

### The English Department

The English department is perhaps the most important training given in our studio. The first step in this process toward stardom is the teaching of the correct usage of words. Just plain grammar is taught the first year, while during the next two, students are left to pursue the higher branches at will.

After the first year, the department branches into fields which give players the chance to specialize in courses which will have a bearing on the careers they choose. This is where we find Speech and Dramatics, those courses which give students the poise and ease before an audience which all actors need.

Journalism teaches all phases of newswriting and reporting, and gives the student confidence to enter many new ventures. The "Outlook" and "Wakitan" are put out by this class,

Creative English is the class where all the aspiring scenario writers, with an average above "S," are taught the fundamentals of style and criticism. This class helps to put out "Tower Gleams."

English Literature is an exciting subject where our actors get many a tantalizing look into the lives and works of the greatest of literary men.

Business English is given to aid the student in holding out as a star in the business world. They are taught correct English usage, spelling and types of letters.

Contemporary Literature is the study of literature written by present day writers. Here our actors study poetry, novels and short stories.

#### Constructive Arts

As our starlets enter Central's training school they are presented with a variety of courses offered to give them a firm clasp on an important role in life.

Homemaking, Foods, and Clothings are offered to the girls. These courses make for better living and appreciation in the homes of the future.

Boys are offered some unique courses, the newest of which is printing, where the young players learn to set type and run a press. Then, there is Lathe and Bench, where the boys turn out wonders in carpenter-ship.

Mechanical Drawing starts many a young architect on his climb to stardom, through making floor plans and blue prints.

In the Art Department one may find a variety of courses fitted to equip any youngster's talent. Here we find Art Appreciation classes, classes in Clothes Designing and Interior Decorating classes. The stars of Commercial Art classes supply our halls with attractive posters.

Musical talent is also supplied for Central's studioglee clubs. The Girls Glee Club, Boys Glee Club, and Mixed Choir have helped music appreciation on this high school lot.

No production could be complete without background of music. This, at Central, is provided by our splendid orchestra and band, large, and very talented.

### Physical Education

All work and no play makes Jack a dull boy. This familiar statement holds quite true to the young actors of our Central studios. Many of our military minded students seek as their extra curricular work, R. O. T. C. This military training course helps in preparing a student not only for future work in military, but in helping to produce a more successful citizen.

The boys department of athletics is composed mostly of football, basketball, and track, in which a numerous amount of boys participate. An interesting program of intramural sports is also planned and carried out each year.

The Central "C" is the goal which the girl athletes strive for each year. Many sports such as softball, basketball, hockey and others are included in their program.

Ballroom dancing and tap classes are two other subjects which Central proudly presents to its young actors. They are becoming more and more popular with the students each year.

Central's aim in presenting physical education to its partakers is to prepare the physical being to the extent that he can get the most out of the mental side of school life.

### Commercial Department

Among those in our Central Studios that are seeking more knowledge in the way of movie talent, choose in their selective courses in the Junior and Senior year such subjects as Shorthand, Typing and Office Practice. These are the primary and most interesting subjects for the vocational minded high school movie star.


In Shorthand the course

In Shorthand the course definitely endeavors the student to learn dictation and application. In Typing, the main purpose is to learn the fundamentals, and ability to operate a typing machine. Most students try to take this course, not only because

of its value in the school but after the goal of graduation is reached. Office Practice, another subject under this, deals chiefly with both short-hand and typing combined.

hand and typing combined.

Bookkeeping, the only elective subject in which a student may take all three years, is open to everyone. Five periods a day. During the first semester a pupil learns mostly the elementary side of bookkeeping. The second semester deals mostly with application of the theory. The highlights of the second semester is the completion of the Household Practice Set, which deals with the economic and Budget system of one's home life to come. It bears upon a student that thrift and economy are two of the finer points in our future life.

One of the things that help to make our movie lot a more joyous and happy one is a n u m b e r of elective courses designed into leading us to a vocation. Among these is a business commercial course known as Commercial Law. Learning the general knowledge of laws pertaining to trade and commerce and providing students with a little enjoyment while having sham trials are only a few of the finer activities in Commercial Law.

A varied approach to the

in Commercial Law.

A varied approach to the subject of Economic Geography commands a great deal of our students' interest. Economic Geography deals chiefly in the types of industries, occupations, hunting and fishing, grazing, farming and lumbering of the people of the world. The plan of presentation of the materials is new and stimulating. It replaces the old Cyclopaedian form. form.

Business English and Salesmanship are two other sub-jects which demand much of the students' attention. They are very popular among the classes.

### Natural Science Department

order that a student In order that a student may graduate from Central High, they are required to take a one year course in Natural Science. Biology, Chemistry, Physics and Psychology are the four very interesting subjects offered to our students.

teresting subjects offered to our students.

Biology, which is the primary and Sophomore subject, is by far the most interesting to the student. After completing this course a student will have fully absorbed a knowledge of biological standards. Also he will have had a faint glimpse into such subjects as Electricity, Physics, Psychology and Chemistry. Advanced Biology for Juniors and Seniors is also offered.

Chemistry, which seems to lure many Junior and Senior boys and girls, is one of the most fascinating and interesting subjects at Central. Many pupils enroll in this subject throughout the year. The principal aims in the study of Chemistry are the

solving of simple problems in the arts and elements of Chemistry. The working out and analyzing of primary Chemistry experiments, and the relationship and solving of Chemistry problems to our modern world-like conditions.

modern world-like conditions. Physics, which seems to attract many mechanically minded pupils, offers a very broad and educational field. This subject seeks to teach the student an elementary knowledge of electricity, sound and light, and the principles which fluctuate mechanics and weight. Physics also helps to install into the mind of a student the most important scientific attitude.

Another study in our pro-

Another study in our program of education which is gaining more and more in popularity among our students each year, is the subject of Psychology. This subject which is most diligently taught is open only to Seniors and is a one semester course.

All in all our Natural Sci-

All in all our Natural Science Department is a great help in the development of our own character. In helping us to think clearly and to solve intelligently our own problems.

### The Mathematics Department

The Mathematics department is of great benefit to our school. Here students are trained to solve any problem confronting them concerning figures. Mathematics itself presents the practical parts of Algebra, Geometry and Arithmetic applicable to every day business situations.

Trigonometry is the appli-

Trigonometry is the application of Algebra, Geometry and the practical measure of triangles. This includes both practical and theoretical mathematics.

Geometry is the study of angles, measurements, square root, solving of problems concerning them, and the application of clear thinking to problems of life. Algebra is the study of equations.

### Language Department

No actor in the Central Studios may consider himself fully applicable for the right of promotion unless he has become acquainted with the variety of speeches, offered to him by our Language Department.

Latin, Spanish and French are the three presented to our students.

Latin in the field of medicine, and the basic of all other languages may be considered first. The immediate primary objective for the study of Latin is the ability to read and understand the importance and history of Latin. Through the study of Latin one may develop desirable mental habits such as

perfected attention, perseverance and accuracy. In completing the course a student shall have gained a historical background, relating to life, history, mythology and religion of the Roman people.

French and Spanish courses are the two studies next to be discussed. These I wo courses are somewhat alike in the subject of aims. For both of them a student's objective should be, the ability to read and express simple ideas, to develop in the minds of the student a greater understanding of life and customs of the Spanish and French speaking people, creating in them a warmer feeling of international friendship.

The brief glimpse which a student receives in taking a foreign language is a great help in preparing for a college education.

### Social Science Department

The Social Science courses that Central offers to its young actors prove to be of the utmost importance to the development of future citizens for our Democracy. They are all applicable to modern living.

modern living.

A Sophomore elective course, World History, deals chiefly with the activities and struggle of man from the prehistoric ages up to the present day. This most interesting subject by linking together these events of medieval and modern times proves that present day events have their bases in the past. To further this idea an integrated course of Sophomore history and English is taught.

lish is taught.

United States History, a Junior course, is the story of the rise and development of our nation up to the present. It relates the struggles and warfare that our people engaged in, to reach our present state of civilization. It shows how modern economic and social conditions rose out of the past. An interesting experiment has been conducted in the integration of United States history and Missouri history in one class.


Senior subjects are Eco-

Two elective courses in the field of Social Sciences for boys are Personal Problems, which helps the boys to be successful in their jobs in business. Each boy taking the course has a job outside of school; and Consumer's Science, which has as an aim, helping man to apply science to his daily living and to live successfully with modern science.


EVERY production must have an executive board to direct its affairs and offer suggestions for improvement. Such a body is the Student Council, who participate in the student government of the school.








#### OFFICERS CLUB


#### RIFLE TEAM


The rifle team was founded in 1922. It has always been an organization that has won honors for Central. Coached by Sergeant McCroskey, the team won the first city championship in eight years.





