






#### Foreword

Climaxing the year was the culmination of the political campaigns in the election and inauguration of President Richard M. Nixon. His victory slogan and inauguration theme, "Bring Us Together" and "Forward Together", vividly express the theme of this yearbook.

Anyone who has ventured into the boys' gym during class can verify the presence of a permanent fixture, an integral part, no less a supporting force than the walls of the structure. Upholding, not the ceilings, but students, Coach Les Fields has for over twenty years guided their progress.

Coach Fields, a graduate of Central High School and Central Missouri State College, came to East in 1945. An outstanding track man himself in high school and college, Mr. Fields has coached football, basketball, and golf, as well as cross country and track.

Always a picture of discipline and devotedness, Coach Fields has shaped hundreds of E as t High students into proud athletes and upstanding young men. Under his leadership and training, East High School's cross country team has developed into one of the most respected in the state of Missouri.

Last year, Mr. Fields was presented the 1967-68 "Coach of the Year Award" by the West Central Coaches Association in recognition of the undefeated record of his city and district champion cross country team. An honor such as this can reflect only the willingness to work long and hard, which is so typical of Coach Fields.












## **SCHOLARSHIP**

Mr. Dickson, as principal, has many responsibilities which include faculty appraisal, curriculum development, interschool liaison, Parent Teacher Association, Public Relations, and support of and cooperation with student council leaders.

Mr. Markey is in charge of the tenth, eleventh, and twelfth grades at East. He also supervises discipline on the second floor and after school on the first floor. Mr. Markey is also in charge of locker problems, extracurricular activities, and emergency situation drills.

Mr. Ridley has been a Vice-Principal at East for the past three years. Mr. Ridley has many responsibilities among which are all enrollment, programming, scheduling, and discipline of eighth and ninth graders.





#### English

Language, English or otherwise, is a key factor of success. In English, the students of East are taught the basic parts of speech, the structure of a sentence, the interpretation of a poem or novel; each successively more difficult. In Speech, these lessons are put to use in learning to express themselves in communication. The study of English is important to each student if he is to be successful communicating with his fellowman. The knowledge of our English language is the mark of an educated individual.

#### Foreign Language

After the mastery of English, a foreign language may be chosen from the three taught at East-French, Latin, and Spanish-to broaden the student's outlook on the world. The study of a language teaches a student to speak and write a language and to understand the culture of the foreign country. The language lab helps the student to increase his proficiency at speaking a language.



#### Science

Science and math usually complement one another. A good background in each is desirable in many careers. Science classes range from General Science, in which the basic principles of most fields are touched upon, to Physics, in which physical causes of natural phenomena are explored. Two years of science are necessary for graduation.

#### Math

Math, required only one year, is offered a total of four years. Choosing from General Math, Refresher Math, Algebra, Geometry, Advanced Algebra and Trigonometry, and Senior Advanced Math, students learn the basic fundamentals and more complex theorems. These help students to solve everyday problems and to discipline their minds to provide background for further study.






## C.O.E. Students Work for the Future




#### Competition and Practice Build Sportsmanship in Girls' Sports






#### Northeast








#### Southwest


#### Season Summary


After the football season has ended, our team cannot be judged by their win-loss record. They played as a team with all they had and all they could give for our school.













#### Lillis




#### Lincoln







### Ruskin Invitational






Central Invitational



### Top Cadets Are Honored with Appointments and Awards

Mr. Taylor came to East High School at the beginning of the 1966-67 school year. He took charge of a Corps of Cadets that barely numbered sixty-five cadets. The minimum number of cadets allowed to maintain an R.O.T.C. battalion at any high school is one hundred. During his first year here, the Instructor Group of R.O.T.C. in the Kansas City school put East on probation for a period of one year. The very existence of East's R.O.T.C. unit was hanging in the balance. Then in 1967-68, Mr. Taylor relaxed his efforts not in the slightest. By the time of the Federal Inspection in the spring of 1968, East High School's R.O.T.C. battalion numbered approximately one hundred and twenty.

Lt. Col. Jerry Weimer, winner of Chicago Tribune twice, and holder of 3 shooting medals, was recently awarded the position of Chief of Staff on the City Staff. The City Staff has the responsibility of planning all R.O.T.C. functions, such as the R.O.T.C. Ball and Field Day. City Staff is the highest organization in R.O.T.C. One cadet is sent from each school to compete for City commander. The position on City Staff is determined by the outcome of this competition.

The Battalion Staff is the governing body of the R.O.T.C. Battalion. The members are the limbs and senses of the Battalion Commander. They assist him in his duties and advise him in important decisions. They also help him in control of his unit.

An example is the Sergeant-Major. Being the Senior noncommissioned officer and enlisted cadet in the Battalion Reserves as a liaison between the non-coms and enlisted men and the Battalion Commander.




