




# Three business courses offered







# C.O.E. combines work and study

Cooperative Occupational Education (C.O.E.) is a vocational program that provides training to high school students by using business and industry for actual onthe-job training.

This is a full year program for which two units of credit are earned. One unit is received for the work, and one, for class work.

Students must be 16 and have an M average in school. They work from 15 to 30 hours per week and are usually paid at least the minimum wage.

There were two C.O.E. directors this year, Mr. Ray Galler and Mr. Marcellus Hughes. Mr. Galler commented that it was more difficult this year to find jobs for all the students enrolled in C.O.E.


### English offers semester variety



The industrial arts classes combine pre-vocational and general knowledge classes.


Drafting, for instance, could be classified as a pre-vocational class, teaching the student to draw, read and understand plans.


Classes like crafts, wood, and metal teach general knowledge skills like learning to work with materials and to use machines.










## Science instructs about environment






The math lab changed this year. It was moved to a new room and was put under the supervision of Mrs. Nichols instead of student tutors. The assistant was Miss Debbie Smith.



There were several classes offered ranging from auto mechanics to commercial sewing.


At the end of each class a completion certificate was given to the student who maintained a M average and an attendance record of not less than 85%.

Landscape horticulture finished a decade at East this year. The three hour course offered to juniors and seniors is a vocational class which prepares the student for work in a nursery or greenhouse.


Besides many East people, students came from Van Horn and Southeast to be supervised by Mr. Andrew Klapis.


#### French's new


Beginning and advanced Spanish courses were also offered, taught by Mrs. Duran. Also a bilingual course was designed especially for Mexican-American students.

Also, two members, Sharon Graves and Donna Young, were sent to Madison, Wisconsin to attend the Central Region Leadership Conference.







Leundis unlike other clubs began their literary work early in the year.







It was decided at its start that each girl would buy her own uniform. However, the girls started this year off by selling shaker-pennants to raise money for new uniforms for next year.



Mrs. Enyard, who started the group, said students responded more front of others.





To be on the stage crew, students need an M average, good attendance and nothing below a 3 in citizenship.




#### Black awareness

The show was supervised by Mrs. Anderson.




## Reactions vary to assemblies






## Pep Club cheered victory and defeat

At the end of the year the athletes of East were honored by Pep Club at a picnic.


















## Bears have losing season



East did not have any players make the first team, but two players did make the second team. For defense Tyrone Colen; position: tackle; height: 6'; and weight: 280.




## East enters state regionals


Friday, October 11, the cross country team ran in Blue Valley Park in the conference championship.





The Turkey Tournament is a tournament played around Thanksgiving. There were four schools competing in this tournament and again East placed second.






















#### East has poor season






The junior varsity Bears hosted a tournament this year. Four schools competed. Those schools were East, Westport, St. John, and Van Horn.












# Practice pays off for swimmers




Undefeated in their six regular season meets, the East High swim team owed its victorious season to perseverance and hard work, under the coaching of Mr. Tom "Splash" Adams.















## Girls, boys bowl on separate teams



















# Girls track, too!

The girls who went out for track this year, practiced hard after school in the halls before the season actually opened. When the weather cleared, the girls practiced outside.


















# Tennis team attracts more players

This year also saw the beginning of a novice division to help new players gain experience. There was also a novice city championship.



Mr. Heine encouraged parent involvement and cooperation in school activities.




The office ladies took care of attendance, registration, textbooks and school finances.










The security guards helped with operation sweep to keep students out of the halls during class time.








