Dr. Grube Retires After 36 Years' Service

Happy and joking; but at the same time serious and dedicated are descriptive of Mr. Wallace M. Grube. He has been dedicated to his school work and to the betterment of youth since he began teaching at East in September of 1926. He taught horticulture for awhile, but later went into human science and biology.

He was sponsor of the first Eastonians and since has contributed hours of time and work to successful yearbooks. His yearbook work gave him his start in photography. Through his dedication, the book brought back living memories of things that have happened not only to him, but to the hundreds of students who have passed out of the halls of East with memories of Mr. Grube.

For 36 years he has been an outstanding teacher and friend. To those who know him well, he seems to be a serious minded comedian. He always has a kind word or a funny story for a student, although he keeps a stern hand on his classes.

His work with the Boy Scouts and youth groups has brought him many honors. Missouri Valley college awarded him a Doctor of Humane Letters degree. He has been attending scout camp for thirty-six years and is a member of the staff. He has been medicine man in the tribe of Mic-O-Say since its founding in 1929.

Because of his support of athletics for thirty-six years, the athletic department presented him with a letter jacket, bearing a white "E" for purity inscribed on it.

Always his loyalty to the important parts of his life show up. His whole life seems to be dedicated to work and service. As these seemingly short thirty-six years of Mr. Grube's school life draw to a close, we know his work with youth and scouts won't cease. Many more will receive his guidance.

We wish "Pappy" good fortune and a prosperous future. We all will remember this outstanding person as an instructor, friend, and a guidepost to happier lives.

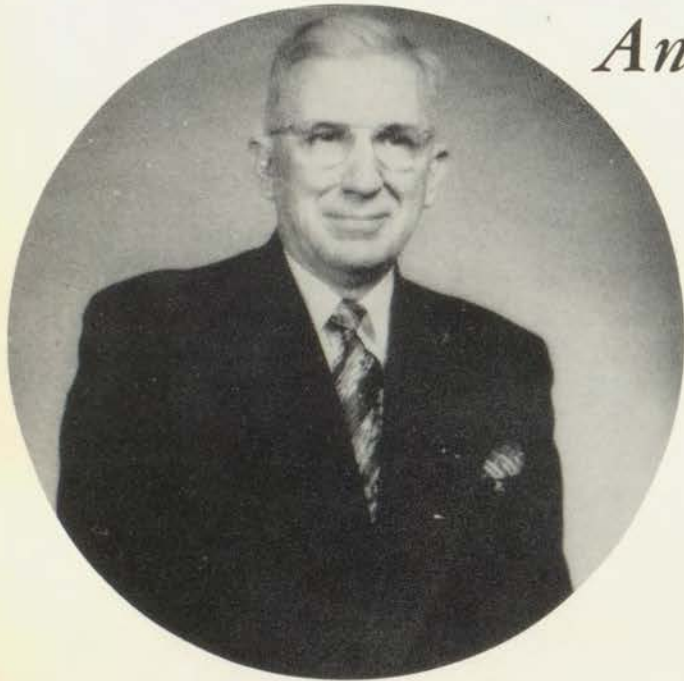

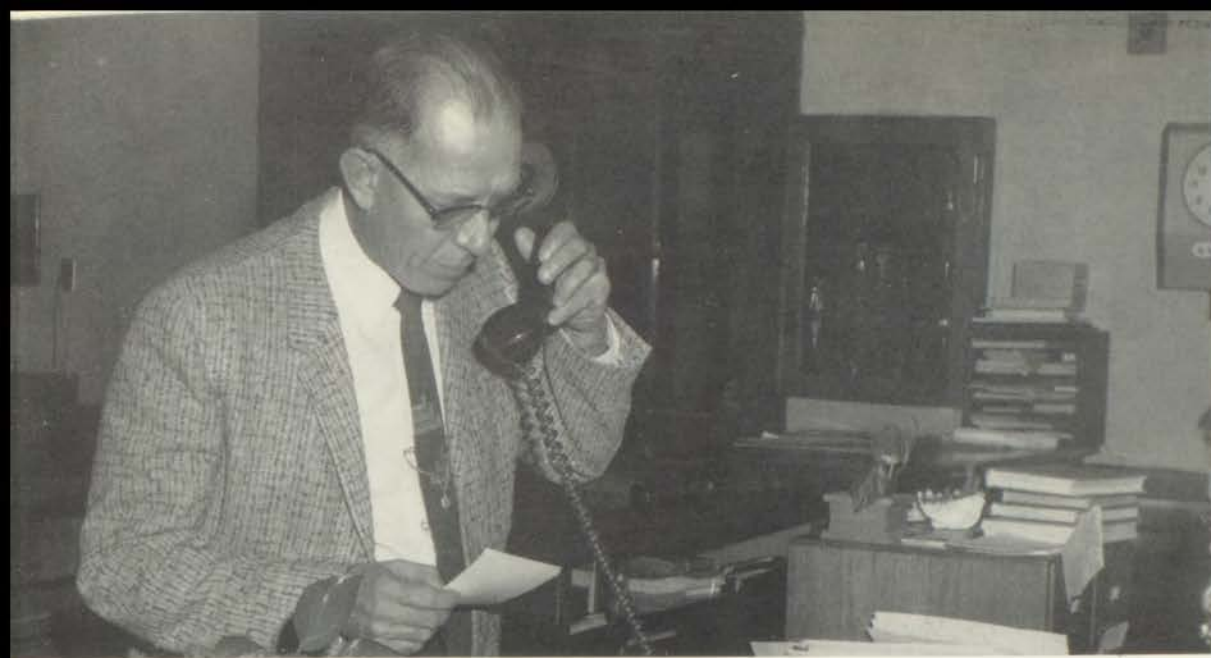


A Message From Mr. Williams

Teaching students to speak before an audience was capably handled by Miss Eva VanNatta, who leaves East this year after thirty-six years of instruction in beginning speech and public speaking, Mrs. Etta Marie Carlisle, drama instructor, and Miss Pauline Wolfe, speech and English teacher.

The sub-freshmen find their basic course, common learnings, a worthwhile study of history, science, and English under the instruction of seven teachers, Mr. Clayton Newton, Miss Cosby Harrison, Mrs. Helen Lapsley, Miss Edith Wilson, Mr. Herbert Cohn, Mr. Francis McGreevy, and Mr. Jerome Winegar.

The feminine half of East's population learned to increase their home economics skills through foods and clothing classes taught by Mrs. Juanita Barr, Mrs. Mary Gauldin, and Mrs. Adah Vendetti.

Civics, world history, and American history fill the social studies bill through the teachings of Mr. Mervel P. Lunn, Mr. James Penny, Miss Jessie Willitt, Mr. Edgar Van Fleet, and Mr. William T. Ridley. Courses in American problems, American democracy, and psychology, though half-year courses required the full time study and preparation to benefit the students taught by Mr. Americo Felici and Mr. John Peters.

Family living is a preparation for East's seniors in social and family life to fill their futures. This course is taught by a newcomer to the faculty this year, Mrs. Veona Coons.

Stress College Preparatory

Mathematics play an important role in many students' futures. Not only general math, taught by Mr. Harry Hommes and Mrs. Crystal Barndt, but algebra, geometry, and trigonometry, under the instruction of Mrs. Mary Zickefoose, Mr. Carl West, and Mr. Robert Winters, were the fundamental subjects that college students based their programs upon.

Science has rapidly increased its need in the past few years due to the stress on space travel, engineering, and scientific leadership. For the past two years, East has offered an advanced course in physics which is equivalent to a second year college course. It is taught by Mr. John W. Layman* and is conducted through a college-level text. Chemistry, too, is an accelerated course, receiving an extra honor point. Mr. James Michaels teaches this course in the newly finished laboratory. Girls' human science and biology are taught by Mrs. Mary Bates. Mr. Paul Day and Mr. Tom Smith instruct earth science and general science classes, while Mr. Wallace Grube teaches boys' human science and photography. Zoology is an up-and-coming course at East, taught by Mr. J. W. Peters.

The commercial branch of East's curriculum includes typing, stenography, and bookkeeping. These courses are taught by Miss Mabel Mary Cobb, Mrs. Nellie McKanna, Mr. Richard Benson, and Miss Minnie Baker, who is also the school treasurer.

Physical fitness is also stressed here at East. Three girls' physical education teachers, Miss Helen Cox, Miss Mary Ledgerwood, and Mrs. Sondra Paris, teach sportsmanship, various athletic skills, and even rhythmic dancing. In the men's department of physical education, Mr. Virland Harris, Mr. Harry Driefus, Mr. Roy Brown, Mr. Douglas Roether, and Mr. Gene Sebastian teach sports, calisthenics, and the skill of getting along with fellow workers.

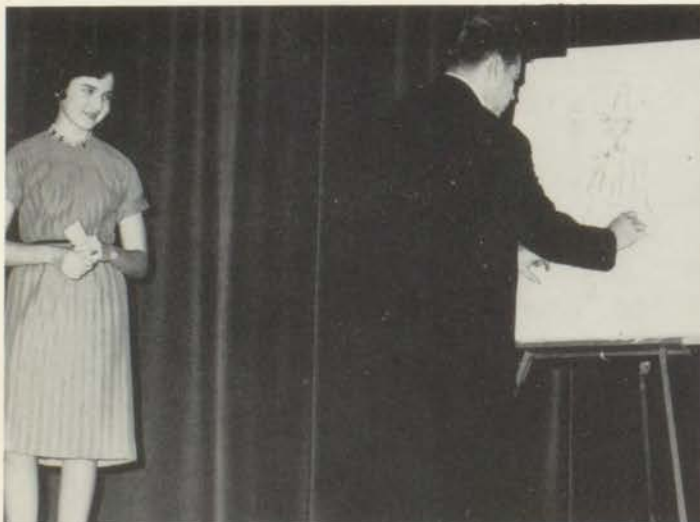
Parents-Teachers Strive To Improve Relations

During the football season, several performances at half-time, including Homecoming, were presented by our band directed by Mr. Marion Sell. He also chose a special group to play at the Outburst. They marched in the American Royal Parade, and at Christmas time the band went around to all the area grade schools to play familiar Christmas music. While on this tour, they played at the dedication of the National College gym. The East band represented us in the band and orchestra festivals. Beginners and advanced bands helped to develop and mold future musicians to the proficiency point.

There were many early morning rehearsals that prepared them for "Music in Review," the final and biggest event presented by the entire musical department.

With an emphasis on the string instruments, the orchestra learns about the techniques which will help them to acquire the ability to play closer to those members of orchestras such as Kansas City's philharmonic orchestra. Members of the orchestra learn about the background of the music they play from Mr. Marion W. Sell, the leader. They are taught all of the musical terms from presto to allargando. They learn of the lives of the famous composers, such as Strauss, Beethoven, and Bach.

Besides playing classical music, the orchestra often plays popular music from the Broadway shows such as "The Music Man" and "Porgy and Bess."

Just as with the band the orchestra supplies some of the members for the orchestras of the Outburst and Music in Review stage shows.

Unlike the band, the orchestra may have eighth graders if they are past the stage of the beginners. The orchestra has members that range all the way from intermediate to advanced, while all the members of the band are in the advanced stage with the intermediate group in the "B" band.

Members of the orchestra may try out at the city tryouts for the state music contest, and if they are given a 1 or 2 rating they may go on to the district and state contests. The big event for the orchestra is the annual orchestra festival in which all schools participate.

C.O.E. was designed to give students actual on-the-job experience, plus classroom knowledge. Each student must spend approximately three to four hours each day in school, and a minimum of 15 hours a week on their job.
