



### FOREWORD


Early Kansas City, with its customs, its occupations, and its amusements, is of the irrevocable past... Around us instead is a mighty city.

# National Honor Society

The National Honor Society is the only honorary organization at Central. The membership is determined by a vote of the entire faculty.

The members are chosen on a basis of scholarship, extra-curricular activities, and character. To be eligible, a student must rank in scholarship among the upper twenty-five per cent of the Senior Class. However, not more than ten per cent of the class may be elected.

All members of the Society must be Seniors and the students who have been elected to membership are not announced until the last few weeks of school.

Honors for extra curricular activities are based on competition, popularity, and appointment. No student can count more than two, five point honors, and minor honors are also limited. In no case can two honors in the same activity be counted either by duplicating or by pyramiding.

The Central chapter was organized in 1922, and was the first chapter to be organized in any Missouri high school.

The object of the National Honor Society is to create enthusiasm for scholarship, to stimulate desire, to render service, to promote leadership, and to develop character in the students of America's secondary schools.





Under the new rule of last year, the orations were six minutes long, and an extemporaneous speech of 4 minutes was given afterwards.


In the contest held at Convention Hall, April 11, Lyman Field, of Westport High School placed first, with Glenn Ohleson, from Manual, a close second.

During the latter part of the week, a large party is attended by the entire family except Edgar and Ruth Thomas, the secretary. Edgar feels that he is keeping Ruth from going out, so he gives her one of the two dresses that his sister had sent out on approval. Ruth, who is ready first, returns to the library to find Philip and Geraldine plotting an elopement. Geraldine leaves by the hall door and Philip starts to get an overnight bag from the closet. As quick as a flash Ruth pushes him on in the closet and locks the door. Geraldine returns only to be told that Mr. Denby had suddealy been called away on business. Geraldine leaves again, with Edgar and Ruth, but is very much worried. After the party and when all are in bed, Edgar hears someone moving in the library. Going down, he finds Ruth and Denby talking. Denby leaves, and Ruth says he returned to give back a compact of Geraldine's and she being downstairs had let him in. She goes to bed, and Edgar, about to leave, sees some feminine article lying by the steps. He picks them up, and believing them Ruth's concludes that she was planning an elopement with Denby.

The next morning Edgar tells the house that he is to leave for a long sea voyage. He is very moody, and hateful, and extremely cool to Ruth. While planning his trip, Eliza, the old Irish maid, enters and asks him why "Miss Jerry's things were laying by the library steps." Then Edgar realizes the

In the meantime, Jane Brier has fallen in love with Peter, a chemist on the Woodbine farm. Also Mr. Woodbine, thinking it about time for his daughter to get married, arranges a meeting between his daughter and Ebenezer. But Virginia falls in love with Jack, who shows up at the wrong time, although her father has the impression that she is in love with Ebenezer. Shortly afterwards, however, Sheriff Bean arrests Jack. Prudence, who is postmistress, saves him by pasting postage stamps on him and declaring him under the protection of the mails. Jack then proves his innocence and is released. In the meantime, Ebenezer has fallen in love with Prudence. And so the play ends with Peter and Jane happily married, and Ebenezer and Prudence, and Jack and Virginia very much in love. Mr. Woodbine and Mamie make the fourth couple.

HE well-known "Dorothy Vernon of Haddon Hall," a romantic comedy in four acts by Paul Kester, was presented in the school auditorium on the nights of March 27 and 28.

The settings and quick moving action of the play kept the audience entranced.

Two fathers, Sir George Vernon and Earl of Rutland, swear that their children shall wed. However, times change, and a feud between the two families supposedly breaks all marriage promises, and Dorothy Vernon is to wed her cousin, Sir Malcolm Vernon. The time for the wedding has been set for Dorothy's eighteenth birthday, and so on that day Sir John Manners, son of the Earl of Rutland, boldly enters the Vernon estate and captivates the whole family, while posing as Malcolm. Lawrence Siegle as Sir Malcolm and Mable Halter as Lady Vernon displayed real dramatic talent. Howard May was fine as the jester, and Harland Tickemyer drew much applause as Sir George Vernon. 


SCENE FROM "DOROTHY VERNON OF HADDON HALL"

To improve ability into championship channels is commendable; but to create ability, developing not an unbeatable eleven, but a team that can cope with the best is wonderful strategy that shows successful coaching plus hard work. However, grid battles are either won or lost on the gridiron, and experience is a major factor in determining their outcome.

Central opened the season with only four lettermen: Leo Bergman, quarterback; Merle Stafford, end and fullback; Don Shutty, destined to become the hero of Centralites by his sensational playing, halfback; and Joe Peters, tackle and captain, the latter being the only regular from last year's champion-ship squad.

Nevertheless, Coach Harry Slaymaker developed a squad that not only finished in third place, but held the champions, East High School, to a scoreless tie and placed two men, including the captain, on the Journal-Post's mythical all-star team.

Don Shutty, one of the greatest offensive players that has ever entered into Interscholastic competition, was named as captain, and Joe Peters rated a tackle position. However, the Kansas City Star named just Shutty.

When the final reckoning was posted, Central had won four games, lost one, and tied one. Incidentally, the only league encounter lost in the last 34 games Central has played.

#### FIRST GAME

Six thousand people saw Central humbled before the Wyandotte Bulldogs to the tune of 12-6 in the first night game ever played in Greater Kansas City. Inexperience was a major factor in determining the outcome, but the boys learned a lot about football and lost any signs of stage-fright.

#### SECOND GAME

The following week, Central trampled the Paseo Pirates 19-6, in the only league game away from home. Don Shutty broke through at will, twice racing more than 80 yards to boost the Blue and White score. Girard scored on a freak play at the kickoff to account for the remaining score.

#### THIRD GAME

Southwest was the next opponent. Although the Kingbirds fought valiantly, the inspired Indians trod on their opposers 13-6. Again Shutty was the star, scoring the only Central counter. However, it was not an easy game for the invaders, but a truly earned victory.

#### FOURTH GAME

Westport was the next victim. The Tigers drew first blood, but the Blue Eagles came back in the third quarter to knot and later unknot the score. Again Shutty thrilled the crowd with a 74-yard run. Jones chalked up the second counter when he plunged over from the 10-yard line. The score was 12-6.

### FIFTH GAME

St. Joseph Central comped on the Central aggregation 20-0 in a repetition of last year. However, various Central stars were held in reserve for the East encounter the following week.

### SIXTH GAME

The Blue Eagles slowly and surely walked out of the championship light when she battled East High to a scoreless tie on the former's field. Had Central defeated East in this encounter, the Blue and White juggernauts would have tied for first place, but even as a tie it was a great game.

### SEVENTH GAME

In the next game, Central smothered Manual under an avalanche of touchdowns. The final score was 50-0. By this time the Blue and White eleven was functioning to perfection, and it was a mere walk away for the stronger squad.

### EIGHTH GAME

Central finished the season in heroic style when she sank the ship of the Northeast Vikings under a score of 33-0. Shutty ran wild and scored four touchdowns with a contribution from Campbell, an end. The Purple and White easily withered under the Blue Eagle onslaught.

Handicapped by lack of experienced material after Sydney Peltzman and Alex George became ineligible at the end of the first semester, the 1931 Blue Eagle five, defending champions of the state and Interscholastic league, suffered a somewhat disastrous season.

Central finished in a tie for fifth place with Southwest and Paseo, having won two league games and dropped four. The Blue and White quintet started the season in championship style with a well balanced team moulded around Syd Peltzman, all-state center last year, and Alex George, a sharp-shooting forward. Nathan Roitman teamed well opposite George and later was the mainstay after the ineligibility of the two former stars. Joe Peters and Archie Cullens held down the defensive positions but their stellar guarding could do no good without a strong offensive machine that was seriously lacking in the last four encounters.

#### FIRST GAME

Lawrence High School fell before an onslaught led by Captain Peltzman to the tune of 16 to 9 in a preliminary to the M. U.-K. U. game at Convention Hall.

#### SECOND GAME

Peltzman was again high point man in the game against the alumni which Central annexed with a score of 30-18.

#### THIRD GAME

Central tasted her first defeat at the hands of Wyandotte High School, Kansas City, Kansas. When the game closed it found Central holding the short end of a 25-19 score.

#### FOURTH GAME

An invading St. Joseph Central team trod on their Kansas City opponent in the final game before the opening of the Interscholastic league the following week. The score was 20-18.

### FIFTH GAME

On the opening of the Interscholastic league, Central administered the Paseo Pirates a decisive trouncing when they emerged with the long end of a 23-15 score. Peters was the individual star.

#### SIXTH GAME

A fast passing, sharp-shooting team comprised of Rockhurst Hawks pulled the blind over the eyes of Central in a 21-15 defeat. The game was a see-saw affair and the outcome was doubtful till the gun barked the close of the game.

#### SEVENTH GAME

George and Peltzman proved the master of the floor when they each scored 11 out of 28 points to smother the Southwest Indians' 18. This game curtained both of these stars' High School careers.

### EIGHTH GAME

A late rally almost overcame a Westport lead in the final quarter but the Tigers finally tightened down and blasted the Central hopes with a 13-16 score. A new lineup did not function very well.

### NINTH GAME

East High School, runners-up to Central last year, revenged their last year's defeat and counted up 21 points to the 8 of the Blue Eagle five. Coach Guemple's boys were considerably lacking in offensive power.

### TENTH GAME

Manual was represented with the strongest squad they have had in many years. It was evenly matched till the final canto when the Red and White rallied and took a 25-19 lead.

### ELEVENTH GAME

Northeast, 1931 Interscholastic champions, played a hard fought game with the Blue Eagle defense. Central, however, was smothered under a score of 24-1.

#### TWELFTH GAME

In the pairings to determine the Kansas City representative in the state tournament at Columbia, Central was bracketed with the Vikings from Northeast, Interscholastic champions. A completely revamped lineup held the champions to only 18 points while the Blue Eagles succeeded in chalking up 11, but not enough for victory. However, a decided improvement was shown.


This was the second successive year that Coach Frank Guemple had produced an undefeated team and so successful was the outcome, that Central's chances for next year are bright.



ASTER-SERGEANT FRANK BOWLING, military instructor at Central, retired March 3 after twenty-six years of service in the United States Army.

Before his arrival at Central, Sergeant Bowling had served in five different detachments of the army. He first enlisted at Birmingham, Alabama, and was assigned to Company G of the 30th Infantry. His second and third enlistments were in Company F of the 14th Infantry and Company D of the 19th Infantry, respectively. The first five years of these two enlistments were spent in the Philippine Islands.

Sergeant Bowling then saw service in Company H of the 6th Infantry; and after this enlistment expired he re-enlisted again, being assigned to the disciplinary barracks at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas.

After six years at Fort Leavenworth, Sergeant Bowling was appointed military instructor at Central in June, 1923, at the beginning of his seventh enlistment.


John King Park was appointed Cadet Colonel by Captain Harry E. Mitchell, After a second ballot, June McGinness was elected Sponsor Colonel.


Tenth Week-The Blue Eagles' chances for the championship became a thing of the past when East and Central battled four periods to a scoreless tie.




Thirteenth Week-Mr. Wood, who for 15 years has been a teacher at Central, died as the result of blood poisoning.
