BOYS' AFFIRMATIVE

BOYS' DEBATE TEAM

T

OR THE first time in the history of high school debating in Kansas City, Missouri, Central's boys' debate teams have gone through four successive years of interscholastic competition without experiencing a single defeat. This record has been achieved through hard work on the part of the boys from

Central and their coach.

By gaining a double victory over two opponents last year the debate team secured the Amherst trophy as the permanent possession of Central, she being the first school to win for three successive years. In 1924, Central defeated her two opponents; as did Manual. Central and Manual then debated off the tie, and Central was acclaimed victor. In 1925, with three veterans, Central won both debates, defeating Westport, 3-0, and Northeast, 2-1. Her record last year was exceptionally brilliant when it is considered that with a new coach and only one returning debater from the former year, she established as excellent a record as that of the two preceding years. This year, with but one veteran on the team, Central swept through to victory over Westport and East High school, a new, but powerful entry into high school competition.

This year, contrary to the plan adhered to previously, the debates were held in the afternoon at 1:30 o'clock, the classes being shortened in order to enable the students to hear the contests. The plan was inaugurated with the idea that if the debates were held in the afternoon it would enable more persons to attend the affrays. The success of the plan was indicative by the increased attendance.

On February 16, of this year, the boys' debates resulted in a complete victory for Central. The negative team, debating Westport's affirmative team at home, on the question, "Resolved, that the Phillipine Islands should be given their immediate independence," won a unan mous decision over her opponent. Meanwhile, our affirmative team, opposing the East High negative team in their auditorium, won a 2-1 victory in the first clash between the two schools.

Central was the only school in the city to have, including the girls' debates, four victories and no defeats to its credit. Manual and Paseo placed second with one defeat each. Incidentally, former Central students were representatives on each of these teams.

The affirmative team, composed of Jack Morris, first speaker; Murray Schwartz, second speaker; Lester Salwinsky, third speaker and captain; and Grant Anderson, alternate; journeyed to East, where they, though faced with strong opposition, proved to their audience and the judges that the Phillipines should undoubtedly be given their immediate and absolute freedom. Jack Morris, first Central speaker, opened the affirmative side of the question by proving that the United States is both

morally and legally obligated to grant the Phillipines immediate independence. Murray Schwartz, as second speaker, continued the affirmative argument by proving that the Phillipines have established and are maintaining a stable government. In concluding the case for the affirmative, Lester Salwinsky proved that they are capable of maintaining and filling international obligations and that world conditions are compatable. The East team retaliated with a strong and admirable appeal, endeavoring to undermine the affirmative's arguments by entreating that the step was unethical and not in accordance with moral laws; that the Phillipines were were financially unstable and politically unprepared. Despite the excellence of her opponent, however Central's convincing proofs and sparkling oratory received two of the three votes awarded by the judges for a winning decision.

The Westport team was unable to cope with our forceful negative team in either speeches or rebuttal and consequently lost a debate infused with enthusiasm and rigor.

Central's forsenic opponents, in an appeal to moral right, to the stable government of the Phillipines and to the favorable economic conditions of the Islands, presented arguments of a sound policy and in a convincing manner. Central's negative team consisted of: first speaker, Caspar Garrigues; second speaker, Charles Hackler; third speaker and captain, Donald Cox, the sole veteran of the team of 1926; and David Newcomer, alternate. The negative team centered its attack on the fact that it would be an extremely unsound diplomatic policy to give independence. Caspar Garrigues opened the negative attack by explaining that we have not yet fulfilled our trust with the Phillipines. Charles Hackler continued the negative's analysis by proving we were not legally obligated to grant immediate independence. Donald Cox, in concluding the argument for the negative team, pointed out that it would be an unsound diplomatic policy and that it would be economically unwise to grant their independence.

In rebuttal, Central cautiously and decisively proceeded to defeat each issue of their opponents proofs, tearing apart and destroying the arguments one by one. The unanimous decision awarded to the Central team bespoke plainly the attitude and the judges.

A. B. Richmond, who this year coached Central, should receive much of the praise and appreciation resulting from the double victory. Coordinating and guiding a team, of which only one was on last years team, with untiring efforts and appreciable skill, he contributed another debate truimph to the annals of Central history.

The outlook for Central next year should be far from disheartening. The return of Charles Hackler, David Newcomer and Grant Anderson, all three of whom were on the team this year, as juniors, will insure Central of at least an unusual advantage. With the reputation of four successful years behind them it is certain that the utmost will be expelled from them in an effort to retain supremacy in the forsenic field.

GIRLS' DEBATE TEAM

N WINNING a double victory from their rivals, the Central girls' debate teams again brought the championship of the city into the ramparts of our intellectual fortress, after an absence of but one year.

Casting aside the shadow of defeat, which had so long proved impenetrable to our Blue and White orators, the team wrested a double victory from her opponents in 1925, when she successfully conquered the Westport affirmative and Northeast negative debaters. That year Central brought the championship into her halls with a high spirit. In 1926, however, Central, unable to secure a double victory over her worthy rivals, witnessed both success and defeat in her arduous attempt to retain the city championship standing set the year before. The results were a 2-1 decision in favor of the affirmative team against Westport's negative, while Central's negative was defeated by a 2-1 vote cast for Manual's affirmative.

The question this year, "Resolved, That the Henry Ford five-day-week should be adopted by all large manufacturers," was threshed out to an inimicable degree on Wednesday afternoon, February 9.

Central's affirmative team invaded East High School and presented its arguments in such convincing and forceful fashion that a unanimous vote was accorded them over their opponents, the negative aggregation of East High School. Meanwhile, the negative team successfully met and defeated Westport's affirmative team at home with a 2-1 victory.

At East the Central invaders, composed of Katherine Burnett, first speaker, Betty Herzensteil, second speaker and captain; and Edith Wells, third speaker; with Lucille Nairn as alternate, based their arguments on the fact that it was not injurious to industry, that it would prove a benefit to the worker and would better the unemployment situation now existing.

At Central, the negative team, composed of Dorothy Lane, first speaker; Mary Webb, second speaker; and Josephine Scroggs, third speaker and captain; with Helen McGee as alternate, delivered speeches so well organized that, although faced by one of the strongest teams seen at Central, she won the decision of the judges. Dorothy Lane, the first speaker for Central's negative, explained the disadvantage of the plan to all large industries. Mary Webb, second speaker, continued the negative argument by maintaining that a five-day forty-hour week was a social menace because of the lowered living and health standards. Josephine Scroggs, Central's negative captain, closed the affirmative argument by proving that the five-day weak plan has not

accomplished its purpose and that the industries using the plan are not finding it successful at the inset,

In a rebuttal featuring emphatic and decisive speeches, the negative maintained that the plan was impractical and pointed out that the affirmative had dodged the issue by limiting the industries in which the plan was practicable while the question was: Resolved, That all large industries should adopt it. The Westport arguments, while powerful, lacked the co-ordinated unity which obviously was the outstanding virtue of the Central speeches, nor were they supported by such authentic and conclusive evidence.

It must be readily connived that on Miss Margaret Farrell as coach of the girls' teams, much and unsparing praise should be bestowed Her able management, extensive and unceasing labor, her vast knowledge and resourcefullness aided the two teams materially in their intensive preparation for the contest. It was through sheer power and persistency that Miss Farrell developed such an efficient and cohesive machine.

A powerful factor in the excellency of the teams was the return of Josephine Scroggs and Betty Herzensteil, both of whom were on the team last year. Around them the unit power was developed.

Otto F. Dubach, principal, acted as chairman at Central. The judges were Miss Nettie Huff of Huff's Business college, Miss Elizabeth Scott, former Manual debate coach and Mr. Floyd C. Holmes, of Northeast. Miss Sadie Mac Millan of Paseo was alternate judge. The chairman at East High school was Principal Nowlin and the judges consisted of Mr. Guy V. Price, of the Kansas City Teachers' college; Miss Julia Guyer, history teacher at Northeast High school; and Mr. Ogg, instructor of mathematics at Paseo High School.

In all four debates the main speeches on both sides were well organized and delivered, and at no time during the debates were the contests permanently decided. The rebuttals revealed the power of all the teams. Sharp and decisive, a continual fire of questions and replies hurled from one team to the other.

Next year, with the return of five veterans, Mary Webb, Dorothy Lane, Katherine Burnett, Edith Wells and Lucille Nairn, all of whom were juniors this year, it is strongly and justly predicted that Central's representatives on the debaters' platform will again be successful in securing premier honors and in support of their enviable reputation by winning for the second consecutive year. The success of both the girls' and boys' team this year was dependent upon almost identical factors. Co-operation among the team members, the presentation of compact, well-balanced cases in the development of which each speaker aided almost equally; these things may be defined as large factors in the success of Central's intellectual contestants.

The thirty-third annual fall play was directed by Miss Virginia Robertson. Replete with humor, snap and originality the production entertained large and responsive audiences each evening.

In conjunction with the usual effort the play was also given with an aim toward the raising of a sum of money to enable the purchasing of dimmers for the stage.

The plot of "Honor Bright" centers around the difficulties and complications involved when Richard Barrington invites his fiancee Tot Marvel, a chorus girl, to his parents' summer home at Beach Haven, Massachusetts, for a visit,

Dick, a well bred but somewhat daring son of a wealthy, prominent New England family becomes infatuated with Tot Marvel, a chorus girl in the Broadway sensation, "Snap-it-up." After Barrington has invited Tot to his home for a visit he learns that his wealthy aunt and uncle, the Reverend and Mrs. William Carton are also making a short stay. As Dick wishes to be the heir of the Carton fortune he feels it important that Miss Marvel make an excellent impression on his staid relation. Imagine his surprise and disgust when Tot's trunk arrives promptly but the chorus girl does not appear. While Dick, almost frantic with her absence worries and frets. Honor Bright, a well bred, young and enterprising book agent calls at the home. Dick succeeds in persuading this cultured and winsome girl to fill Tot's absence. The plan succeeds until Tot arrives. Owing to an escapade in which she was nearly imprisoned she was unable to be on time.

With the advent of Tot, Dick realizes that he is desperately in love with Honor and has not the slightest inclination toward Tot. The situation is critical until Aunt Carton voices her opinion that she has never believed Honor Bright to be a chorus girl. This is relieving. When Bill Drum, the blustering but humorous press agent arrives, all the clouds show their silver lining.

Gathering up Ouija, Tot's pet pup, and taking Tot by the arm he departs for the sorcery made by his unscrupulous, plotting cousin. But, contrary to the cousin's justice of the peace, leaving Honor and Dick enfolded, each in the others arms.

The success of the play was due largely to the capability of the cast. Billy Weeks captivated the audience with her successful interpretation of Honor Bright on Friday night.

Lois Bridges excelled in the following performance. The nature of Richard Barrington was typified by Paul Reichard and Paul Gribben with their nervous and emotional temperaments.

Tot Marvel was presented in a charming and breezy fashion by Virginia Lohefner and Patsy Gilday. Mrs. Carton was played commendably by Florence Naysmith and Edith Wells, while her husband, the Rt. The enthusiastic applause and laughter of the audience bespoke the success of Watts the butler, by Jack Parsell and Herman Ferguson. Russell Huggins as the Reverend James Schooley reduced the audience to the wildest merriment with his feminine characteristics.

Other members of the cast who did outstanding work were: Melbourne Ford, as the messenger boy; Francis Tiffany and William Morgan, as the chauffer; Grant Anderson and Chilton Creason in the role of Foster, the enterprising gardener; Florence Hoffman and Florence Fields, depicting meek Annie, the maid; Irwin Spiegels portraying Simpson, the sheriff; the role of Maggie, the irate cook was upheld by Rosalyn Shear and Velma McIntyre; Stanley Keiter and Francis Tiffany enacted the role of Jones, deputy sheriff commendably.

Many prominent factors figured in the success of the production. The time and effort given by Miss Robertson in the direction, coupled with her ability, was the greatest of these factors. To J. M. Lukens and C. O. Williams, as business manager and stage manager, respectively; A. H. Roberts, auditorium manager; and G. M. Lortz, manager; Sol Studna, properties; George Wopat, electrician; and Harold Manuel, also deserve an ample portion of praise.

Humorous situations are prevalent and intertwine throughout the play. There are four neighborhood friends who engage in a quarrel over the sale of a horse. Mr. and Mrs. O'Dowd, the former owners of the horse may be looked upon as crafty salesmen while Mr. and Mrs. McGinnis are the credulous but unfortunate buyers.

When the story opens, Mona, a girl of twenty has just returned from Dublin where she had been in school for two years. Her presence in the house not only disturbed Bridget, who expected to have her smooth and easy ways upset, but her designs upon Dennis might be thwarted. Margaret Flinn was comforted to a large extent by the timely arrival of Lawrie Linnering, a handsome dapper young man just returned from Dublin to the village, where his father, the Squire owned immense estates. Lawrie was instantly infatuated by Mona, and his father willingly gave his consent to the marriage on condition that Dennis would turn over the marriage dower. Denn's, however, had inwardly loved Mona, also, and had hidden his love all the years. It was with great consternation and not a little surprise that Lawrie realized he was not loved by the winsome Mona, when, one summer evening, she rebuked severely for the attention he bestowed upon her. The truth of the whole situation was explained in the inner attitude of Mona toward Dennis. This girl realized she was infatuated with here guardian

Paul Reichard won admiration as Lawrie Linnering, the unsuccessful lover of Mona, as did also Jack Parsell in the roll of Squire Linnering, the money-grasping, scheming father. The characterization of Bridget O'Riley and Miss Margaret Flinn were successfully given by Edna Hemperly and Glenna Hahn.

In the Saturday night cast, Cecil Rogers as Dennis and Mildred Thomas as Mona made the most of their leads by equalling the success of the Friday night cast. Frank Dubach gave a pleasing and well-portrayed characterization of Lawrie Linnering, while his father, Squire Linnering was realistically produced this night by Herman Ferguson. Margaret Bradfield excelled in the part of Bridget as did Pauline Busch in the clever role of Miss Flinn.

Others in the cast who deserve special mention and who performed exceedingly well are: Rose Bayles as Nora, a child; Melbourne Ford and Velma Reece, as Michael, her brother; Granny, taken by Marjorie Lentz and Josephine Scroggs; Shirley Metzger and Ortis Johnson as Mr. O'Dowd; Dorothy Dameron and Marian Brenner as Mrs. O'Dowd, his wife; Mr. McGinnis, another peasant, by Richard Park, who played both nights; and Mrs. McGinnis, his wife, by Elizabeth Johannes and Mary M. Korfhage.

"Heart of Paddy Whack" was dedicated to the class of 1926, since that class furnished part of the money which was used to purchase the rheostats that operated throughout the play.

The success of this production is due to the talent and untiring efforts of Miss Virginia Robertson, the director. Others who helped to make this play a success are the stage crew, composed of Weir Mackie, Sol Studna and George Wopat; the business manager, C. O. Williams; director of properties, G. M. Lortz; and the auditorium manager, A. H. Roberts.

"YEOMEN OF THE GUARD"

EOMEN of the Guard," a Gilbert and Sullivan comic opera was presented on the nights of November 19 and 20, by the Choral and Glee clubs in the Central auditorium under the direction of Miss Mari F. Whitney. A series of Gilbert and Sullivan operas have been produced by the music department and with ever increasing success. The first opera produced was a medley of favorite songs and choruses from different Gilbert and Sullivan productions, all combined under the title of "All at Sea." This opera was in 1920. "The Mikado" was presented in 1921 and proved so successful that it was given a repeated performance the following year, and with even greater prosperity. In 1924 the opera was "Pinafore" which was given a two night run before large audiences. The production of "Pirates of Penzange" the following year proved the popularity of the opera. Three nights were required to accommodate patrons and in each production the play reached the ultimate height of success. Last year "Iolanthe" was selected and it, too, acclaimed a great success. The rapid growth of the popularity of this type of entertainment in Central High School is easily apparent. From the year of 1920, when it was found difficult to sell tickets for but a one-night performance, the annual opera of the Choral and Glee clubs has rapidly found favor in the eyes of the Central patrons until this year it was enthusiastically received by both the students and the elders who attended. The music department in presenting yearly such excellent entertainment has made a noticeable and unique contribution to both the music and the dramatics of Central.

The story of the opera is perhaps the most entertaining and humorous that has been seen on the Central stage. The plot of the "Yeomen of the Guard" deals mainly with the dashing, philosophical and romantic Colonel Fairfax and Elsie, a beautiful strolling singer. Colonel Fairfax has been condemned to death on the charge of sorcery made by his unscrupulous, plotting cousin. But, contrary to the cousin's expectations he marries Elsie on the eve of his execution so that she, instead of his unworthy cousin may reap the benefits he is to leave behind. With the assistance of

his friend Sergeant Meryll, Captain of the Tower Guard, whose life Fairfax has saved twice, the Colonel escapes from his prison cell and masquerades as Sergeant Meryll's son, Leonard. Saucy little Phoebe Meryll, who aided in Colonel Fairfax's escape, is ardently and jealously wooed by the grim and yet comical Wilfred, the head jailor. His love is for naught, however, because winsome Phoebe has lost her heart to the unheeding Colonel. Dame Carruthers, the housekeeper of the Tower, has a desperate horror of becoming a permanent widow and thus excercises her womanly wiles on the unwilling sergeant Meryll who has no desire for matrimony with this persistent old lady. Jack Point, the poor and clever jester, sighs in vain for the love of Elsie, but she too, has been captivated by the Colonel. The opera abounds with excitement and humor and ends with everyone contented.

Colonel Fairfax was well played by Robert Bohannon and Ruth Leonard who played opposite the Colonel as Elsie won the applause of the spectators. Phoebe Meryll, portrayed by Roma Robeson, captivated the audience with her winning ways and beautiful singing. Donald Tiff, as the jester added much zest to the performance with his wit and singing. Dame Carruthers and Sergeant Meryll's performance, by Carol Clendennin and William Cade respectively, lent much humor to the situation while the characters of Sir Richard and Sergeant Meryll's son were ably upheld by John Arcella and Clarence Philbrook. Gordon Houser may be commended on his excellent characterization of Wilfred and credit should be given to Albert Preston as the Headsman. The humor was increased by the six Yeomen: Billy Blanchard, Edward Myers, Howard Greene, Albert Lyons, Robert Warr, and John Selover.

Much credit should also be given to the following for their capable management: Miss Mari F. Whitney, director; J. M. Lukens, business manager; A. H. Roberts, auditorium manager; G. M. Lortz and Miss Coah Henry, scenery; A. E. Harley, Printing; and the stage crew: C. O. Williams, George Wopat, Weir Mackie, Harold Manuel and Sol Studna.

ITH the invocation of the activity group and its natural increase of stage entertainments, the stage crew has leaped in the limelight as never before. Barely a day passes which does not see the stage crew hard at work in the many and various phases of which it has charge of for years one of the established honorary organizations in Central has been this crew, composed of boys, who are interested in the mechanical features of presenting plays, motion pictures, and the other entertainments before the footlights. Aside from this interest these students must be the characterization of diligence and efficiency. Inaugurating the dimmers presented by the class of nineteen twenty-six, a certain amount of technical knowledge was required as to the operations involving the regulation and arrangement of lights behind the curtain and in the auditorium. Each play was assisted by the rapidity of the in the scene shifting and the handling of furniture, and other properties. Spotlights gleaming from the balcony are operated under the careful supervision of one of these men.

With the addition of a regular showing of motion pictures more knowledge was entailed as to the efficient operation of the machine. A familiarity with the entertainment given and a careful exercise of their own judgments in the important matters was also required.

Aside from the many minor productions and entertainments given this year, three plays were also given. "Yeomen of the Guard," "Honor Bright," and the "Heart of Paddy Whack," all three of which had two night runs. Each of the three productions contained three individual scenes, which also increased the work. That the enormus successes of these plays were due in no small part to the efficiency of the men behind the scenes there is no doubt.

ATHLETIC DIRECTORS



HE ENVIABLE record established by Central in the high school leagues has been largely due to the earnest efforts and co-operation of our three faculty athletic directors: Louis E. Menze, head coach; Harry S. Slaymaker, assistant coach; and T. E. Talmadge, business manager.

Coach Menze has completed his eighth year as head director of athletics at Central during which time the physical education department has shown consistent progress. It has been said of Menze that "There is probably not a coach in Kansas City who does not command the respect of his boys, but something akin to hero worship seems to spur Central's teams to deeds of greatness. FOOTBALL REVIEW

INTRODUCTION



HOSE who witnessed the bonfire and snake dance on Saturday night, November 13, which closed the 1926 football season, can well testify to the enthusiasm with which Central rooters celebrated the team's undefeated season. Along with the championship pennant, Central permanently annexed the Yale and

Harvard cups and succeeded in placing six players on the all-star team. The six honored all-stars are Dubach, Madison, Warden, Terwilliger, Bresette and Corti.

PRE-SEASON GAMES

Central opened the '26 season by winning for the sixth consecutive year her annual battle with St. Joseph, by a seven to six score. As the score indicates it was a hard fought game and both teams remained scoreless until the last quarter. In the last quarter, however, both teams scored and Central gained her extra point with a successful drop kick. The other pre-season game was played at Excelsior Springs and resulted in a scoreless tie. Central clearly outplayed the Excelsior Springs team, but with a muddy field and the breaks of the game against them the Blue and White failed to score.

FIRST GAME

A scoreless tie with Westport in a sea of mud marked the opening of the interscholastic league games, on October ninth. The condition of the field hampered the playing and though the Westport goal was neared several times, Central's gridsters failed to pierce the defense presented by the Blue and Gold. At the start of the second

quarter, Central succeeded in placing the ball on Westport's three yard line, but failed to cross the goal. The ball was placed close to the goal again in the third quarter but still the Westport line held and the game ended scoreless.

SECOND GAME

The following Saturday Central and Northeast staged one of the most spectacular games ever witnessed in the high school league, when they battled to a seven to seven tie. Throughout, the game was full of thrills, remarkable runs and sensational passing. Central's counters came early in the second quarter when Dubach, quarterback, drove four yards thru the line for a touchdown and then caught a pass from Severs for the seventh point. Shortly after that a long pass and a perfect drop-kick by a Northeast back tied the score. Thereafter the two teams battled on even terms until the final gun.

THIRD GAME

In the third round of play, the Central offense started functioning and Manual was left on the small end of a nineteen to six score. Manual opened the scoring by carrying a Central fumble for a goal, but failed to score thereafter. Central's three goals and one drop kick put the game on "ice."

FOURTH GAME

In the next game the Blue and White team smothered the Westport team with an avalanche of touchdowns, which, when the game ended, totaled fifty-one. Westport failed to score. Throughout, the game was rather uninteresting, due to the one-sidedness of the affair. Central seemed able to score at will even with the second string playing.

FIFTH GAME

In the second clash with Northeast, the next week, a twenty-five yard drop kick by Dubach in the last quarter gave Central the interscholastic championship for '26. The two teams fought for three quarters on even terms with no score until a series of plunges brought the ball to Northsast's fourteen yard line. After three more plunges had failed to gain the kick was attempted and resulted in a championship for Central.

SIXTH GAME

Central concluded her football season, by trouncing Manual twenty-seven to nothing, on Saturday, November 13th. The game was featured by the stellar line plunging by Madison and the accurate passing of Warden. Central scored every quarter and all goals but one were made good for seven points. By winning this game, Central further strengthened her right to the inter-scholastic championship and completed an undefeated season.



SECOND TEAM FOOTBALL.

FOOTBALL

ITH four victories and two defeats the second string football men accomplished the primary purpose of a second team—that of providing hard scrimmage for and helping round out a winning first team. Although not the champions, they have worked unceasingly in their efforts to aid the first team, and much credit should be given to that group composed largely of sophomores and juniors,

under the leadership of Jewell Campbell, fullback.

In the season there were no outside games. The first clash was with Westport at Tramway Park. Green, Westport's one man offense, was responsible for their consistent ground gaining and finally a touchdown. Central's only counter came when Campbell ran 45 yards for a touchdown. The final score stood 7 to 6, a hard fought Westport victory. This game was later forfeited to Central because of the ineligibility of Green, Westport half.

In the second contest Central met Northeast on the Tramway field and decisively routed the invaders, piling up a score of 26 to 6. At the outset, Campbell, Central half, caught the ball on the kick-off and ran 60 yards through a broken field for a touchdown. The aerial work of the reserves was the feature of the game.

The next round found Central paired off with Manual. In this game Manual's championship team clearly outplayed the Central men, chalking up a 19-0 score against them. The Central team seemed a trifle overconfident and tightened only when it was too late. In this game Phipps and Glass played well for Central.

The following game was forfeited to Central by Northeast because of extremely


cold weather, as our team had previously won over the Northeast Reserves.







BASKETBALL REVIEW

OLLOWING in the footsteps of her successful football team, Central's basket-ball team this year closed the season in first place, having won twelve of the thirteen games played. Three of the players were honored with all-star positions, those three being Arnold as captain and forward, Hartman as guard, and Sample at center. "This year's team has the finest record of any basket-ball aggregation in the last eight years," is Coach Menze's statement regarding our 1927 basketball team.

The first game of the season, December 10, gave the Central team a twenty-eight to twenty-five victory over the alumni. The victory came as a surprise, for the alumni team was exceptionally strong being composed of universal stars and members of the Ivanhoe team. The following week Central returned from Jefferson City with the long end of a fifty-nine to twenty score. Kauffman's stellar shooting in this game accounted for twelve of the goals. The last pre-season game was with Kansas City, Kansas High school and resulted in another victory for Central; the score being thirty-four to fourteen. Hartman's defensive abilities were largely responsible for the low score of the visitors.

Interscholastic competition opened January 15 with Central winning from Northeast by a twenty-nine to twenty score. This game clearly showed the smoothness of Central's offense and the exceptional strength of the defense. In this game, as before, Kauffman starred with his uncanny shooting.

Friday of the following week Central won her fifth victory by defeating Southwest, a team not as yet in the league, by a twenty-nine to twelve score. The lowness of the opponent's score shows the perfect functioning of the Blue and White defense.

A victory over Manual on the night of January 19 gave Central first place in the interscholastic league, a position she maintained until the end of the season. The score of this game was thirty-four to twenty-six.

Central's next game was with Central High school of St. Joseph and was concluded by a twenty-two to nine score and another Blue and White victory. The score does not indicate the hard fast game that was played, and although St. Joseph had a strong team the lack of substitutes resulted in her defeat. Roadcap and Sample were the most outstanding players of the game.

February 5, the team went to the enemy's camp and smothered the Paseo team with a fifty to nine score. Again Hartman's strong defensive abilities kept the Paseo team from scoring except at long range.

The game following, with Rockhurst, was one of the most thrilling of the season. With Rockhurst holding a twenty-two to twenty lead and only two minutes to play, Hartman succeeded in netting two goals and Sample one, which gave Central the twenty-seven to twenty-three victory. The game was played at Rockhurst and the long passes from one side of the court to the other kept the Menzemen busy at all times.

The following Friday the league schedule was resumed and Central emerged triumphant for the tenth consecutive time by defeating Westport thirty-four to twenty-two. Fuchs, a guard, carried off the individual scoring honors of the game by sinking five goals.

A twenty-three to eleven victory for Central was the outcome of the second encounter with Northeast. This, too, was a hard fought game with both teams showing excellent defensive ability.

On March 4 came one of the biggest "dope" upsets of the season, when the Manual quintet downed the Blue and White with a thirty-four to twenty-two score. Central forwards seemed to be off for they missed several "set-ups." Umphrey, of Manual, was the star of the game and took high point honors with five goals to his credit.

The interscholastic league season was concluded with a second victory over Westport with a twenty-nine to twenty-five score. The game was close throughout with
with Westport leading at the close of the first and third quarters. Sample, of Central,
and Smith, of Westport, were probably the most outstanding players of this concluding
game.

By winning the city championship Central earned the right to compete in the state contest.





TRACK REVIEW

N THE Central field, May 8, the four high schools again met in the annual Quadrangular Meet, which brought to a close high school athletics in Kansas City for the 1926 school year. As in each of the previous meets this year, Central emerged from the contest victorious, and with a relatively wide margin over her opponents. Her total of 88% points was seconded by Northeast, with 64½ points. Westport and Manual placed third and fourth with 55% and 32 points respectively.

The most commendable performance was the work of McFarland, Central Captain. His mark of 12 feet 7 inches in the pole vault broke the former city record by 6½ inches. He also set a new city record by doing the 100 yard high hurdles in 13.4 seconds. McFarland with 13 points, Hursley with 12 points, and Oldham with 8 points were Central's high point men. These three with Jacobstein also placed second in the half-mile relay.

Central scored eight firsts and eight seconds, to nose out its nearest competitor for first and second place honors. Westport was second with seven firsts and four seconds.

Central Second in K. C. A. C. Meet

With a total of 13 points, Central's indoor track team placed second in the high school class of the K. C. A. C. invitational meet Saturday, February 19. First place went to Northeast by a total of 24 points. Manual with 11, Westport with 2, Paseo

with 1, and Southwest with none, were the other rankings.
In the 50-yard dash, the two Northeast entries Dorsett and McDaniels finished first and second respectively. Alspach, Central's hope in the sprint ran a fine race winning two points by coming in third. The 440-yard dash was won by Baughman of Northeast, making two places for the Purple team. Alspach came a strong third, while Lawson fought it out for fourth with the Westport runner.

The best race of the evening was the 880-yard run. Auld on the Northeast team won five more points by coming in first and giving that team a comfortable margin over the others. Third place was captured by Bowers of Central.

Central's "A" relay team won second place, and the "B" team repeated the per-

formance by taking the position after Northeast's first place. Westport gained one more point by securing third,

Central Second in K. U.-M. U. Meet

In the second competition of the season, Central's indoor track team placed second in the M. U.-K. U. meet, Saturday, March 5. With a total of 19 points the Blue and

White ranked second only to Northeast, which accumulated 22 points.

Central showed strength in every event by winning first and fourth in the 440-yard run and placing second in all others except the half-mile. Manual with a total of nine points placed third and Paseo amassed four points to gain fourth. Both West-port and Southwest failed to show any running strength and did not place in any of the five events.

In the 50-yard dash, Dorsett of Northeast, repeated his performance in the K. C. A. C. meet by finishing first in a field of six runners. Alspach of Central, likewise

duplicated his own record and placed second in this event.

In the 440-yard dash Lawson, running in fine form, easily placed himself at the I of the others and finished there. Alspach won fourth thereby really placing head of the others and finished there. second when the outsiders are excluded.

Northeast captured the 4-lap relay with Central second. Pasco finished third. Central was also second in the 8-lap relay with Northeast in first place. Manual came

in third.

With the termination of this meet it was realized that Northeast was leading in the interscholastic field, with Central as a close second. The work of the other schools was apparently of no importance.

Seven Centralites Qualify for the State Meet

Central led in qualifying athletes for the meet to be held in Columbia. Seven Blue and White athletes placed in addition to capturing the half-mile relay in the trials held Wednesday, April 27, among the eight high schools on the Northeast field. Only two persons can represent each district, thus it was necessary to hold the elimination meet among the schools of Kansas City, to determine the representatives for the State Meet to be held in Columbia, Missouri.

Northeast places six men, Westport five, and Manual and Paseo one each. South-

west, East, and Lathrop Trade school failed to qualify a man.

Those qualifying from Central were: 440-yard dash—Lawson, Wheelock; broad jump—Alspach, Pope; half-mile relay—Alspach, Tiffany, Wheelock, Lawson; shot-put— Corti; 220 low hurdles ; 120 high hurdles—Blaco.

Dual Meet to Central

The Blue and White track team captured the dual meet from the Westport squad on Central field by a score of 47 to 38, Friday, April 29. A strong wind prevented any record-breaking performances. However the commendable work of Alspach and Blaco won the meet for Central.

The feature of the event was the broad jump which was won by Alspach by a 21 foot, 5 inch jump. Blaco lunged into the tape and barely escaped a tie with Kite of Westport in the 100-yard hurdles. Another thrilling event was the 220-yard dash in

which Johanning and Alspach ran side by side the entire distance.

In the 100-yard dash, Central placed second with Westport in first place. Blaco captured first place in the 100-yard hurdles. The 220-yard dash was won by Alspach. The 880-yard dash was likewise captured by Bowers of Central. In the 440-yard dash, Lawson of Central, won first place. Corti won the shot-put, and the broad jump was won by Alspach. Pole vault was won by Whittaker of Central. The last event, the half-mile relay, was won by the Central team composed of Alspach, Tiffany, Wheelock, and Lawson.






Athletic Awards

The first award is a small "C" which is given to every girl having earned sixty points. Elda Hartung, Margaret McNichols, Evelyn Berry, Roma Robeson, Geneva Newfarmer, De Etta Beedle, Mildred Heal, Elizabeth Sibley, Ione Bodley, Victoria Crafton, Mary Louise Brown, Norene Welsh, Wilma Weeks, and Dorothy Lane received little "C's" this year.

All awards of the gymnasium department are granted on the basis of the point system. These points may be gained in the following ways: Ten points for membership on a first team for the first and second years and seven points for every year thereafter; five points for membership of second team for the first and second years and three points for the following years; clash leaders, ten points; championship teams, five points; all-star team, five points; swimming team, three points; winner of swimming meet, ten points; first place in an event, one point; hiking ten miles, one point; third year gymnasium, five points; fourth year, ten points; and the sport managers ten points.

To the school at large we leave a score board to record the great deeds of our predecessors.










September 7-A different atmosphere pervades our halls, twenty-three teachers departing from the straight and narrow to other institutions of learning.
