times.




"Being a twin, there are both some good things and some bad things, but the best part is knowing that they'll always be there," senior Joe Wheeler said.

#### Events around the world hit home



"I love seeing all of the kids dress up in their outfits and have such a good time. I volunteer at most of the dances just to see them," Pam Hahn said.









"Everyone contributed to the success of the play. We were all at every practice and we worked really hard," sophomore Cydney Carl said.


"I joined the cast of *The Baseball Show* because I thought it would be fun. I wanted the acting experience," sophomore Alex Myers said.



Mr. Michael took his Geometry class outside and created a human pyramid to help the kids learn about the Pascal's Triangle.





Not only is it a challenge for the students, but it is a challenge for the teachers as well.


"The most challenging aspect of teaching my collegecredit-classes is finding ways to engage the students with difficult texts," Dr. Maridella Carter said.



"Most people think that JROTC is all about the military and uniform but in actuality, we learn many skills that we will need throughout life," sophomore Mark Johnson said.



"The class covers pretty much everything, so you can basically go one way or another," senior John Plukett said.







"In the spring, the JAWS Stream Team picked a section of the Missouri River and cleaned that area," Dr. Maridella Carter said.







"Club 121 was a great place for Christians to get together and worship God," senior Audra Hanke said.









"I enjoy being in ACE be cause it gives me a chance to express my feelings on being an African- American," sophomore Wayne Kindle said.


The purpose of ACE is to better inform the school about the African-American culture.









"We had a camp out at our coach's house. We put up tents, had races and got to know our team better," junior Emily Petelin said.


The volleyball season lasted only three months of the year, but to be a part of the team it was a year long commitment.







Every sport was bound to have some good times and some bad. Although the soccer team's record was not as good as the players had hoped, they still gained many things from the season.


"I made many new friends this year by playing soccer. We had lots of pasta parties and it was fun just being together." freshman Eric Hobbs said.





Captains weren't the only team leaders. "It's really surprising how the freshmen have been the ones to show leadership, but it's very impressive," sophomore Seth Henson said.







"I love the social aspect of the team, being with awesome coaches and friends I've grown close to," Elrod said.


The friendships developed


Having some wrestlers out, due to injuries, at the beginning of the season was a setback.

However, the wrestlers were able to overcome the obstacles and reached their goals.



Six wrestlers qualified for state and five of the six placed individually. Each wrestler put forth their best effort to add to the team points to take the State title again.









"Tve played basketball all four years of high school and I put the most effort into this year. It's my senior year and I just want to do my best and be a team leader," senior Matt Watley said.


When the team wasn't working hard at practice, they were busy spending quality time together.






For over half the team, their high school baseball career was over. They will always remember the family like bond among their teammates and the fun times they shared.










High schoolers were nominated and then Officer Allen Kintz reviewed their applications to become a tutor. You have to be a positive role model," senior Liz Andrews said.






