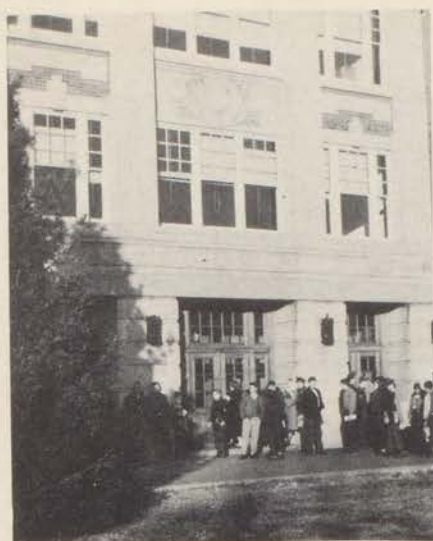

At Mid-Century, East High School stands with the other schools in America as the hope for the preservation of the democratic spirit. The school's motto, "Do Unto Others As You Would Have Them Do Unto You" expresses the spirit that is so needed in our world today.

In its twenty-four years, East High School, under the leadership of Mr. Clifford H. Nowlin, its first principal, Mr. J. Lyman Laughlin, Mr. W. W. Clement and Mr. C. O. Williams, has had as its central purpose, the welfare of all the people. Under its banner of green and black, the school has sought to provide equal educational opportunity for all, regardless of intelligence, race, religion, social status, economic condition, or vocational plans. The curriculum has encouraged free inquiry and inventiveness as the best roads to progress.

The school has endeavored to give to all, the right to obtain reliable information, the right to form and express through discussion individual opinions, the right to try to persuade others, the rights of peaceable assembly, freedom of religion, and the right to impartial justice in accusation and judgment.

In the conduct of its affairs, the school has stressed the ideas that every privilege has a corresponding duty, every authority a responsibility, every responsibility an accounting to the group which granted the authority.

As Kansas City celebrates its centennial year, East High School, although faced with many discouraging problems, continues to challenge youth with the hope of building a society "with liberty and justice for all."

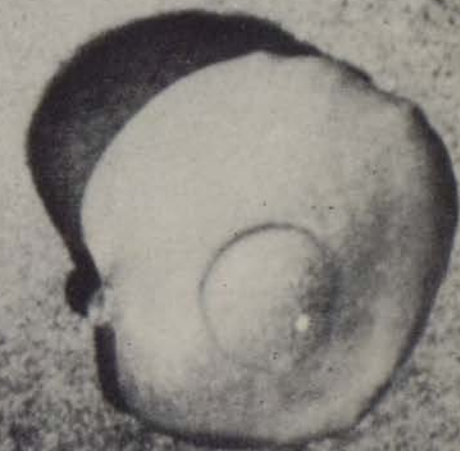
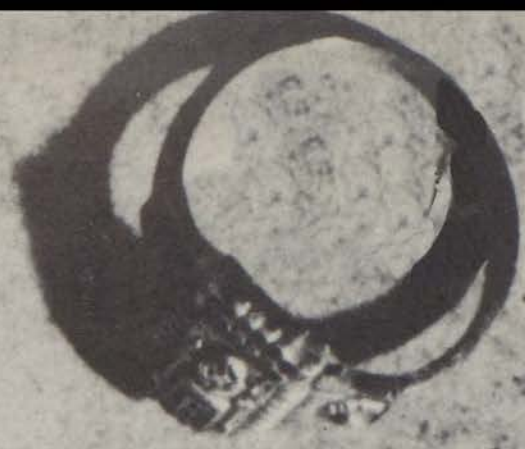

Social and Physical Sciences

The social science department is instrumental in training citizens for the future. No less than ten instructors hold these important positions. History is taught by Mr. John P. Dix, Mr. Clayton Dickson, Mr. E. C. Fields, Miss May Farr Hiatt, and Miss Jessie Marie Willitt. Mrs. Helen Lapsley, Miss Nell Wells, Miss Ota Crosthwait, Miss Cosby Harrison, and Mr. A. E. The physical sciences are taught by five members of the faculty. Miss Nora Boone and Miss Anna McGloin instruct classes in human science and biology. Michaels have charge of the general sciences and chemistry classes. Mr. Esther also has a radio class.

Mrs. Gertrude Carr Davis assists Mrs. Frances Maddi in the activities of the office.


New Members



East's second team football squad won five and lost two games during the season. After many stiff fights, the mighty cubs were defeated by Southwest and Southeast.

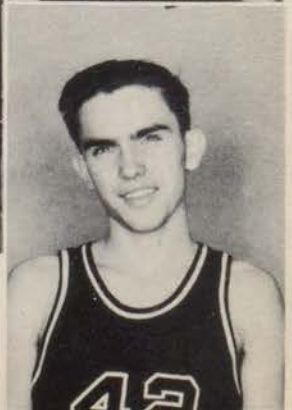
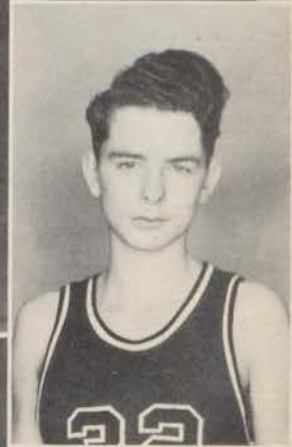
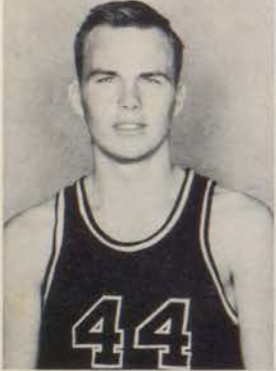
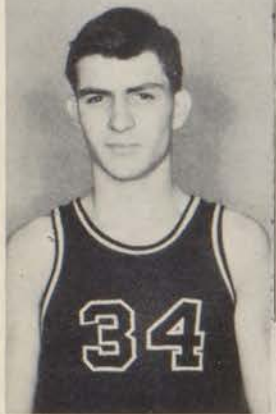
At the end of the season, the East team was in second place, due to the outstanding performances of the players and the coaching of Les Fields.

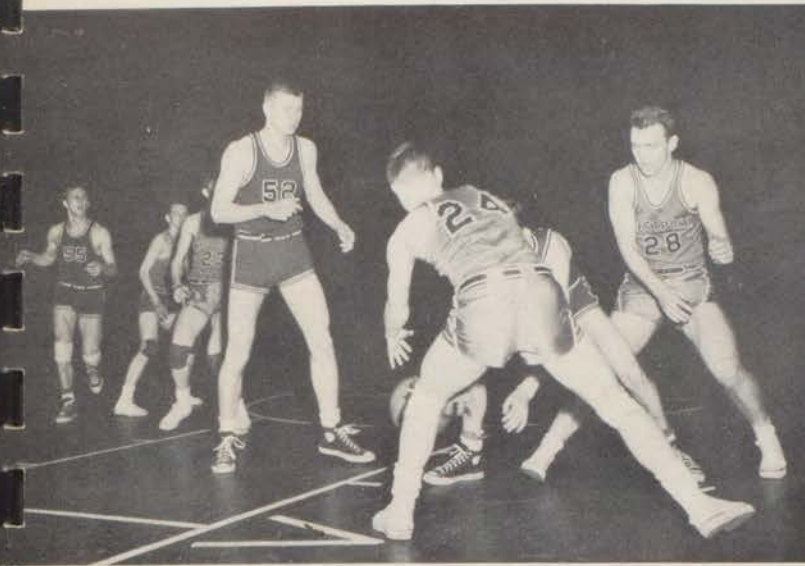

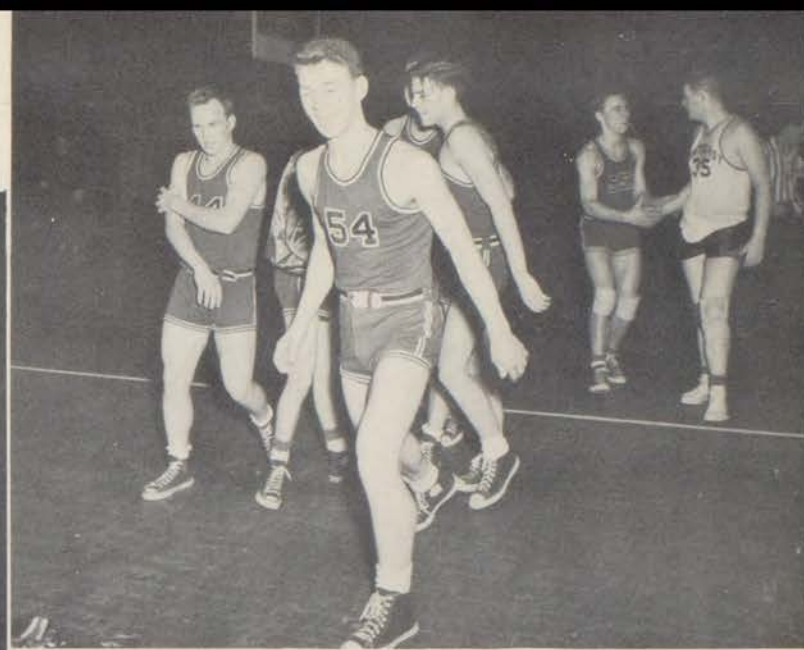

The Bruin track specialists opened the '49 track season, at the Big 7 indoor meet, with a flourish, taking victories in the 60-yard dash and 880 yard runs, with Freddie Slocum turning in a time of 6.6 seconds in the 60-yard dash.

A determined East track team made a good showing by placing third in the annual indoor state track meet at Columbia, Missouri on April 2. This was the first time that the East team had attended the Indoor State Meet. The undergraduates participating in the meet were: Bob Pryor, Fred Slocum, Jimmy Jacks, and Willie Sharp.

The rugged Bears of East kept their track slate clean by defeating the Eagles of Central and the Red Birds of Manual in the two opening track meets of the season. East won its final dual meet of the season by defeating the Southeast Knights on the East track. Slocum turned in a broad jump of 19 feet, 5 inches to become highly favored in the city meet.

The East Bears won their first City Track Title on Southwest's field by breaking Southwest's five year reign as city champions. Jimmy Jacks turned in the surprise performance of the afternoon as he edged out state champion Dan Burt of Southwest at the tape, with a time of 52:6.

Times and distances which in most cases were better than those which won the city meet just one week before, couldn't quite turn the trick at the State Meet held at Columbia, as East, one of the pre-meet favorites, placed seventh. East placed second in the mile relay team made up of Glen Vinson, Fred Slocum, Jim Jacks, and Jack Cherry turned in its best time of the season. Jim Jacks placed fourth in a quarter mile field which was the fastest in years.

Establishing four records and winning third place honors at the St. Joseph Relays, the Bears closed their track season. The meet was held on St. Joseph Central's track, May 20. East placed in the 880-yard relay, 440-relay, and 2-mile relay. The boys established new records in all three relays. The mile relay team also came through in fine form placing second. East finished third in the meet, 7/10 of a point behind second place Paseo, the meet was won by Christian Brothers of St. Joseph.

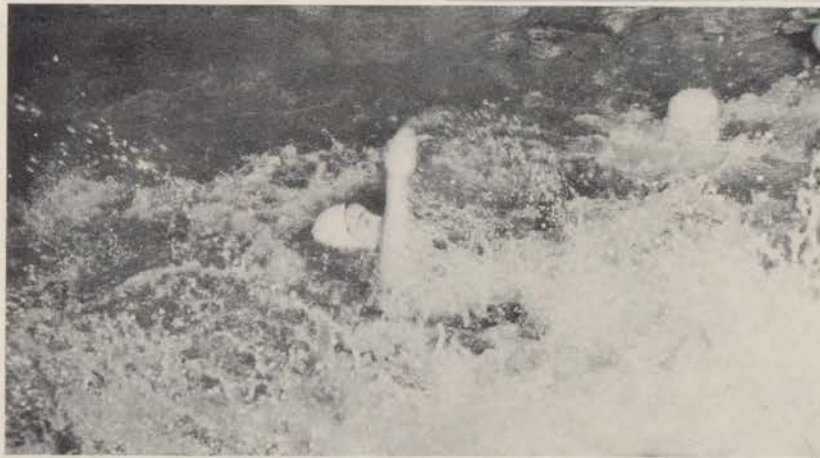
