Central High Branch Library

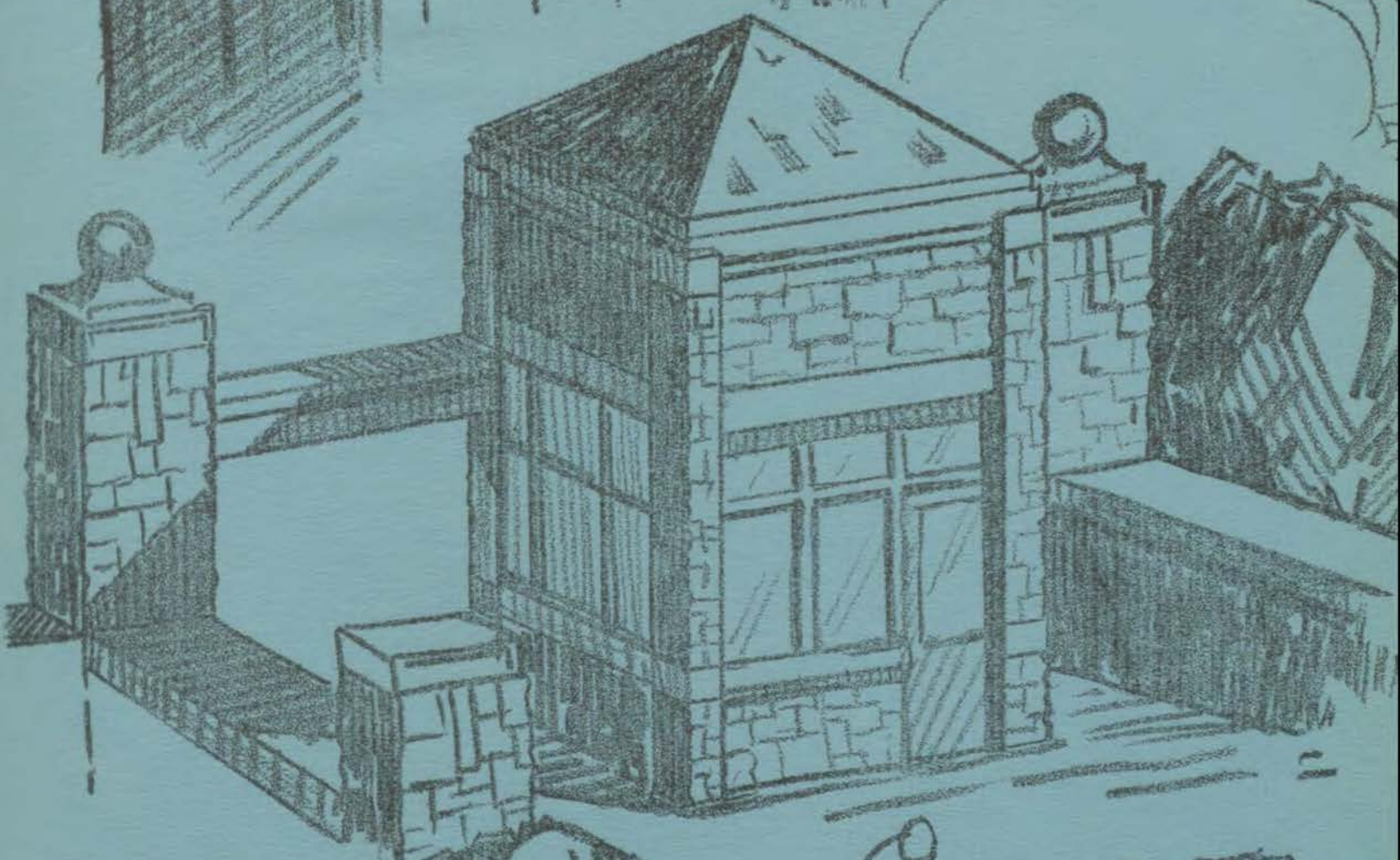
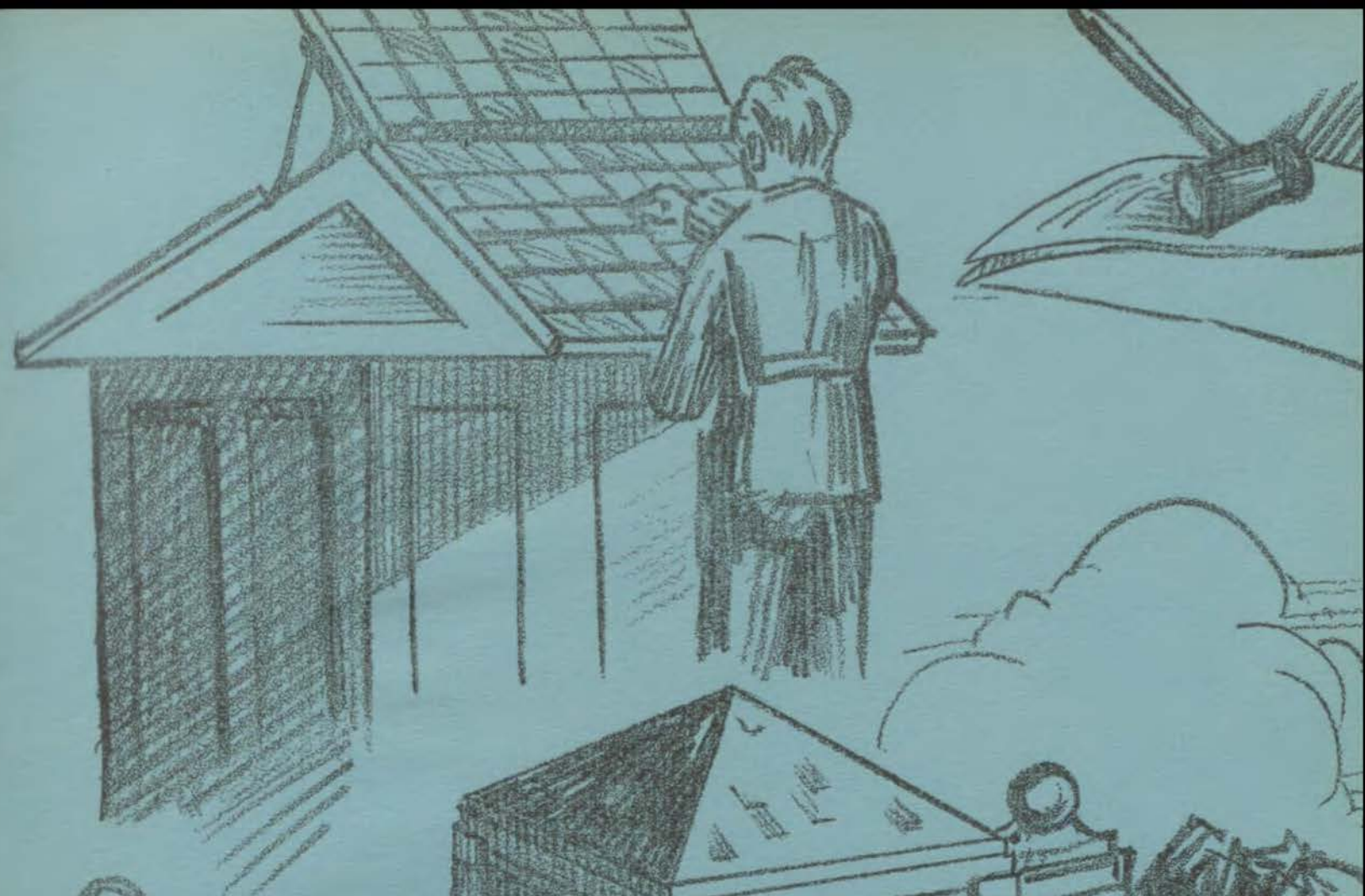

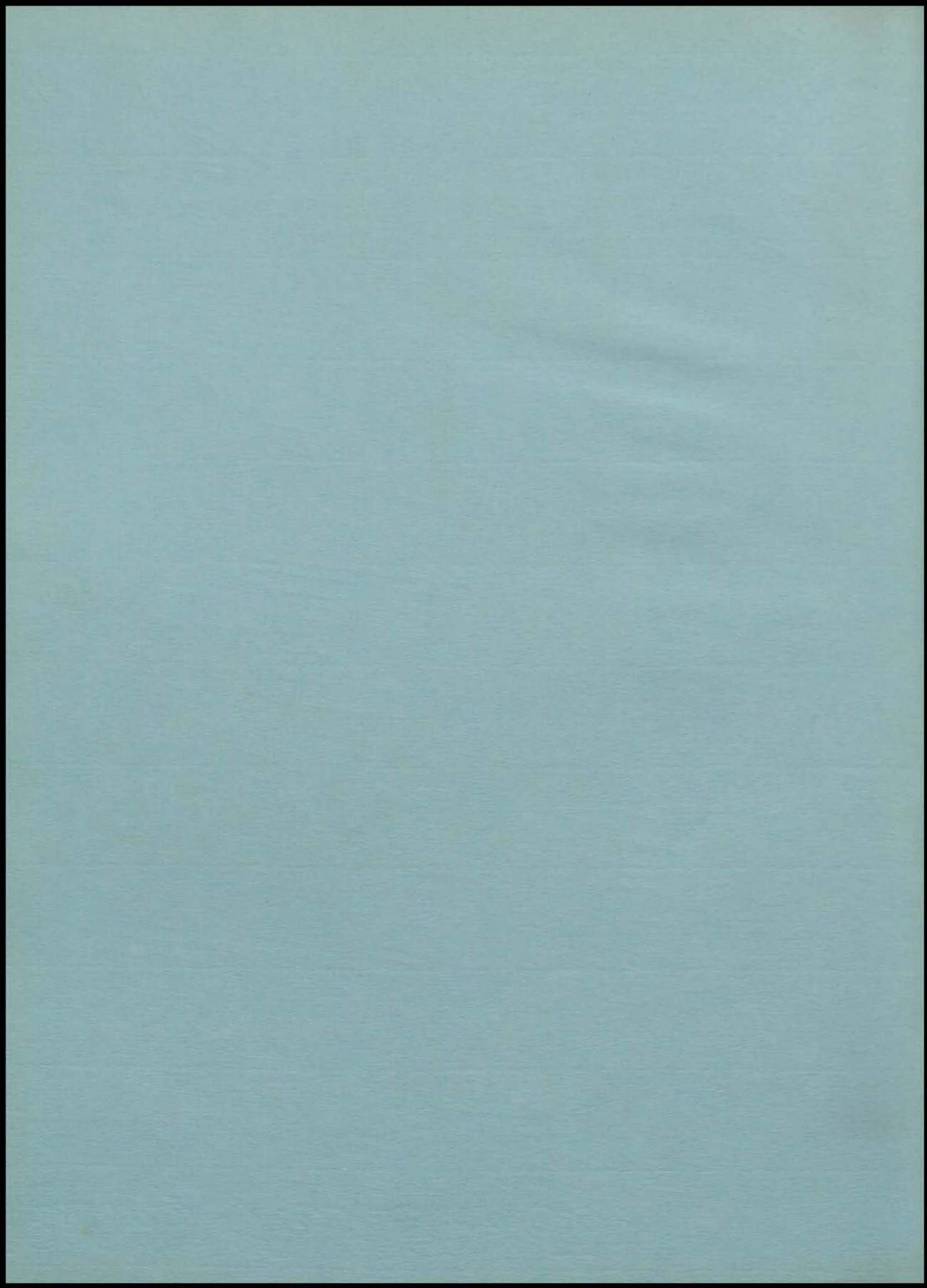
These facts prove an obvious conclusion, that the service extended by the branch library to Central and her students is invaluable.

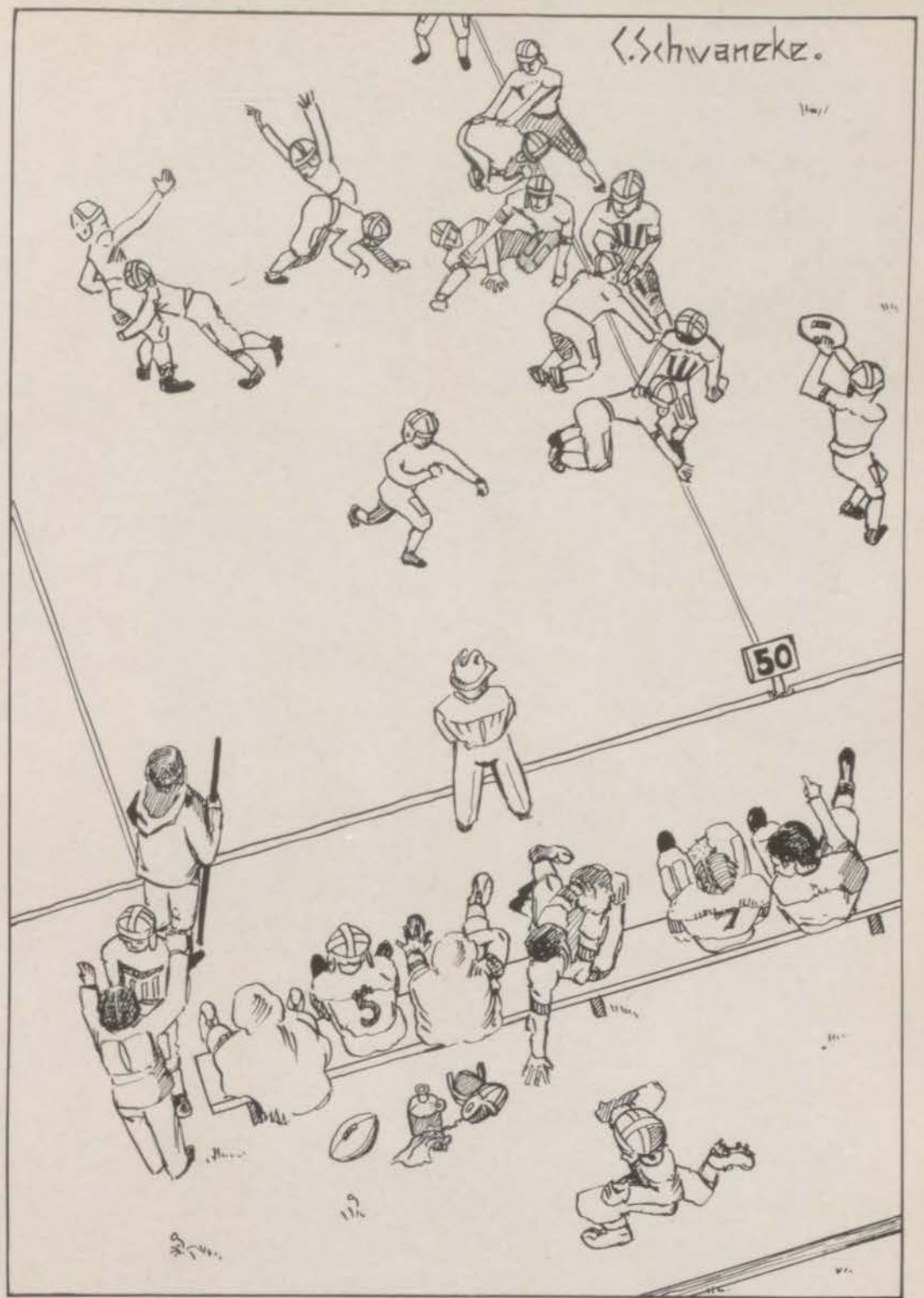
MIXER ORCHESTRA

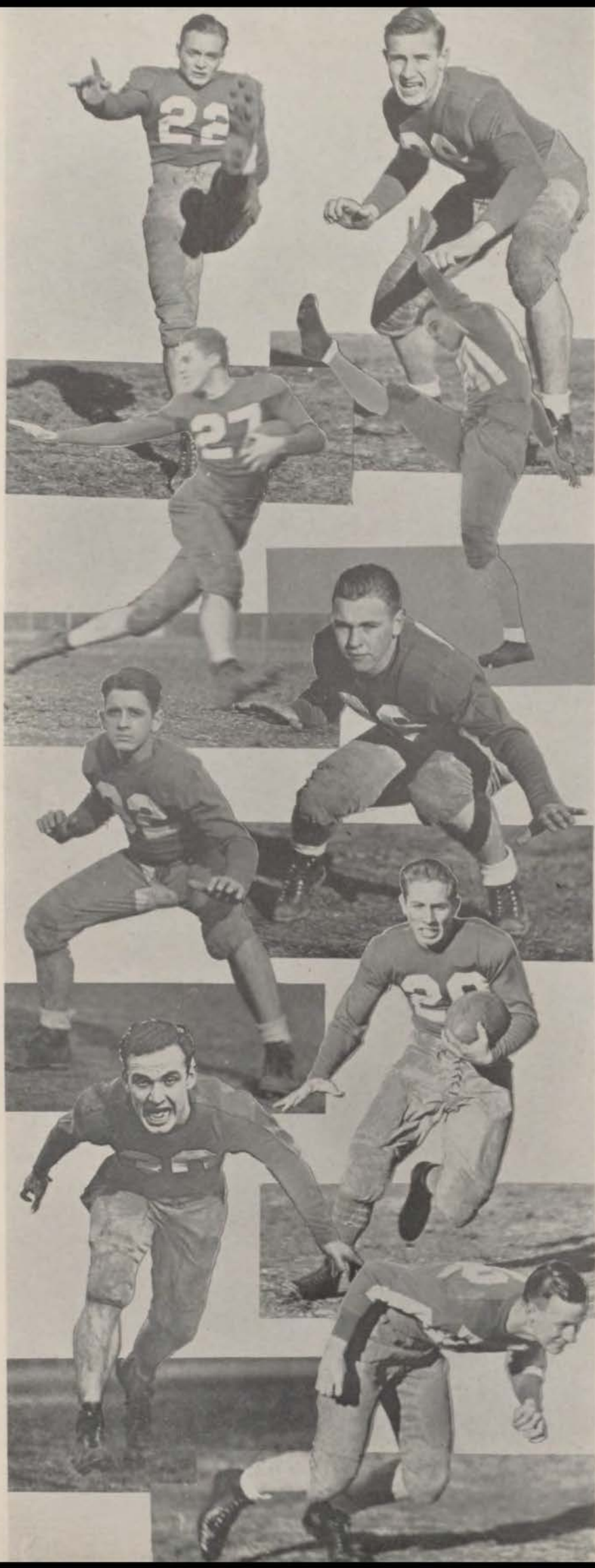

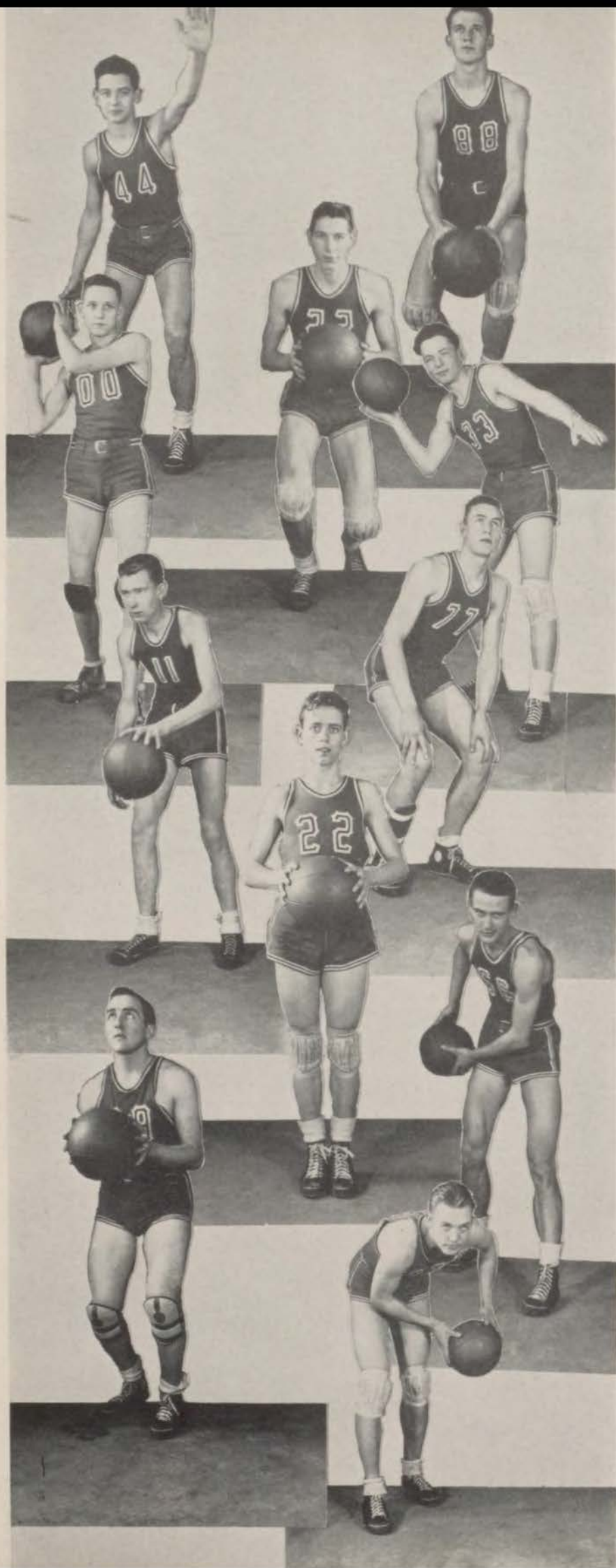

RESUME OF FIRST TEAM FOOTBALL

The 1935 football season mingled victory and defeat for the Central Blue Eagles as they won one game, tied one, and lost six games. Coach Harry Slaymaker molded his eleven about a nucleus of three returning lettermen: Goodwin Lyon, Norman Newell, and Rimmel Young. From a large group of promising junior and senior candidates, he selected the men to comprise his starting eleven. The inability of the team to score in the decisive moments brought defeat by scant margin to the Eagles in several games. Their determination and their ceaseless effort, however, were illustrated in the last two games in which they defeated the Westport eleven and held a highly "touted" Southwest team to a scoreless tie.

Rimmel Young and Bob Morgan-Dean were two grid stars of the season. Bob Morgan-Dean, lanky newcomer to Central football, played brilliantly as an end and back and placed on the city's second team All-star. Rimmel Young punted sensationally in the latter games of the year, his boots averaging 49 yards in the Southwest game.

The Blue Eagles defeated Westport, tied Southwest, and lost to East, Northeast, Manual, Paseo, Wyandotte, Rockhurst, and the Alumni.

BASKETBALL 1935-1936

Central's towering basketeers completed their most successful basketball season in three years, downing seven opponents and losing to four and ending the season in a deadlock for second place.

The Blue Eagle squad was composed of men without first team experience, and Coach Guemple displayed a green but enthusiastic team for the initial game of the year.

The squad averaged over six feet in height and used this advantage to amass points on rebound and tip-in shots. Omer Brenton, 6-foot 4-inch center, established a new individual scoring record for the Interscholastic league as he scored 61 points in six games.

From the alumni game, it was evident that Central possessed a superior team that passed and scored with such accuracy that they defeated veteran teams.

PROSPECTUS OF 1936 TRACK TEAM

Spring days mean track days and Central's athletes have deserted the gymnasium for the cinder track and green grass. In the past years the Blue Eagles have been strong in track, winning first place in 1934 and third in 1935.

Our chances for 1936 championship track squad were severely jolted when Bob Morgan-Dean, track-captain and lanky 440 yard dash man, moved to Canada. Morgan-Dean would have been the outstanding runner in the 440 and anchor man in the relay. Burch King, Frank Kavanaugh, Bruce Meier, and Jack Wilson, all sophomores, will bear the brunt of the century and furlong dashes. With three years to go these boys should develop into championship material. Omer Brenton, recent basketball star in the interscholastic league, has made a strong bid for the high hurdles, having shown amazing pre-season form. With the graduation of Wilmer Warren, state champion sprinter, Central is left without its usual strength in the sprints. Bud Elias and Bruce Fink are returning veterans of the 440 yard dash and may be the leading middle distance runners this year.

Much of the Eagle strength will be concentrated on the 880 yard run. Carl Morgan, a junior who ranked third in the city meet in 1935, will compete in the half-mile. John Howard and Donald Winegar, however, will contest Morgan's supremacy.

Pre-season expectations reveal little strength in the field events. Everett Tull, a track letterman, is expected to win several firsts in the high-jump and pole vault. Three heavies of the shot, Art Wegerer, Joe Boutross, and Jasper Davis, will again represent Central.

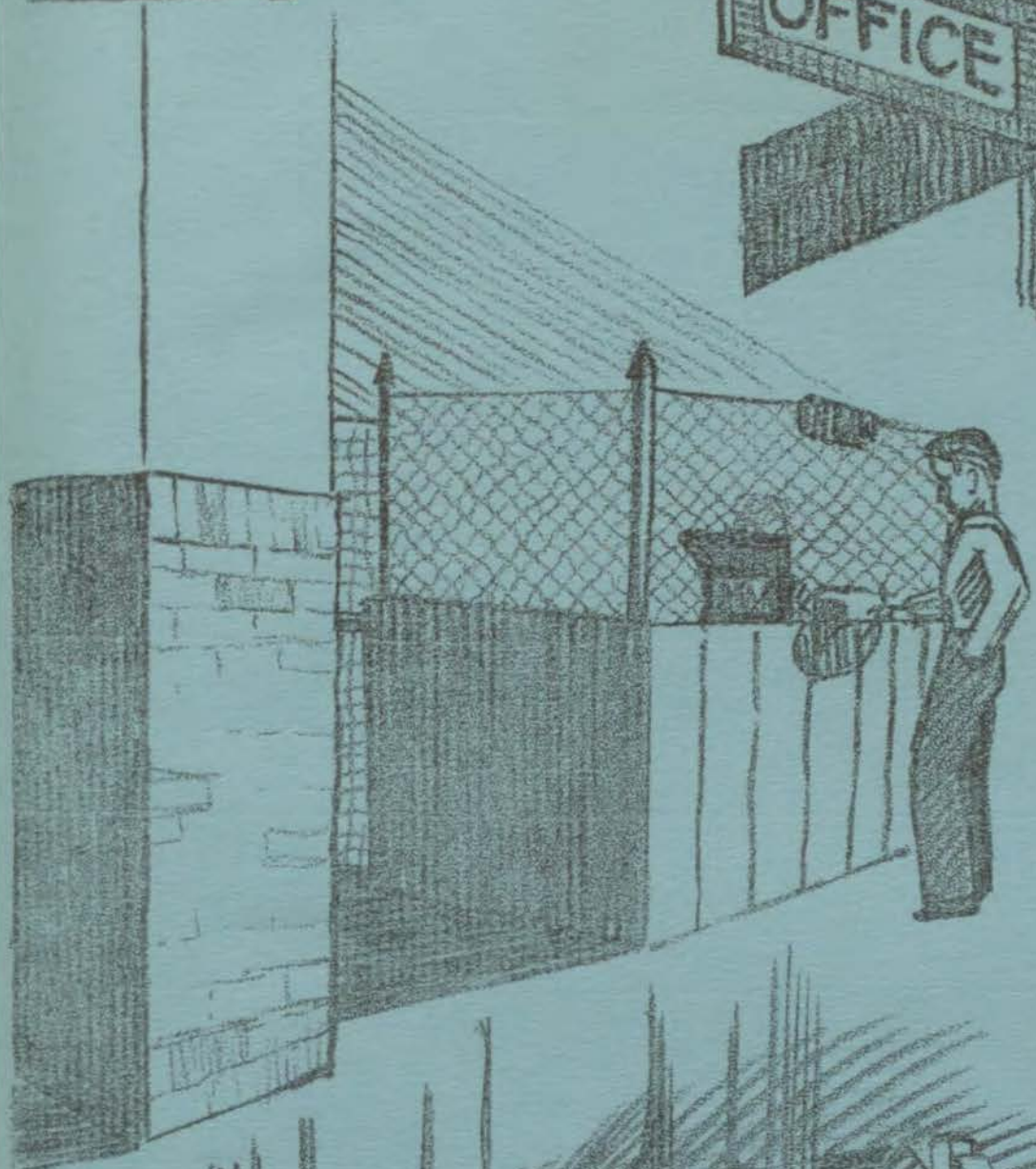
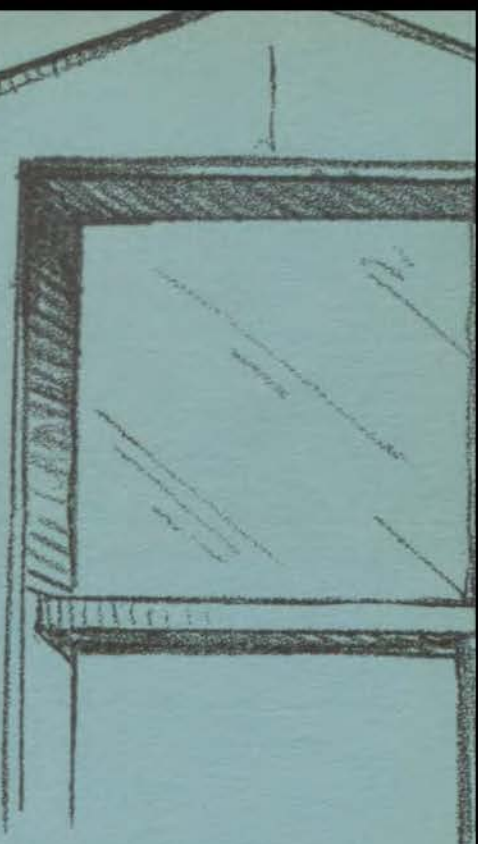
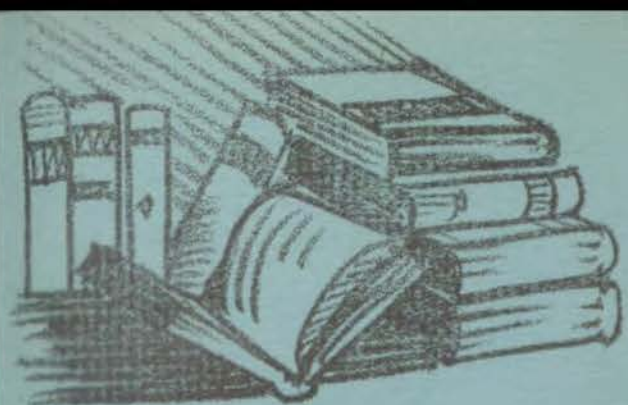
In February, 1936, the Central shoulder insignia was changed from the old "C" with the R. O. T. C. Torch to the "C" with the Flying Eagle.

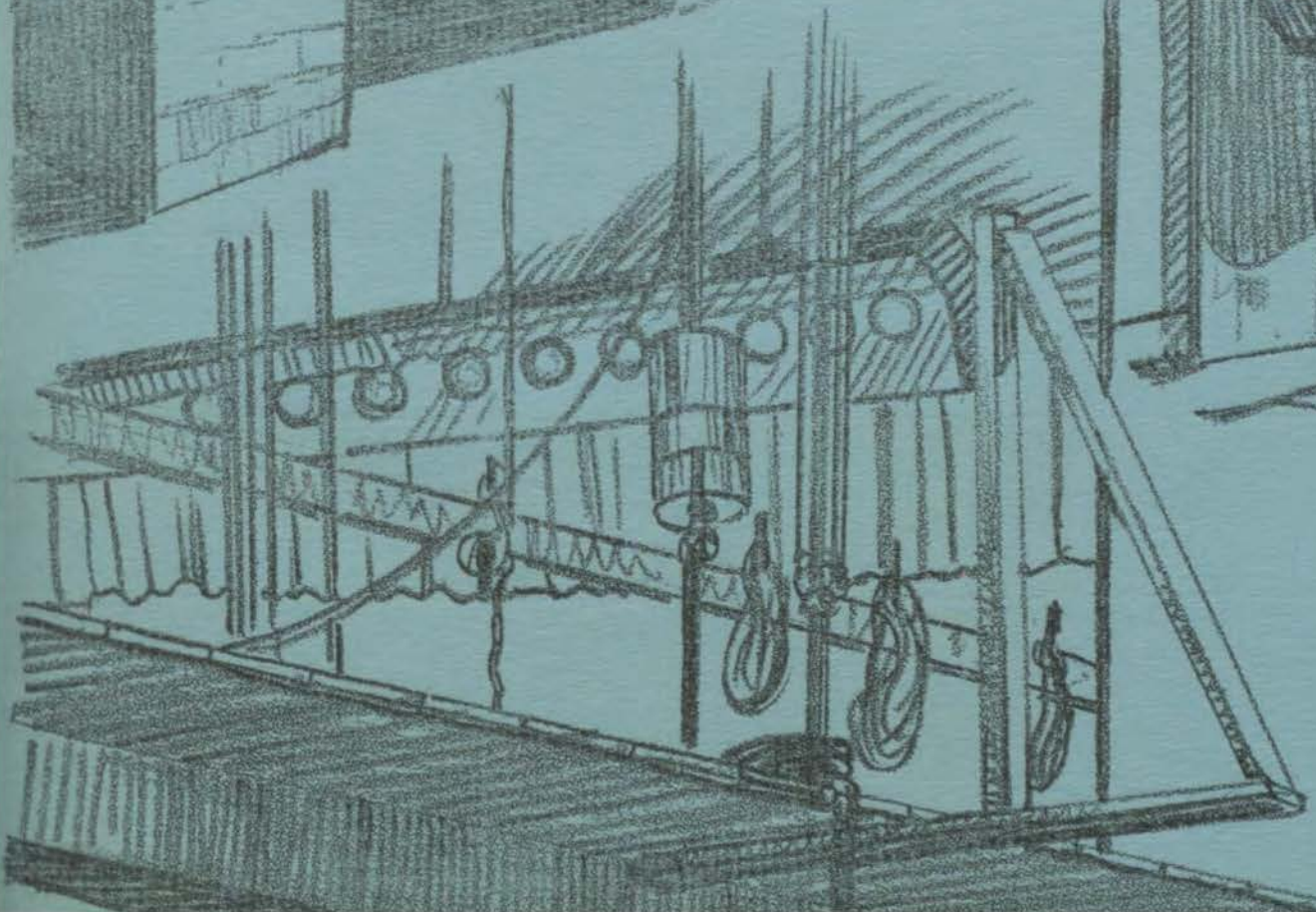
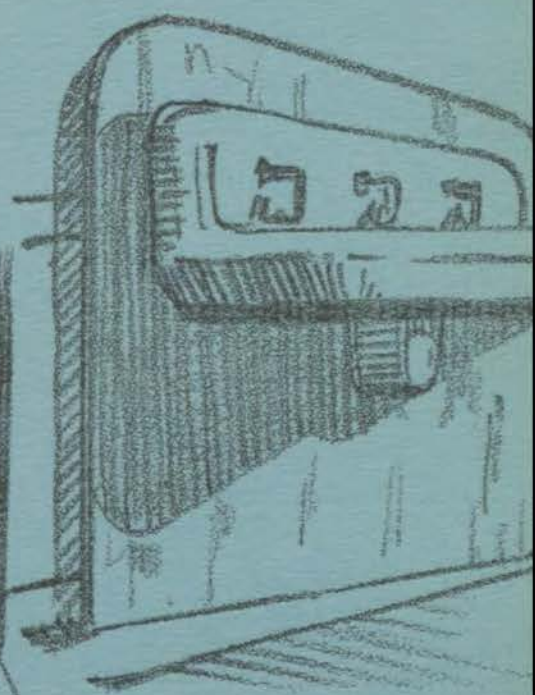

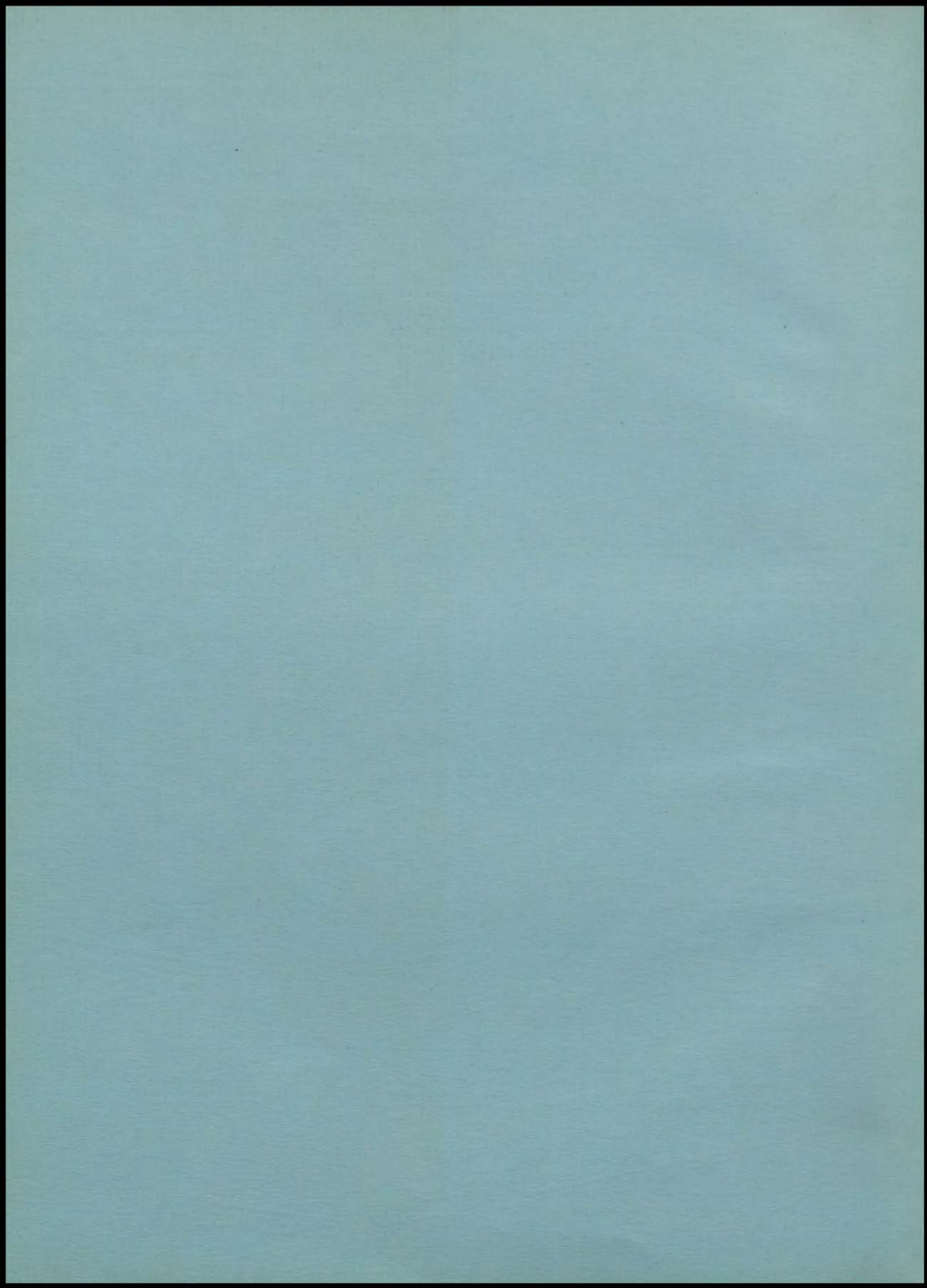
