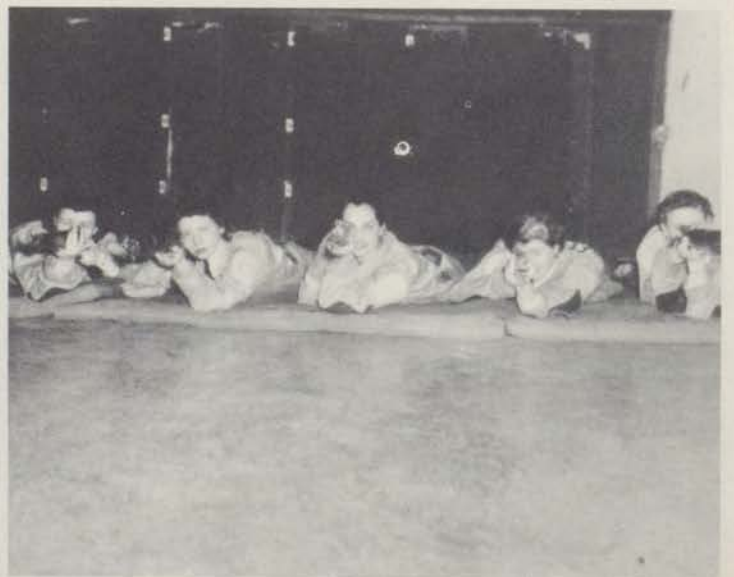
“GUYS AND DOLLS”

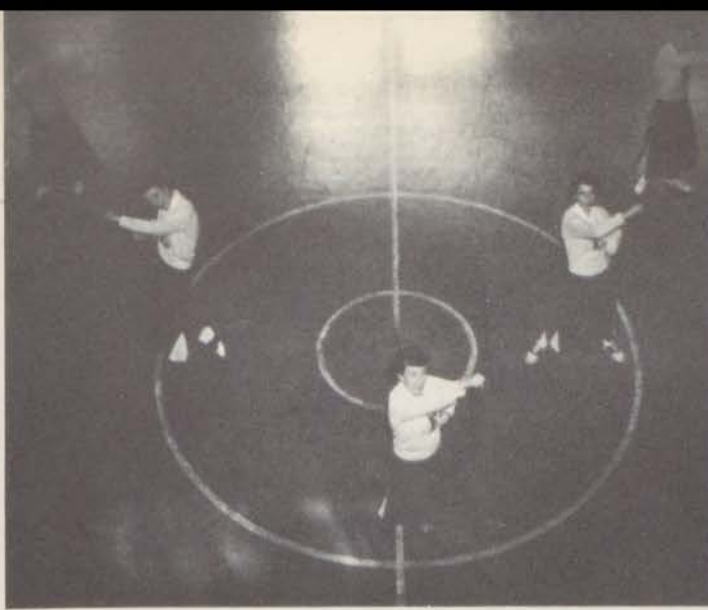
PEP CLUB

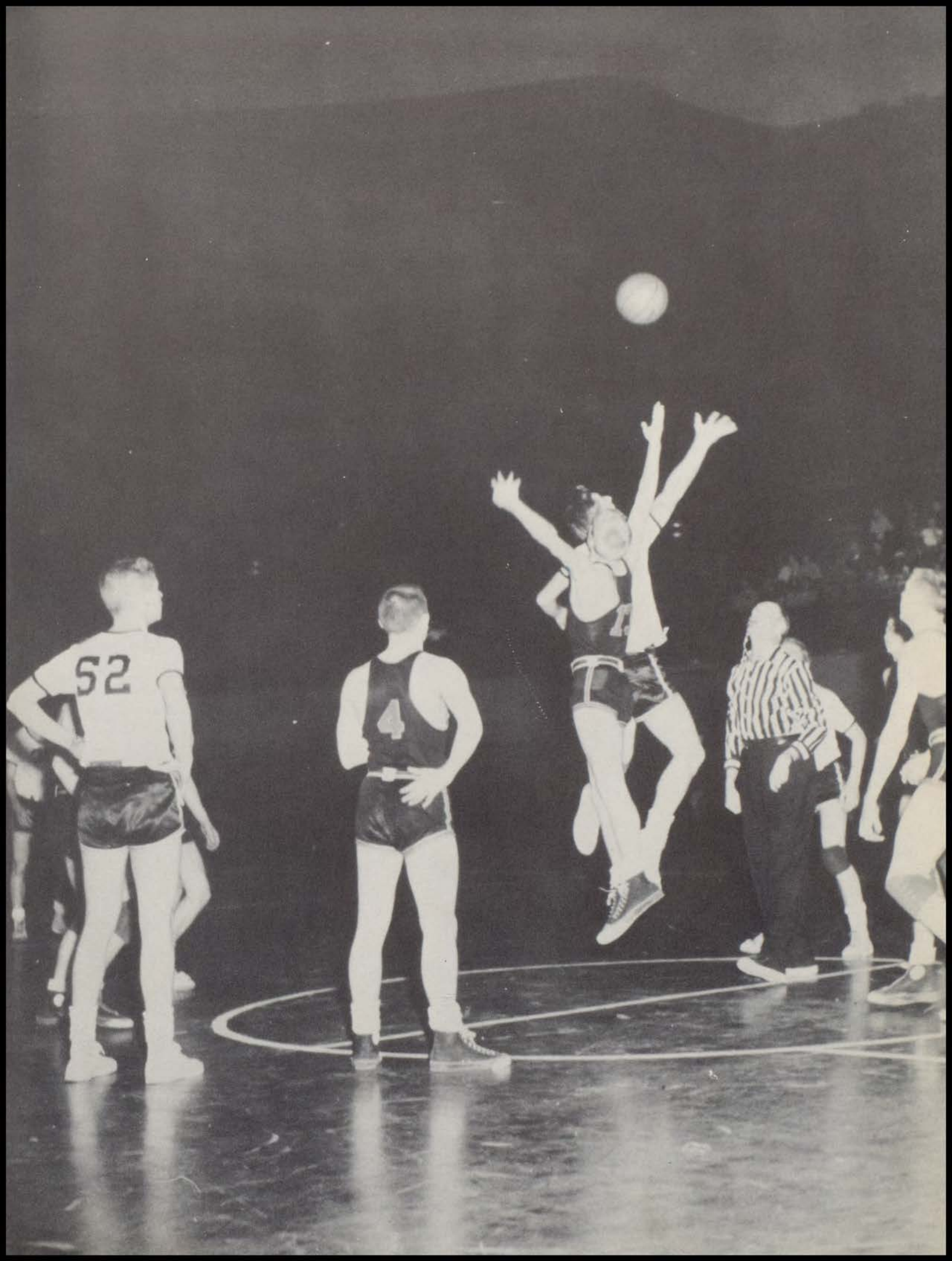




FOOTBALL QUEEN
