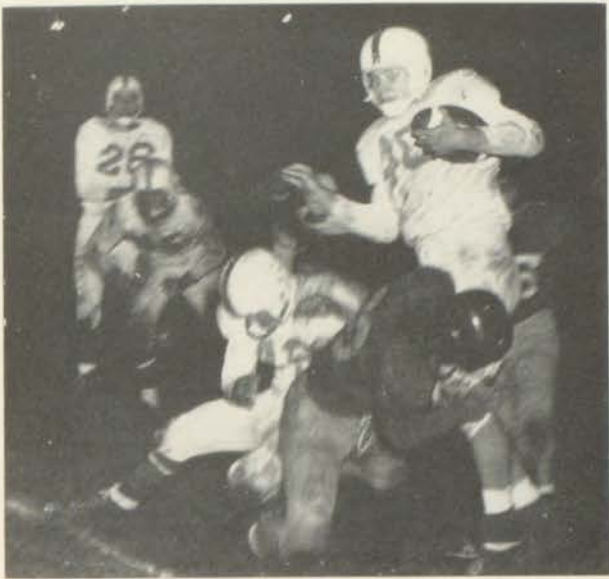

The mastering of football fundamentals and those of sportsmanship were the goals set by Coach Mitchell in preparing his Cubs for the coming years of varsity play.

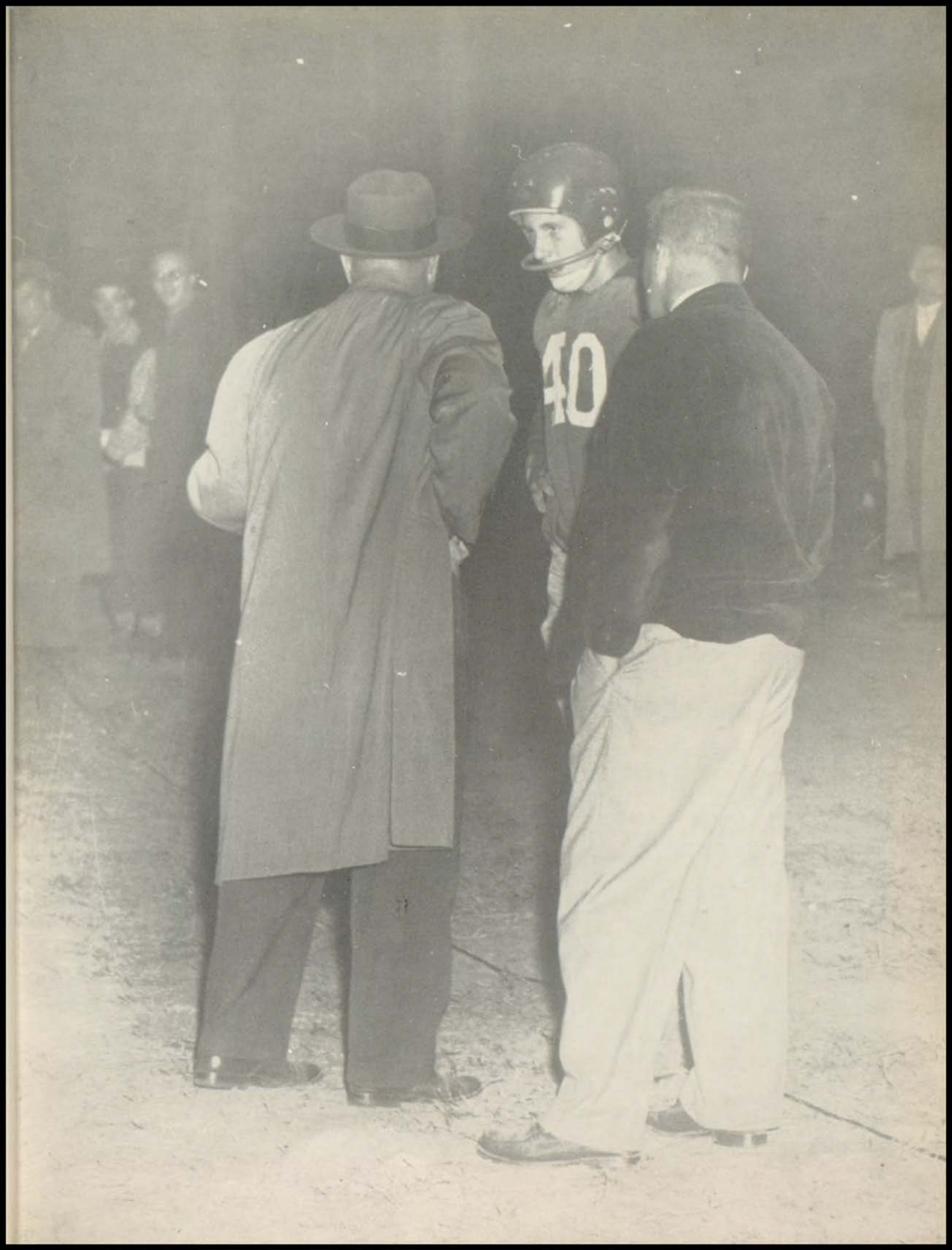
Winding up league play with an unimpressive 2-8 rec-

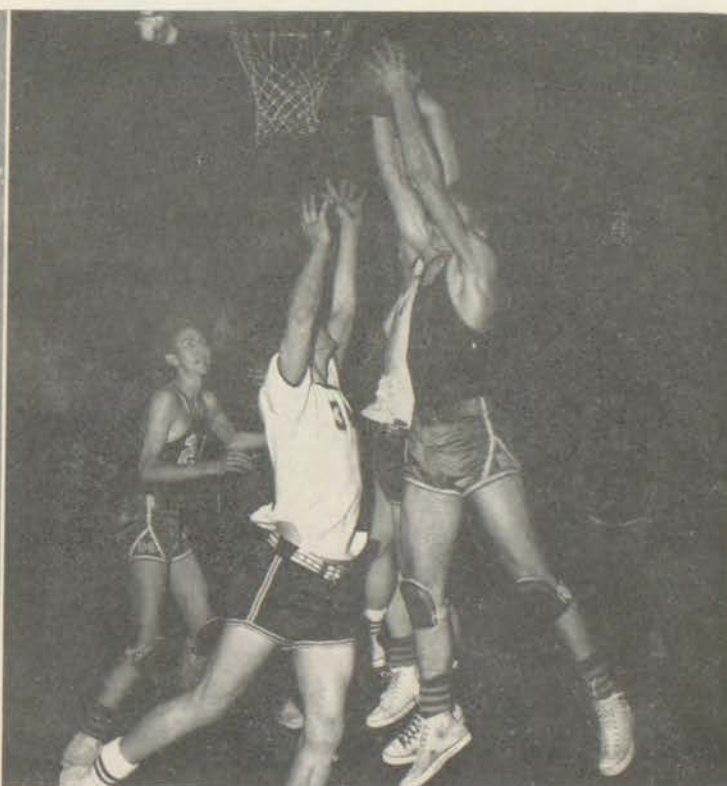

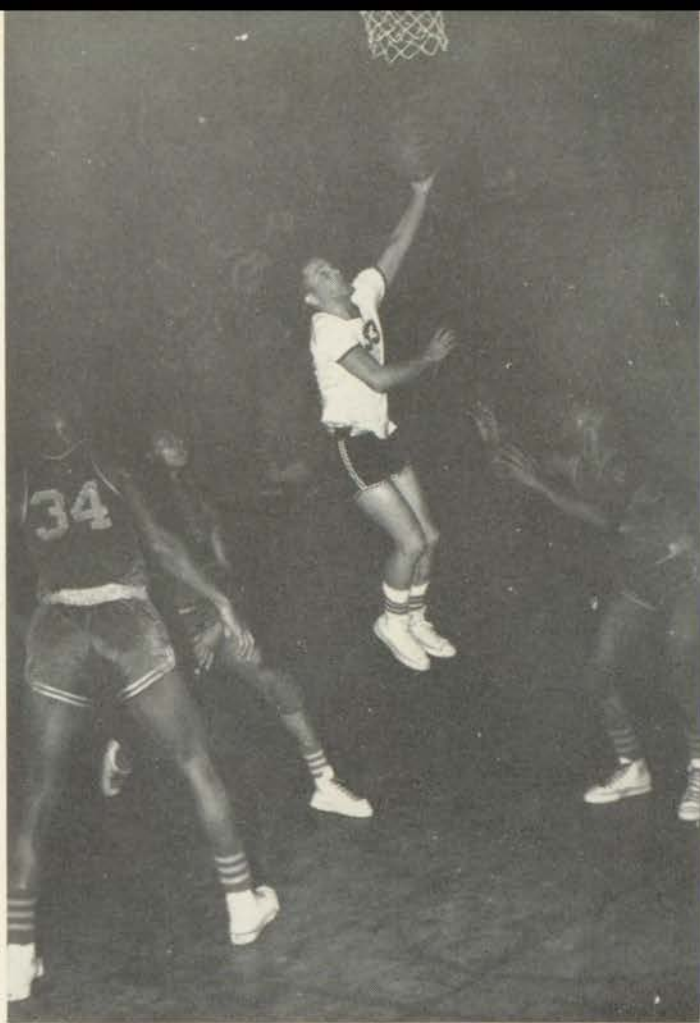

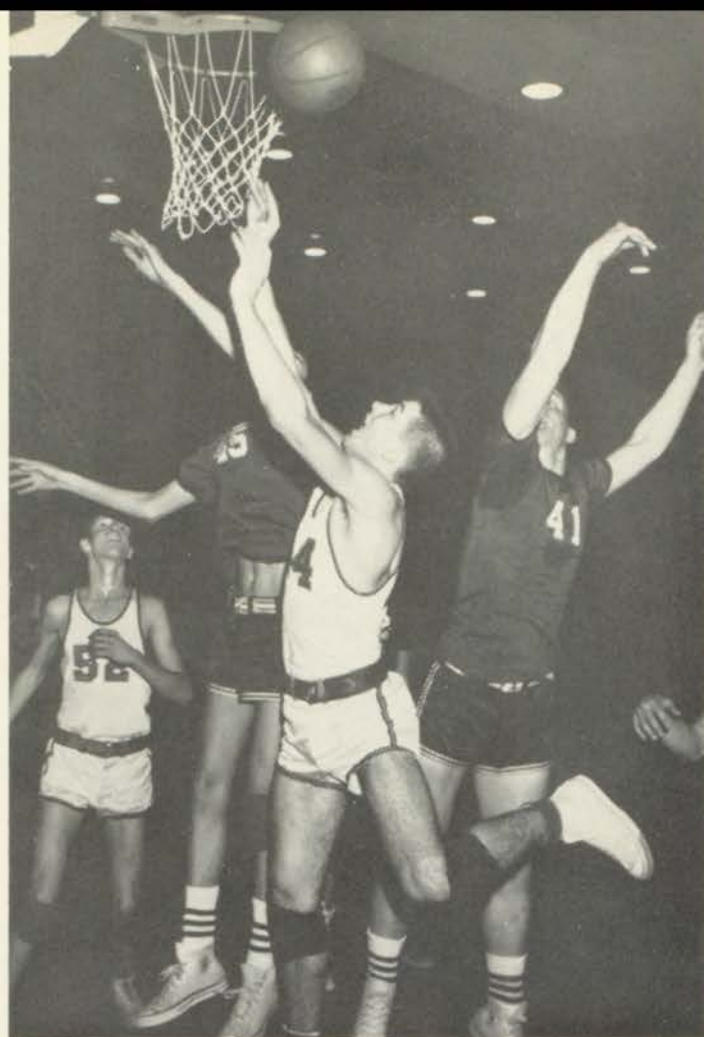


Conquered Easily

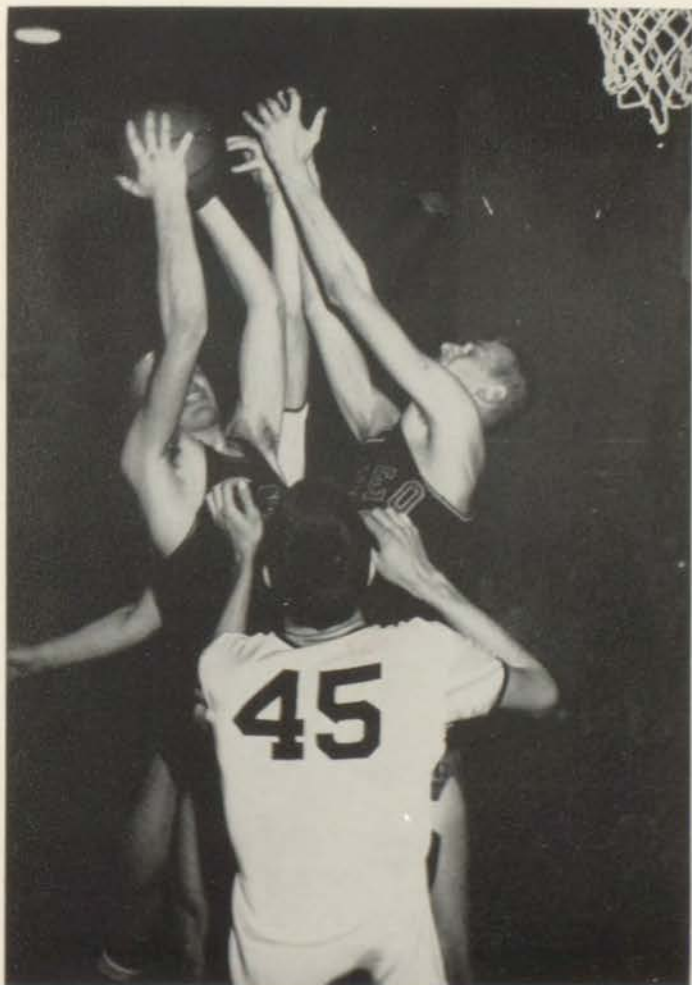

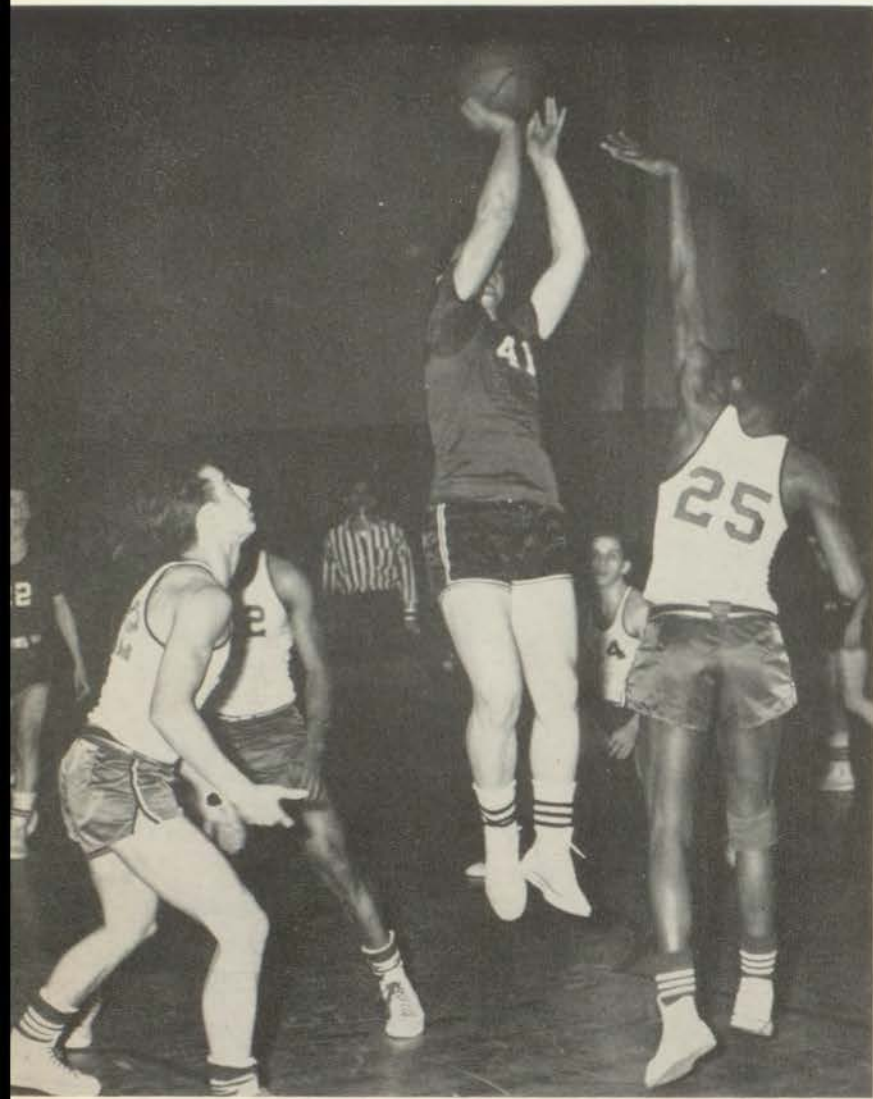

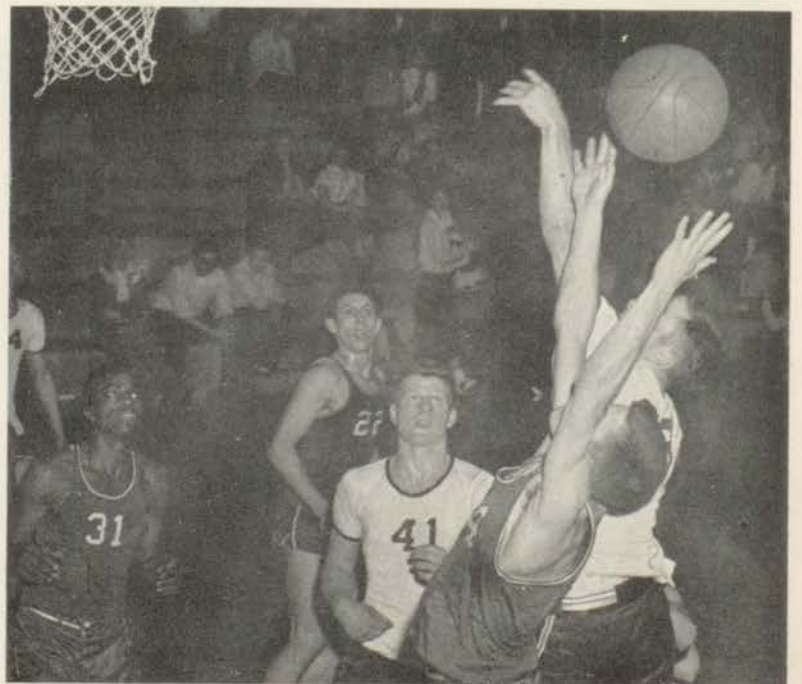
Manual Smashed

torists with their driving. The remaining three days of the week are spent in study hall.

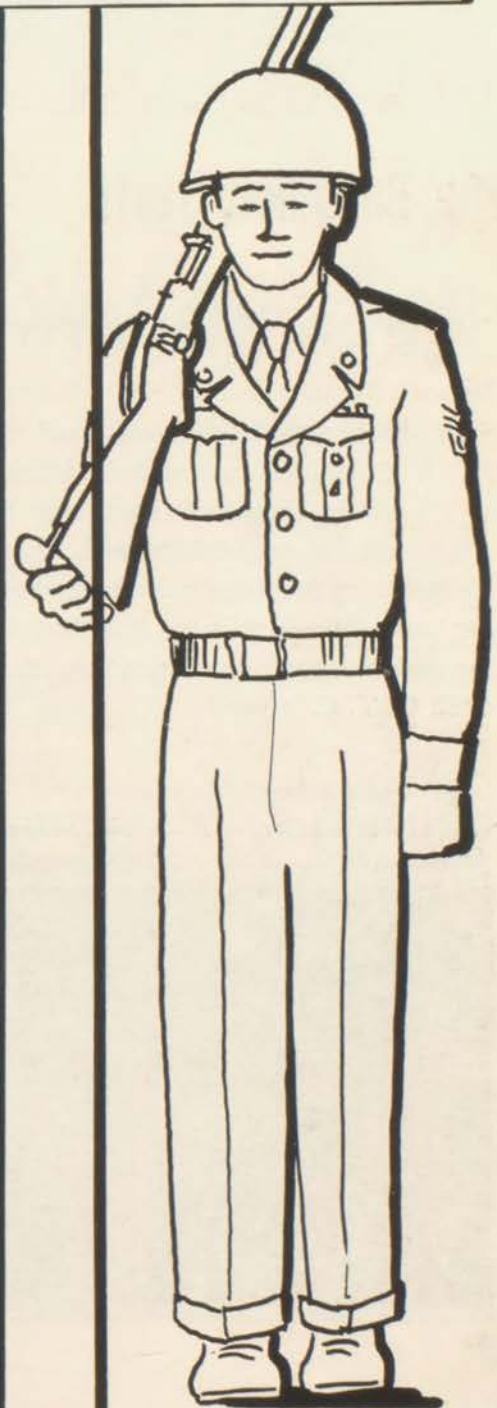
Every year the class is presented with a new car equipped with dual brakes and dual clutch. This year's car was a Ford.

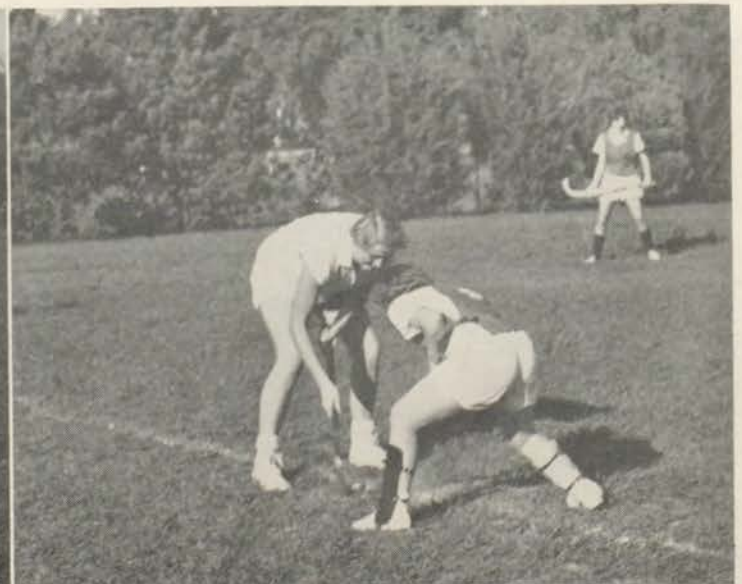

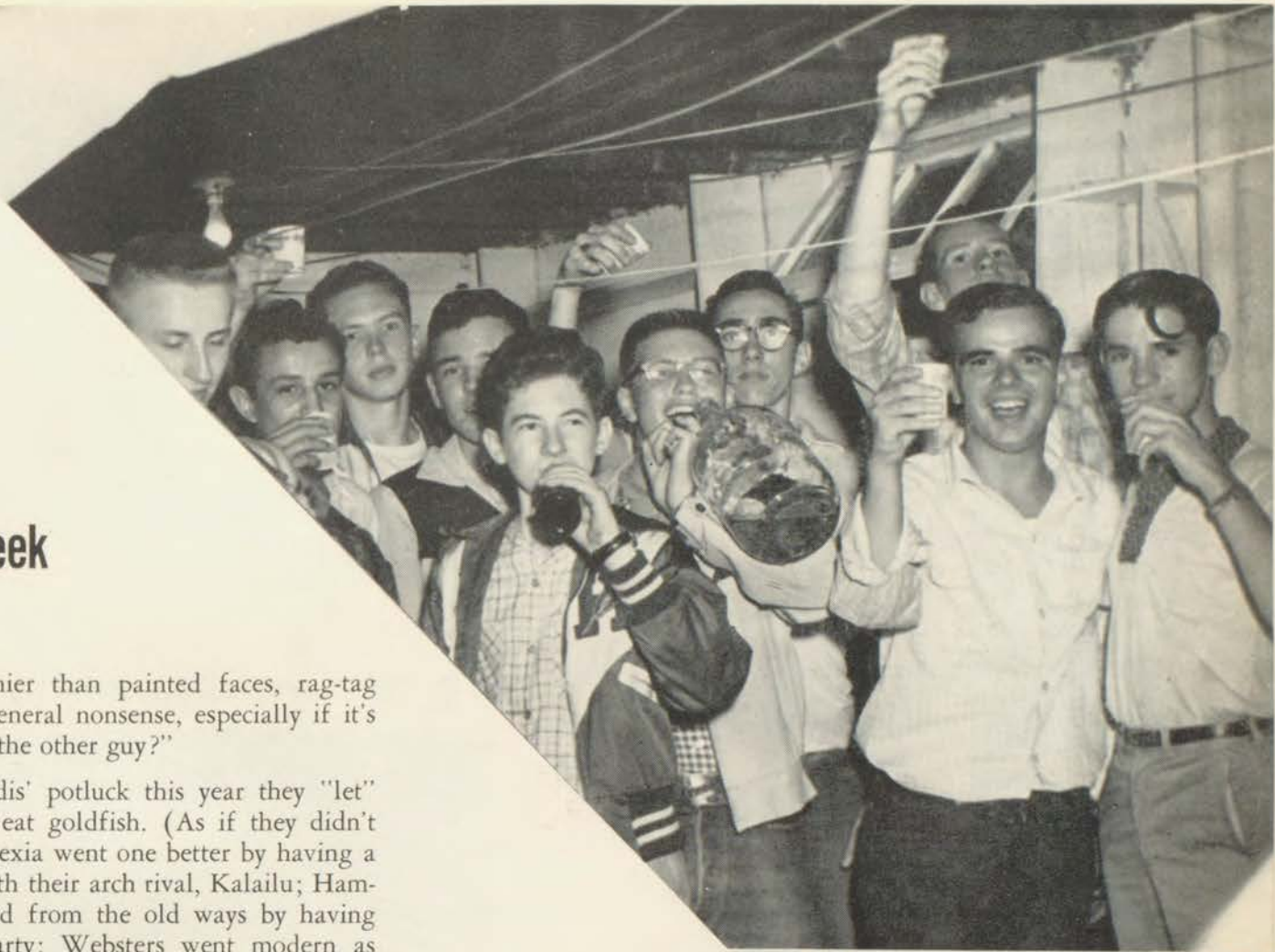


Rush Week

No Problems Are Too Big

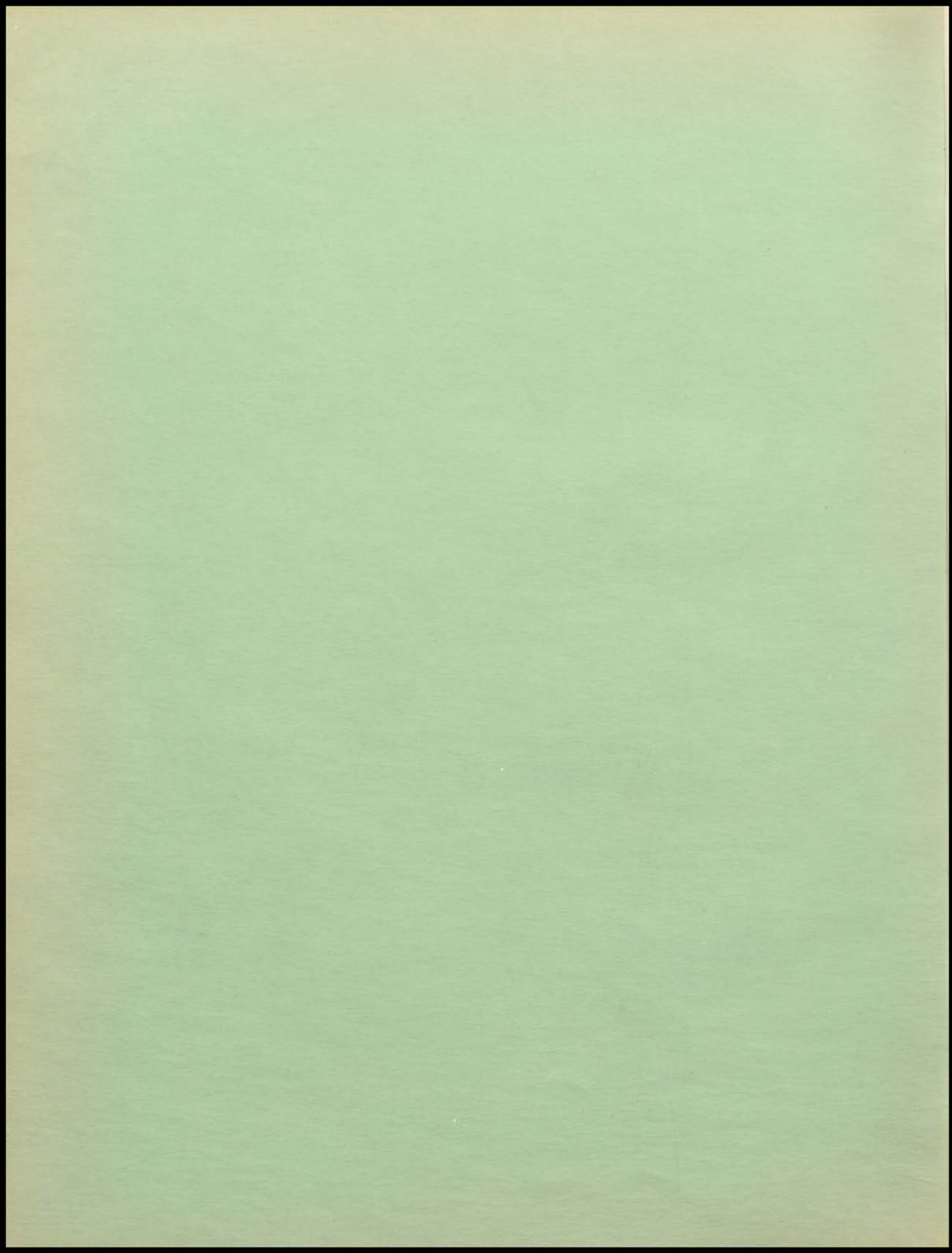

Future Journalists Raid Chicago

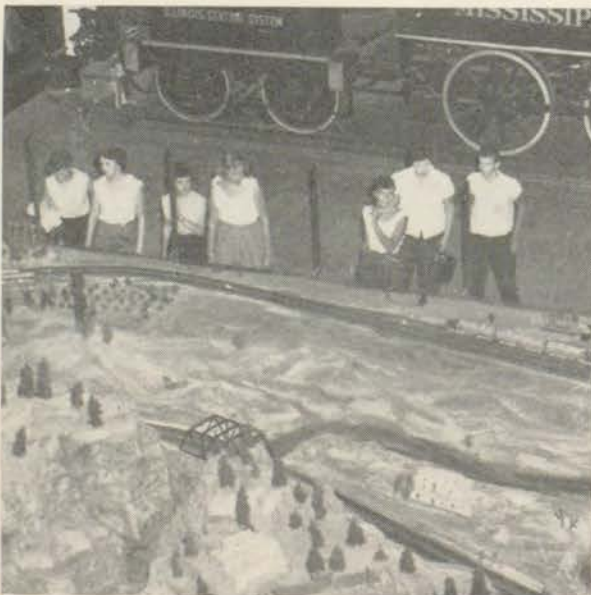
