National Honor Society

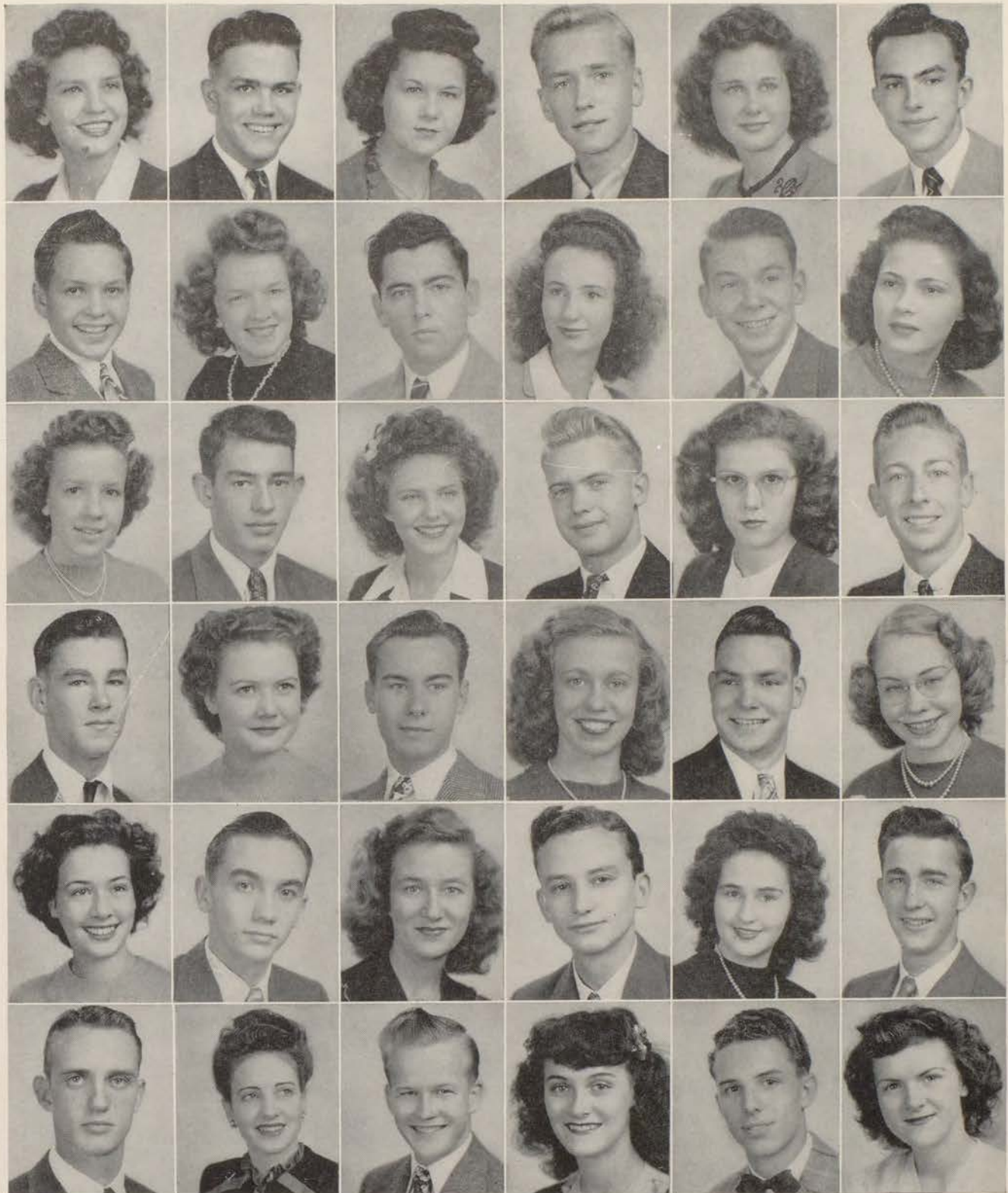
The highest peak of achievement in high school life was attained by thirty-six East High School seniors this year, on May 16. On that day, these seniors received the cherished National Honor Society pins, and were formally accepted as members of this national organization. They were selected on the basis of scholarship, character, leadership, and service.

The East Chapter of the National Honor Society was organized in 1928. Each year since then, about fifteen percent of the Senior Class, chosen from the upper quartile, receive this distinctive honor. Eligible students must have been at East at least one year, besides being outstanding in the principles of scholarship, character, leadership and service. Each candidate must have faculty approval. A senior has attained the greatest honor possible in high school when he has arrived at this goal.

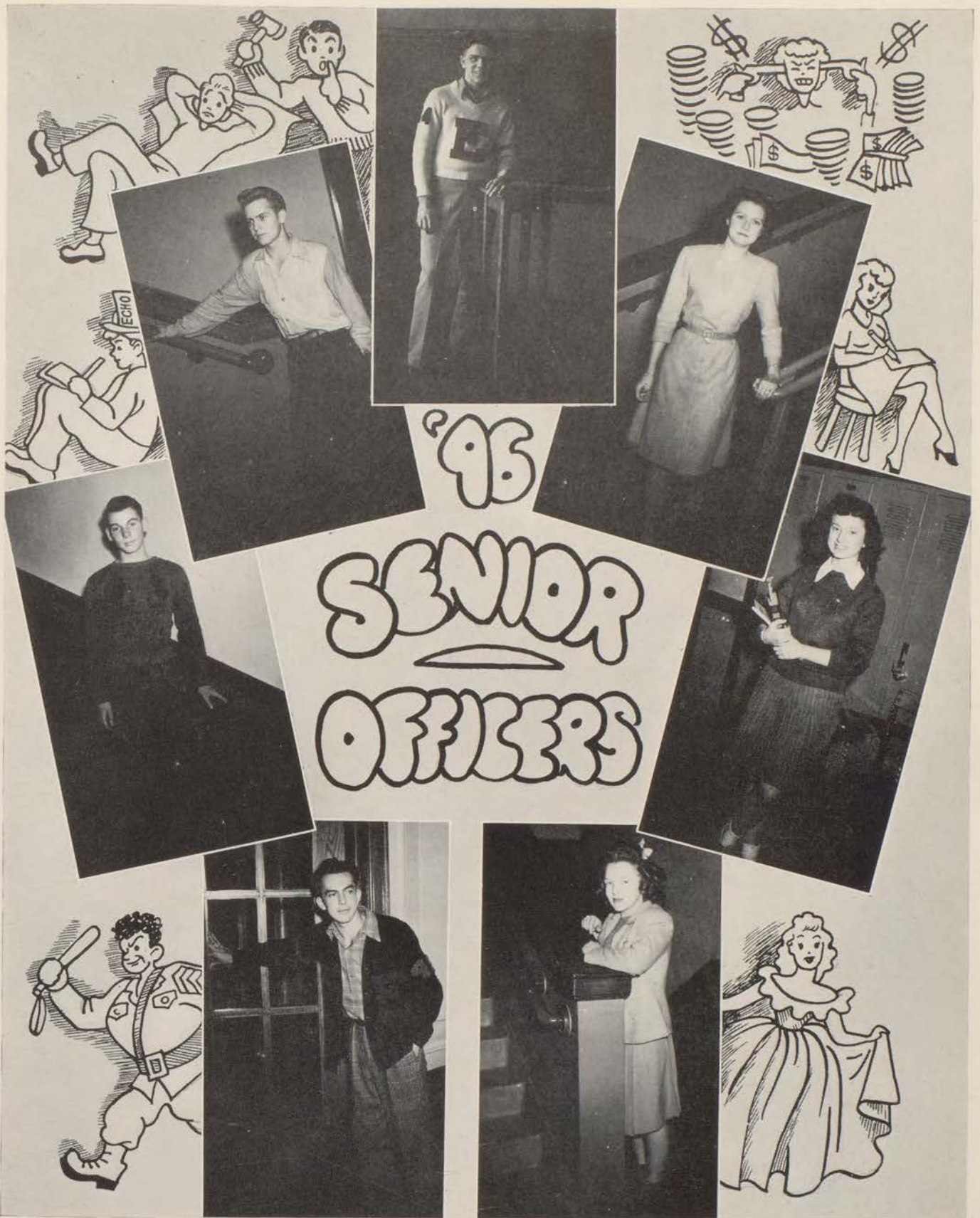

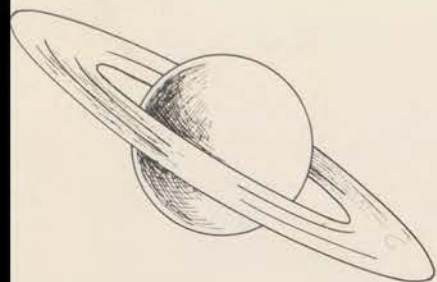

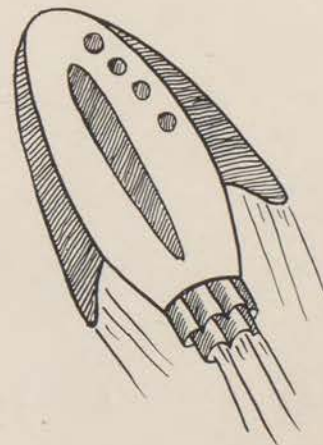

Flash! United States aircraft carrier Wasp torpedoed while covering movement of reinforcements and supplies into Guadalcanal. British forces occupy Madagascar. President Roosevelt signs anti-inflation bill.

A memorable month? Yes. It is September, 1942. To some 250 boys and girls, the month of September, 1942, will stand out forever; not because of world events, but because in that month, they first trod the corridors as students of East High.

While battle after battle raged across the seas, these young students turned earnestly to their Civics books. Freshmen. Excited, happy but bewildered. They gazed with awe upon upper-classmen and wished that they might be so debonair.

Flash! September, 1943. Iran declares war on Germany. Russians capture Smolensk and Roslavi. Allies invade mainland of Italy.

Meanwhile, at East High, this same group of boys and girls plugged away at their studies. They saw their brothers, dads, and uncles going off to war. Perhaps the boys wished they might be older so that they, too, might join the ranks of the armed forces. But, instead, they joined whole-heartedly into salvage campaigns, Red Cross drives, and bought war stamps regularly each week through their home rooms. They did their job on the home front—and did it well.

And now, September, 1944. The city of Luxembourg liberated by Allied forces. The United States First Army forces occupy Sedan on the Belgian border. Warsaw, capital of Poland, falls into German hands.

Juniors, now, these noble ones. Full of importance and sophistication.

April, 1945, and our great leader, Franklin Delano Roosevelt, died. The shock, which shook the entire world, was felt deeply by those at East.

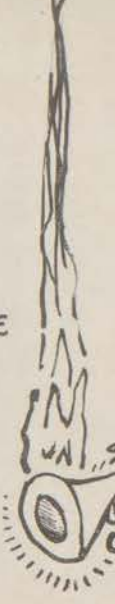

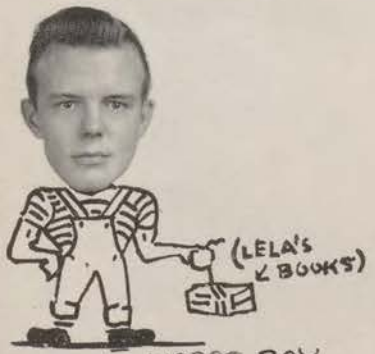

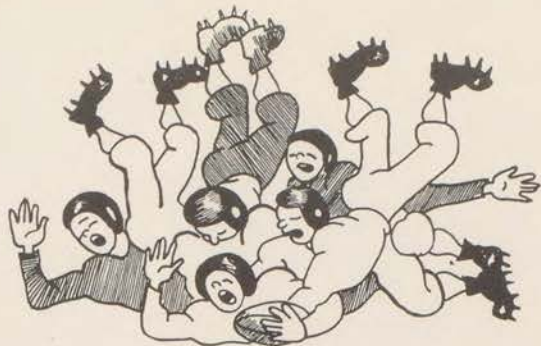

Football

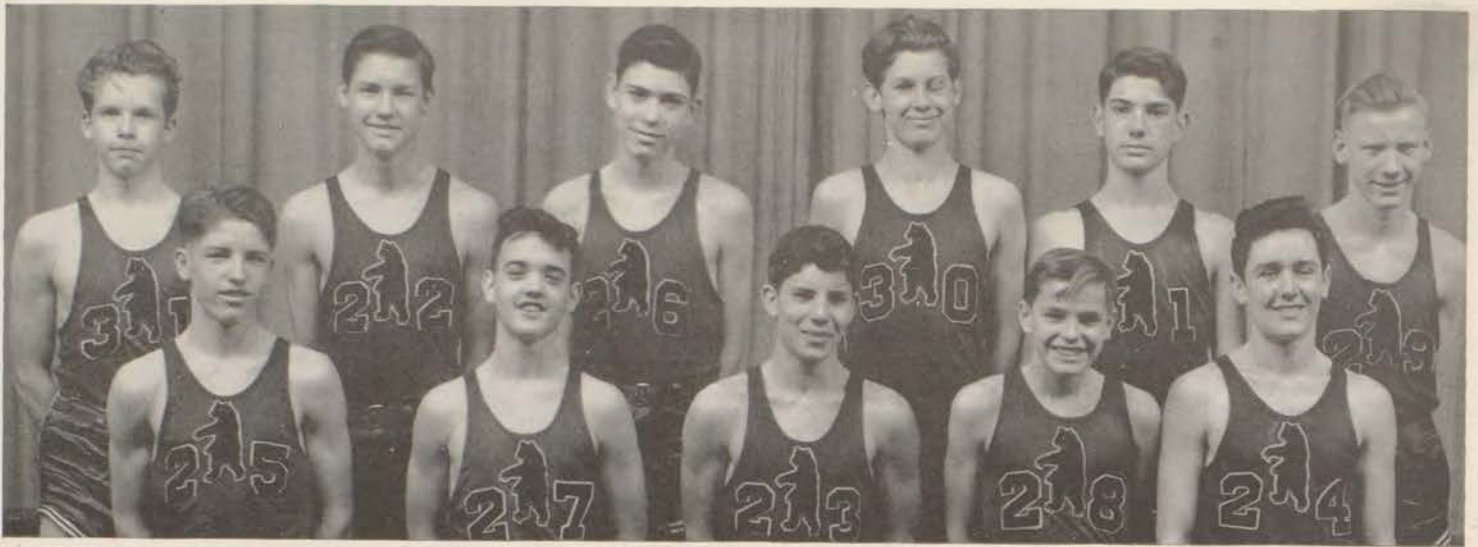

Ed Sayles, high-scoring center, was an honorable mention choice on the all-stars. Charles Stamper and Charles Russell were chosen co-captains.

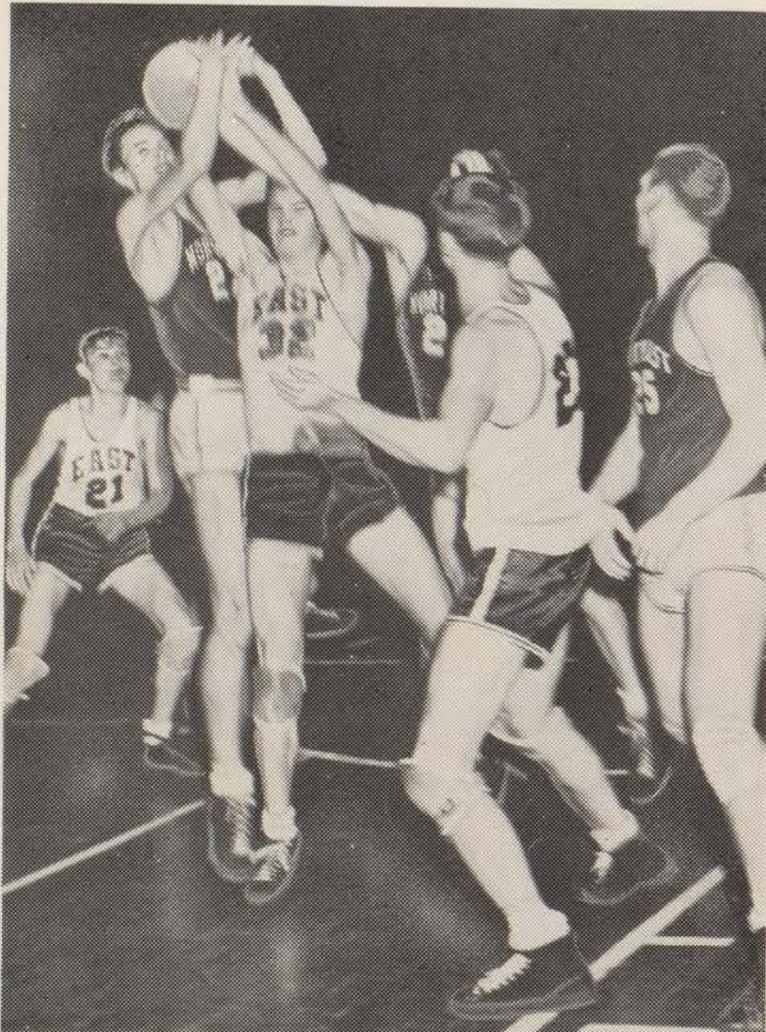

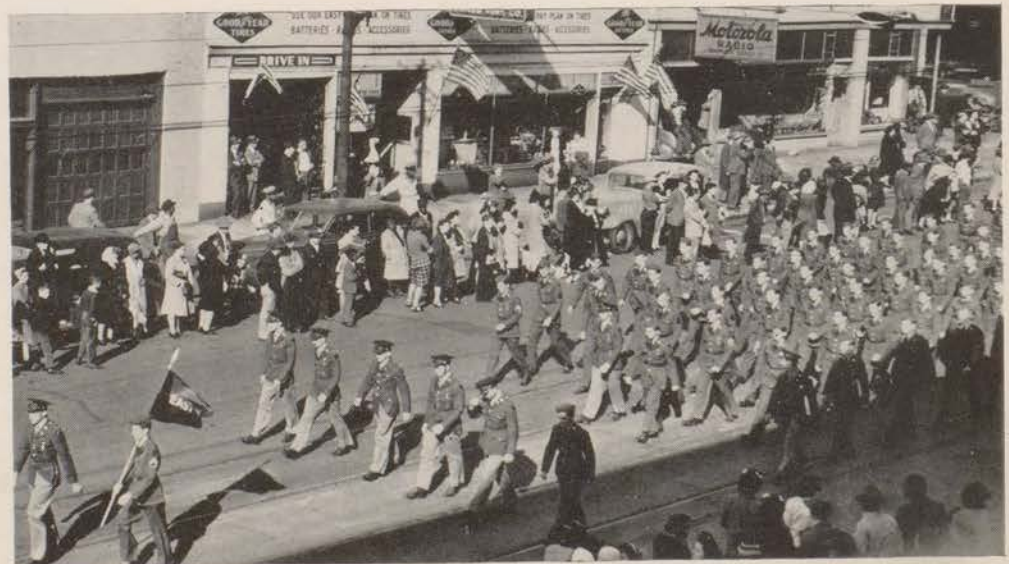

Reserve Officers Training Corps



"The Reserve Officers Training Corps presents one course in which every cadet may participate with the certainty that in so doing he is definitely enhancing his value to the community and insuring his increased capacity for service in the event that the greatest of all scourges, war, should ever again involve our country in its destructive clutches." These are the words of one of our country's brilliant militarists, General Douglas MacArthur.

The East High School branch of this organization is under the able guidance of Sergeant J. J. Mansour, United States Army. Captain Clarence V. Herndon, Professor of Military Science and Tactics, is the supervisor of the entire Kansas City Area. It is a well known fact that a man who has undergone ROTC training in the basic forms of military strategy has a great advantage over an ordinary civilian entering the army or some other armed service. In these times in which most physically capable men must enter the service, ROTC training is an excellent recommendation.

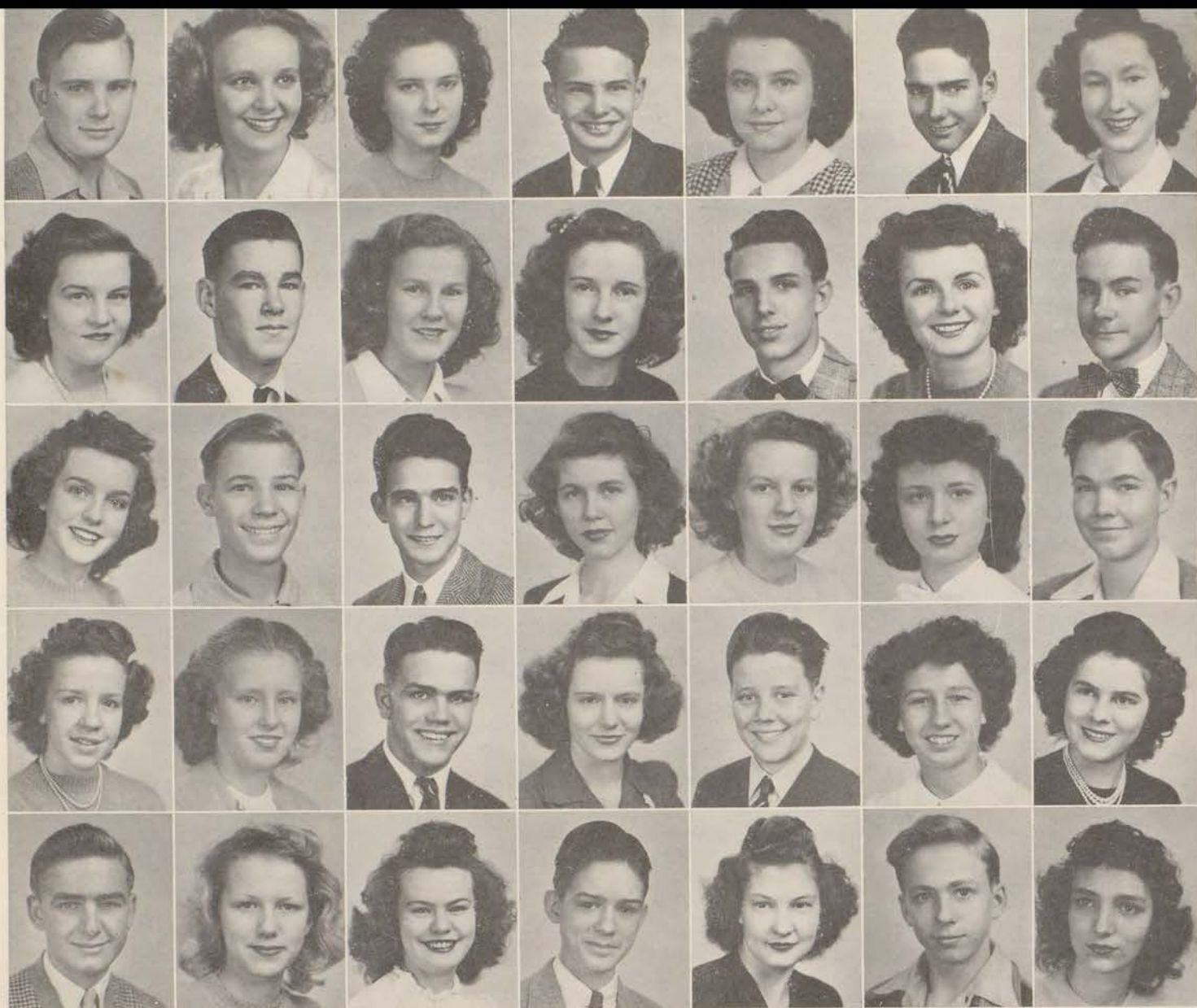
The ROTC includes many important events in its school year in addition to the usual drill and theory work. The East battalion this year enjoyed one of its most successful years in competition. Some of the achievements of the battalion were: winning the third place cup in the city rifle matches, first place in the corp area match in the city, and a select

squad in competition with the ten other high schools won the first place cup presented by the National Guard, the night of April 6, 1946. One of the important events was the annual Military Ball, at which time the ranking officers of other schools, parents and faculty are invited to witness a delightful dance. This year's ball was rated the finest ever held in the history of the East battalion. At this time, Miss Naomi Campbell was elected Queen by the corps. Her attendants were Miss Dorothy Nelson and Miss Vera Redenbaugh. All were of the graduating class of 1946. Naomi was rated second in competition for Queen of the Army Day parade among candidates from each high school.

Federal Inspection follows the ball closely. The inspection group consists of a number of army officers before whom the cadets "strut their stuff." The inspection requires one full day to receive a full report on the battalion. During this time items such as care of clothing and equipment, theoretical abilities and drill capabilities are checked. For the past four years East has won the Honor Rating in such inspections. Following inspection is the annual Field Day, the most important event in the ROTC school year. This event puts every battalion in the Kansas City Regiment in open competition. The different drill classifications include individual, squad, platoon and company drill. After these drills, each battalion is turned over to the prospective officers for the following year.

The Andrew Drumm Institute

D.

In 1928, the Andrew Drumm Institute, an endowed institution, was founded for boys of good moral character, to enable them to receive a normal education and training for good citizenship. Its founder was Andrew Drumm, 1828-1919. The present Superintendent is H. R. Nelson.

The 370-acre farm is located two miles southeast of Independence, in Jackson County, Missouri. At the present time, twenty-seven boys, ages ranging from ten to nineteen, live in a modern, fire-proof home, help cultivate the farm land, care for the live stock, and attend school both in Kansas City and at the Institute.

The majority of the Drumm Institute boys are of high school age and attend East High School. They receive three-fourths of the regular high school course. Those attending East this year are: Boynton Wesnidge; Robert Richardson; Bill Edmonson; William Cramer; Warren Patton; John Strong; Ralph Peck; Roy Turner; Bill Richards; Laurice Smith; Tom Conroy.

They attend morning classes at Kansas City schools, those under high school age go to Bristol Elementary School, and all take a course in vocational agriculture at the Institute under George C. Berkemeir, instructor. Their afternoons are spent in practical farm experience such as caring for livestock, plowing, cultivating, hoeing, and harvesting the crops.

Every individual has his own project to care for. He is given a selection of some crop

to grow and a plot of ground his first year. After the first year, he may enter a project of either hogs, sheep, or chickens. His last year he is allowed a calf to care for and fit for Fairs and Stock Shows in which the farm participates. The American Royal is one of these.

The Drumm Institute boys of high school age are enrolled in the Drumm Farm Chapter of the Future Farmers of America and have won very favorable recognition for the Farm among the high schools of Missouri. They also belong to the 4-H Club.

Not only is there work and school, but there is play as well at the Institute. Many of the activities include baseball and swimming, football and basketball, and various winter sports such as skating, coasting, and skiing. The boys entertain their friends from neighboring schools with informal parties and dances.

The Andrew Drumm Institute is non-sectarian and in the past, seven denominations have been represented by boys enrolled at the Farm. The older boys usually attend the Young People's evening meetings at the different churches in Independence.

A well selected library is maintained in addition to the public library books available to these boys in school. More than a dozen of the leading magazines including those published for boys are always to be found on the reading table in the living room of the dormitory.

COMMERCE DEPARTMENT

Cooperative Occupational Education

The Cooperative Occupational Education program provides actual on-the-job training for high school students in cooperation with business and industrial employers. Approximately one-half day is spent in class-room study, and the other half day, or a minimum of fifteen hours per week, is devoted to work experience. This type of program enables the pupils to develop skills, obtain essential information, and to make a practical application of their studies.

There are qualifications for enrollment in this course. The student must be sixteen years of age. He must have a satisfactory school

record, and he must be willing to cooperate with the rules and regulations of the course. The approval of the parent or guardian and the principal must be obtained.

The 1946 Outburst

The student body of East High School presented the annual variety show, the OUTBURST, March 15 and 16 in the auditorium.

The theme for the show was centered around the wheel of time which moved forward and backward according to the desires of a young girl, and her grandparents.

The first scene pictured a schoolroom complete with blackboard, desks, children and teacher. Much hilarity was offered the audience by the many jokes given by the participants. A very clever reading entitled "Old Mother Hubbard" completed the first scene.

Disgusted with the thought of school in by-gone years, the teen-ager moved the wheel of time forward. A trumpet and drum arrangement of "Blue Skies" and a portrayal of a modern jam session introduced this scene which featured a vocal number, several dance lines and solo dancers.

In the third scene, the grandparents somewhat bewildered by all the excitement, desire the wheel of time to be moved backward to the quieter moods. The Indian dance was one of the highlights of the show displaying excellent costuming and lighting. The number was climaxed by the singing of "Indian Love Call." The finale introduced the audience to a character called "Trouble" who was dressed in black and who shouted and screamed that he had done a good job of creating trouble in the world by making people fight against one another, by causing strife and bringing about a chaotic world. The voice of trouble is overpowered by the voice of a soldier who has died for the freedom of his country and who states that the Cross of Christianity, the flag and the Statue of Liberty can never be destroyed. The curtain closed on the successful 1946 Outburst with the singing of "God Bless America."

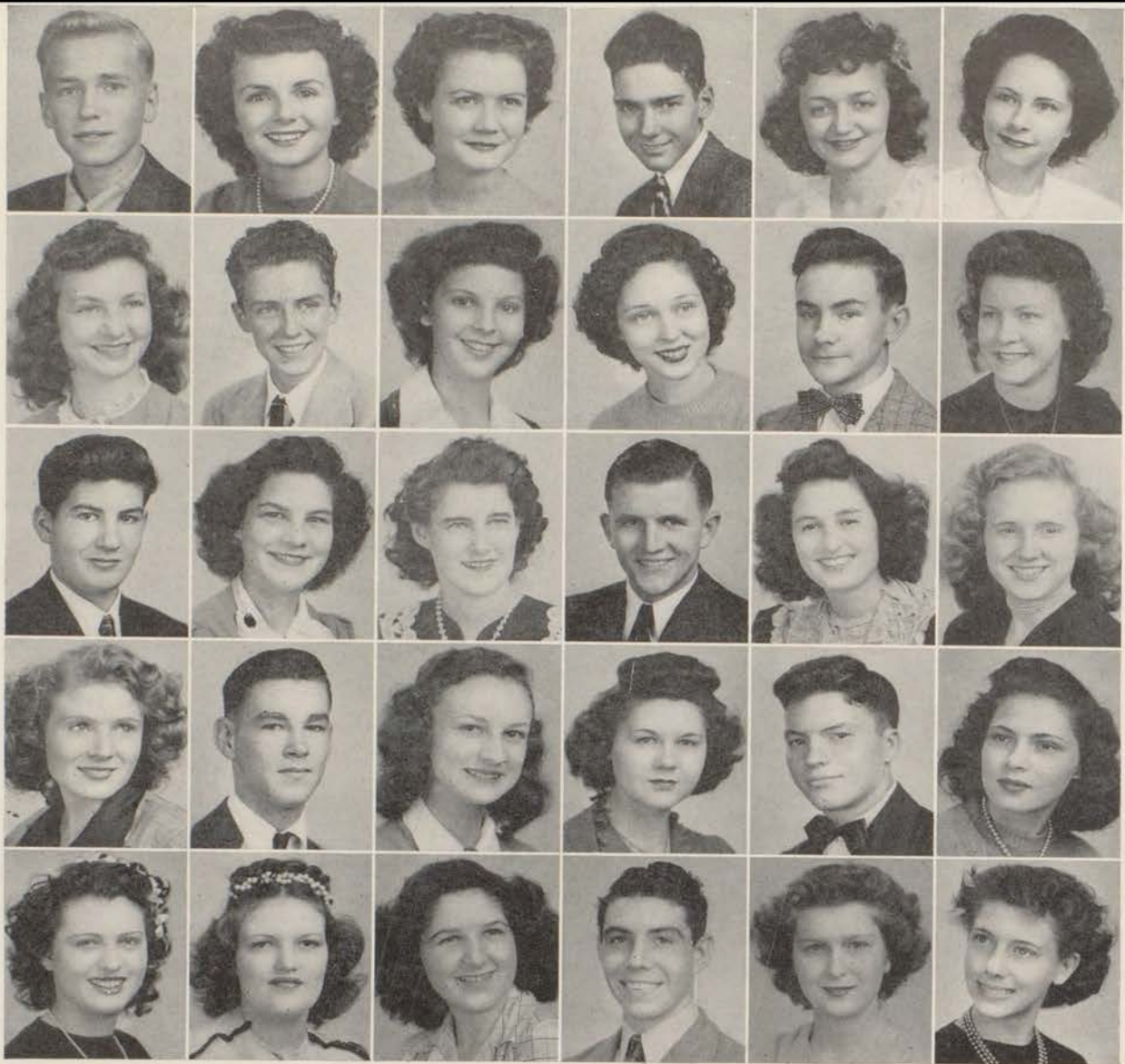
