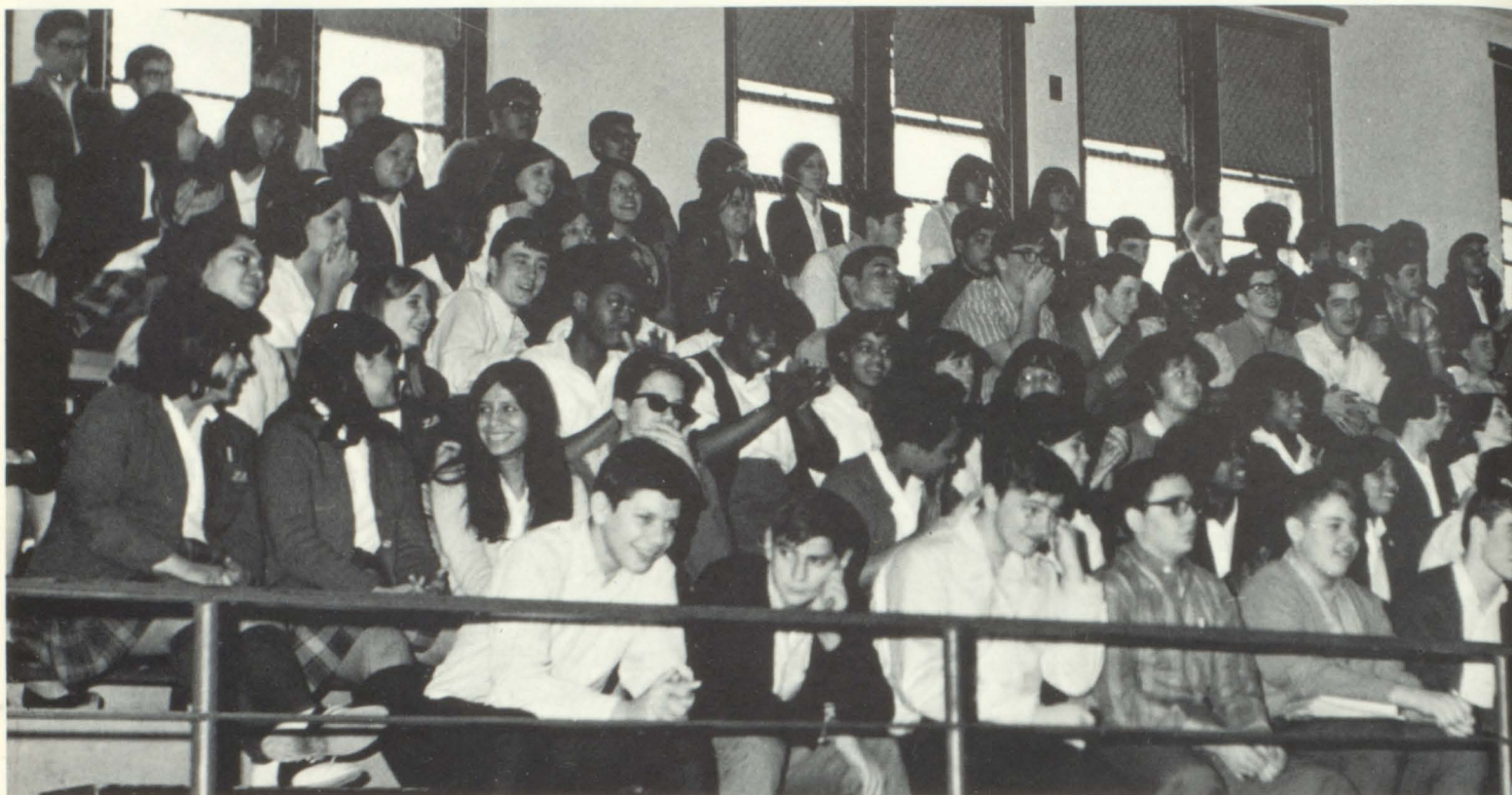
Interest and Solemnity prevailed at the general sessions of the Retreat.

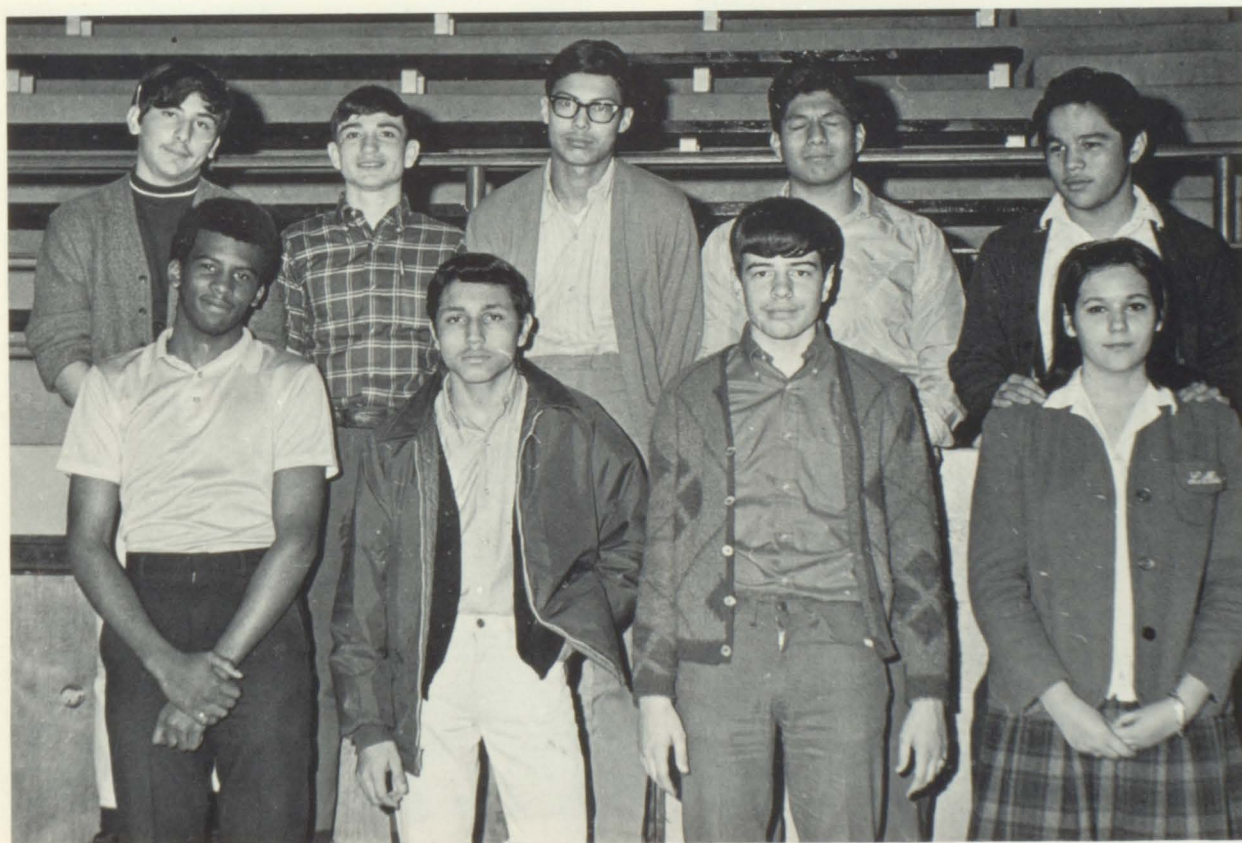

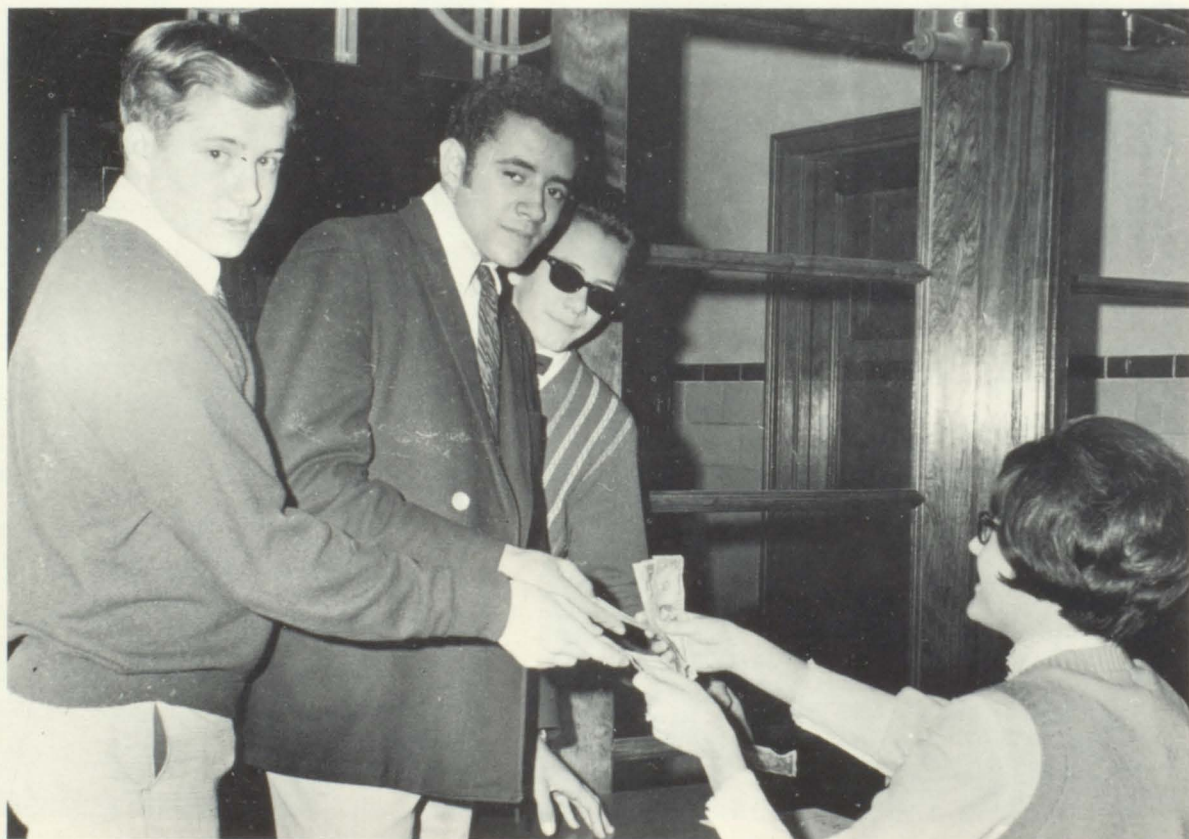
## *STUCO Exercises Initiative and Ability*

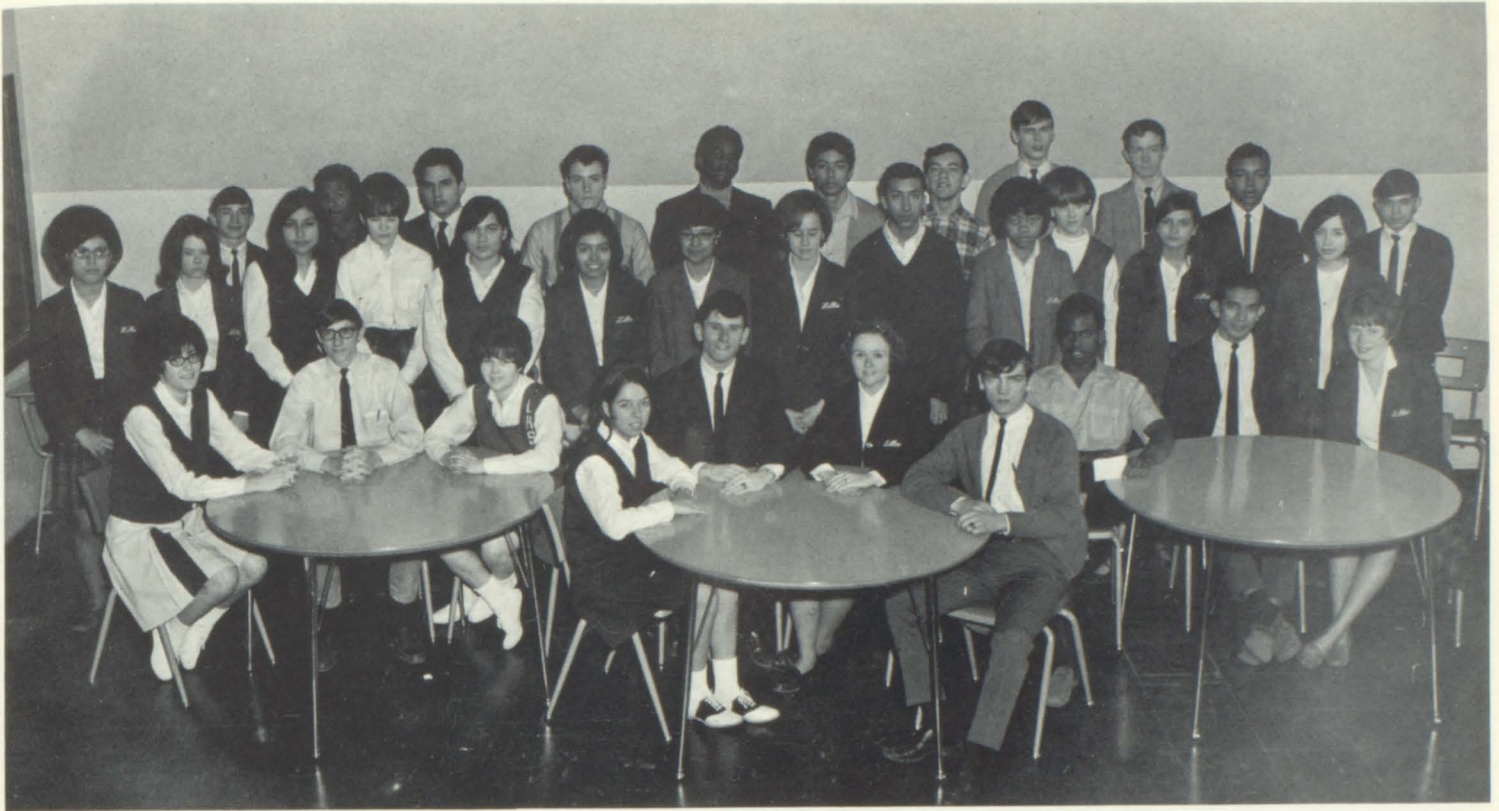
The 1968-69 Student Council consisting of 35 outstanding members of the student body was the first council to become operational under the newly amended constitution.

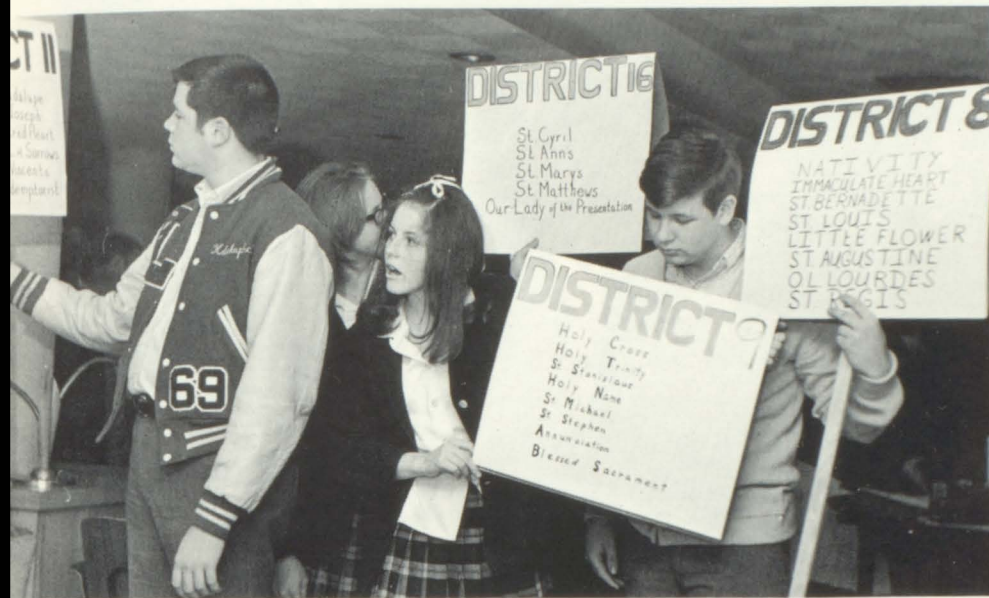


# Worthwhile Projects

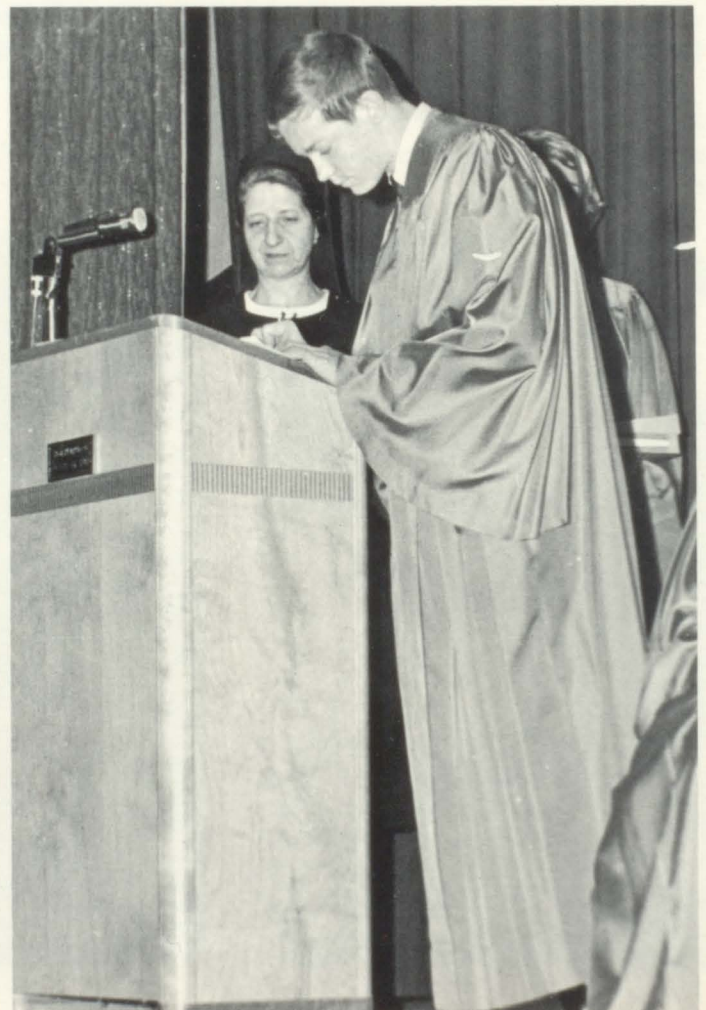

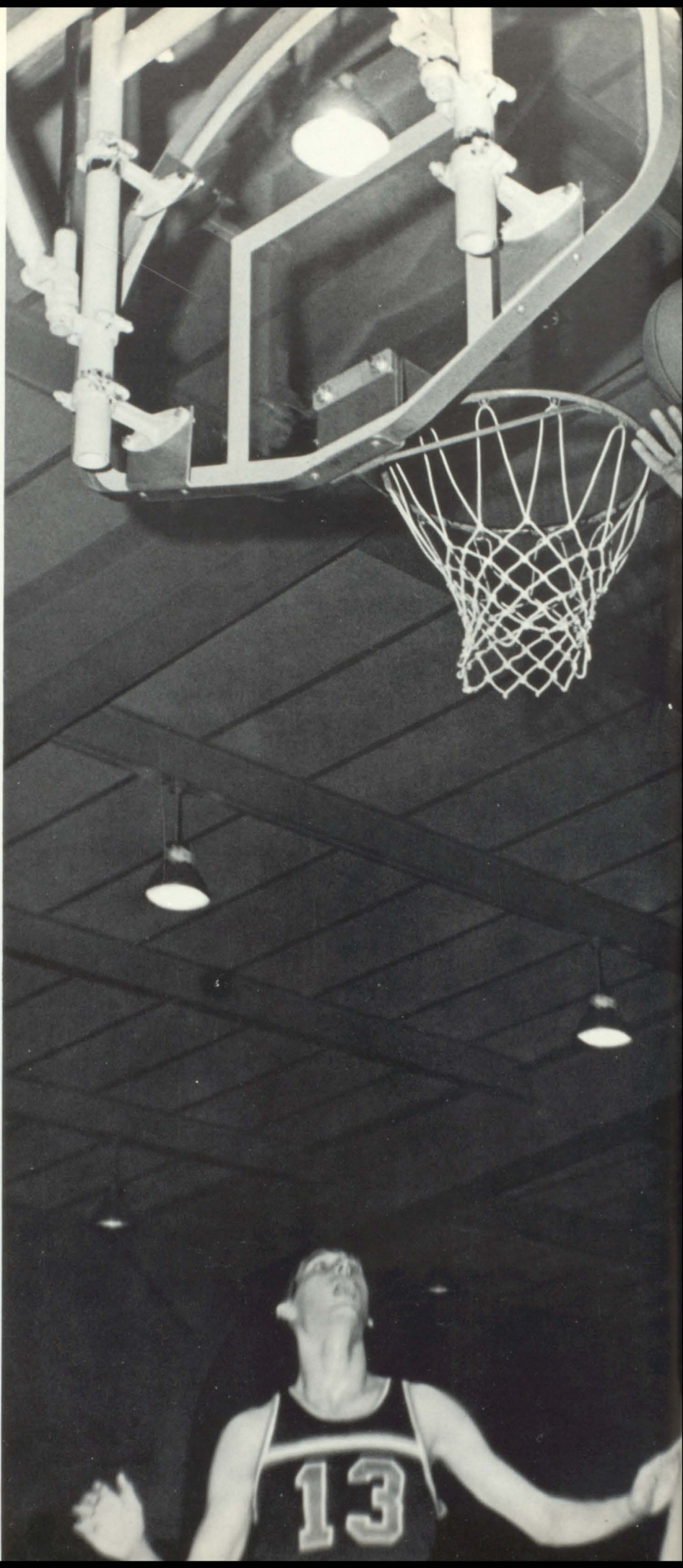

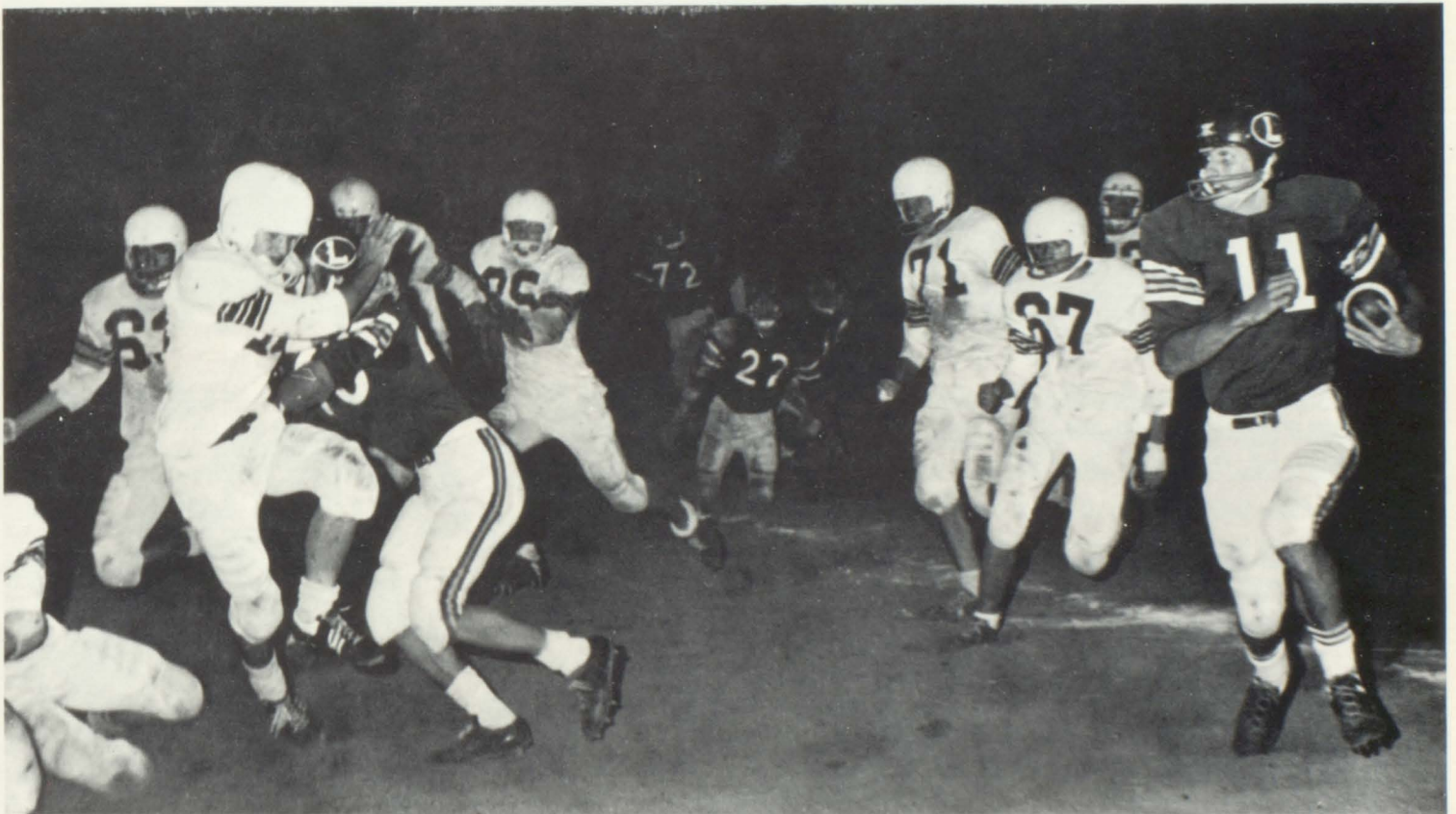

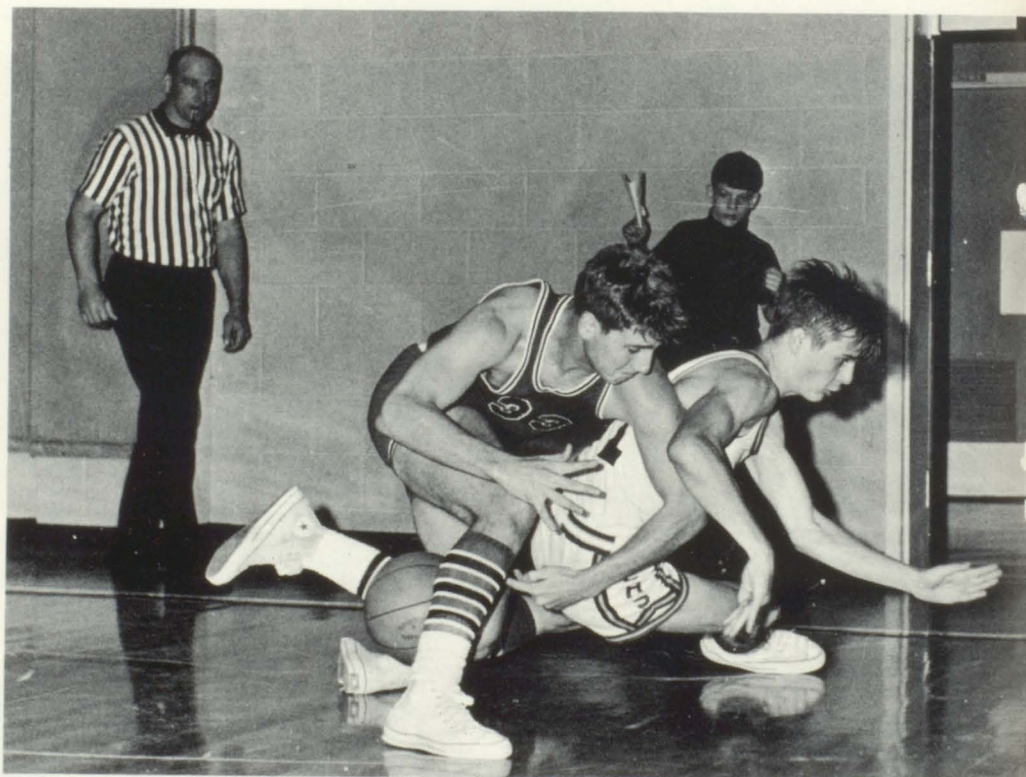

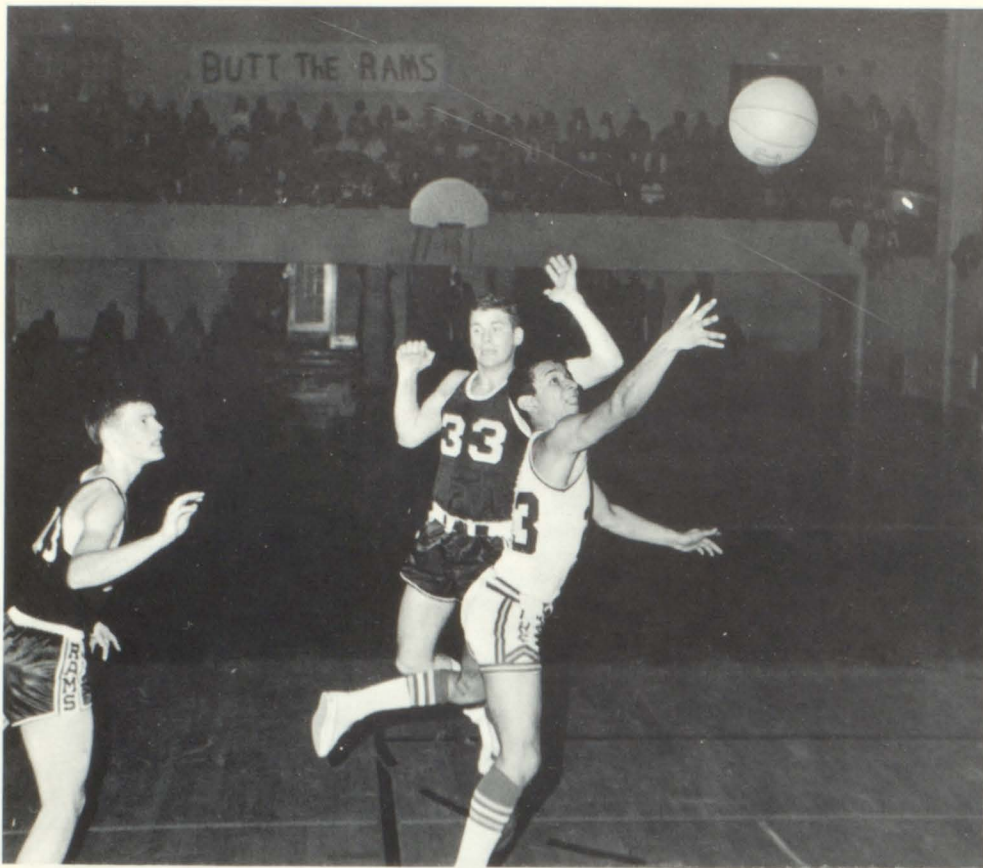
## *Coach Periera Guides Varsity Through Successful Season*

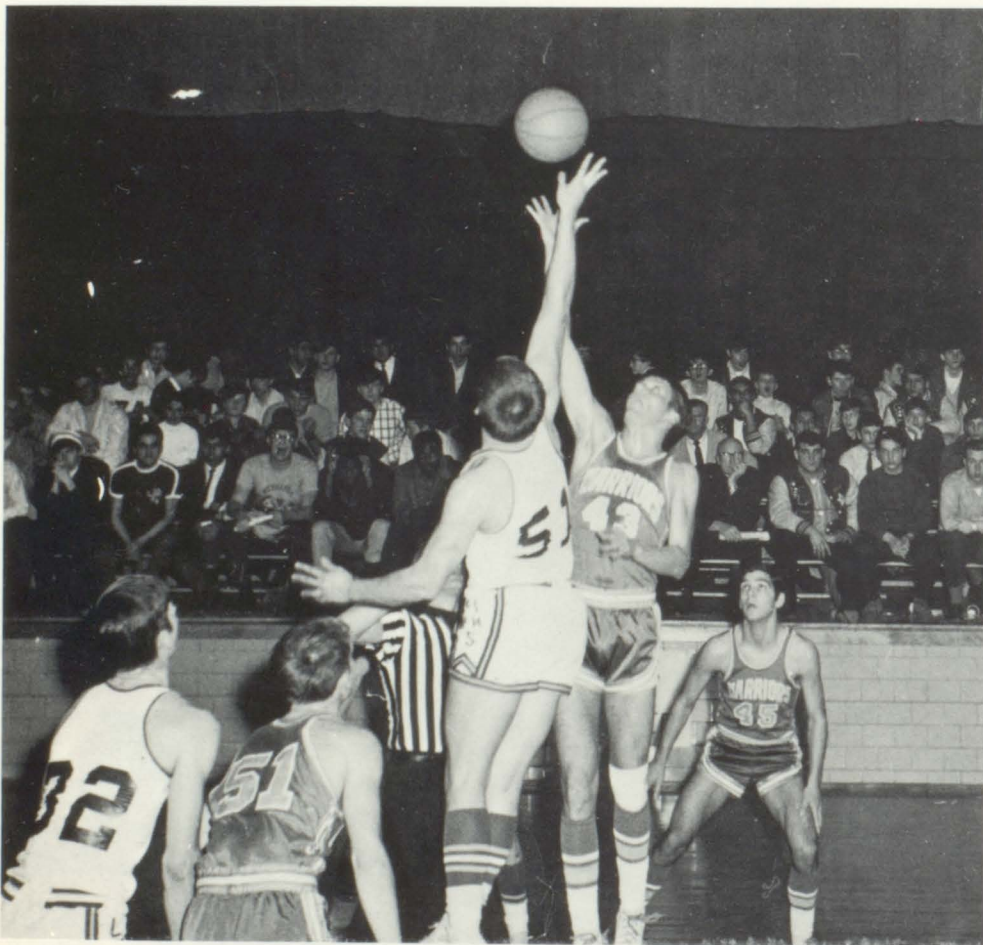

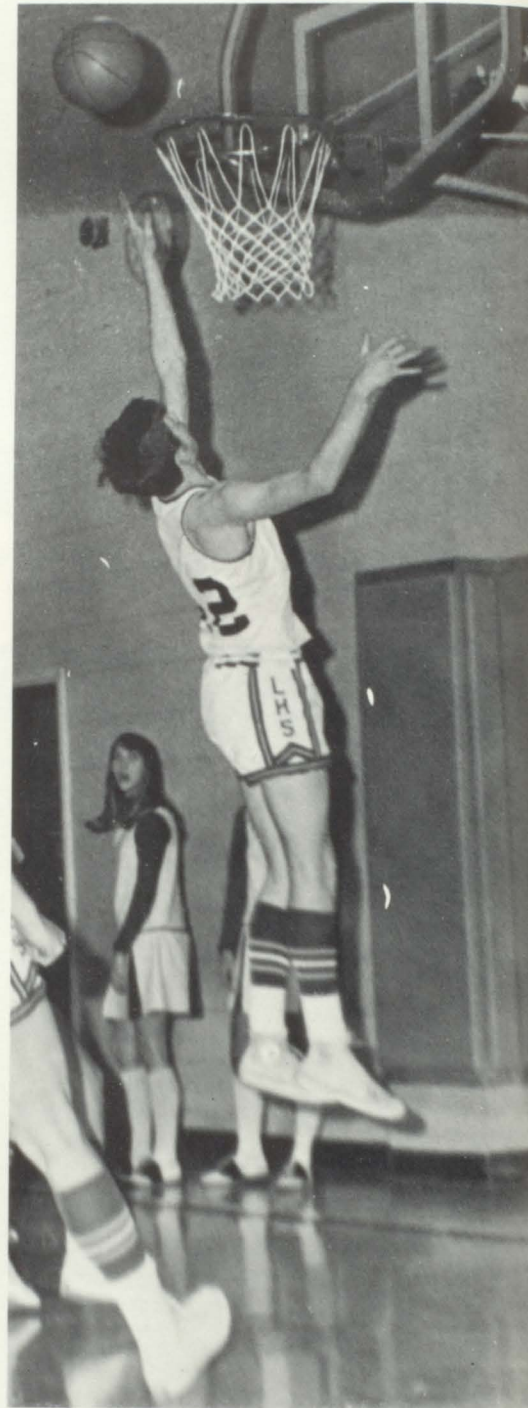
