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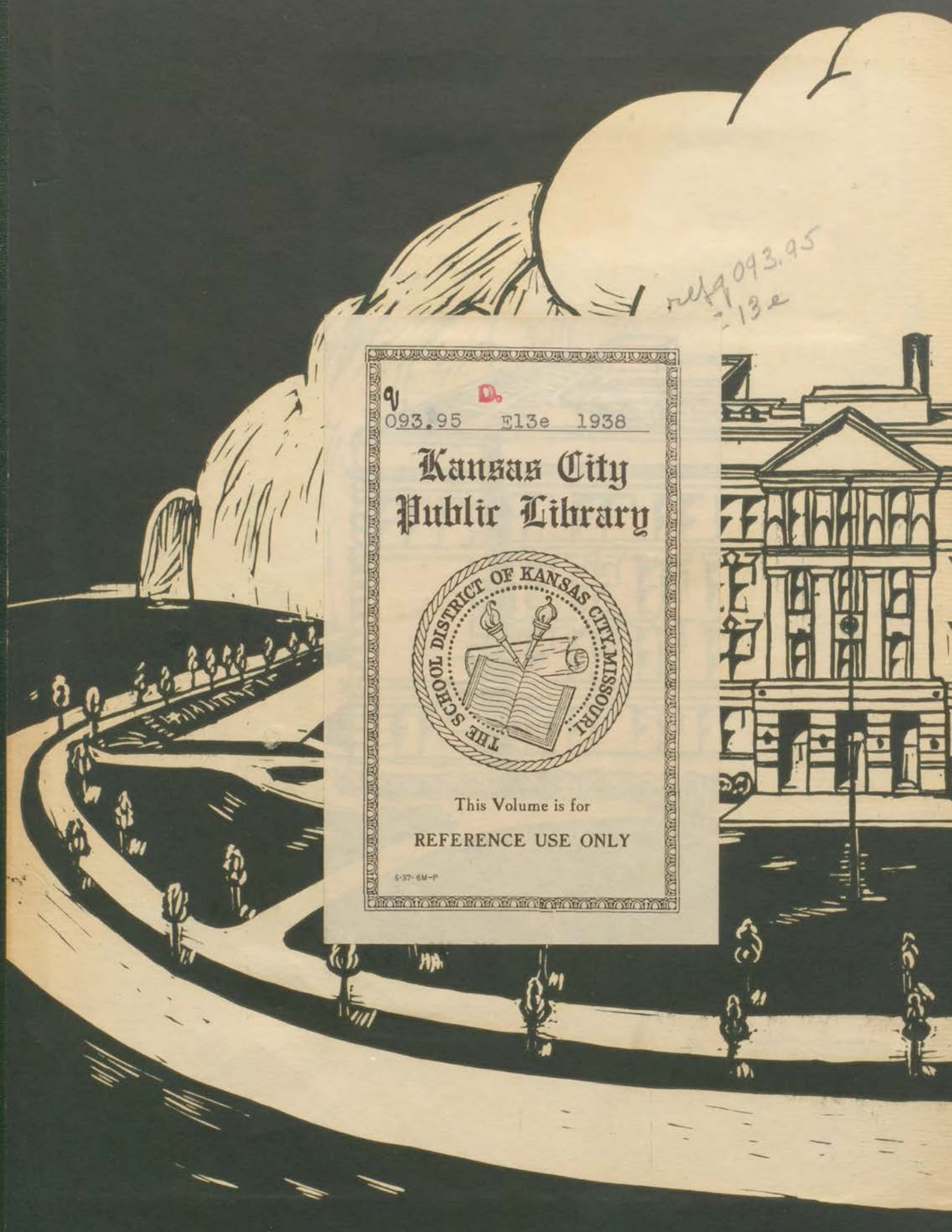
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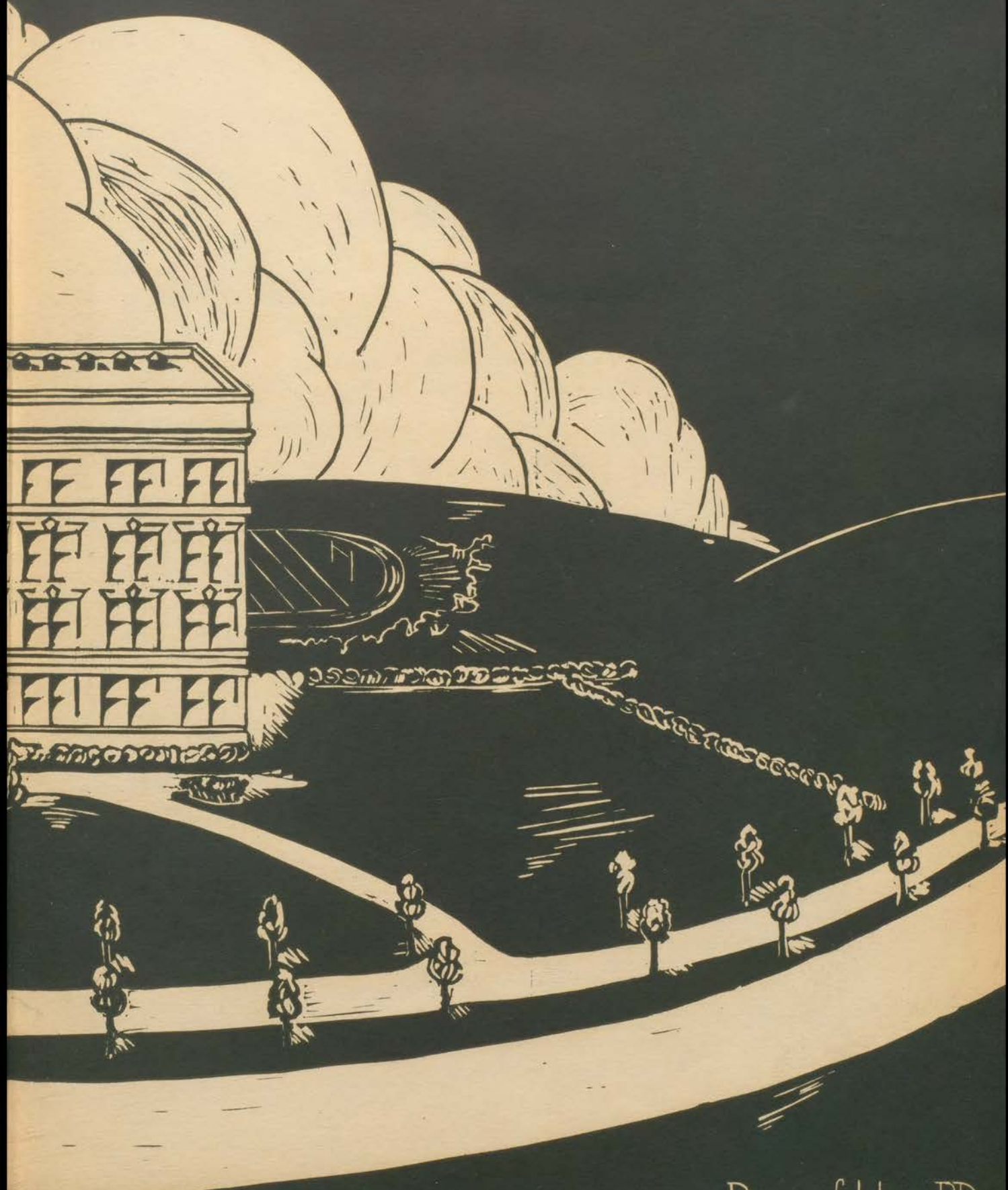


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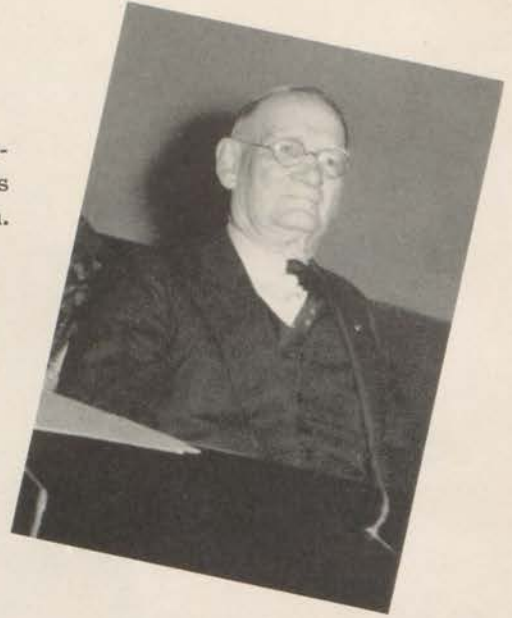

By his sunny disposition, gracious manner, righteous living, and good character he has influenced many people. For the past twelve years he has stood before us, a living example of the Golden Rule. So we think it fitting, since Mr. Nowlin is retiring from active service in this school system, to dedicate our year book to him.

Although it seems to us that Mr. Nowlin has changed little, if any, these past years, he has not always been as we have known him. He, too, spent years in school and gained much by experiences.

Born in Jackson County, Michigan, he received his first education in a small country school of Cass County, Michigan. Our principal then moved to Kansas and continued his schooling in Douglas County and later at "prep" school at the University of Kansas.

A graduate of two colleges, Kansas State Teachers' College and the University of Kansas, he is highly educated along many lines. With the completion of his training as a pedagogue, he started out to establish a name for himself in this vocation.

Mr. Nowlin has held a number of positions in this occupation, as he was supervisor of several country schools in Johnson County, Kansas; principal of Longfellow School in Kansas City, Kansas; instructor at Wyandotte High School; vice-principal of Northeast; principal of Northeast Junior; and principal of East.

These positions alone would be of ample credit to any one man; however, he has also instructed a large number of teachers by having conducted county Teachers' Institutes in Kansas, taught two years in the summer session at the University of Denver, and two summers in the school for teachers here in Kansas City.

Besides being well known as a teacher, he has acquired a name for himself in other fields also. He has lectured in several states but is even more widely known as a story-teller. His special hobby, and one that has brought him much recognition, is that of writer of verse and prose. Many of his articles have appeared in the newspapers and magazines. One of the greatest honors he has received for this work is having served as a president of the Missouri Writers' Guild.

Having been a man of such renown it seems impossible he could be as close to the students as he is. Yet, he has in every sense been the head of his "East High family."

Because he has so capably led East forward these past twelve years, because he has kept before us always an example of the Golden Rule, because we have appreciated what he has done for us, we dedicate this year book to our principal, Mr. Nowlin.

EAST HIGH SCHOOL FACULTY

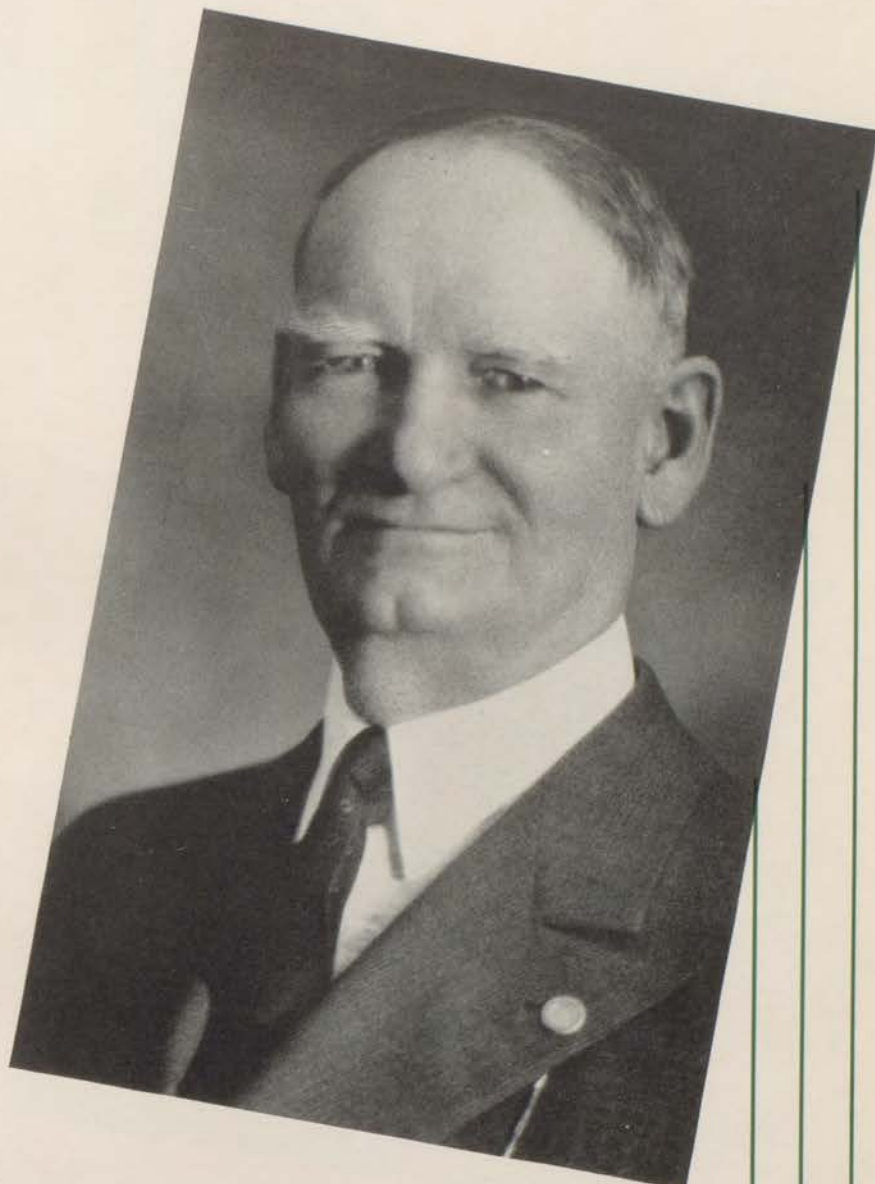

PROCTOR SYSTEM

The second semester brought forth a new system to East. The proctor system was sponsored by the Student Council after much planning, discussion and work. The need for the proctor system was apparent as there had recently been several episodes of bicycle stripping and breaking into lockers. Because of these acts the student body desired to install this system in order to protect the students.

The proctors are juniors and seniors having a scholastic average of medium and desirable qualities, such as dependability, obedience and trustworthiness. The qualified list of proctors is voted upon by the faculty. From this list twelve proctors per hour are selected by the Student Council committee. Each hour has a captain appointed by the generalissimo.

These proctors see that the halls are clear during class time, visitors are directed to their destination, and traffic is effectively directed.

There are also "cub" proctors, usually freshmen, who assist the proctors. The proctors and "cubs" are identified by green and black ribbon badges. The "cubs'" badges are shorter than the proctors'.

Both cub and proctor are subject to dismissal if they do not perform their duty satisfactorily.

The proctor system, having been established for the good of the students, seems to have accomplished its purpose.

STUDENT COUNCIL

The Student Council was organized and exists today mainly for the purpose of establishing a ground for the discussions common to the pupils and faculty. The Student Council is the means by which the entire student body voices its opinions.

This year the Council has assisted the nurse in securing assistants and co-operated with the librarians in sponsoring a plan to help students in selecting reading material. The first semester Council had as their guests representatives from all the Student Councils of the city. The officers also went to the regional conference at St. Joseph and visited Wyandotte High School. The direct result of all these conferences was the proctor system. The system was installed the second semester.

The Council also sponsored four mixers, three the first semester and one the second. For the first time a free mixer was given to the student body. Two of the mixers were at night, one a Halloween and the other an apron and overall dance.

The success of the Council was partly due to the sponsors, Miss Louise Hatch, Miss Nora Boone and Mr. E. F. Thelen. Much credit must also be given to Mr. Nowlin's liberalism. In appreciation of Mr. Nowlin, the Council sent a letter to the School Board in recognition of his services.

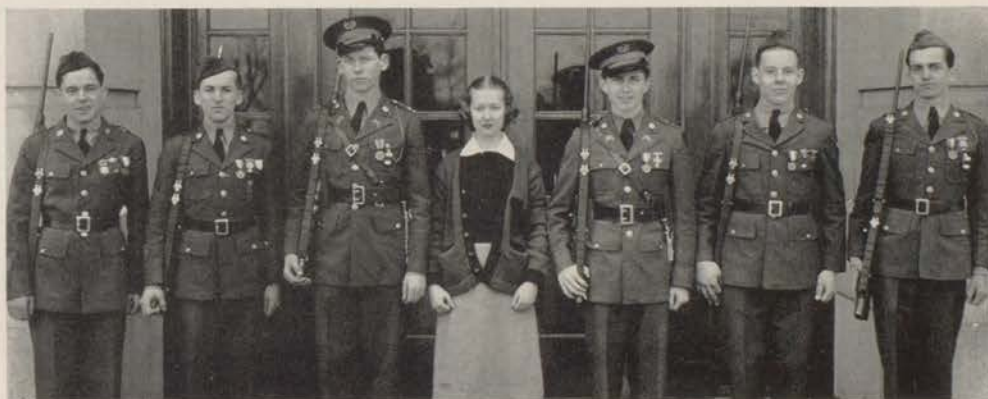

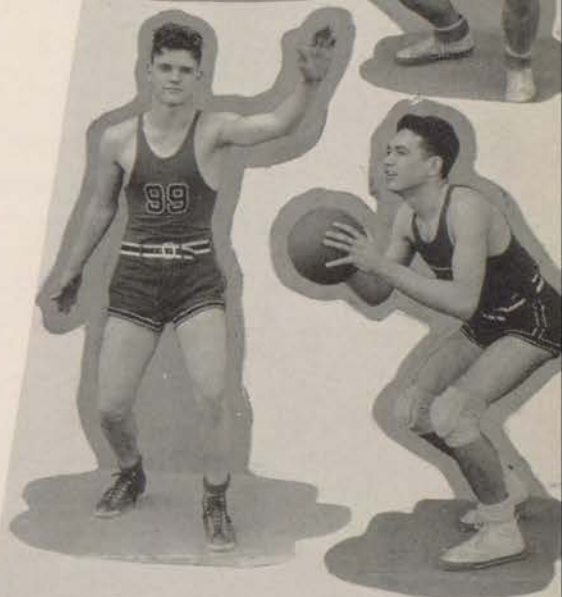

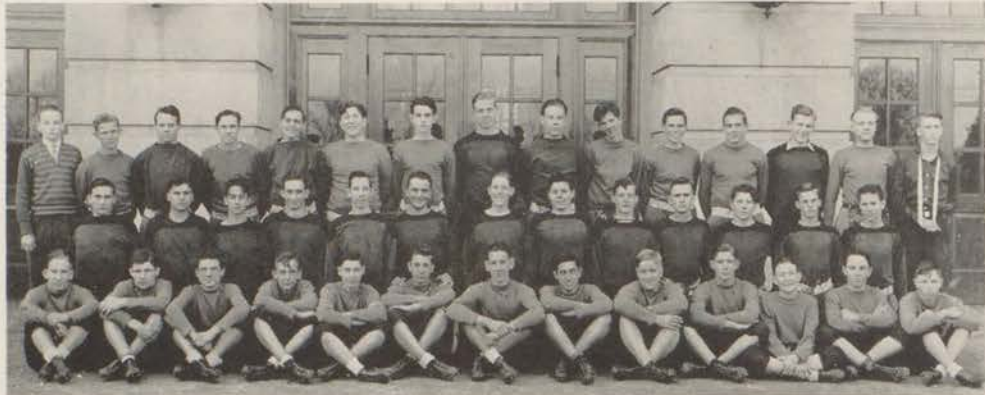

At the time of the publication of this annual the team had participated in three track meets and the Kansas Relays.

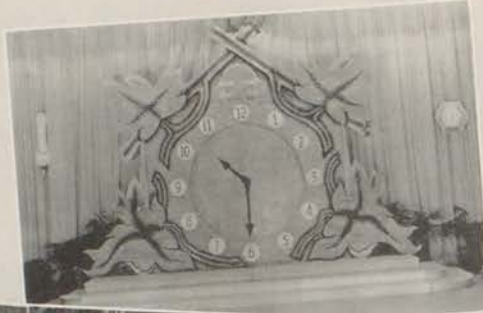

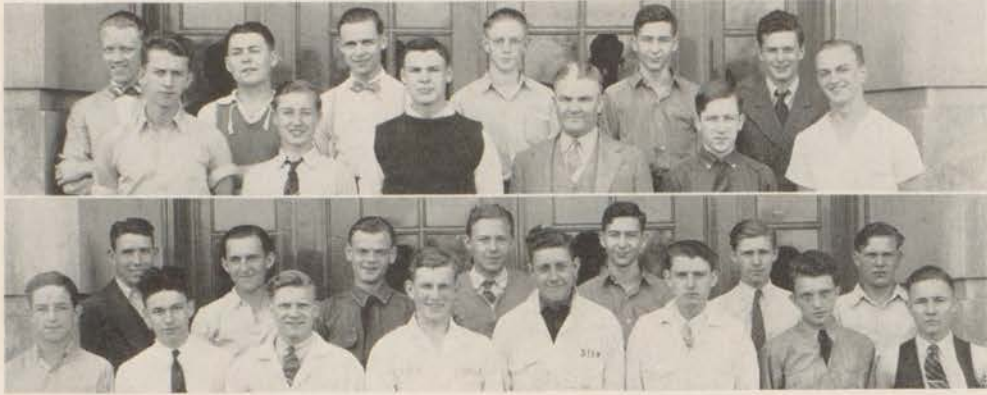

October 16: Second football game of the season played by East's grid men against William Chrisman, scoring a deadlock of 7-7. Darn the luck, anyway.

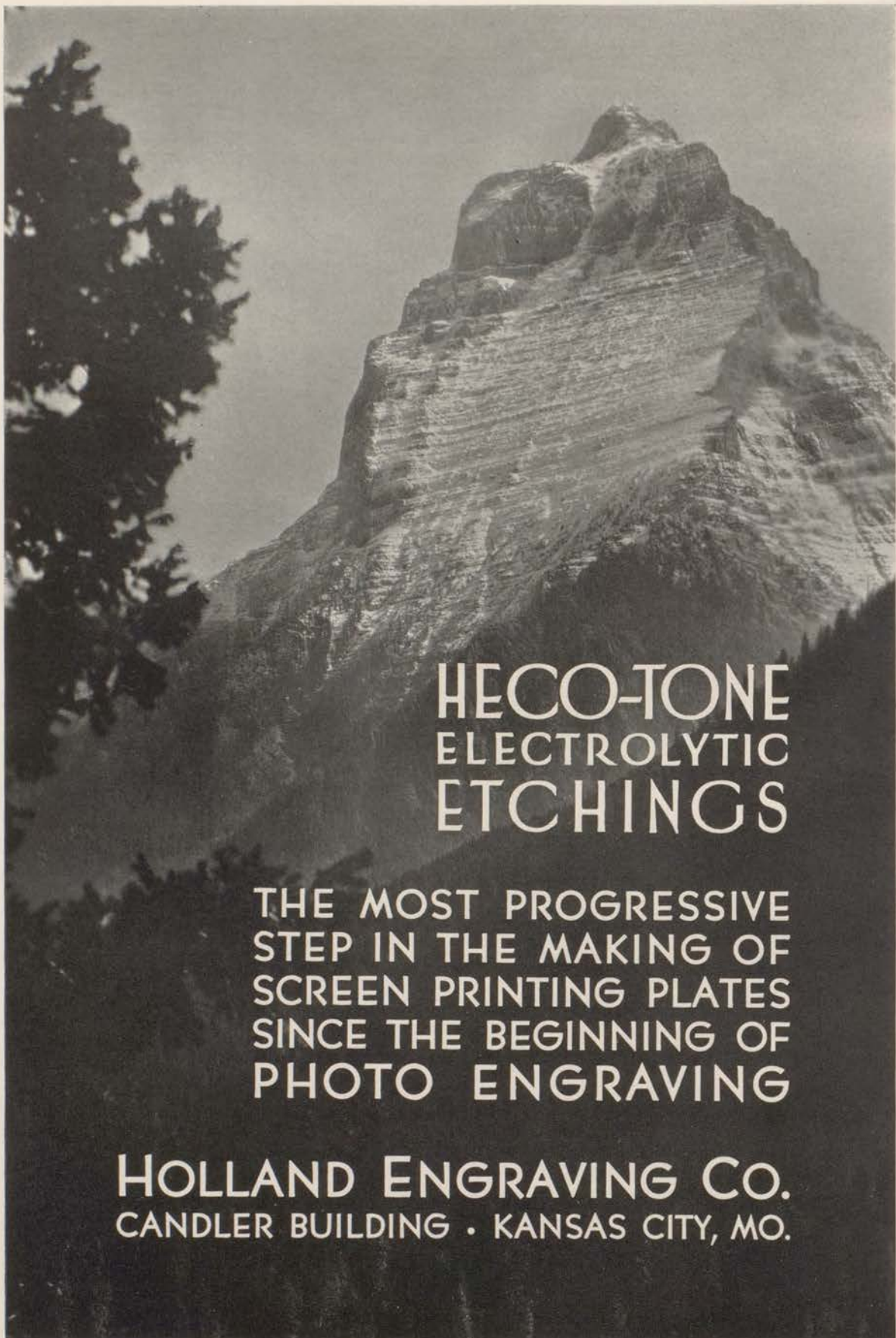

10 . . . The brilliance with which to get about half the number of credits required to graduate in four years, in that time?

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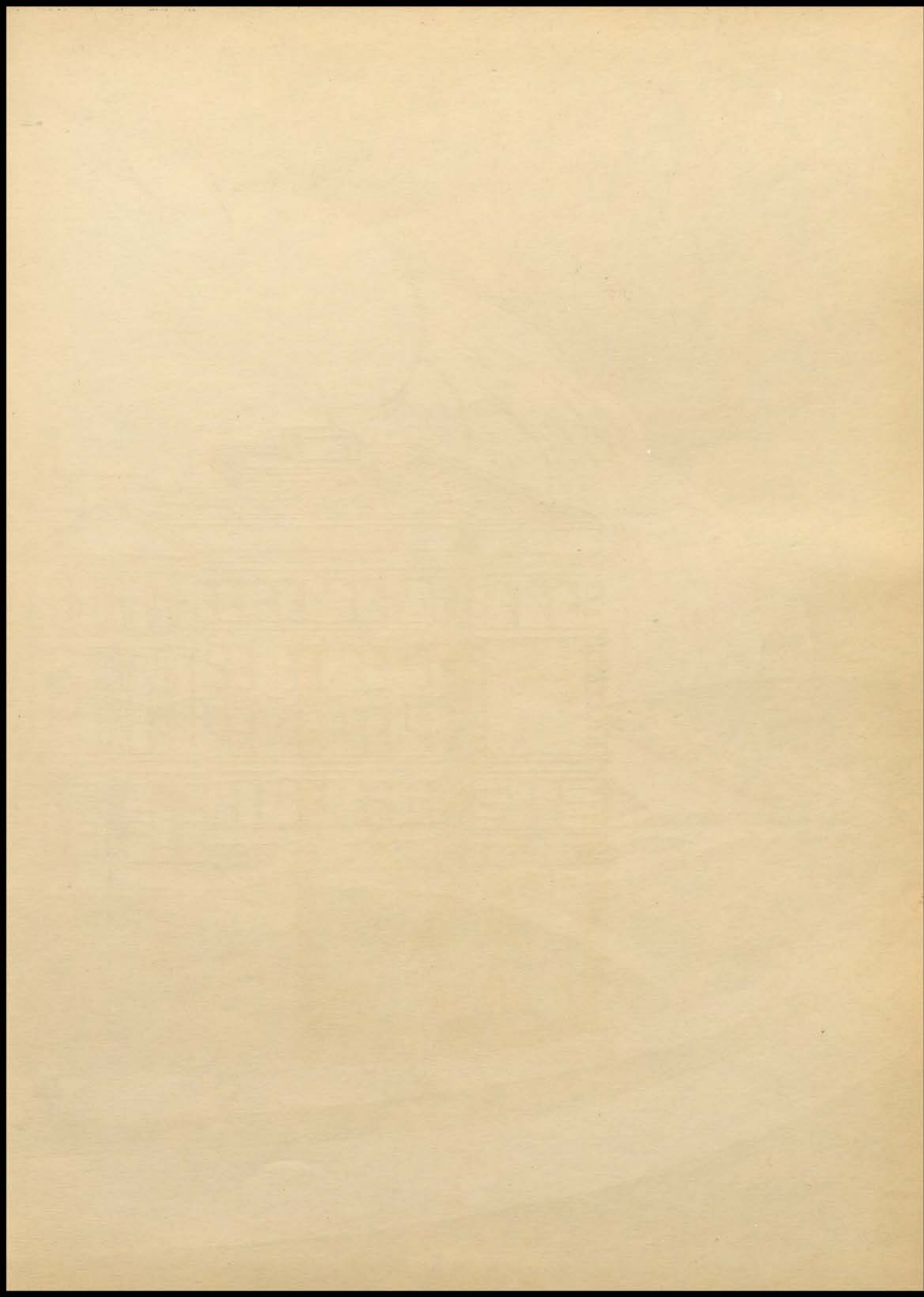
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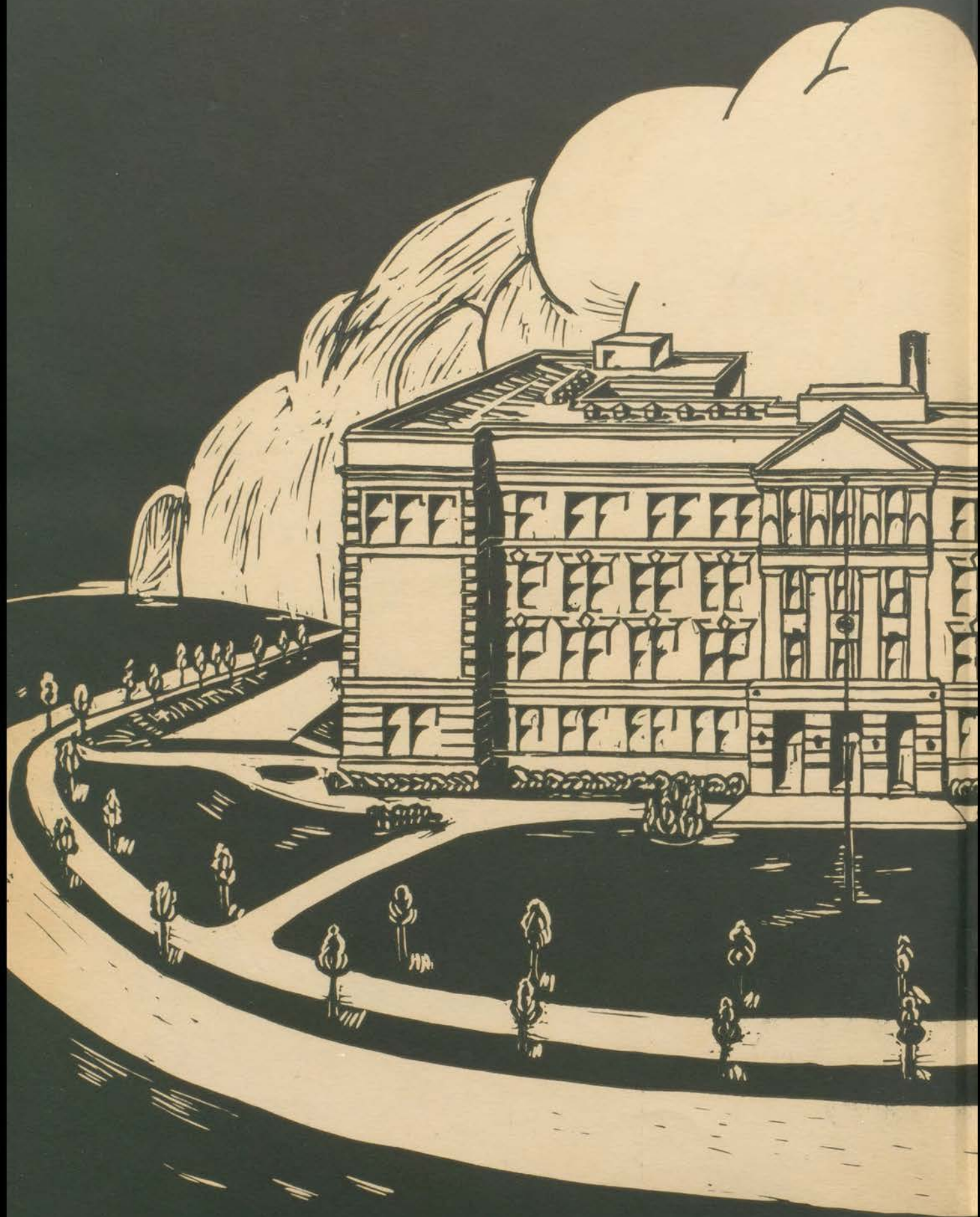
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
