
Following a year in the administrative office downtown, as physical education consultant, he became vice-principal at Northeast, where he served until the fall of 1963 when he came to

With these thoughts in mind, we have dedicated this yearbook to you, Mr. Markey.























































#### **Foreword**

1969-70 will undoubtedly be a year long remembered after volume 44 of our Eastonian has been laid aside. Not only did it close out the sizzling sixties; it saw the fires lighted to open the roaring seventies.

This has been a year of protest. From the opening of school until its close, there has been a constant tension not only in the halls, but in the class rooms as well. With an 0-10 record in football, a 2-16 record in basketball, and threatened boycotts in track, school morale faded to its lowest levels as many students led protests against the administration, the faculty, other students, their parents, and the establishment in general.

Closing of school several days in September, expulsion of several students, and dissatisfaction with school in general all contributed to a general feeling of bewilderment and apathy. Many students withdrew, others dropped out, but the large majority clung desperately to their loyalties, and tried to keep school activities moving in a somewhat normal way.

Racial unrest again broke out in March, causing several days of very little school. Calmer heads tried to keep the situation "cool", but with great difficulty, classes struggled along. Demands were made of the administration, the school board, the student government, and everyone in general; some changes were made; others seemed impossible to effect.

In spite of constant tension, many activities continued. Lit clubs met rather haphazardly, queens were selected, the Echo covered the news, and plans for lit contest moved ahead. Most seniors began to look forward to "getting out of the mess". With frequent fights in the halls and classrooms, as well as on the way to and from school, additional security guards were hired to patrol the building and grounds.

Many hoped that the creation of a new eleven member board of education would help the situation; However, even though the symptoms and causes of the unrest were recognized and considered, the cure was not so easy to come by. Faculty members, often the target of student resentment, found it more difficult to maintain order in class, and undoubtedly began to count the days until the close of school. Some left before the end of the term.


We, the Eastonian staff, feel that we have at times faced nearly unsurmountable obstacles as we attempted to meet deadlines and maintain quality of production so we could give you, the student body, a yearbook of which you could be proud. Our first failure was in not being able to assemble the '69 supplement; Riots and general confusion prevented this. Then our studio camera was stolen; we lost two weeks of valuable time before it was returned. As we close out the final pages of this, our 1970 Eastonian, we are not sure whether it will be on time. Even though this was to be "our year", it certainly has not been. We can only hope that the rest of the '70's will go more smoothly.

All of us love our school; we shall cherish the memories of our years at East. We shall try to remember the good things that happened, and hope that time will erase memories of the bad ones. To the class of '71 and future senior classes we wish much success, and hope that they will find the way to accomplishment of their goals.




### William T. Ridley-Vice Principal




# Math Proves Helpful





# Girls' Physical Education Improves Grace and Poise









This year we have eight teachers in the field who work along with other staff members in a continuous effort to help these students.



# C.O.E. Pays Off in Money and Grades



Nevertheless, for the career types that find college is not their thing, the C.O.E. class aids in insuring a student a full time job after graduation.









### Montage







this year was, "Soul City U.S.A."



The orchestra, due to lack of size, spent most of the year improving. The orchestra is looking forward to a better season with many new members next year.









The following week, East traveled to Clinton, Mo. only to be shut out by the Cardinals 11-0.








### East 0 Southeast 34









## East 6 Northeast 20








### East 0 Manual 20








#### A Season Builds Firm Foundation for Young Bears



# Junior Varsity Finish Fine with Five Victories




