students and faculty at East. He is a speaker, a scout leader, church worker, and an enthusiastic supporter of activities for youth.



Mr. King came to us from Westport High School. He enjoys fishing with his wife and son at their cabin in Colorado.








History Follows Modern Methods in Modern World






Six More Lead Cubs












All-Star Honors






"WHOA!" A grim and determined Pirate attempts to drag down Larry Myers, East end, after a substantial gain on a completed pass.


East Eases By Eagles





East Chills Indians


The resurging East Bears, the cold wind and snow combined, chilled the Indians of Southwest with a 13-6 win in below freezing temperature.






"OH, BOYI PAY DIRT!" Jerry Womack scores for the Bears early in the game on their way to a 67-0 bouncing of Manual.



Bears Fall to Raytown







The East Bears earned a portion of the Interscholastic championship on February 27, by nosing out Manual in the season finale, 58-56.




The Bears then caught fire with Albert Miller collecting 8 points and Dennis Elmore hitting 6 of his 13 basket attempts for the evening.


Victory Over Chrisman









Second Goes to East in Tri-meet


The only tri-meet of the season saw the Eagles of Central trip up both the East Bears and the Indians of Southwest with a fine team effort and good depth.





Balmy skies, a warm wind, and the cheers and shouts of the ardent followers of 25 area schools combined to spur on the more than 400 athletes from the Greater Kansas City area who gathered on Nowlin Field Saturday, May 14, for the annual warm-up trials for the state meet held later.

The Bruins of East made a very fine eighth place finish with 12 points as highly favored Raytown took first for the day, again displaying the fine, allaround balance which has proven them one of the strongest schools in the area.

The Bears, however, missed the record-setting spotlight as they failed to finish first in any event. They did, however, manage 2 seconds, 1 third, 1 fifth, a sixth, and 1 seventh. Capturing the Bears' first second was the Bears' cinder-burning hurdler, Carl Rhoads, who was edged out by inches in the

Rounding out the Bear point-getters was Don Thomsen, who finished sixth in the mile and Bob Scott, whose heave of 46 feet 11 inches in the 12-pound shot was good for a seventh place berth. This closed out the track season for the year and because of the number of returning lettermen, East High School can well look to a fine sport season in 1960-61.



Bears Show Tennis Skill


Leading the tennis team in its third year of Interscholastic league competition was Coach Harry H. Hommes.


Modern Dance Dance Creates Interest
