


FOREWORD

with ribbon and star across his chest, is the first Poet Laureate of the United States.





The 1961-62 basketball edition of the Central Eagles compiled the best record of a Central team under the reign of James Wilkinson, Varsity Coach at Central for three years.

After placing third in the Interscholastic League Tournament, the mighty Eagles successfully opened league play with a thrilling 60 to 55 win over Paseo. The Eagles then suffered a heart-breaking 60-53 loss to Raytown. The loss, however, did not upset the Eagles as they reeled off 5 straight victories. Rated as one of the top teams in the area, the Eagles ran by Manual, East, and Southwest by scores of 54 to 37; 57 to 43; and 60 to 36.
