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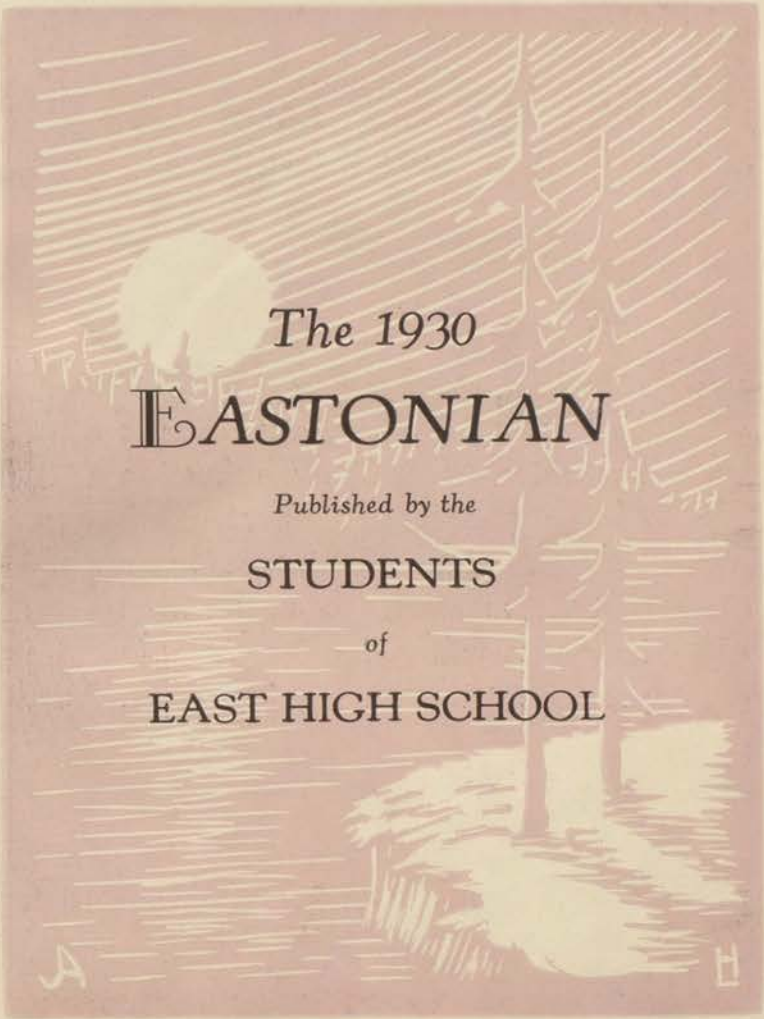

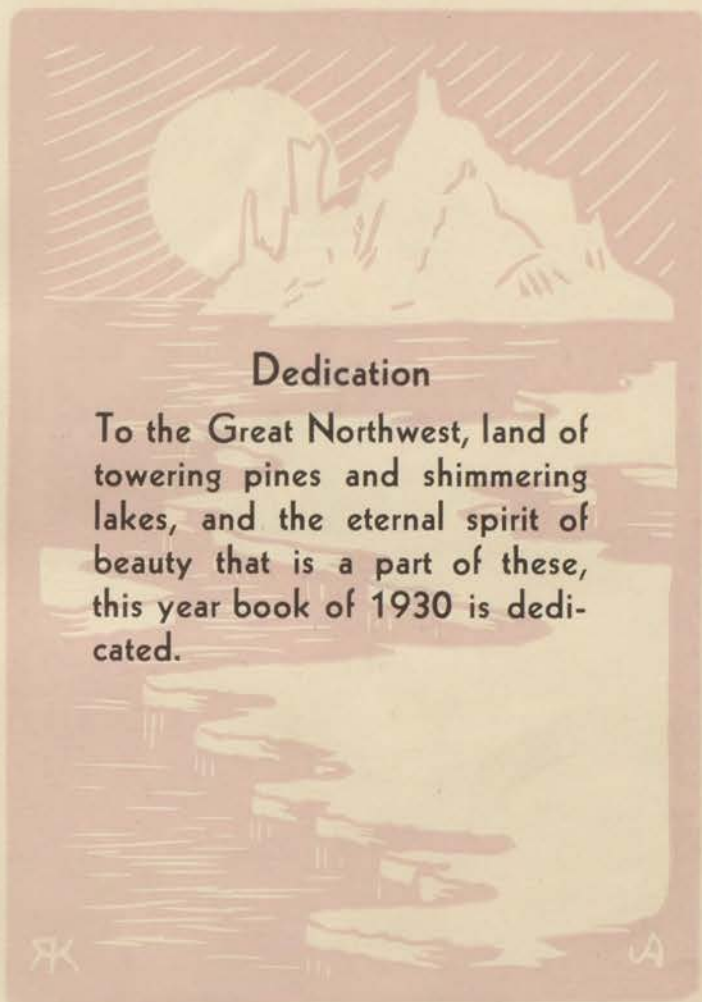


### Foreword

In looking back over the fourth season of dramatics at East, nothing is more indicative of the success of the productions than the splendid attendance. Although handicapped in not having an auditorium and in not having sufficient space for seating and stage setting, we have placed our department on a par with that of the much better equipped schools.

The Dramatics department, under the direction of Miss Eva Van Natta, produced three very outstanding dramatic presentations this year, namely: The Mid-Year Plays which consisted of "On Vengeance Height" by Allan Davis, "The Eligible Mr. Bangs" by Robert Hausum, and "Two Naughty Old Ladies" by Ada M. 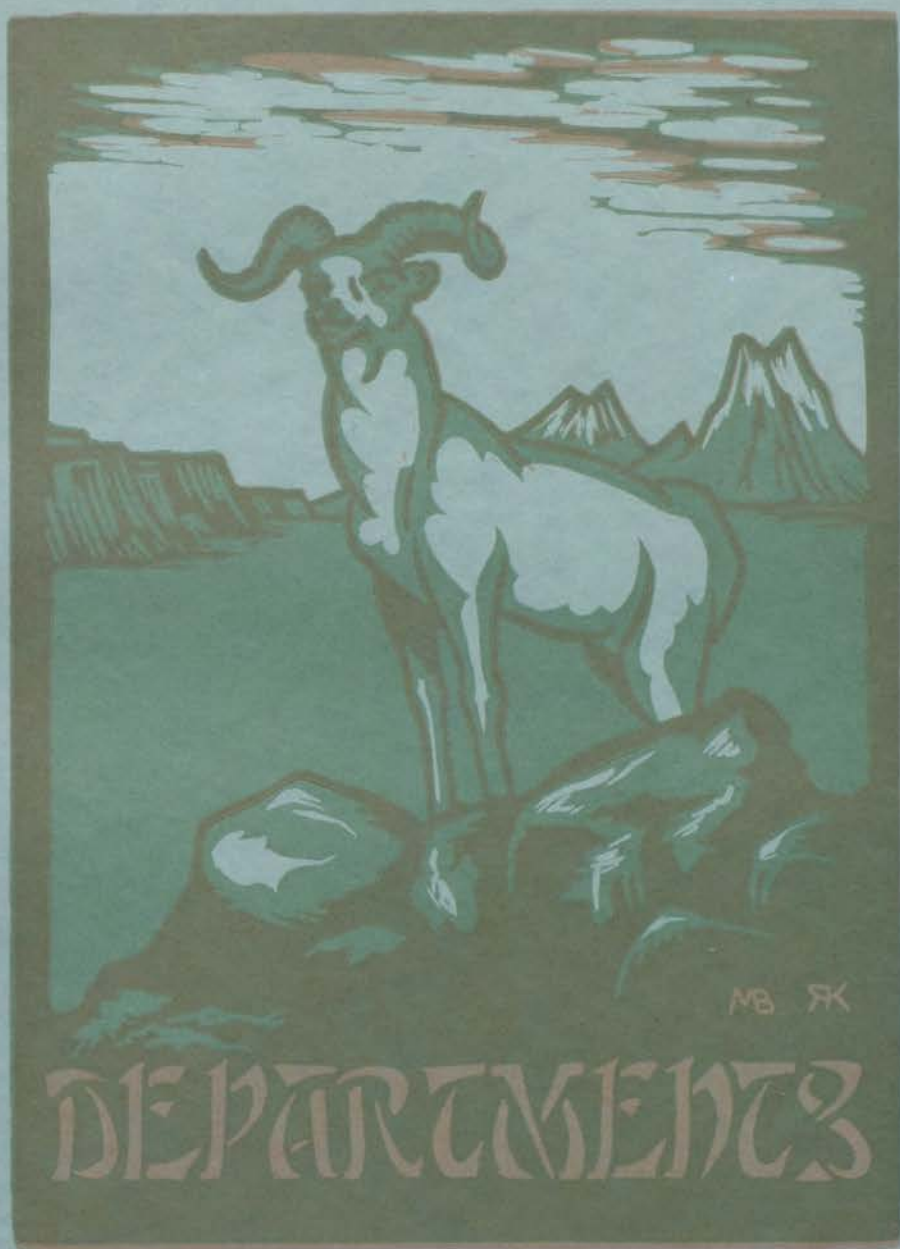
The three productions were very well attended and the casts proved themselves worthy of the honor that is theirs.

The first play, "On Vengeance Height," was a tragedy, while the other two were delightful bits of comedy.



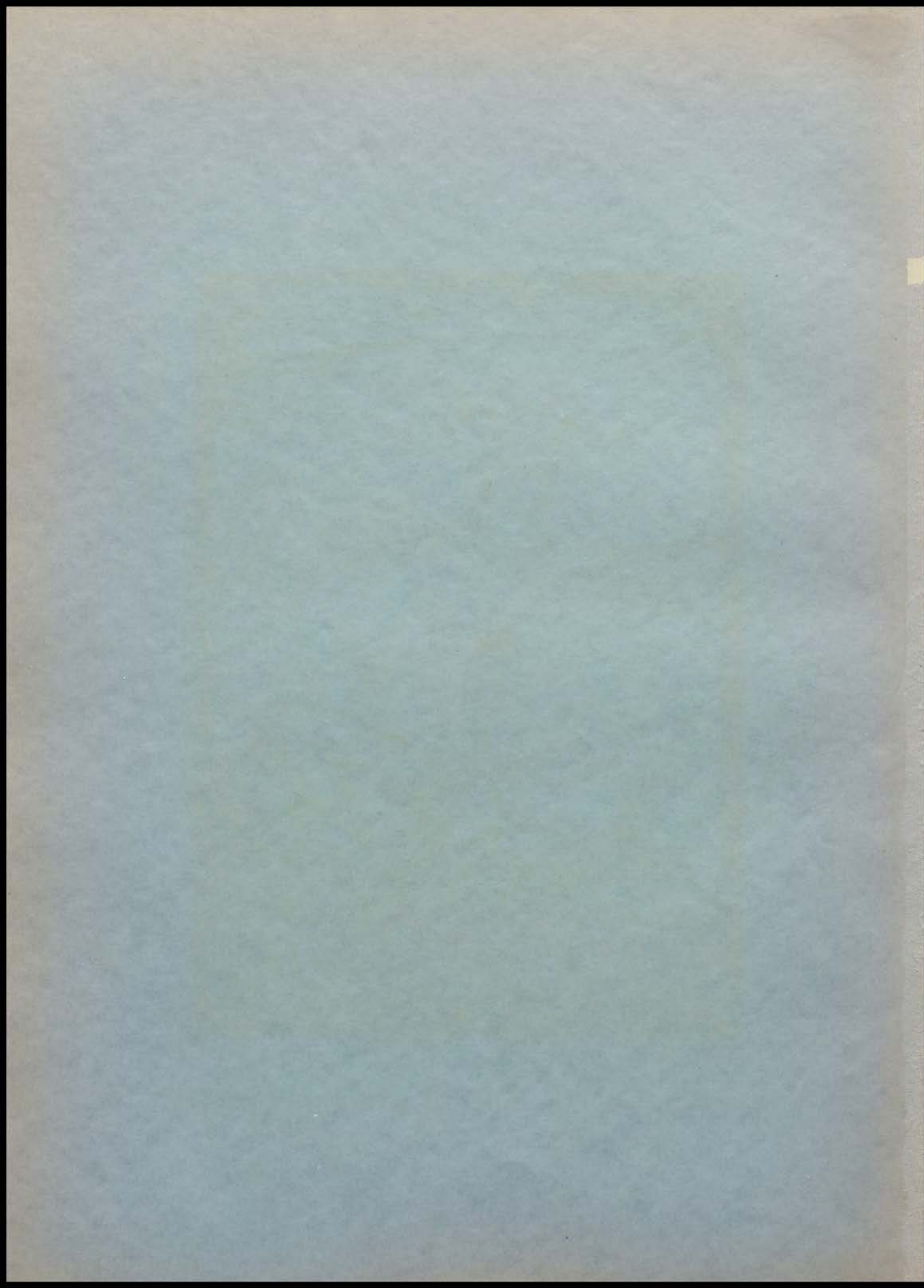

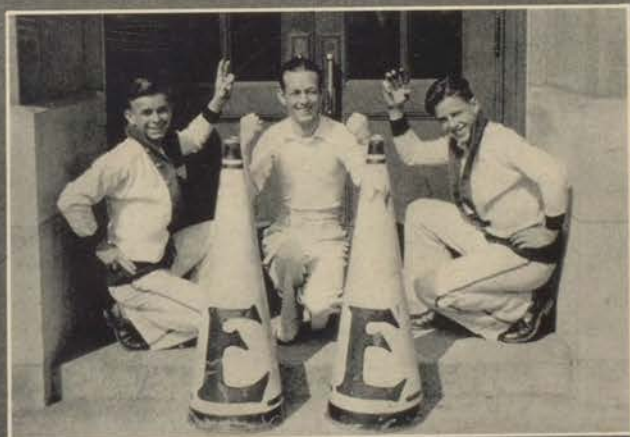

In the outside game of the season, the East backs ran rough-shod over the De LaSalle team. The feature of the game was a 100-yard punt by George Light. He was kicking with the wind, while deep in the shadows of his own goal posts. The ball sailed in the air about 70 yards, and then bounced over the other goal line, completing one of the longest punts in Interscholastic League history.

The Manual line was not strong enough to hold off the charges of the East backs, so Coach Cohlmeier's aggregation rolled up 24 points before the game ended. Many reserve men saw service in this game.

### EAST—0, CENTRAL—20

This game was the most thrilling of any during the season, although we lost it. The green and black team outplayed the Eagles from a scrimmage point of view, but luck in intercepting several passes, combined with an early drive, was responsible for the Central victory.

### EAST—6, PASEO—7

Failure to make the point after a touchdown was responsible for the East defeat in the final game of the season. The game was bitterly fought, and thrilling stops by backfield men kept the spectators on their toes.

## Track Squad

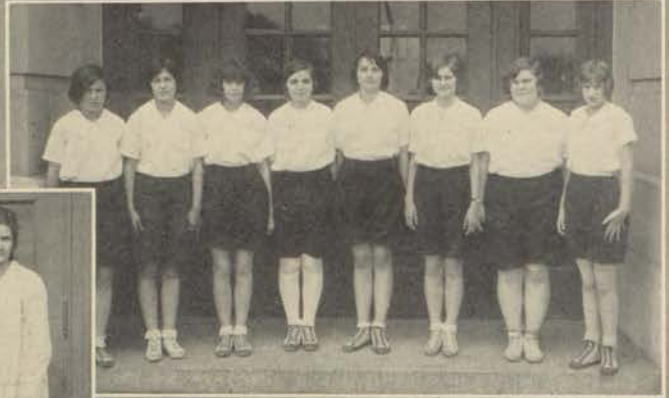

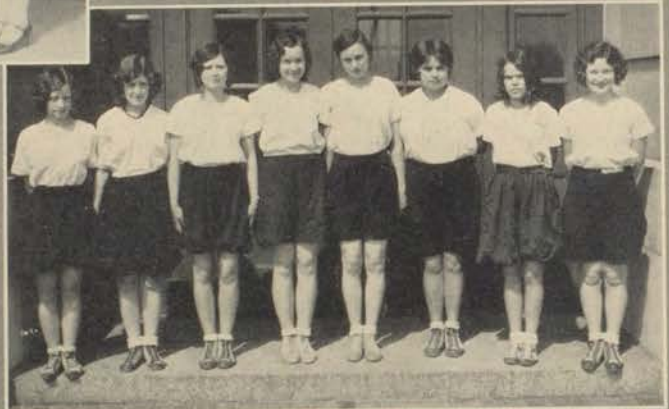

The Student Council was organized in 1926 as the Student branch of school government at East. One representative and one alternate are elected from each home room to serve a one-semester term.

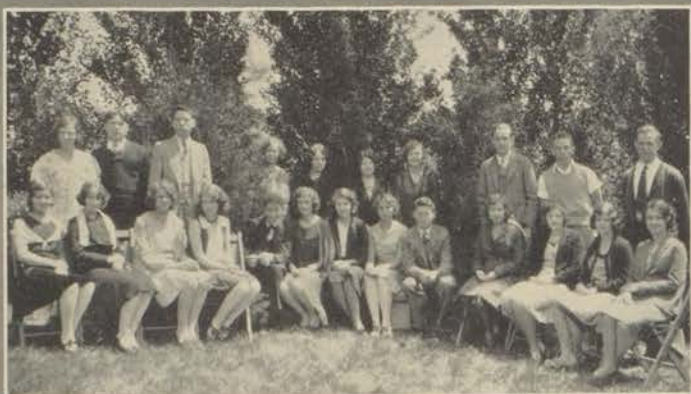

## Typing Contest

The annual University of Missouri High School Day contest for second year typing students was held in Columbia, Mo., May 2, 1930. East High was the only contestant-sending high school entering from Kansas City. Our team consisted of Gene Luther, Draper Jennings and Dorothy Glasner. Draper Jennings won first place, a gold medal, and Dorothy Glasner fourth place. Draper's record was 68.8 with five errors and Dorothy's record was 60.37 words per minute.

On May 3, the Missouri State Typist Association held a contest in which Draper Jennings won the silver cup for the highest per cent of accuracy in the contest. This made Draper the state champion for accuracy for second year students, but he was denied the cup because Kansas City had not held a preliminary district contest as required by the rules of the State Typists Association. The cup was given to the student making the second highest record in accuracy, a contestant from Normandy, Mo.

In the contest for the first year typing students Westport and East were the only contestants from Kansas City. East's first-year team consisted of Marian Shelton, Bessie Anderson, and Dora Hoss. East placed seventh, tenth, and twelfth among thirty contestants and Westport placed nineteenth and twenty-first.

## Music Contest

The Music Solo Contest was held at Westport Junior High School on April 26, 1930. The Boys' Quartet, composed of Eldred Guthrie, bass; Edward Bower, baritone; Charles Reckart, second tenor, and James Womelduff, first tenor, placed second. In the double mixed quartet East placed third. This was composed of Virginia Goelitzer, Celia Peaslee, Margaret Haynes, Dorothy Jean Gamble, Clarence Lucas, Tom Ellis, Richard Hartenburger, Charles Reckart.

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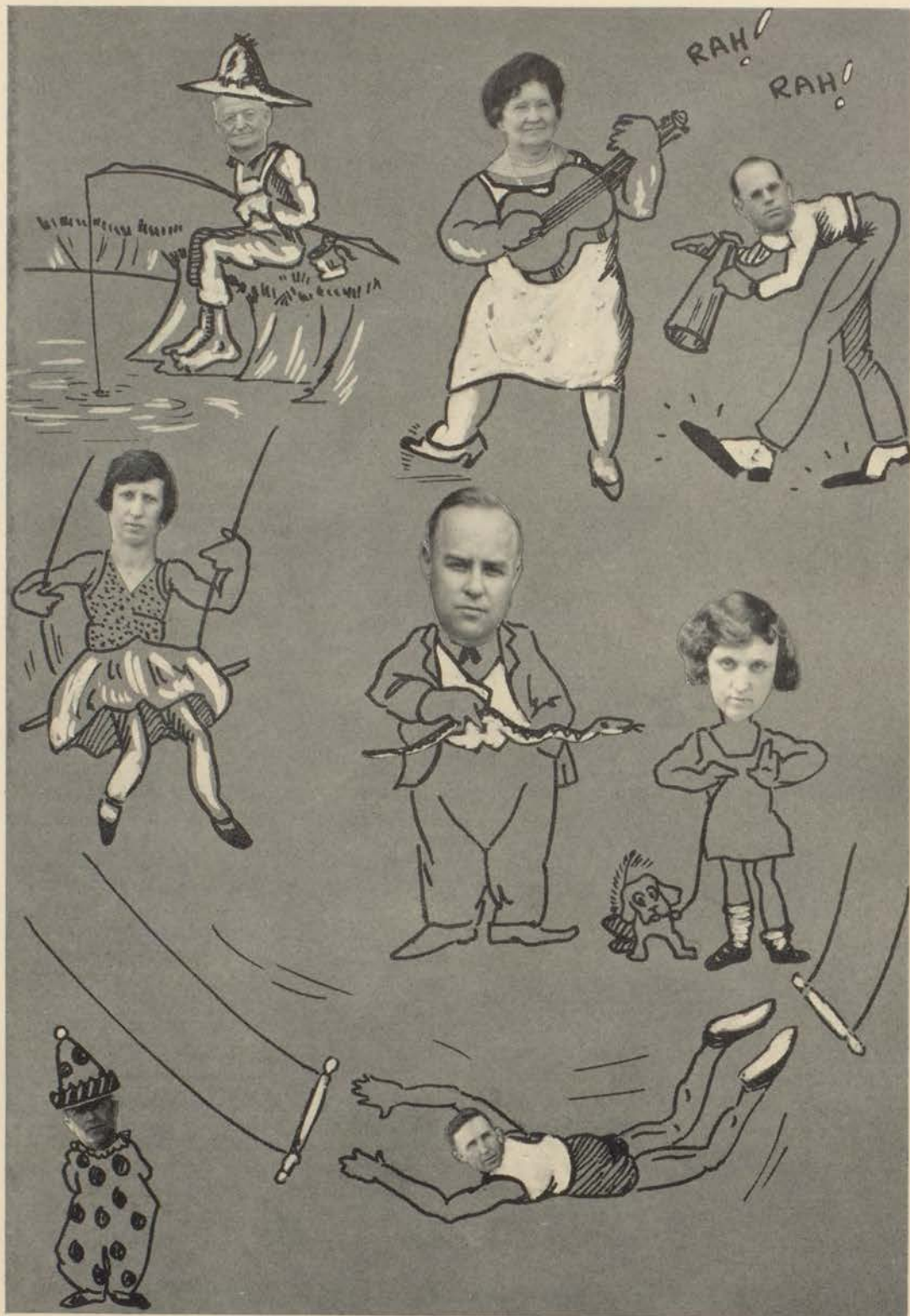
Bow; Wallace Easley, actor; Marjorie Preussner, playwright; Arta Jane Thomas, novelist; and Ralph Deatz, director.

The Lilla sisters were shown singing over station B. U. N. K. of Kansas City.

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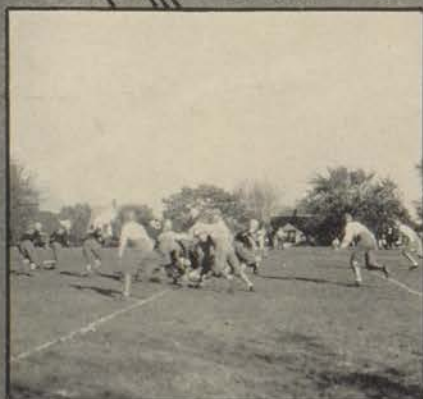



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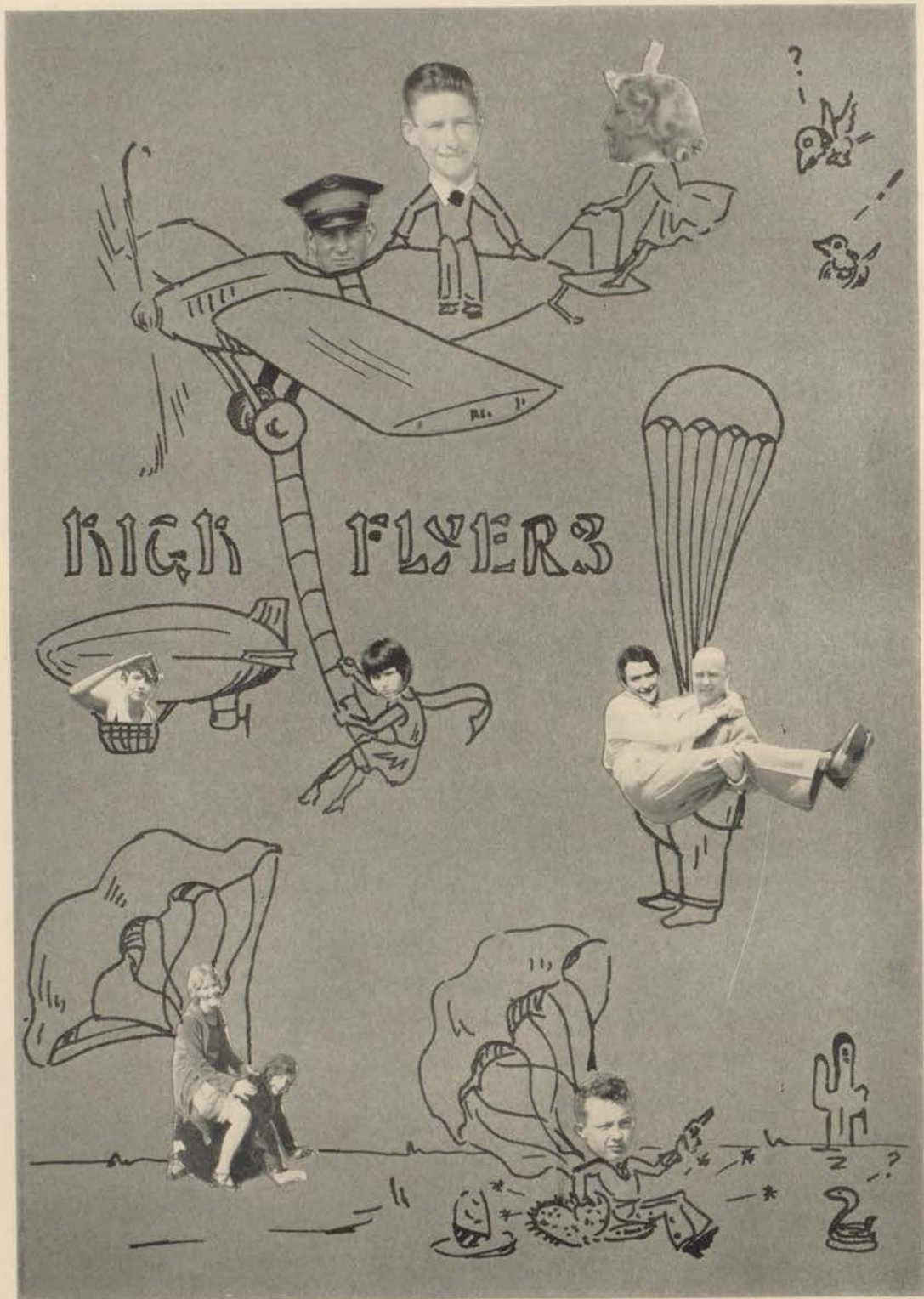
