







ATTITUDES










"I feel the science classes are an essential part of my education even though the courses are not required," commented AMY EISENSTEIN, senior.







Some of the courses offered are Pre-Algebra, Algebra, Geometry, Algebra II & Trigonometry, Calculus, and Math Topics I & II. 
PREPARING FOR JOBS

Data processing, typing, shorthand, business law, clerical practices, computer systems and accounting are all business classes designed to give students sellable skills.







TITLE IX CHANGES P.E.


On July 21, 1975 President Gerald Ford passed what is known as Title IX. Title IX insures the rights of the sexes to get equal treatment in both Physical Education & Athletics. Under this law equal facilities, equipment, and scheduling are to be furnished for both sexes.

Center became one of the first schools in the K.C. area to put this ruling into effect. Co-ed physical education classes were offered, along with all non-contact sports such as bowling, golf, volleyball, and archery.


Some other changes in the department were the 30-year-old lockers in the boys locker room were replaced and the Booster Club purchased additional equipment for the weight room.












DRIVER'S ED Brings fun

Drivers Education is a class designed to teach students how to drive a car and the laws of driving. Because the class is only one semester long, most students take Drivers Education their sophomore year. To be able to take this class you must be 151/2 and not have your driver's license. The class is designed for simulation, classroom discussion, and actual driving. Center is one of the few schools in Missouri with simulators. Many reasons are expressed for taking Drivers Education, but most agree it's to get insurance cheaper. One of the most important parts of taking Drivers Education is that it is one class that you will remember what you have learned.





HEADSTART ON CAREER

This year students who wanted a headstart in learning a career for the future took part in the Vo Tech program. The course, being open to only juniors and seniors, had 48 students enrolled in it.

The Vocational-Technological School is divided into the East and West campuses, which are both located in Rayton.

The program is designed so that the student goes to their own school for half a day and then rides a bus out to the Vo Tech school for the rest of the day.

They are offered such courses as Mechanics, Commercial Building Management, Cosmetology, Food Service, Data Processing, Graphic Arts and many other courses which will help to prepare the student for the future.





Decorating a float for Homecoming and having a banquet in the spring were some of the highlights of the Spanish Club.









EFFORTS PROVE WORTHY



"Key Club played a large roll in my social involvement in school, as well as my educational learnings," stated JOHN CONSTANT.











DEDICATION






VOTING

This year the Political Science Club sponsored the Model UN and the Model Senate. Along with that they held a Mock Election. To vote in the election students were given one week in September to register to vote.


Members of the club plastered the halls with posters for everyone ranging from Presidential candidates to Circuit Court Judge races.

EXPERIENCE GAINED

Model U.N. and Model Senate are two clubs that Political Science Club supports. They are designed for the student to learn parlimentary proceedure and other various aspects of the Senate and United Nations meetings.

On Jan 21, sixteen students attended a Senate meeting at Park College in Parkville, Mo. Eight of the students actually participated as senators and the other eight went as observers.

"The Model U.N. was particularly valuable because it gave participants the chance to discuss with students from other schools major international issues. It also provided some practical insight into the workings of the United Nations," stated JON DRITLEY. On March 2, six students went to Washington D.C. for four days to attend a Model U.N. meeting. 









This was said to be one of the largest turn outs for a fall play here at Center. If you attended the play either night it would be quite understandable why the turn out was so large.


The acting was outstanding, more elaborate sets were used. More money was spent for costumes than plays in the past, and fast costume changes were required with little time allowed for them.






BANDS KEPT BUSY


It was doubtful that there would be a Community Resource class this year, but strong student interest overcame the doubt.

I happen to love football and that is one of the main reasons for going out. I guess another reason for playing is because I wanted to prove to myself that I could play football.


I had always had real good football seasons and my first year at Center was a little scary, but I learned alot and got a chance to play















Combining the talents of players from the sophomore team, juniors from the varsity squad and the JV regulars we joined to form the junior varsity squad.



















Many new, but experienced players contributed to the welfare of the team. These individuals will make fine competitors next year as the Yellowjackets look forward to an even more successful season.








Fifth quarter the end




Projects Raise Funds

Many activities are performed by BBYO chapters. There are five main functions or folds. They are religious, cultural, social, athletic, and community service.








High school big step




The class of 1979 was a class of spirit. The sophmore class added pep and excitement to the football and basketball games this year.

This year brought many changes to the clubs here at Center. One club is C. G.S.A., which is Center Girls Sports Association.




Teachers adjust fast








Another group who have an active part in helping students is the bus drivers. Without the bus drivers many students would be without transportation to and from school and other school affiliated activities.






Small services, big jobs
