

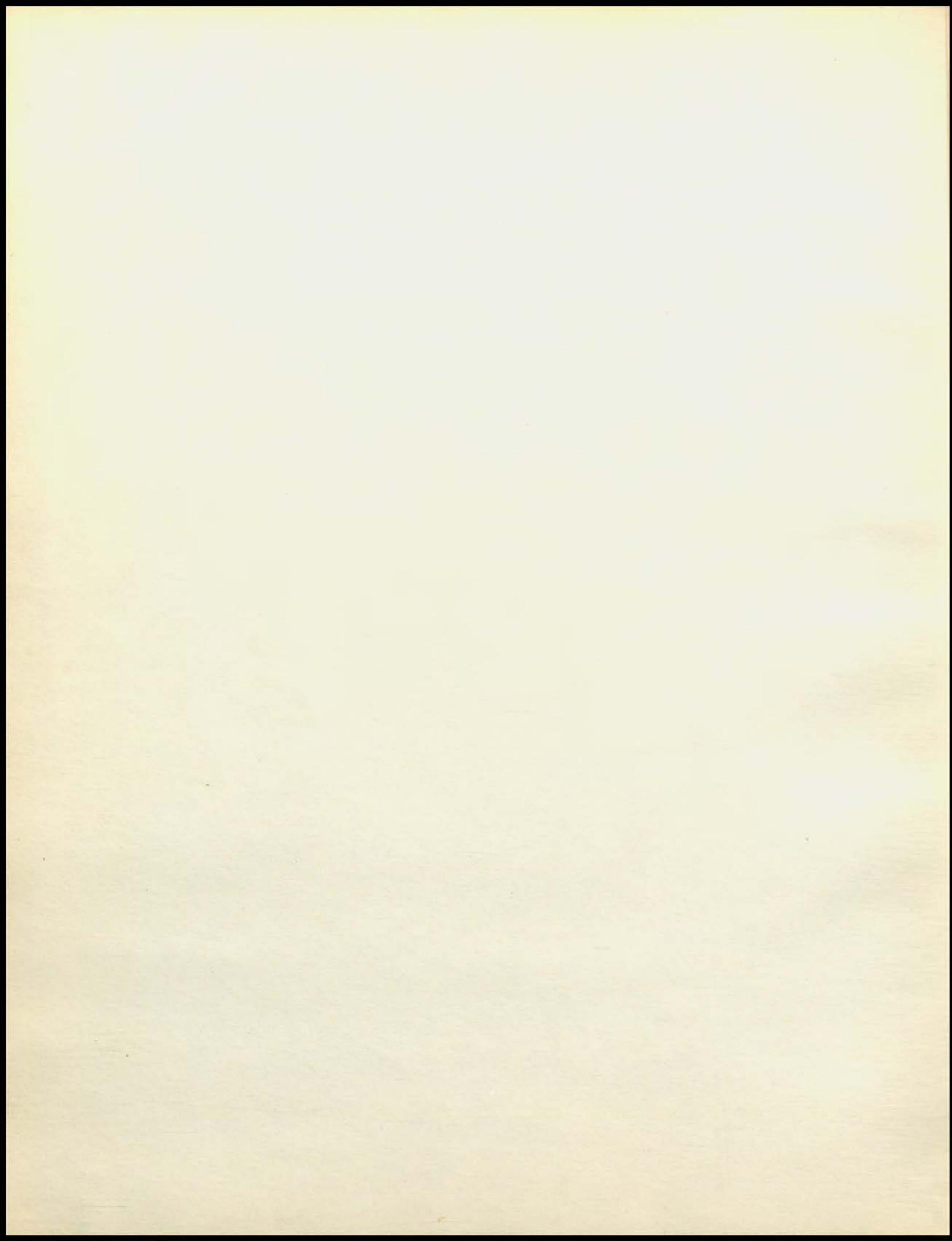

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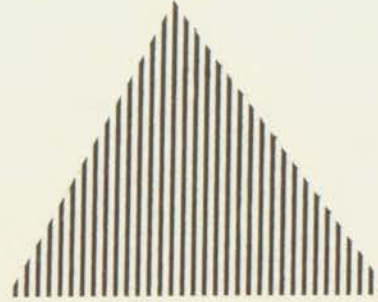
Old and new, this indeed has been the theme of us at East High School for many years. The experienced, the intermediate, and the novice all help to make up a school of great tradition.

They make up the classes that have passed the threshold of beginning years and have moved into the upper half of the school.

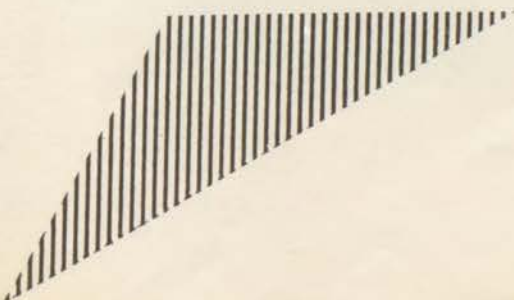
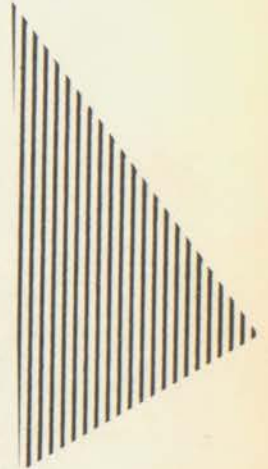
On October 23, 1923, the Board of Education adopted a resolution to accept a tract of land on Van Brunt Boulevard on which to build East High School. With this decision, work on our building moved along rapidly; and in 1926 the new school first opened its doors.

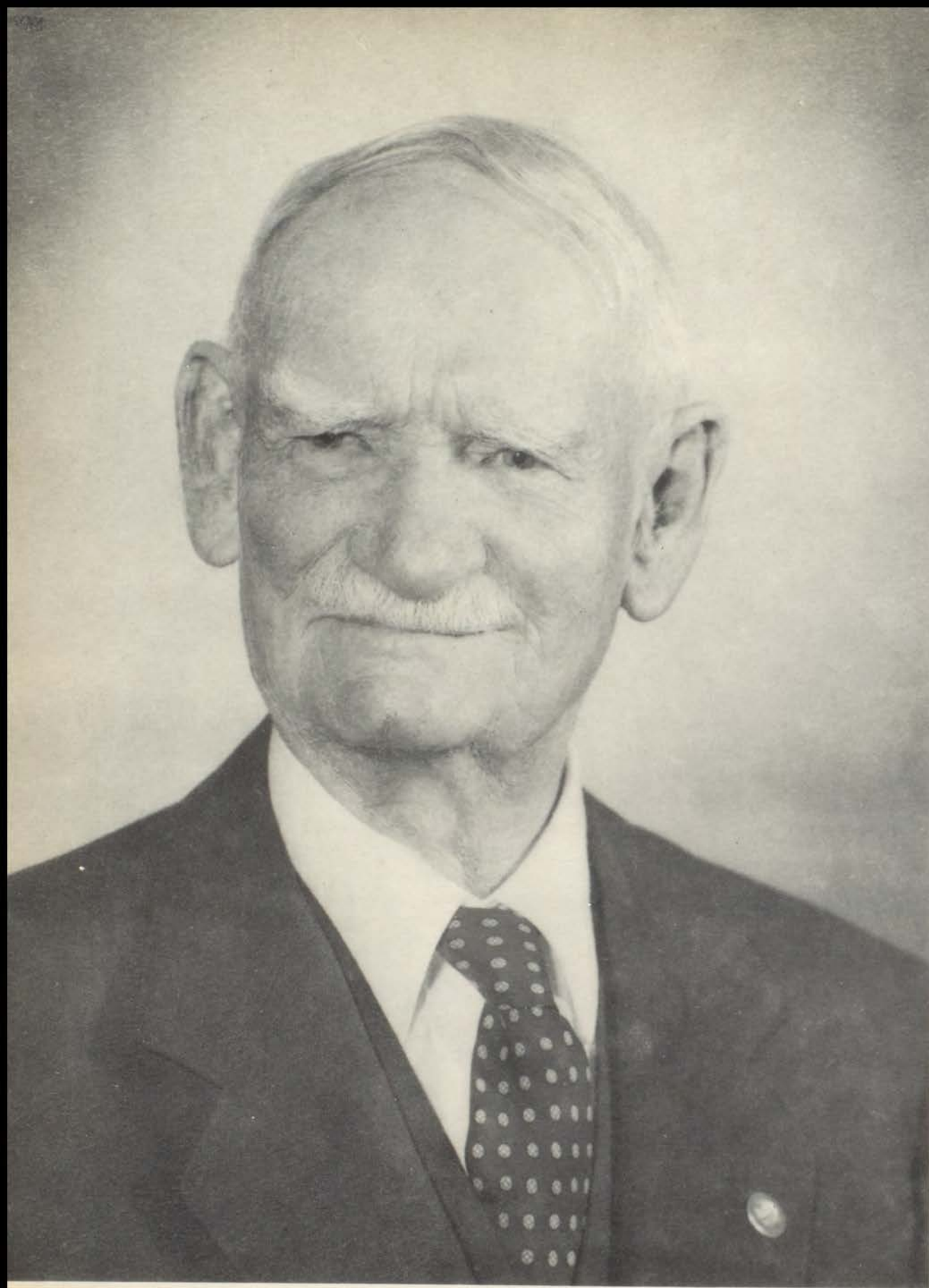
During the first few years of the school's existence, East was primarily an agricultural and horticultural high school. Influenced by this program, our early athletic teams were known as the "Aggies," the "Ducks," and the "Gazooks." Despite the fact that our teams had little experience, they put forth a great effort; in 1929 our varsity basketball team soared into a state championship.

Soon after East High School admitted its first classes, the situation arose where it was necessary to build more class space. In these first days, our auditorium was also used as a gymnasium. Because of crowding caused by the gym equipment, dances and other school activities, were held in the front hall. Not until the additions of a north and south wing and a separate art building did East High have an adequate library, cafeteria, gymnasium, swimming pool, auditorium, and art room.

Many activities were held in the spring and, high-lighting them all, was the balloting for the R.O.T.C. queen—the sponsor major. East's cadets played a much more important part in school life in those days. Walking proudly through our halls, members of the R.O.T.C. dressed in bell-bottomed trousers, knee length boots, and sported shining steel sabres. The school band, then a part of the cadet corps, added color to the activities of the year.

Without a doubt, the history of East High School may be looked back upon with pride. Today, although our rooms have been remodeled and enlarged, they still appear basically the same as they did in 1926. The great traditions established by our first classes are still carried on by the students of 1963.

As the bright shiny new "63" models whizz by our school few people know the history and traditions of the building. It was the year 1922 that the Building Committee and other members of the Board of Education were trying to select a suitable site for a school in this part of town. The Board agreed that the R. A. Long tract on Van Brunt Boulevard was the most desirable site. After some negotiations and concessions on the part of Mr. Long, a resolution was adopted on October 23, 1923.

Our building was expanded much since it first opened its doors. If you had taken a tour through the halls in 1927, you would have seen a basic school without the library, cafeteria, auditorium, pool, or girls' gymnasium—without either north or south wings. The year 1933 was a big year for the school. In this year several additions were made—the library was added and opened to the public, the cafeteria was added and was a big improvement because the halls were cleared of this activity, a gymnasium was added and the auditorium remodeled and improved to appear much the same as it appears today.





Many activities were held in the spring, and on the top of the list was the ROTC queen — the sponsor major. This was the only queen at that time compared to the seven queens of today.

The Outburst was a carnival with side shows in every room and the main program in the auditorium. In one of the shows in those days, they traveled to India while this year we were lucky to get a boat to Paris.





Whether it's waltzing yesterday or twisting today, many students enjoyed the dances held at the school. Our auditorium was then used as a gymnasium-auditorium combined. Because of the gym equipment their dances were held in the front hall. The front hall has truly seen much activity today, but this hall was the center of activities in 1927.

East was primarily an agricultural and horticultural school. The athletic teams were called at various times, Ducks, Gazooks, and finally Bears. Much practice and spirit was put into these early teams, because in 1929, these young Bears became state champs in basketball.



Support by both students and parents was strong. The Mothers "E" Club was a very active group, adding spirit and enthusiasm to our school. This group sat in the bleachers as our pep club does today. On the field, yells were led by the boy cheerleaders who were replaced by girls in 1955.







Although time moves relentlessly onward and alters many things, the scene after school was much the same as it is today. Many of the students rushing from the school in its early years carry the same memories and traditions as do their later generations when they leave the school today.

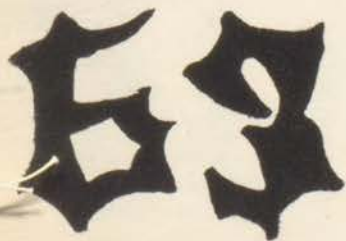

Work started early for this year's staff. Last June Mr. Prewitt, sponsor, chose the staff members and began to organize the group into a team that would produce the best possible Eastonian. Many new ideas were formulated. Juniors who showed ability were asked to join the staff to learn the procedures of organizing the Eastonian; the general layout of the book was changed to coincide with the theme, and the layouts were begun. Three mornings a week the light was burning early in 108 because staff work is an extra-curricular activity that puts together the yearbook during off school hours.

The staff undertook extra projects to build school spirit and to promote the sale of books. The first of these projects was the sale of plastic covers. Then last October the promotion of activity tickets began. This sale provides the students with an economical way of participating in all school events. 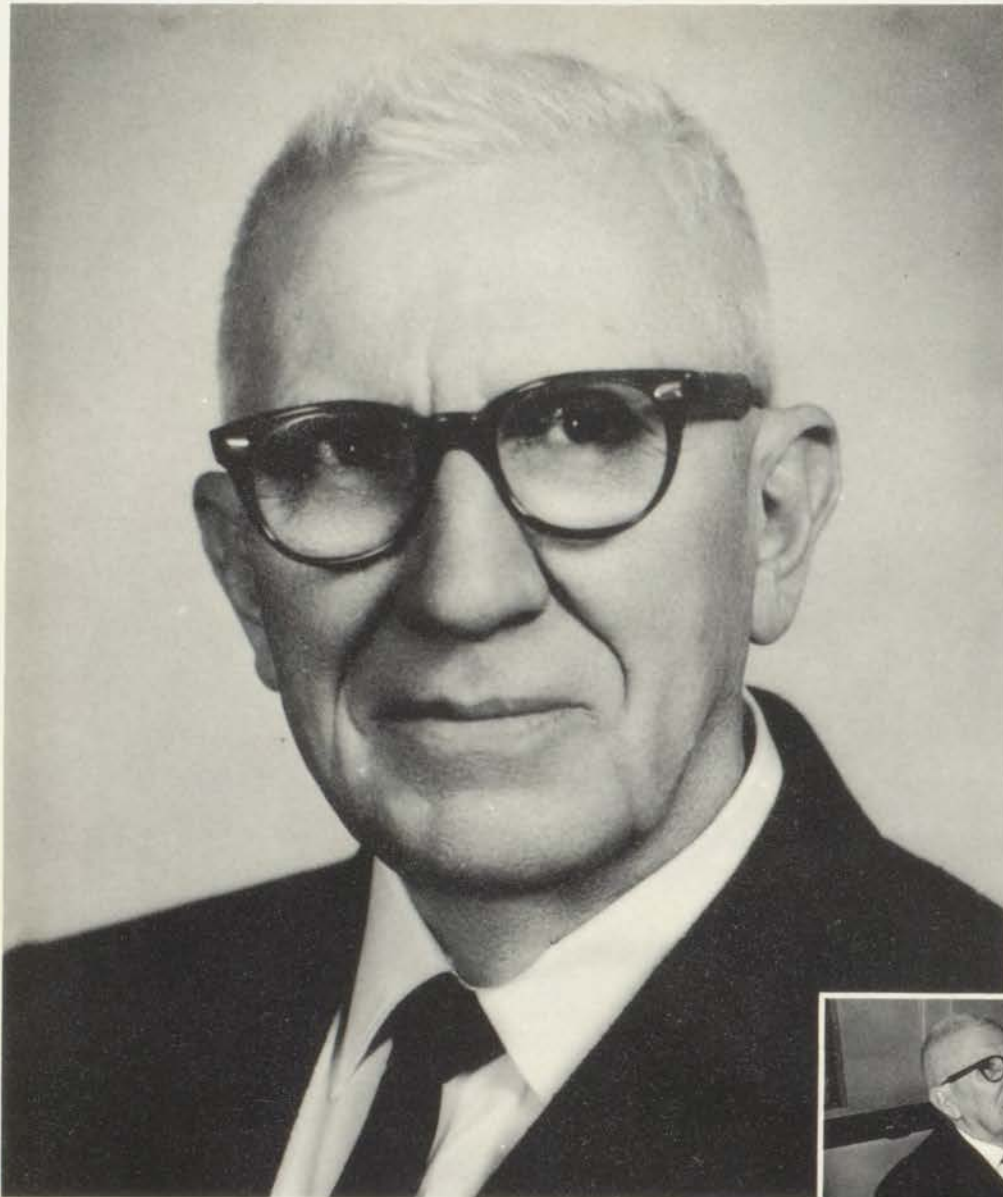

In charge of the new courses in advanced algebra was Mr. Robert Winters. In these advanced mathematics courses, East pupils were soon taking up subjects that were, only a short time ago, taught in college. Soon, undoubtedly Junior will be helping his father with *his* work in the evening!

Keeping in step with the latest developments in the space age, East's science department strived to develop an interest in the physical and biological sciences. Courses were offered in everything from general science to college-level physics. Using a text prepared by the physical science study group, Mr. Stiegler worked to acquaint his students with the newest concepts in physics.

In addition to offering classes in physics, chemistry, and the like, East High made membership in two special clubs available to its students. For those interested in the space age was a club that studied the newest developments in the space program and in nuclear experimentation. 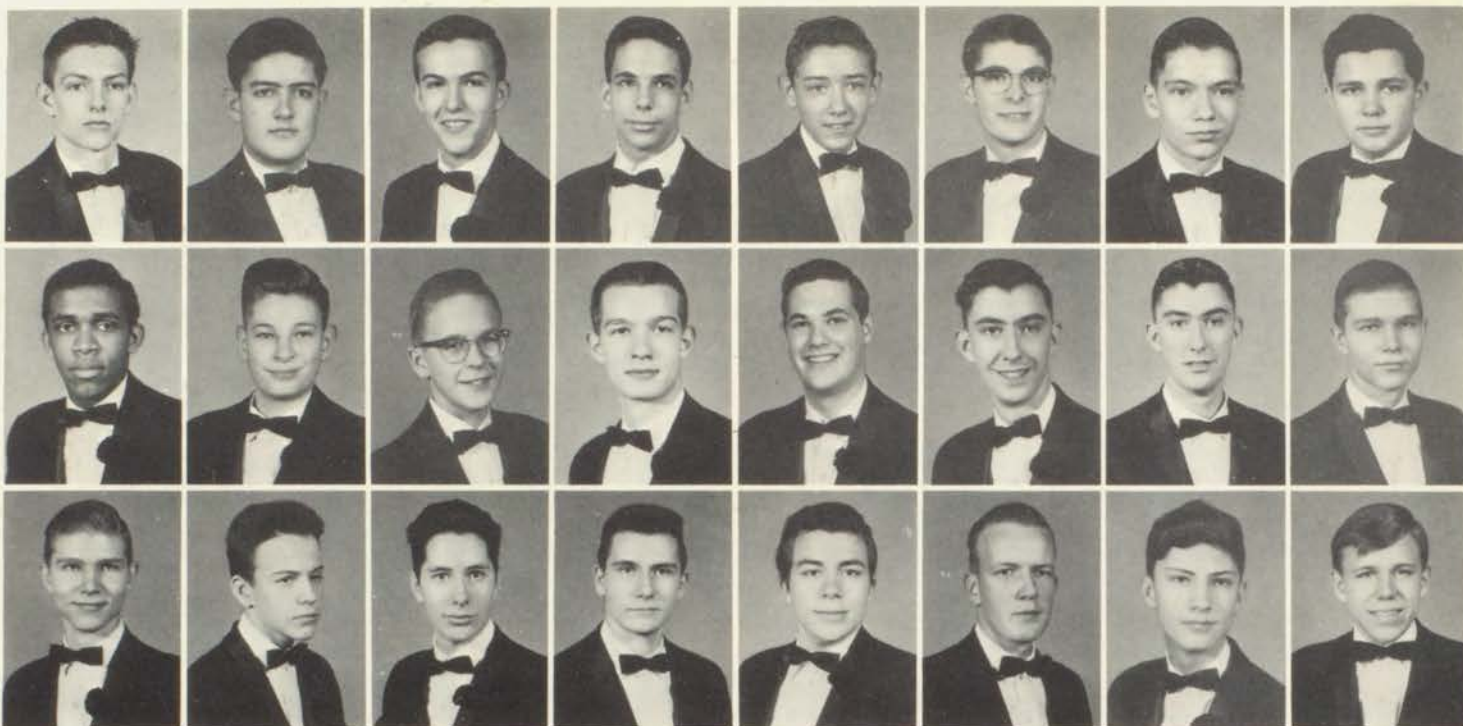

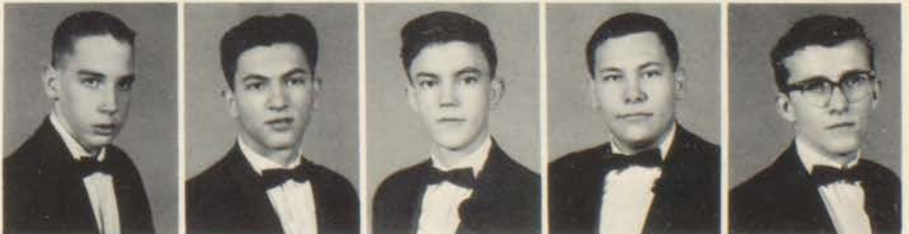

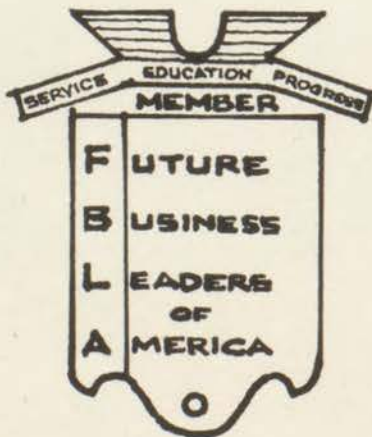

Winding up the season with a 3-4-2 record, the Bears can look forward to another year with most of the lettermen returning, hoping to better the

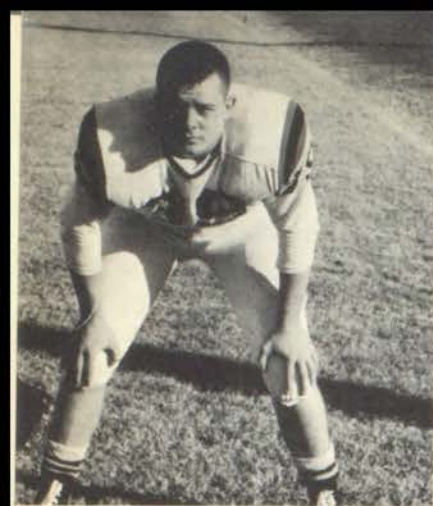

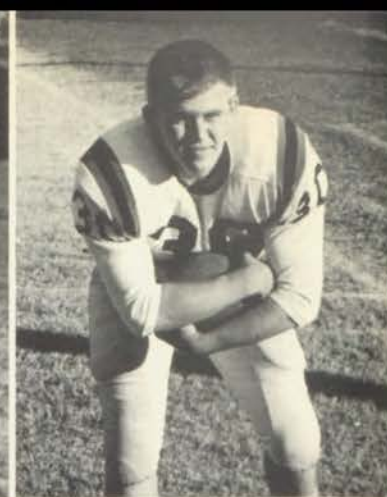

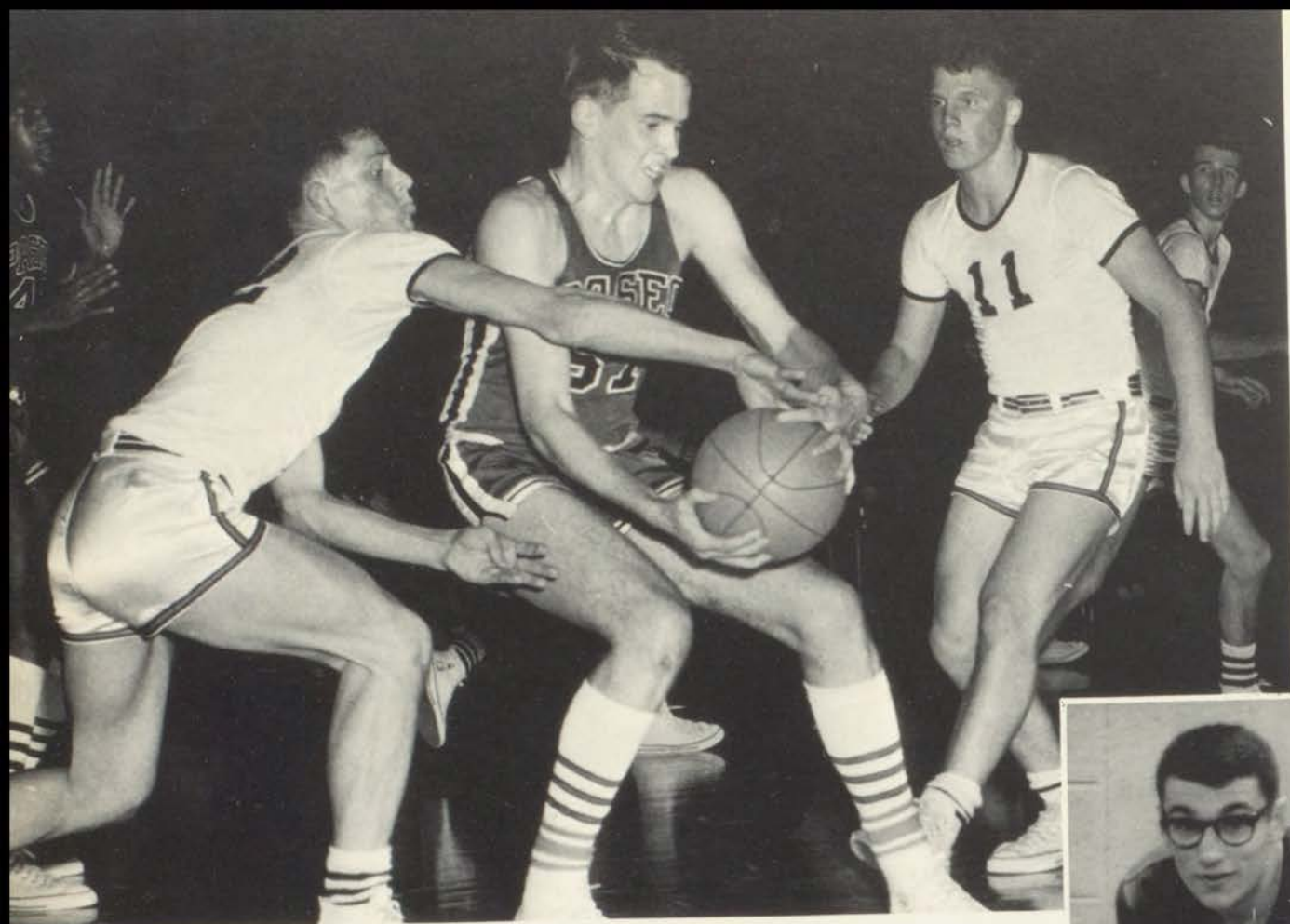

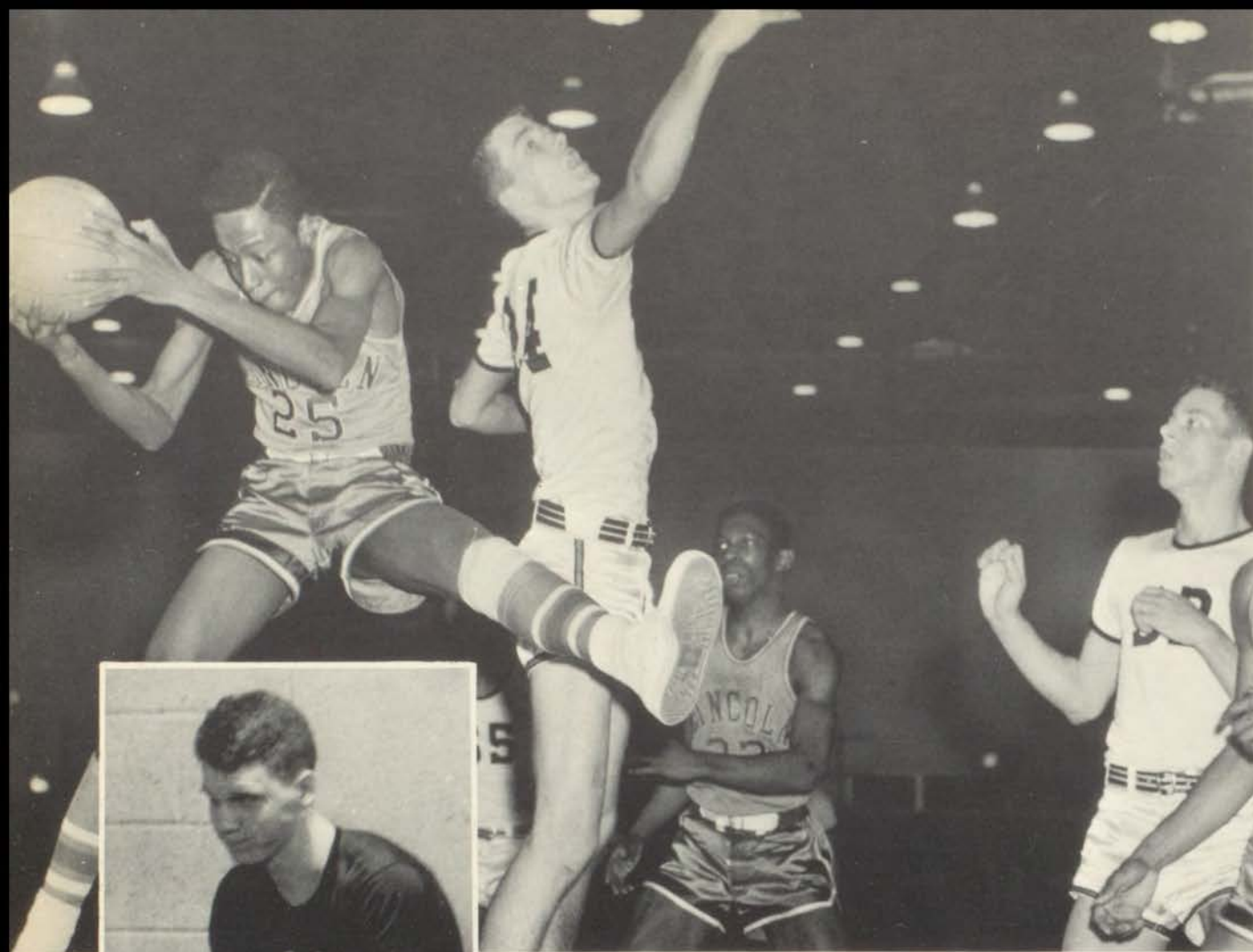

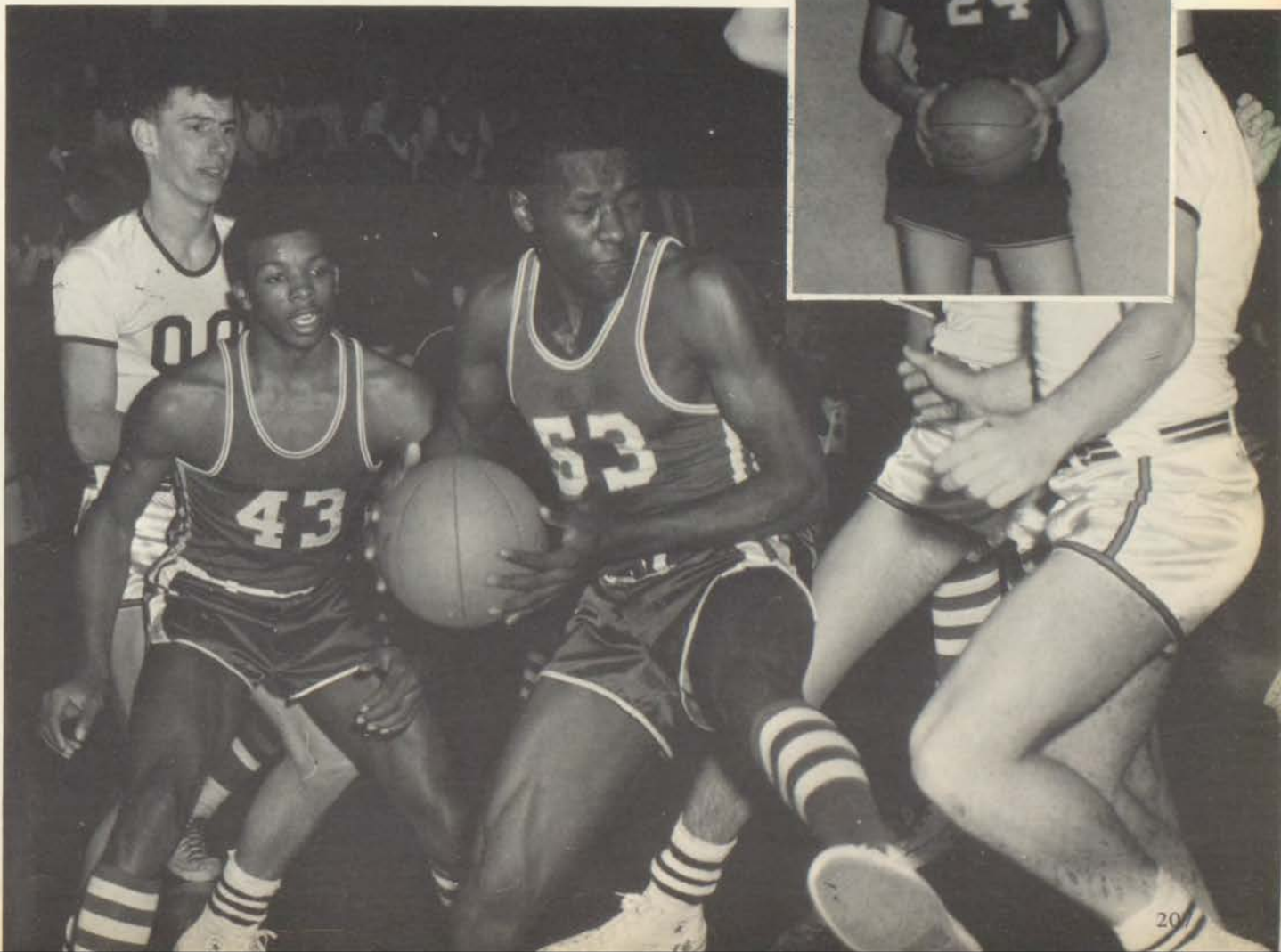

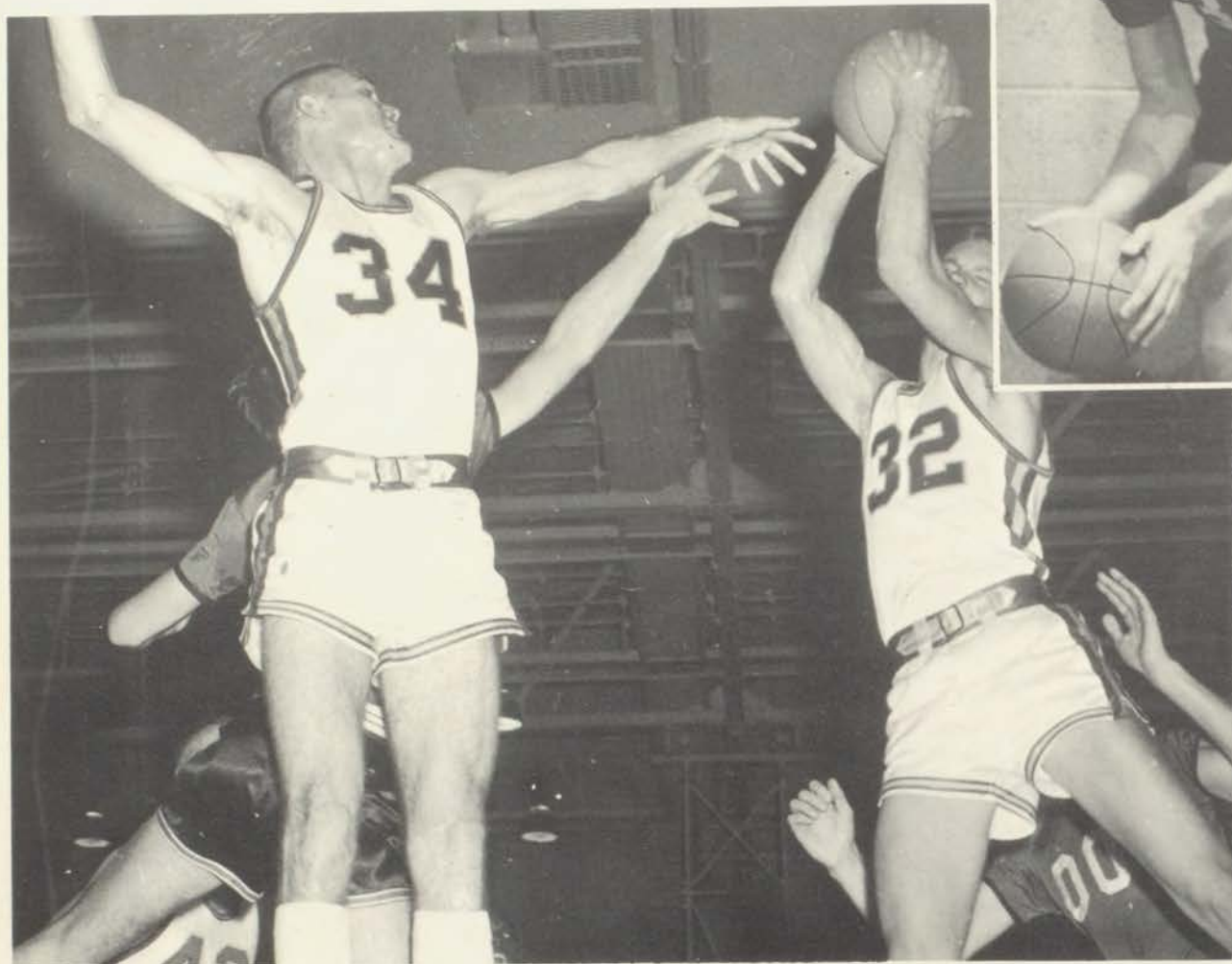


HIGH INTO THE AIR GOES WARREN ARMSTRONG, Central guard, for another of his famous jump shots. Of course, it swished the net for another tally.

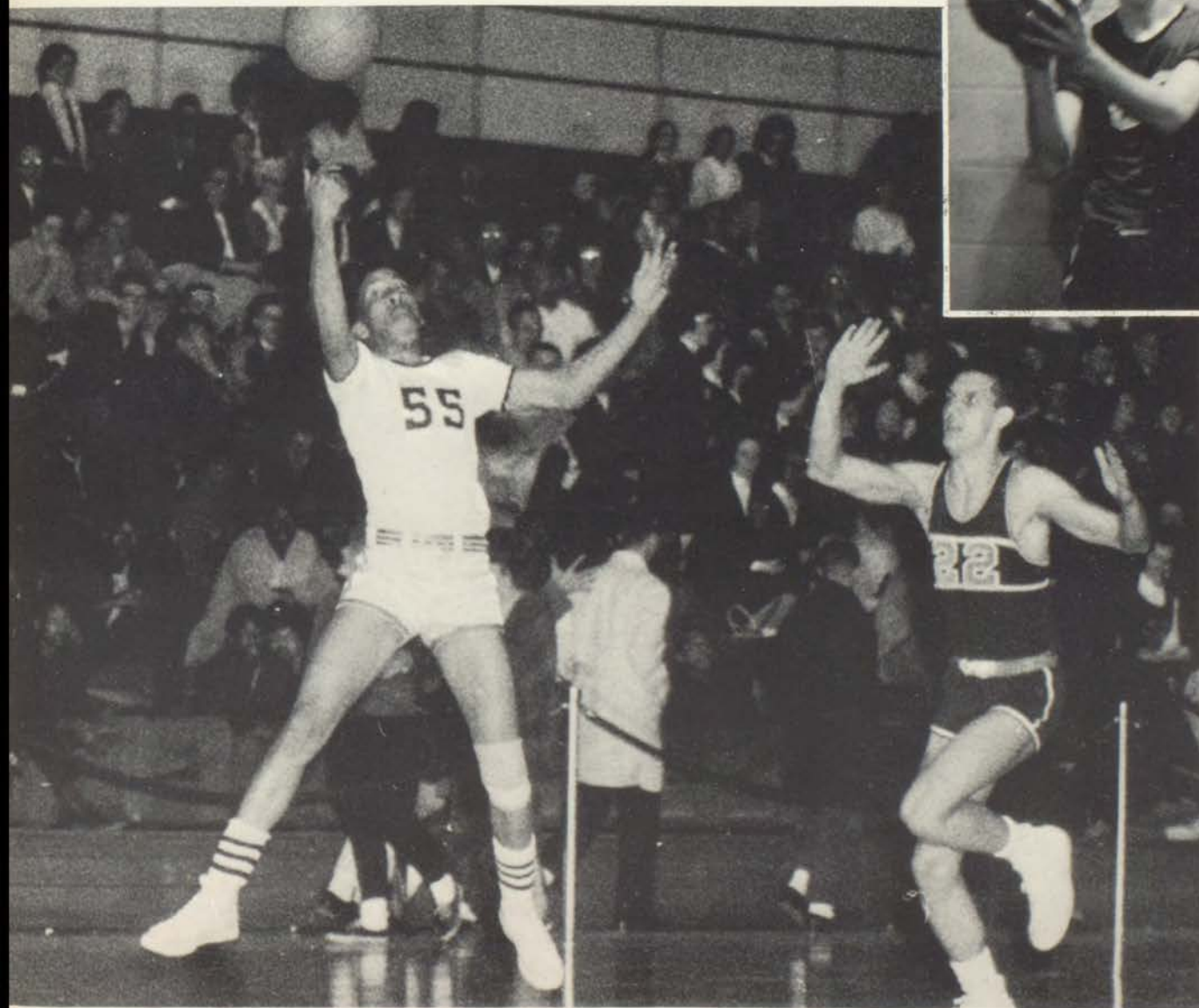

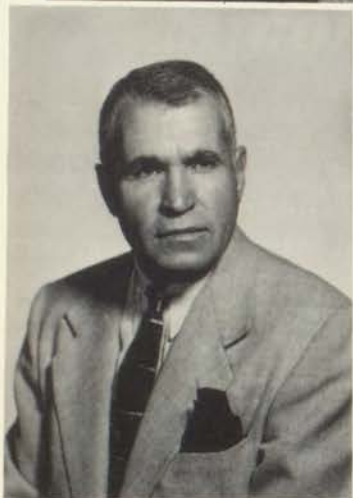

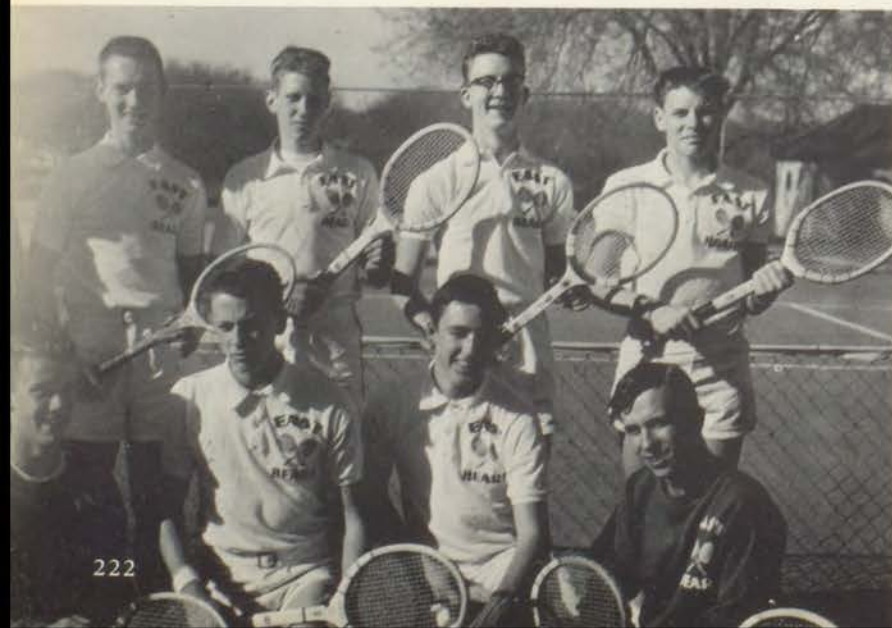
Minor Sports Add Zest to School
