

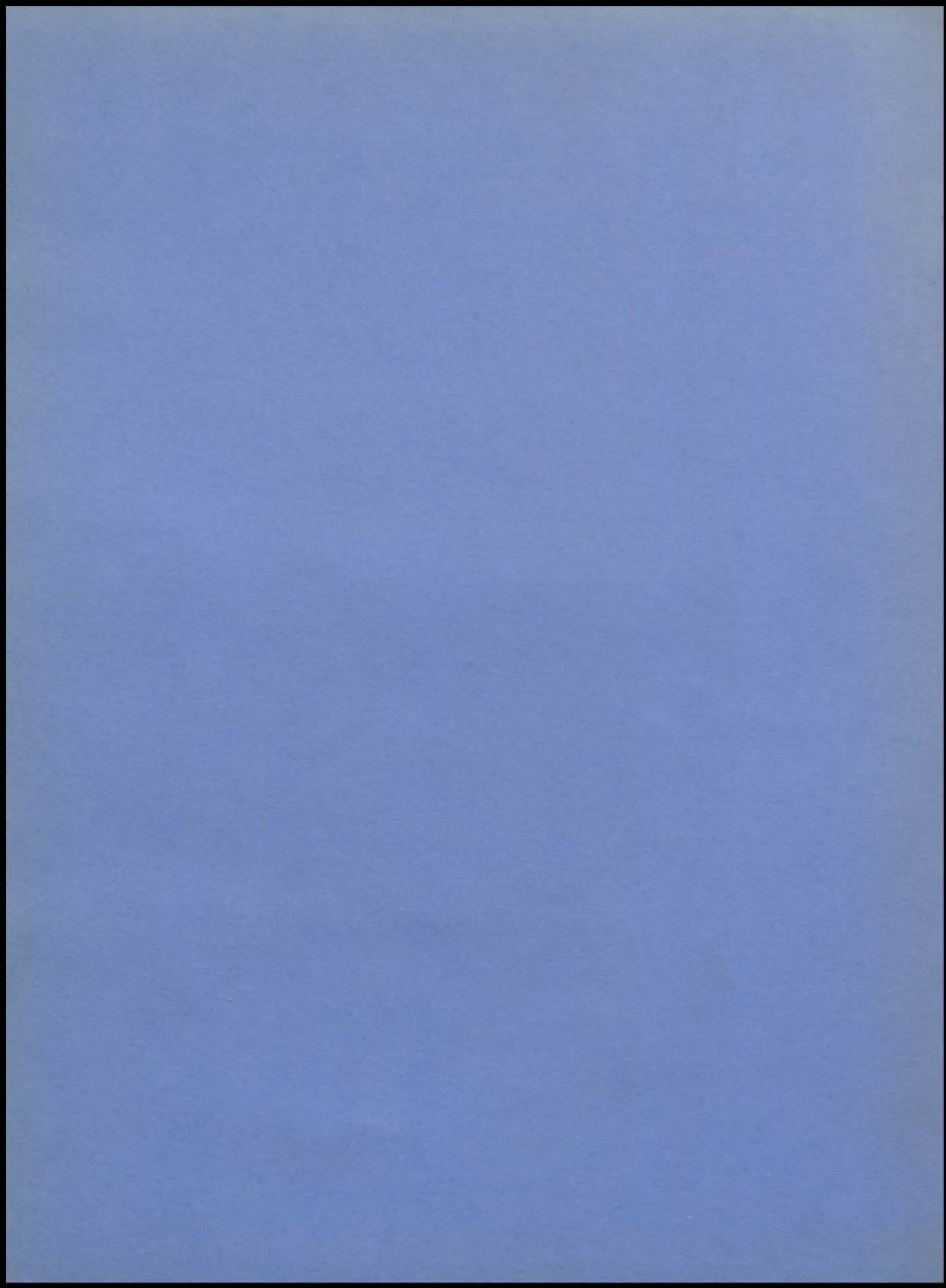


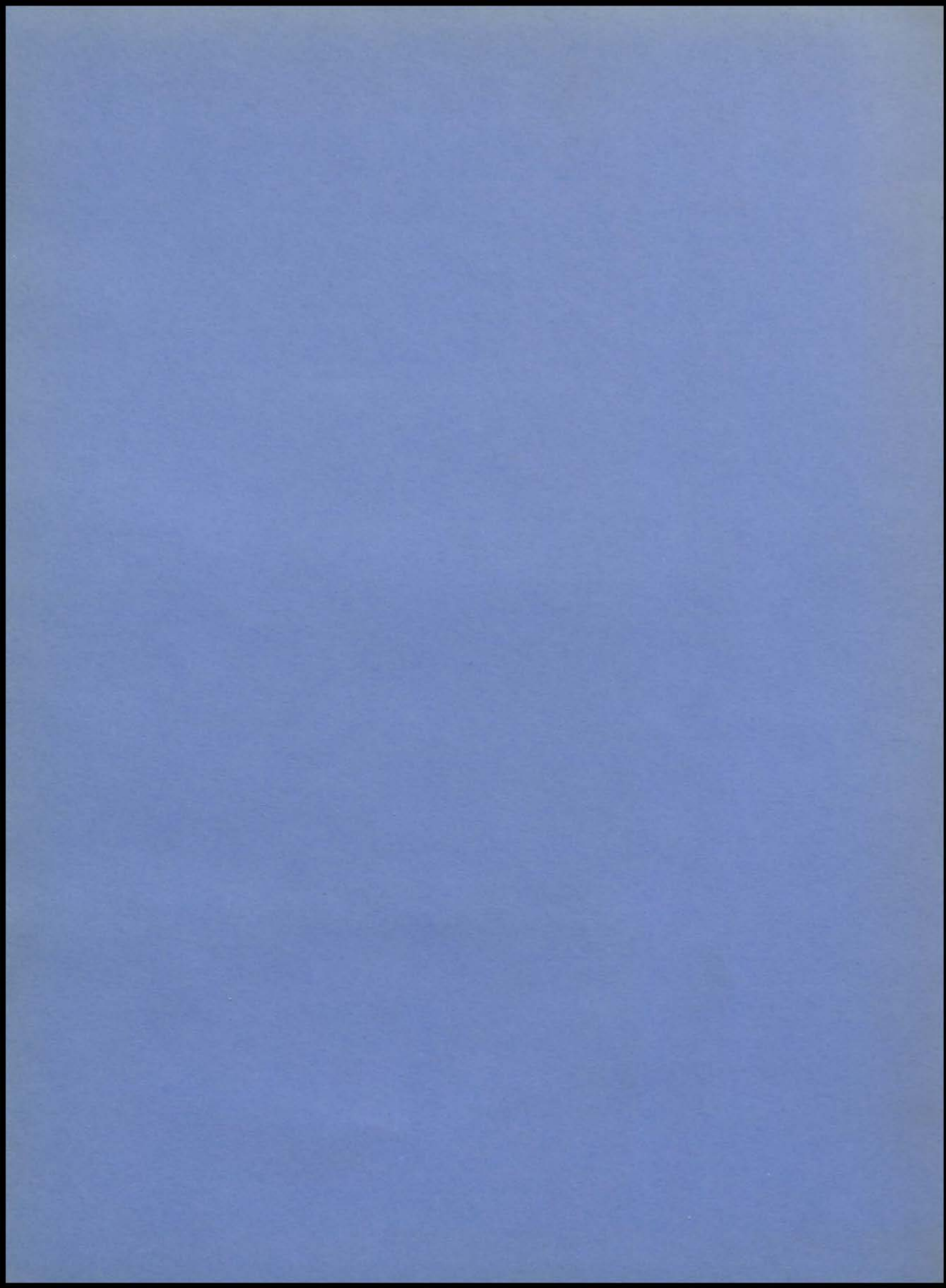

It is the person who assumes the responsibility that becomes the leader and makes a success of life.

Retirement...



J. Ivan Hayes

Central students and faculty were surprised and sorry when J. Ivan Hayes announced his retirement at the end of the 1950-'51 school year. The head of the Mechanical Arts Department at Central, Mr. Hayes taught drafting and mechanical drawing primarily. He

also started a course in photography at Central and taught it for many years until his retirement.

Mr. Hayes' photographic work was considered exceptional. He did all of the photographic work for the *Centralian* and many times was called upon by the Board of Education to do photographic work for its pamphlets, magazines, and handbooks.

Mr. Hayes was very proud of being one of the original Central faculty which started out in the new Central High School in 1915. Although he first taught at Manual High and Vocational School, after he came to Central when it opened, he taught here until his retirement, making a total of thirty-six years at this school.

Mr. Hayes was particularly interested in high school boys and girls. For many years he was a literary society adviser. He was always anxious to help students and willing to give his time in assisting them after school with personal problems as well as school work.

An appreciation for Mr. Hayes' unusual ability was well expressed by W. W. Clement when he said, "If anybody could do anything at Central, Mr. Hayes could always do it a little bit better."

Recognition

Centralites have always been proud to bring honor and recognition to the Blue and White, and this year in traditional manner they have again proved the fact that Central is a school superior in both scholarship and activities.

In true Central fashion, Bob Myers was elected Mayor of City Hall Day by students of the Kansas City high schools.

The All-City Student Council chose Vernon Buck as Vice-President for the first term.

Jim Park and Earl Wright were elected President and Vice-President, respectively, of the All-City Junior Red Cross Council. Jim attended a leadership training program at Clear Lake, Michigan, and Earl was sent to the National Convention in New York City.

Central was represented at Girls' State by Nancy Britton and Jerry Marshall and at Boys' State by Vernon Buck. Elizabeth Fassig attended Camp Minniwanca.

The School Flag Contest sponsored by the Student Council resulted in the selection by vote of student body of Barbara Watson's design.

Judy Stanbrough's pep song "Onward, Central" won the Fight Song contest.

Largely due to the help and encouragement of English instructor Miss Ila Maude Kite, many literary recognitions have come to Central students. DeAnn Martin, Norma Poarch, and Vernon Buck each won \$25 for their fourth-place winning essays in the national contest, "How Can I Help Expand Opportunities in America?"

In the Kansas City Sons of the American Revolution essay contest Lynne Fisher was awarded a silver medal and Pat Kinsella won Honorable Mention. Pat was also the Central representative in the city-wide "I Speak for Democracy Contest," and won second place, \$150, in the National Graphic Arts Contest.

Barbara Blair and Jim Park each received first place in the Scholastic National Writing Awards Contest.

Collen Sandford won third place, \$25.00, in the state contest sponsored by Auxiliary of Medical Association. Her essay was titled "The Growth of Health Insurance in America."

Dona Lee Hills won first place in the 17th Annual Essay contest sponsored by the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Jackson County Council of Veterans of Foreign Wars. Her essay was titled "America Is Everybody's Business." Her prize is a gold medal and \$25.00.

Verses by Helen Juel, Margaret Purtle, and Vernon Buck were published in "Youth Creates," a booklet of compositions of Kansas City public school pupils.

Teresa Campbell was notified that *The Kansas City Poetry Magazine* would buy her poem "The Lady In Lace." Her poem "Fantasy" was accepted by the *Chromotones Magazine* in Los Angeles.

Cartoons, photographs and articles of various types were chosen from this year's Luminary to compete for honors in the Missouri Interscholastic Press Association contest. In the annual printing contest sponsored by the Kansas City Club of Printing House Craftsmen, Sam Dubin, Dean Simpson, and Bob Myers won second places and Dwayne Moss, and Gerald Graver won third places.

Gerald also was awarded a four-year printing scholarship to the Kansas State College at Pittsburg.

After the Interscholastic football season First Team All-Star positions went to David Argie, Todd Sichel, and Tom Slaymaker; Herb McCoy and Bob Myers made the Second Team, and Clyde Fry, Bob Johnson, and George Hess received Honorable Mention.

David also was named as guard on the All-State Third Team. Basketball honors went to Dale Wheat on Second Team All-Star position, and Paul Lambert received Honorable Mention.

The girls athletic department brought home honors, having been undefeated again in the Hockey Sportsday with two ties and one win. Kenneth Jewett was a soloist with the Philharmonic Orchestra in a concert for the elementary schools.

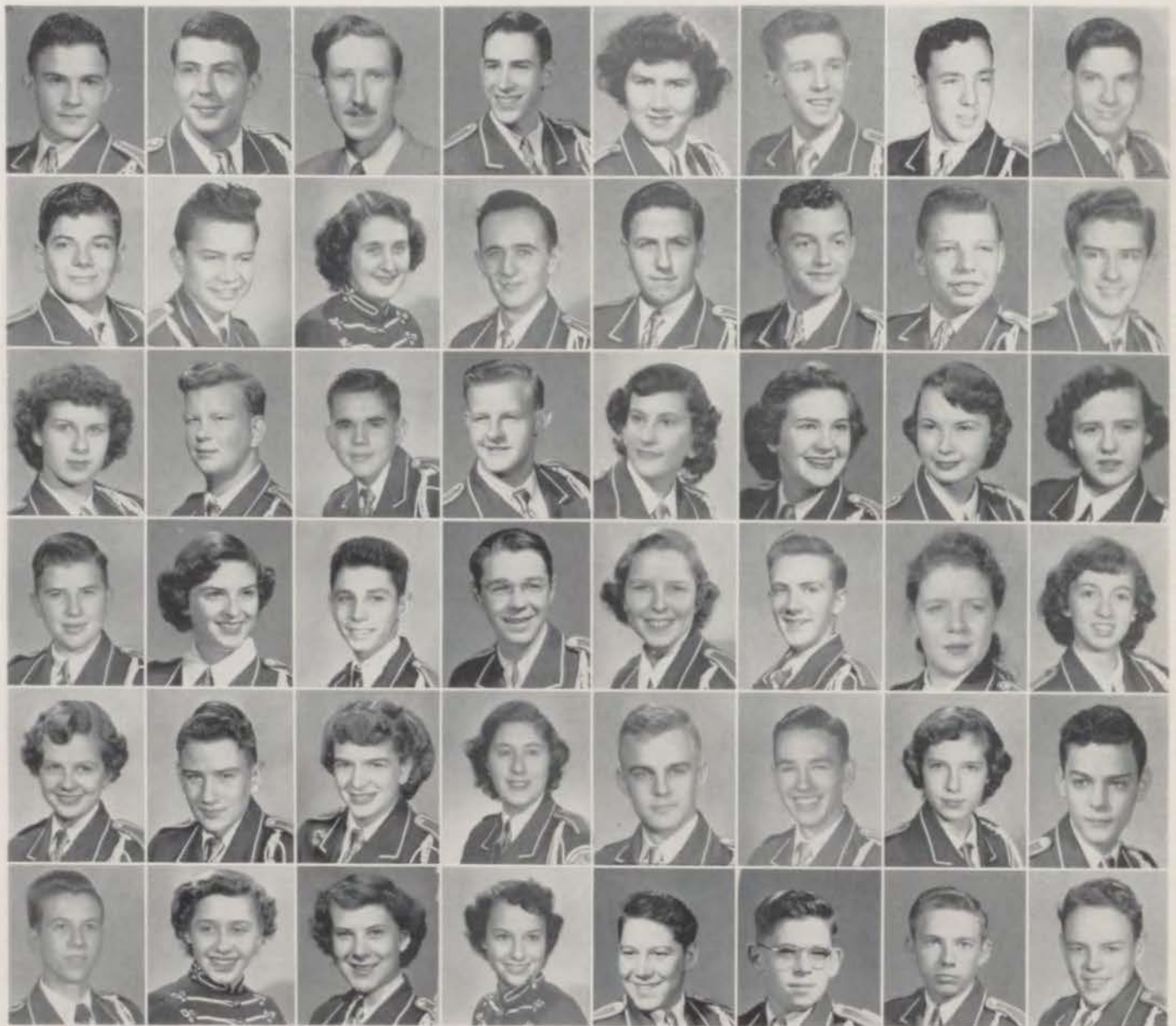

Of all the many activities that offer opportunities for Centralites to get together, the one most unifying is the athletic program. At the Stadium, the Auditorium, or out on the track, the team in the game and the team in the grandstands are united in one purpose—to bring that victory back to dear old Central.

With a loss of twenty-two lettermen, only eight returning lettermen and a host of underclassmen out for practice, the 1951 grid season at Central High had a doubtful future.

Lacking in experience but full of competitive spirit, the Eagle squad took the field for its first game against the seasoned Wyandotte Bulldogs. The Bulldogs were too experienced, however, as they rolled over a scrapping Eagle team 35-6. With only the thought of scoring against the Kansas eleven, the Eagle squad got its chance late in the fourth period when Todd Sichel tossed a 30-yard pass to Herb McCoy, who raced over for the touchdown. The statistics show us that Central was not outclassed too badly and the difference in the score was made by five fumbles lost and three passes intercepted.

Surprising almost everyone except themselves, Central's hustling eleven trounced Paseo 25-0 in the league opener. The Eagles scored early in the first period when Sichel fired a 31-yard pass to Herb McCoy, who plunged into the end zone. With Evans and Fry driving for most of the yardage, Central moved 60 yards to the 4, where on last down Sichel fumbled and Hess recovered in the end zone, giving us a 12-0 half-time lead. Returning with renewed spirit, the Eagles scored again after Austin's recovery of a fumble on the Paseo 9-yard line, when Poindexter hit pay dirt from the 2. A long pass from Slaymaker to Lambert, with Al Gauteri adding his conversion, ended the scoring.

The Blue Eagles continued their winning ways against Westport as speedy, shifty George "Choo Choo" Hess turned in a magnificent performance, scoring five touchdowns on jaunts of 7, 51, 47, 50, and 31 yards. "Choo Choo" gained 207 yards on 11 carries. Todd Sichel, the Eagles' ace quarterback, also turned in a fine performance as he passed and guided the hustling Central eleven through the Tigers' forward wall with ease.

A determined Northeast team handed the blue and white of Central their first defeat of league play in a thrilling 6-0 tussle, October 13. The lone touchdown was made in the third quarter, when on a fake run to the right, Mooney, the Viking quarterback, suddenly stopped and fired a long pass to Windle, all alone on the Eagle 20-yard line. Statistically, the Eagles far surpassed the Vikings in passing, first downs, punting, and yards gained, but time after time the Viking forward wall rose up to defend its goal. The defensive work of Dink Fry was magnificent as the fiery halfback was all over the field piling up Viking plays.

The faint hopes of obtaining a tie for championship by defeating Southwest faded suddenly as the favored Indians scored a 19-14 victory over Central the following week. Striking fast on quick opening plays, Stan Bold and John Powell scampered for jaunts of 65 and 50 yards to help give Southwest a 19-7 half-time lead. Central's tally came in the

second period when Sickel hit Fry in the end zone with a short pass. Keyed up for the second half, Central's rugged line stopped the Indians cold, while in the fourth period, Sickel, after hitting Fry with a flat pass for 26 yards, flipped to McCoy in the end zone. The Eagles fought right down to the wire, throwing a terrific scare into the Indians when Tom Slaymaker recovered an on-side kickoff in the final minutes of the game. However, a pass interception by Carl Ade ended the game.

Hungry for another win, the Eagle eleven thumped Manual 22-0 in their fifth league game. It was "Choo Choo" Hess again sparking the Eagles as he took two punts, sprinting 66 and 65 yards for touchdowns. Central's final score came early in the third period on a 36-yard pass from Sickel to McCoy. The two additional points were added in the first period when Evans crashed through the Manual line to block a punt for a safety. Although the Cardinals outrushed the Eagles, when the chips were down Central's forward wall tightened and halted their drives.

Scoring a last minute touchdown, the East High Bears eked out a 14-13 victory over the Central High Eagles, who were hampered both by injuries and a case of overconfidence. It was the passing combinations of Sickel to McCoy, and Slaymaker to McCoy that accounted for the Eagle touchdowns. With conversions being the deciding factor, Fry's first attempt split the uprights. However, with Dink out because of an injury in the last half, Bob Myers' attempt for the all-important decision was wide.

The unpredictable Eagles closed the 1951 grid campaign with a crushing 18-14 victory over Southeast, ending the Knights' championship hopes. Herb McCoy scored late in the fourth period for what proved to be the winning touchdown as he took a 58-yard pass from Sickel and romped into the end zone. "Choo Choo" Hess again figured in the scoring as he scampered through left-guard 25 yards for a tally, and threw to Slaymaker for 31 and 14 yards, the last finding Tom in the end zone for 6 points. Generally a running team, the Knights unleashed a passing attack that brought both Southeast tallies. Dink Fry halted a last minute Knight rally when, with two seconds remaining in the game, he intercepted Dick Purdy's pass on the Central 10-yard line.

What had been the unpredictable season for the Central Eagles turned out to be one of the most successful in several years. The league record of four wins, three losses and a tie for fourth place is hardly emblematic of this year's fighting eleven, who with a few breaks might have had a perfect record in league play. Certainly no team gave tougher opposition.

The 1951 Interscholastic All-Star team found three Eagles holding down starting berths in Dave Argie, guard; Todd Sickel, quarterback, and Tom Slaymaker, end. Although plagued by injuries at the first of the season, Bob Myers came back strongly to win a second team All-Star berth at guard, along with Herb McCoy, a second team Star at end. Dink Fry and George Hess in the backfield, and Bob Johnson at guard were all awarded honorable mention All-Star. Dave Argie, Central's brilliant guard, was further honored by receiving a berth on the ALL-STATE Third Team.

The Eaglets started the season in fine fashion as they trounced Paseo 19-7, October 2, and shut out Westport the following week, 14-0. Central scored first against Paseo as O'Brien ran a punt back 30 yards. Then in the third period Potts went 10 yards for 6 points and threw 20 yards to Dyer for the final tally. Jay's conversion made it 19 points.

Ronnie Comer began the scoring against Westport as he took a hand-off and scampered 56 yards for a TD. Corder added another 6 points in the

Central's Blue Eagles got off to a flying start by winning all except one of their pre-season games. The Kingbirds defeated De La Salle 43-39, Hogan 54-29, and Glennon 47-28, all on the home court. They also won at Rockhurst 41-32 before being downed by the Pembroke-Country Day Red Raiders 47-53. In four of these games Dale Wheat went over the 20-point mark, once for 30 points, against Hogan.

But the Eagles didn't take the defeat by Pem-Day lying down. They bounced back to win the next four games with Redemptorist, Ruskin, Olathe, and the Alumni.

Central's quintet also opened the Interscholastic League season with a big surprise. The boys from Central defeated the highly rated Paseo Pirates 46-34. On offense the Eagles were really hot, hitting 49 per cent on field goals and 57 per cent on free throws. Todd Sickel, Dale Wheat, and Herb McCoy were high scorers on the Central team with 12, 11, and 10 points, respectively. Paseo's Bill Ross was high scorer with 13 points.

The Blue Eagles also won their second interscholastic tilt against Manual 29-26. The Redbirds kept Centralites on the edges of their seats with their game of deliberate ball-control. The Cardinals held the lead during the first half, but the Kingbirds kept the Manual team scoreless during the third period and pulled ahead to win. Dale Wheat was high scorer with 13 points.

The Northeast Vikings blasted Central's championship hopes by defeating the Kingbirds 49-40 in the Eagles' third league start. The Vikings' center, Jim Toner, was high point man with 19 points.

Central's Blue Eagles lost their second straight game to Westport's Tigers 41-38. The Kingbirds' late surge was stopped by the Tigers' stalling tactics in the last period. Herb McCoy was Central's high scorer with 10 points.

The Kingbirds dropped another game to East 31-43 in their fifth league start. Dale Wheat's 16 points were not enough to keep Central in the race with the Bears, sparked by Herb Morgan's 19 points.

Central lost its fourth straight game to Southwest 45-47 in two overtimes. The Eagles boasted a percentage of 43 in what appeared to be the break in their longest winless streak in two years, but J. M. Powell came along to put the Indians into the overtime with a bucket from the corner and did a repeat performance to win the game for the Southwest team. Dale Wheat was high scorer of the game with 20 of the Eagles' 45 points.

The Eagles wound up their league season with another loss to Southeast 42-52. It was the fifth straight loss for the Kingbirds and dropped them to seventh place in the league standing. Tom Slaymaker led the Eagle scoring with 12 points. The Eagles were hampered by the loss of Dale Wheat who only played half of the game because he was just recovering from the flu.

The hard-fighting Central quintet suffered their worst defeat at the hands of Lillis 56-38 in a post-season on the Lillis home court. The Eagles continued to give Lillis squad a running battle all the way but were unable to squand the tremendous height advantage of the fighting Irish. The height advantage of the Lillis team showed up in the percentage of baskets hit by Central. The Kingbirds were only able to sink 44 per cent of their shots as compared with 77 per cent for the Irish. The high scorer of the game was Dick

Thompson of Lillis who scored 16 points. Herb McCoy was high point man for Central with 11 points.

The Central Eagles met defeat in their final game of the season as they went down before the William Chrisman Bears 57-40, to eliminate them from the regional tournament at North Kansas City, February 27. The Kingbirds were on the short end of the score from the first of the game and their last-minute rally was in vain. Herb McCoy was again Central's high scorer with 12 points.

The Blue Eagles wound up the season with a final tally of 10 games won and 8 lost, a better than average record for a team that started the season with two lettermen.

Special congratulations go to Dale Wheat and Paul Lambert. Dale was placed on the All-Star second team and Paul received honorable mention on the All-Star team.

Central's high scoring records were rather divided, with Dale Wheat, Herb McCoy, Paul Lambert and Todd Sichel all taking honors.

And so another page is turned in the basketball history of Central's Blue Eagles.

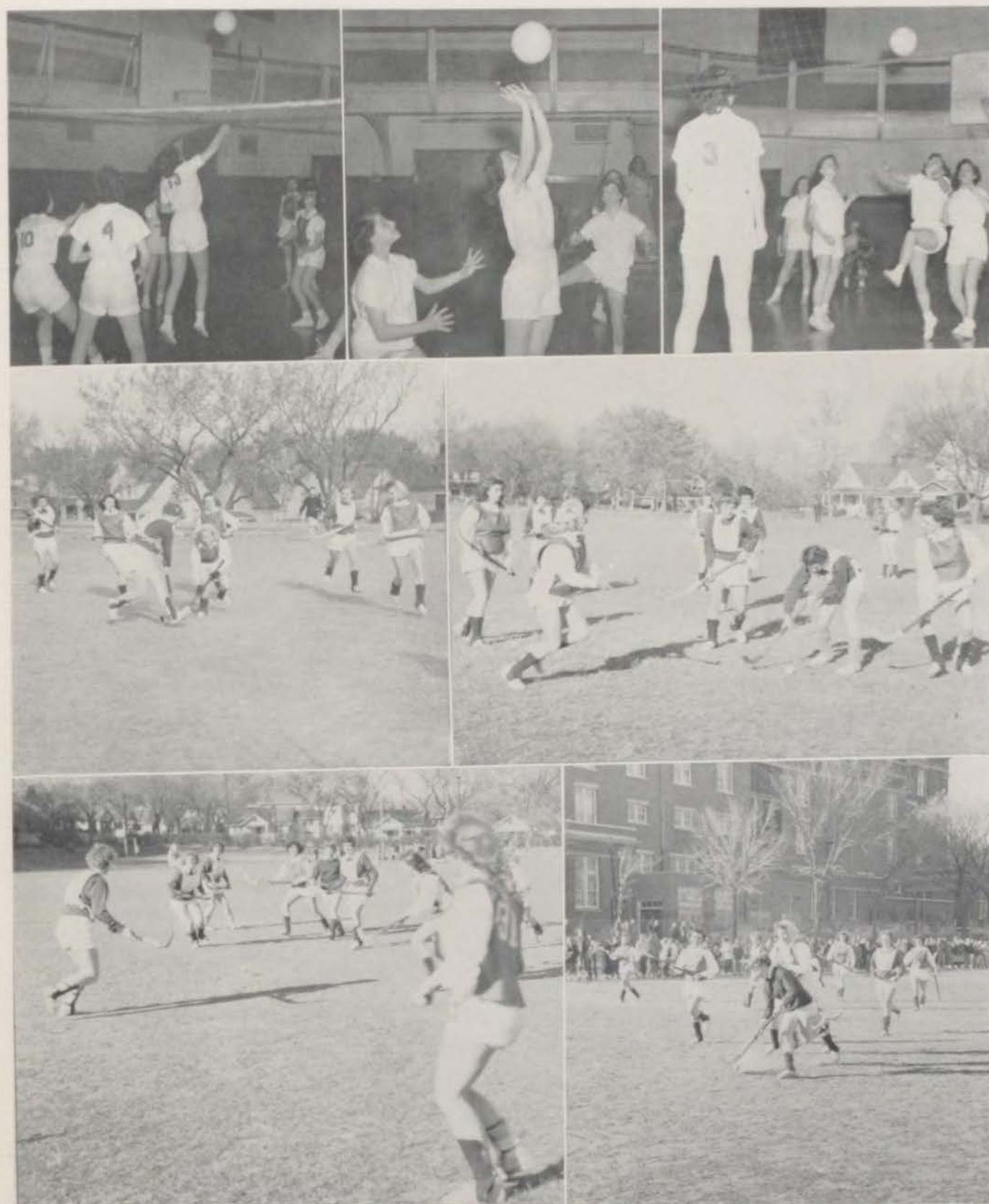

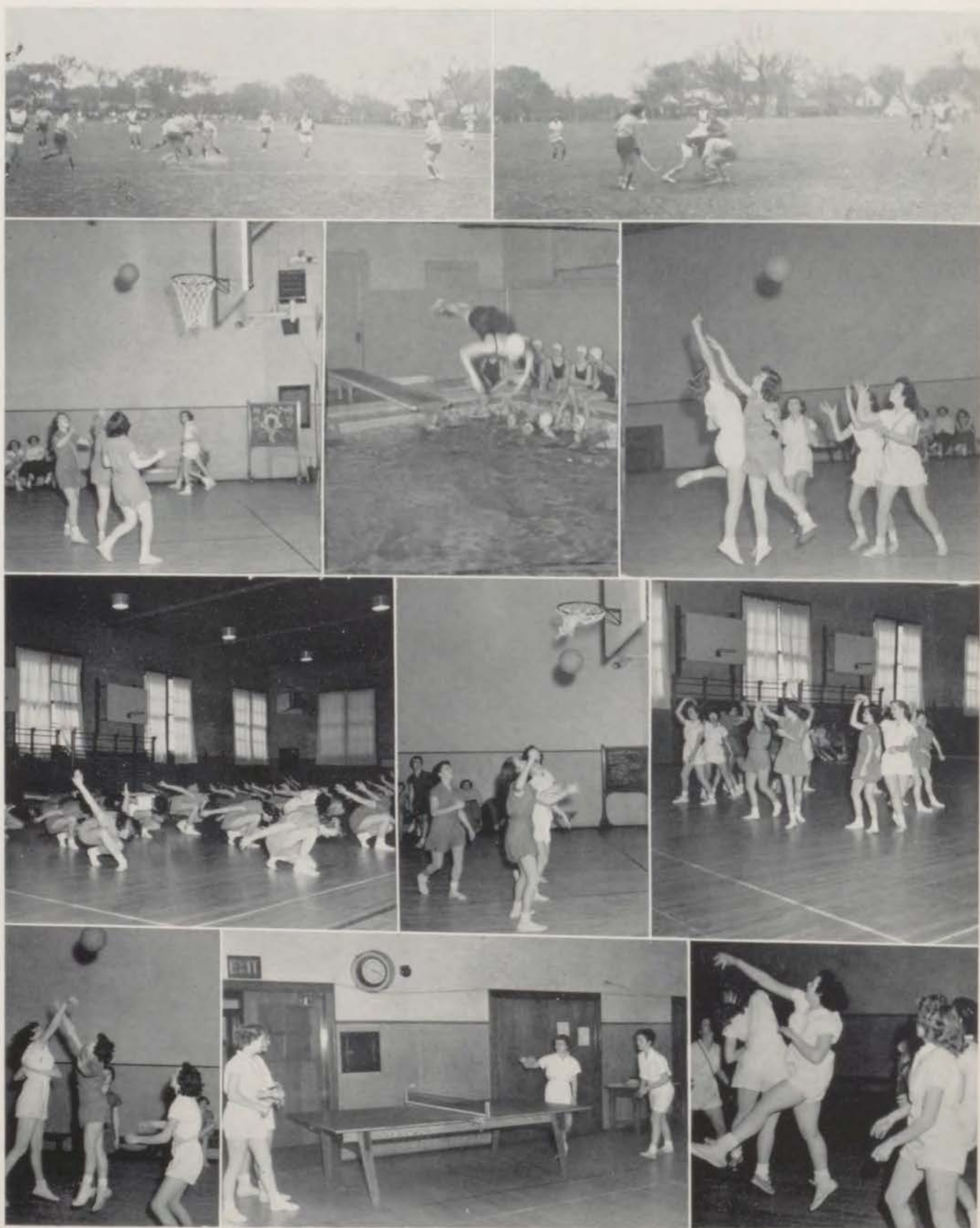
The girls' physical education training in high school not only prepares a girl for worthwhile leisure time activities following graduation, but it also helps to build a well-rounded life.

General Dwight D. Eisenhower once said, "The quality of leadership which we will painstakingly seek to develop and foster in the R.O.T.C. will have application to all walks of life." At Central, the fundamentals of good citizenship are taught, so that a graduate will be able to handle himself with distinction in any situation that might arise. General Eisenhower also said, "We stoutly maintain that leaders are made, not born." Thus, it is the purpose of the R.O.T.C. at Central to develop students who will be marked for leadership in any community in our land, during peace or war.

The Central Battalion started the year with an enrollment of 136 cadets. It was announced at the beginning of the first semester that Central was again rated as an Honor School due to its fine showing in last year's Federal Inspection.

The Junior R.O.T.C. program was again set up this year as a four-year course. Due to the lack of third-year cadets, there was an absence of officer material. The army instructors, M/Sgt. Sam E. Bottorff and M/Sgt. George W. Quigley, Jr., decided to appoint both the fourth- and third-year cadet officers to fill the command positions.

These cadets received their positions by placing first and second in an examination given to all cadet officers. The Battalion Staff consisted of Lt. Ralph Warburton, Adjutant; Lt. Richard Davis, Intelligence Officer; Lt. Darrel Watson, Plans and Training Officer, and Capt. Arthur Harmon, Supply Officer. The Company Commander of Company "A" was Capt. David Henson. Company "B" was commanded by Capt. Dale Knepper. Lt. Allen Lindsey filled in the position of Company Executive Officer of Company "A," while Lt. Phillip Rubin was the Company Executive Officer of Company "B." Leading the platoons of Company "A"

were Lieutenants Bill Glover and Jerry Dougan; of "B" Company, Lieutenants Bob Crabtree and Ben Willis.

Charles Brouse took the examinations for Regimental Commander, while Blair Rowley represented Central Battalion in the examination for Regimental Sergeant Major. Cadet Lt. Col. Brouse was appointed Regimental Adjutant.

The rifle team, weakened by the loss of two regulars, Mark Lessenger and David Brouse, went through the season without winning a league match. However, they came out with the third highest aggregate average of the Interscholastic League and placed second throughout the city in the Hearst Trophy match. Rifle team lettermen were Charles Brouse (team captain), Bill Baker, Bill Glover, Felix Lopez and Dale Knepper. Two members of the team, Charles Brouse and Dale Knepper, are rated Expert Rifleman by the N.R.A. Dale Knepper, Bill Glover and Bill Baker placed on the All-City second team. Central should make a strong bid for the championship next year with three of the regular members returning.

At the third annual Regimental Ball, held this year again at the Municipal Auditorium, Central's queen and candidate for regimental queen was Miss Donna Simmons, who was escorted by Cadet M/Sgt. Blair Rowley. The dance was one of the most successful and brilliant affairs of the school year.

Central again entered a comedy act in the twenty-seventh annual R.O.T.C. Circus. The act, a humorous dramatization of a band to Spike Jones' records, was one of the best in the circus.

The last two events of the school year were Federal Inspection and Field Day. Field Day having been completed, the cadets were given a well-deserved vacation, after having completed another great year in the Central R.O.T.C. tradition.
