HISTORY

THE establishment of an institution is more than an adventure: it is the laying of foundations which will last through the ages.

The movement which resulted in the building of East High School was begun in 1922. The East Side Improvement Association presented the matter to the school board and as a result the tract was purchased from Mr. R. A. Long in 1923.

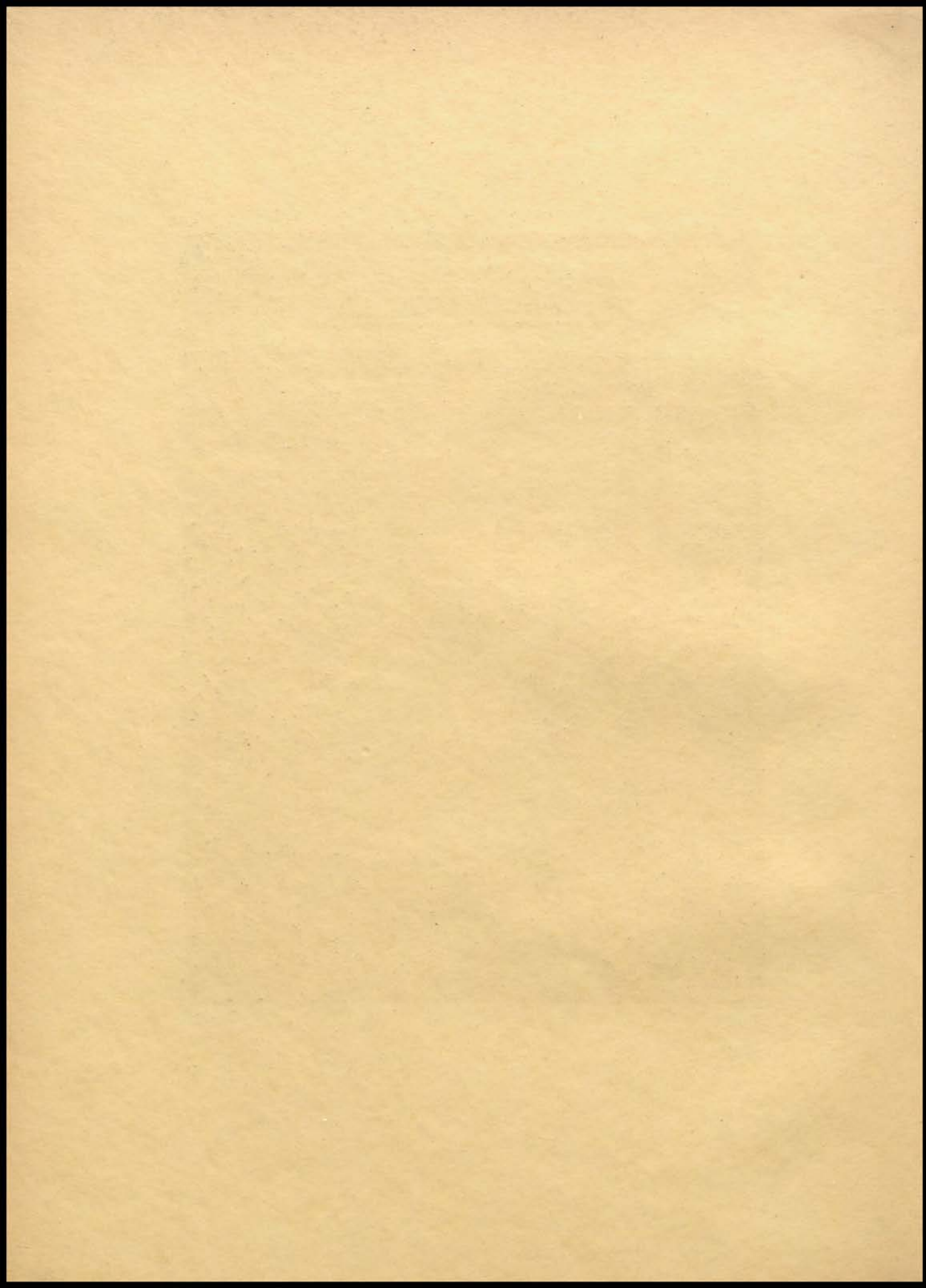
During the first year of East High School's existence, the students and faculty successfully met the problem of instituting the features which should become the school's traditions. Clubs were organized and the athletic department began its career. As a result, the highest form of school loyalty and the desire to promote all activities into which our school entered were created. Honors were attained in this first year in music and in publications. Also, seven pupils qualified for membership in the National Honor Society.

Building upon the achievements of the first year's work, we were able to carry out the activities more extensively the second year. Scholarship was advanced, athletics were well supported, and the clubs gained prestige. Again honors were attained in publications. School spirit surpassed even that of the pioneer year. Twenty-two pupils became members of the National Honor Society.

Our traditions have become more firmly established this year and we have gained recognition from the other schools, especially by our success in athletics. The basket ball team contributed to the fame of East High by winning the state championship in basket ball. Old organizations have been well supported and new ones have been formed.

Because of the success in the three years of East High School's existence, we can look with interest and with confidence to the future of our school.

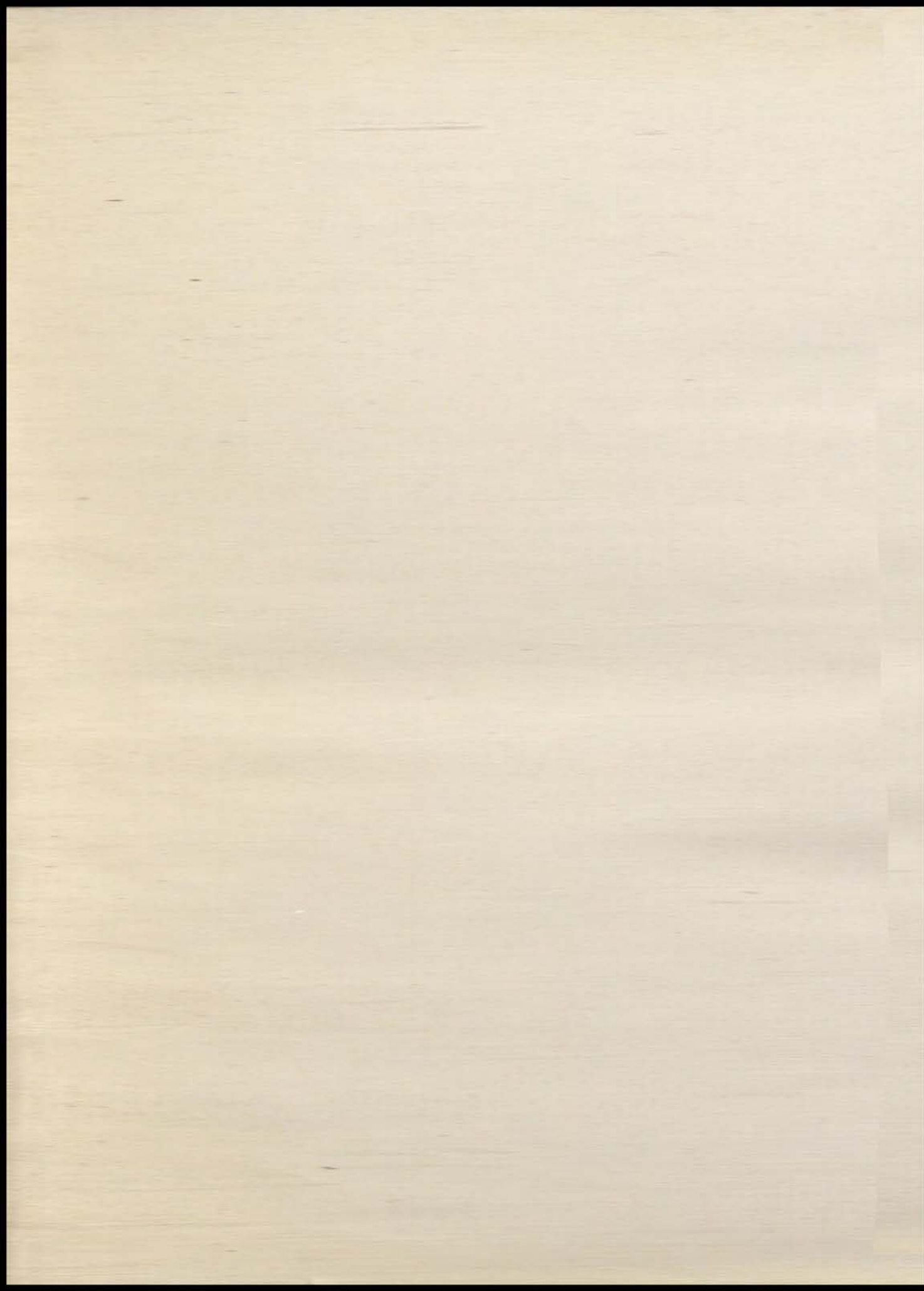

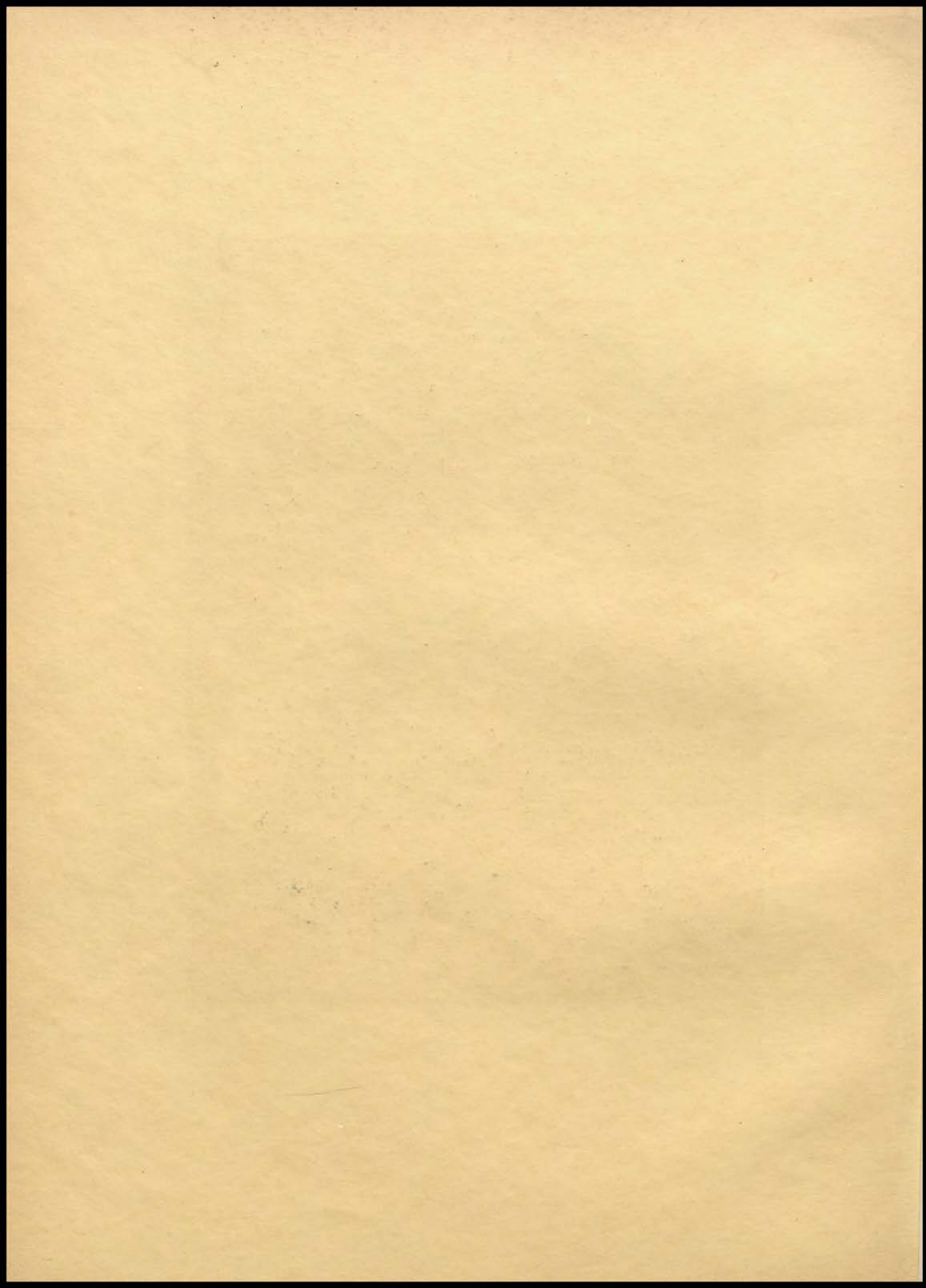

The National Honor Society was founded in the high schools throughout the country in 1924. A chapter was established at East in 1928. This year twenty-two students from the senior class were chosen by the faculty for membership in the society.

Candidates eligible for membership in this organization must rank in the upper twenty-five per cent of the graduating class in scholarship. From this upper twenty-five per cent the faculty may elect not more than fifteen per cent of the entire senior class, basing the election on scholarship, leadership, character and service. Figures showing scholarship and extra-curricular honors were compiled by a committee composed of Miss Hiatt, chairman; Miss Wingert, Miss Gilchrist, Mr. Wahlstedt, and Mr. Broadlick.

Each members receives the emblem of the society, a gold pin in the shape of a keystone, with a torch superimposed upon it and bearing the initial letters of the qualities for which the National Honor Society stands—Scholarship, Leadership, Character, and Service.

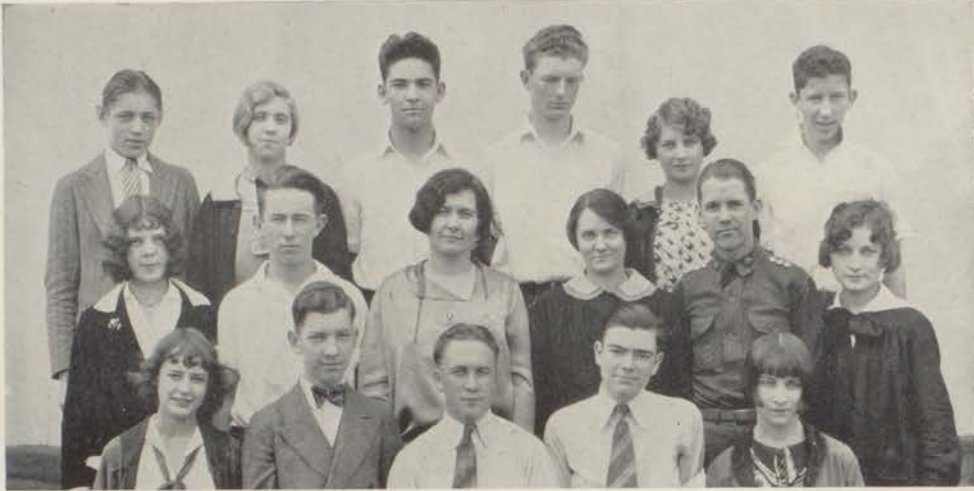

"The Outburst" is undoubtedly the biggest and best supported school entertainment of the year.

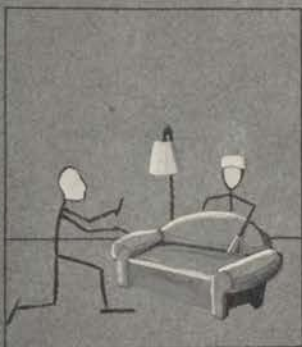

The Citizen, His Privileges and Duties Under the Constitution

Turning back the sacred pages of our nation's history, we view the various achievements of our forefathers from the dawn of our Republic to the present era of power. There are many achievements that fill us with pride; but there is one achievement that we view not only with pride but with reverence and awe, an achievement that stands so far above the other accomplishments of our nation, indeed, the accomplishments of any nation, that it will remain permanent, enduring, to the end of time. That achievement, my friends, is the Constitution of the United States!

Since the adoption of our Constitution the American citizen has enjoyed its privileges, but has he met fully the duties accompanying these privileges? As we look about us and observe the violation of law and prevalence of crime everywhere, we are forced to admit that, in some way, some of us have failed in the discharge of our duties as American citizens, have lapsed into a momentary forgetfulness of the vital importance of a clean, conscientious, law-abiding citizenry to a nation's progress and welfare. If we will to obey our Constitution, it is imperative that we turn from our errors with a stronger and greater determination to fulfill our destiny as the leading nation of the world.

The rights of the American citizen are inviolable; they may never be taken from him. He has the right at all times to freedom of assembly and petition, freedom of the press, freedom of speech, and freedom of religion. His house is his castle, free from unwarranted molestation. If, at any time, he is charged with any offense, no matter how great or small, he will not be compelled to testify against himself, but shall have the right to fair trial by jury with witnesses and counsel for defense. These are sacred rights. And, perhaps most important of all, the American citizen has a voice in his government, the right to vote. Think of it! Freedom of action, thought, and conscience! Priceless Liberty! The heritage of battles fought on the blood-stained fields of Runnymede, Yorktown, Verdun; words from the pens of history's mightiest statesmen; words from the lips of immortal poets and orators; all have toiled and labored that man might have his inalienable rights. Who can fail to give recognition to the constitution as the object and fulfillment of the ceaseless search of the ages for liberty; and in giving recognition, who can fail to honor those heroes of Independence Hall, who made it possible through their foresight, for us, as American citizens, to lead in that fulfillment?

To balance the rights and the privileges of the Constitution, there are certain duties devolving upon the citizen. In a sense, these are not only duties but privileges also;

for the performance of these duties permits us constantly to express our gratitude for the benefits that come daily to us, because of this, our Constitution. And yet, how few of us feel this, how few indeed, give recognition at all, to these definite duties resting upon us!

The true American citizen is law-abiding. He obeys not only the several laws coming within his convenience, but all those under which he has occasion to act. Did every man feel this sacred duty to his Constitution, as well as to his God, our beloved country would not be in its present condition, a situation fast becoming alarming. The solution to this problem is observance of law. We have forgotten that our nation's very "reason for existence is law enforcement," that "it is just as important to defend the Constitution at home, as it is the flag abroad!" Three and a half million answered the call to arms of our nation in her hour of need. How many of us today are willing to answer that same call for preservation, not only by defending, but obeying her laws? The need is even more urgent!

Law observance depends not alone upon the Government, for the Constitution is the law; not alone upon the officials, they can but punish the offense; not alone upon the mass, it is irresponsible; but upon the individual, upon *you!* If only we might realize that we, American citizens, are paying the price of lawlessness. Recent investigation has shown that the cost of crime would be sufficient to maintain all the educational institutions in America. We are paying, not only in money, my friends, but in heartaches, in the needless loss of life caused by crime!

We must not stop at personal observance of law after we attain it but must strive through our example to aid those about us in becoming the type of citizens that is most helpful to the nation. If, through bettering ourselves, we have influenced others to better actions, then we have truly made material progress toward our goal of ideal citizenship.

Thus in our lives as American Citizens, we find a balanced status: on the one hand, privileges, on the other, duties; the one, a guaranty of our Freedom, the other, an obligation to uphold the law which grants us that Freedom.

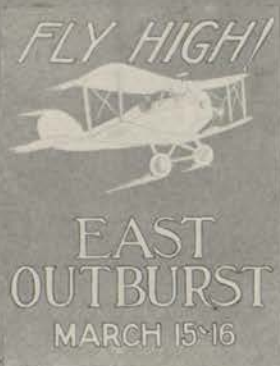

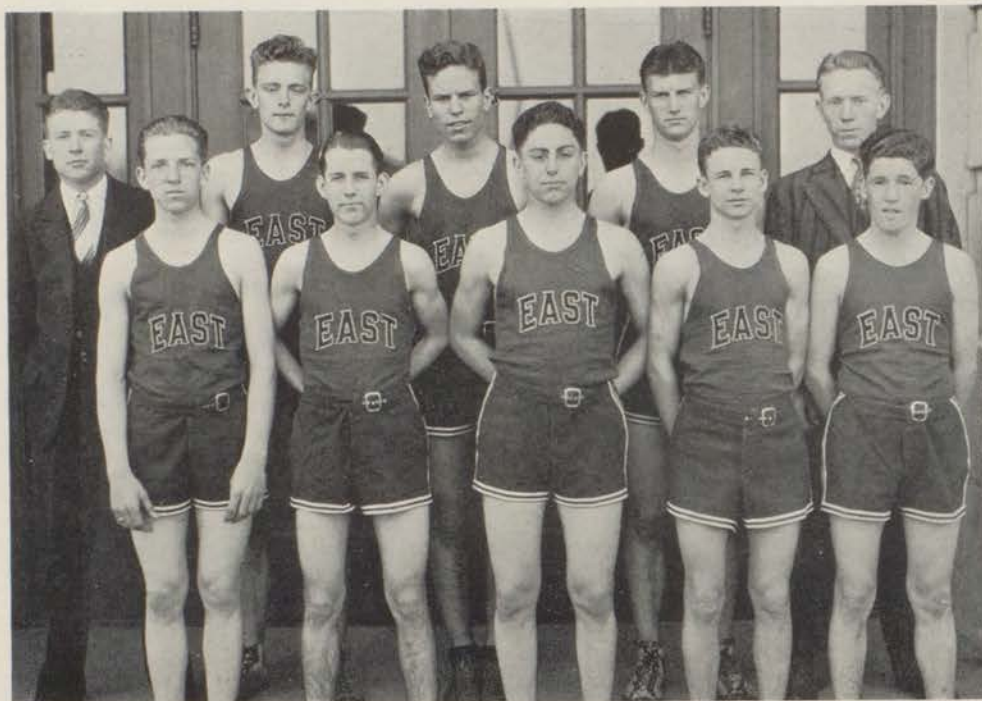

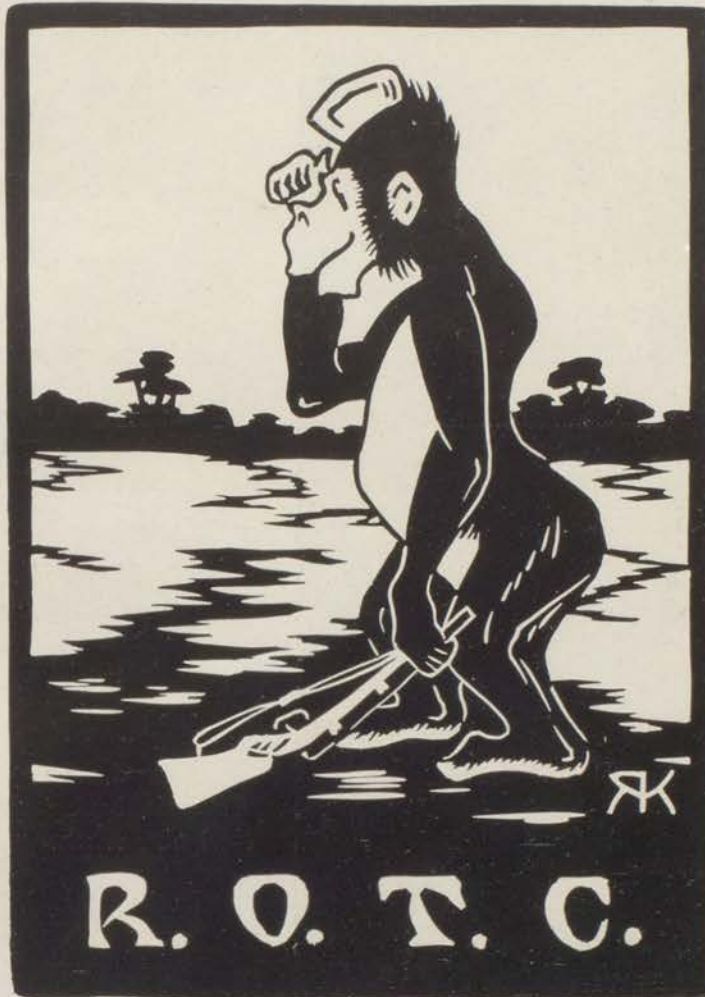
