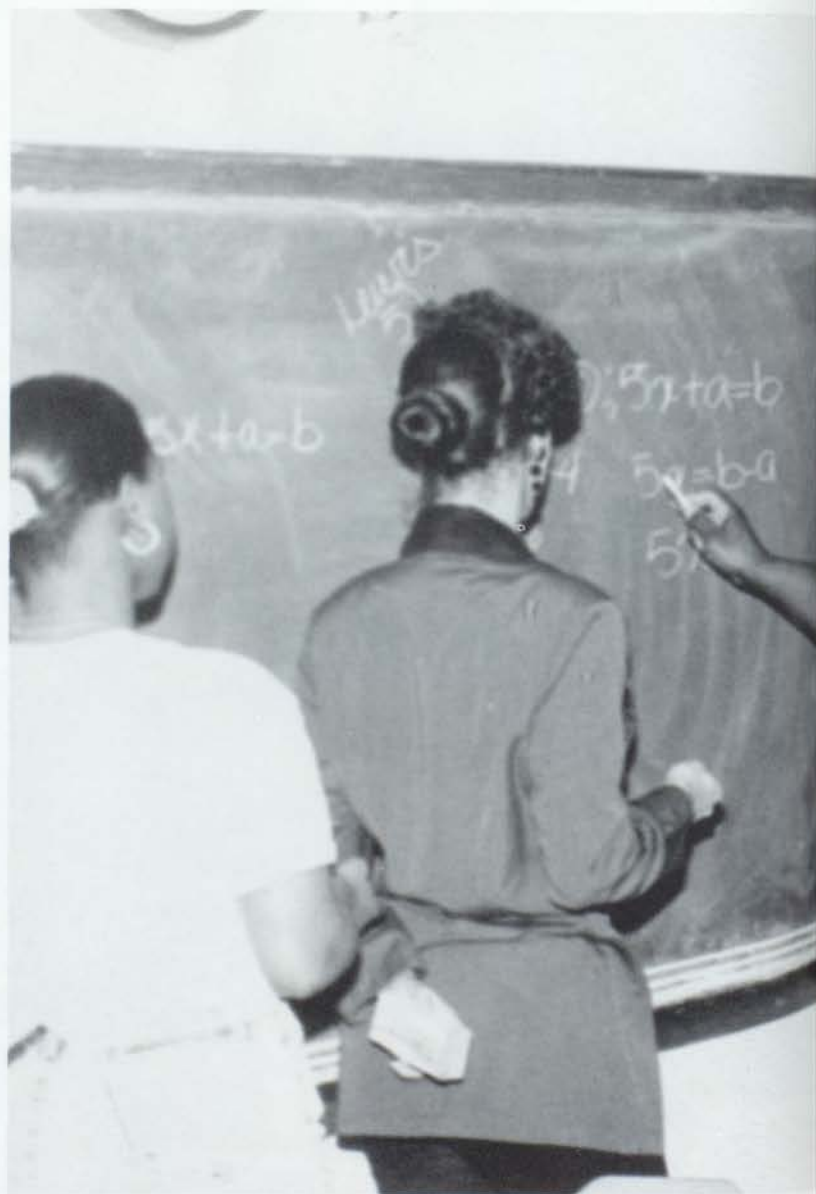

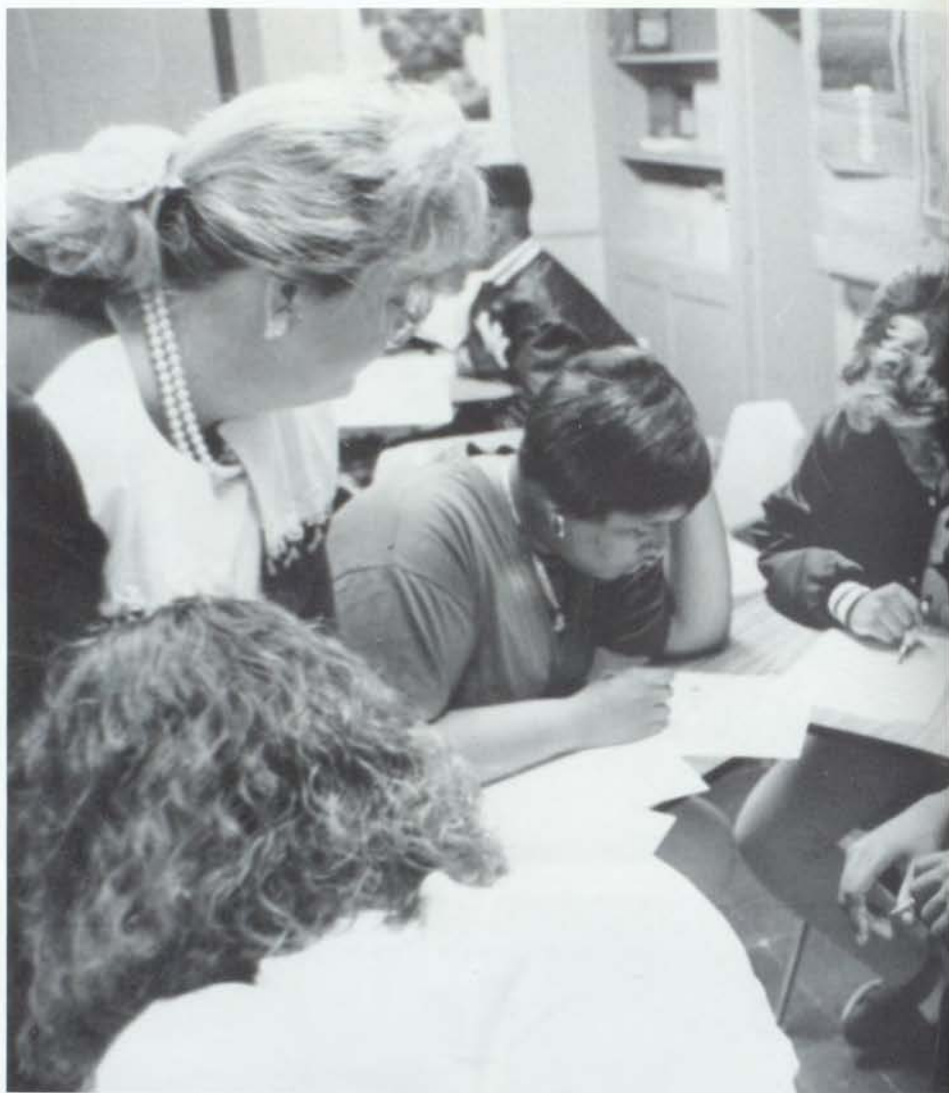


English

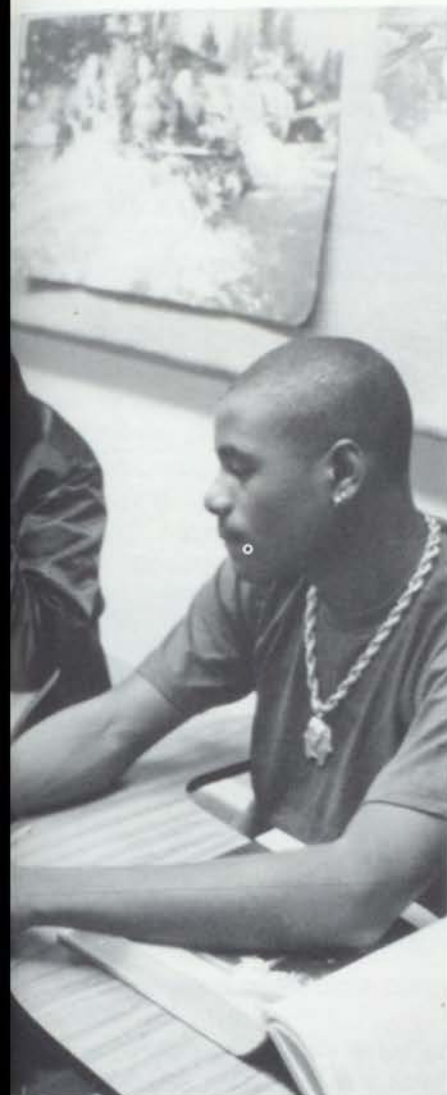
The goal of the English department is to encourage students to read, and bring up their test scores. The students will read the required readings, and they will also work on all the new materials that have been provided for them.

What's going on in the science classes at East High School?

Experiments, demonstrations, field trips, and changes to make our Environmental, and Ecology classes more interesting and challenging. In one Environmental Science class, students are progressing from studying Ecology to the pollutants that affect today's society. Mr. G, allows students extra credit by reporting environmental issues found in newspapers and on television so they will keep up with environmental problems. In Ecology classes, students are learning the basic principles

such as limiting factor, energy flow, cycling, nutrient cycling, and succession. They also studied life zones of the world. One project that the Ecology classes did was make a huge map of life zones. All science classes are stressing the issue about the environment.

New Labs Take Shape



Students attending East will quickly notice the numerous new science labs. There are 12 new labs under construction. Two have been completed and students are impressed with the quality of the equipment and furnishings. Each lab when finished and completely furnished will cost about \$100,000. East students will have science labs that are equal to some college facilities.

There are 8 Environmental Science labs, these would be used by Biology, Earth Science, Ecology, and Chemistry. A new Horticulture lab, a Food Processing lab, an Animal Care lab, and a Agriculture machine shop will complete the totscience improvements at East. Each lab will have full safety measures for students.

Recycle This - Nowlin Middle School

In September of 1990, Nowlin Middle School put on a program sponsored by Dow Chemical Company. Their main emphasis was recycling plastics, paper, and aluminum. Dow Chemical Company hired professional actors and dancers for the recycling program. This program was a good way to start out the year at East High School, as far as helping students understand about trash and the overcrowded landfills where their trash is thrown and what they can do to help this. This program was also essential to East High School because we have a recycling program and recycling bins and can dispensers set up to recycle their own cans at school with the facilities in the classrooms, the library, and the cafeteria, and designated areas that make it easy and convenient for students.



Trash Jeopardy

One part of the program included a game. The object of the game was to have the least amount of trash in their bin. The way to play the game was to have a question about the environment. The two bins

that didn't have the answer first, got trash dumped on them. One of the questions asked was: What type of trash is most economical to recycle? Answer: Aluminum.

students recycling their paper by having them mark off the front side after they have received credit for the first assignment, and then do an additional assignment. "This uses half as much paper for two assignments."

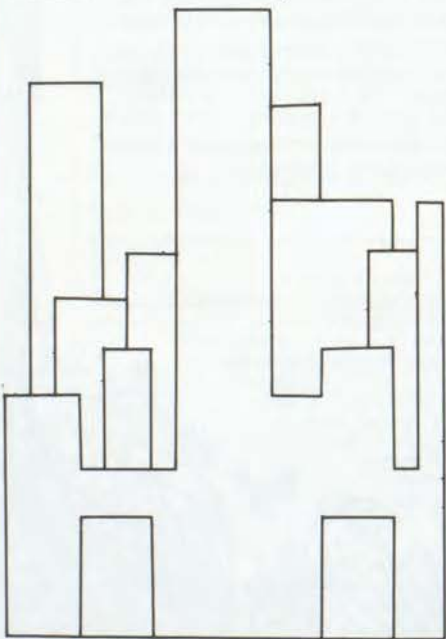

Phys. Science

The Physical Science classes are moving up. With all of the new equipment and labs, they are able to do lots of exciting and interesting experiments. The class will definitely be more fun than it was in the past and much more educational. Mr. Neal has been teaching Physical Science at East for over 20 years.

Sociology and the Environment

This course analyzes the institutions of societies. The class studies effects of the environment of the structure and the evolution of society. Students are more able to understand their role in structures within society and how the various subcultures work together, and independently, within society as a whole. This course teaches the understandings of the institutions of society as a whole so that students can better understand their various roles and their expectations. Students are able to apply sociology concepts to problems they face with everyday activities. This course is one of the advanced science classes offered only to Juniors and Seniors.

A Year To Remember

The 1990-1991 school year will always be a year to remember. Not only did East High School change to Environmental Science Magnet, the United States went to war in the Middle East. The war has been a danger to the environment that East High School is trying to save. There were numerous bombings of oil refineries and lines that have polluted the air. The exhaust from all the aircrafts greatly affected the air also. There were millions of gallons of oil spilled into the Persian Gulf. The spill amounted to about a dozen times the 11 million gallons that the Exxon Valdez tanker leaked into Alaska's Prince William Sound in 1989. The spill destroyed living things in the water. The crises, called "environmental terrorism," has been a disaster.

Biology

Mr. Lemons and Mrs. Merriweather are the professors of this course and are very experienced in this field of study. Biology is the main branch of Science dealing with all living things. Opposed to Physical Science, they are totally opposite because Physical Science deals with non-living things.

The Biology classes are being taught about the living things in the environment, their functions, and their danger due to the shape of the environment. The classes are shaping up now that we have more equipment to help teach the students about living things and the way of life.



Law and the Environment

This course acquaints students with general background of governmental procedures relating to law making with emphasis in the area of civil and criminal law. This course also provides some survival skills and awareness of individual rights and responsibilities. The class also seeks to dis-

cover laws that relate to pollution and other environmental issues and try to determine if such laws were actually being taken care of. The class teaches students to understand the role of the government and the law in current environmental issues. This class is an advanced science class for Juniors and Seniors.



Environmental Issues

The Environmental Issues class, taught by Mr. Simms, focuses on local, state, national, and international issues. The class examines the environmental issues from political, social, and legal perspectives. Students compare the differences in past handlings of environmental issues, and how these issues are dealt with today. Students are introduced not only with the scientific aspects of the environment, but with the social and political aspects as well. The environmental issues course is designed to enhance the students' awareness on current environmental issues. Students feel it's important to be aware of these changes in such an important place and time.

World Geography and the Environment

World geography and the environment is a course that is taught with an emphasis on environmental changes and problems. Technological and agricultural changes are examined in this course. The course provides and in-depth study of geography and current

environmental issues. Students will understand that environmental problems are global in nature. World geography and the environment is an advanced science class that is only offered to Juniors and Seniors.

Chemistry



Expansion! Due to new materials, and equipment, students are able to be more involved in numerous chemical experiments. Miss Lewis, the teacher for this course, is responsible for educating students in three areas: Conceptual Chemistry, which focuses on Chemistry in your everyday life; General Chemistry, which prepares students for college; and also Advanced Chemis-

try, which offers an in-depth study of the subject. If laboratory sciences interest you, chemistry is your subject. Junior Teasha Thomas encourages students to sign up for the course, she says, "it may sound tough, but it's actually general knowledge, that has chemistry facts added to it to give it diversity. It's really a lot of fun!"

Project Wild

In October, the teachers held a project. It was put on by the staff and administrators at East High School. The purpose of the project was to help teachers better understand about the wild and what is it like to live in the wilderness. One of the events that took place was to have the teachers pretend to be bears in the wilderness. They had cut pieces of paper to represent food. Some teachers had to pretend



to be injured or hurt bears. The teachers had to scurry around and look for food, just like bears have to do in the wilderness. The project made teachers aware of the fact that it's hard to live in the wilderness.

The goal of Project Wild is to assist learners of any age in developing awareness, knowledge, skills and commitment to result in informed decisions, responsible behavior, and constructive actions concerning wildlife and the environment upon which all life depends.

Botany and Microbiology

In Botany, the class focused on the structure, function, and ecology of land plants. Mr. Coen, the teacher for Botany, teaches in a hands on effort so that the students

actually have a feel for their subject matter. The course consists of mostly junior, and a few seniors. The second semester is microbiology, and this course teaches students the basic techniques of microscopy, and an indepth description of what a microscope can do, and how it can be done. The students find this class to be a little more challenging, but are giving it a valiant effort at success.



Meteorology/ Oceanography

Meteorology students study weather conditions, and how they change. As the teacher, Mr. Hubert shows students how weather affects us and our surroundings. The oceanography class studies the environment of the ocean, and the ocean habitants. To further their studies, the class took trips to St. Louis to the Missouri Botanical Gardens,

and to Florida to visit Sea World, and the ocean.



Geology and Astronomy



The Geology course is an in-depth exploration of those things learned in Earth Science. The teacher is Mrs. Samples, who is also a resource teacher. In the class, the students did a very neat activity on the computer. They formed types of land and printed it on paper. Then they colored it, and modeled it to look like land. Then, they made it into a 3-dimensional mod-

el. This science class is an advanced course and is only offered to Juniors and Seniors. The astronomy class, also taught by Mrs. Samples, is the study of things beyond the earth. The class takes monthly trips to the planetarium as part of their regular classwork. This is also an advanced science class offered only to Juniors and Seniors.



Clubs



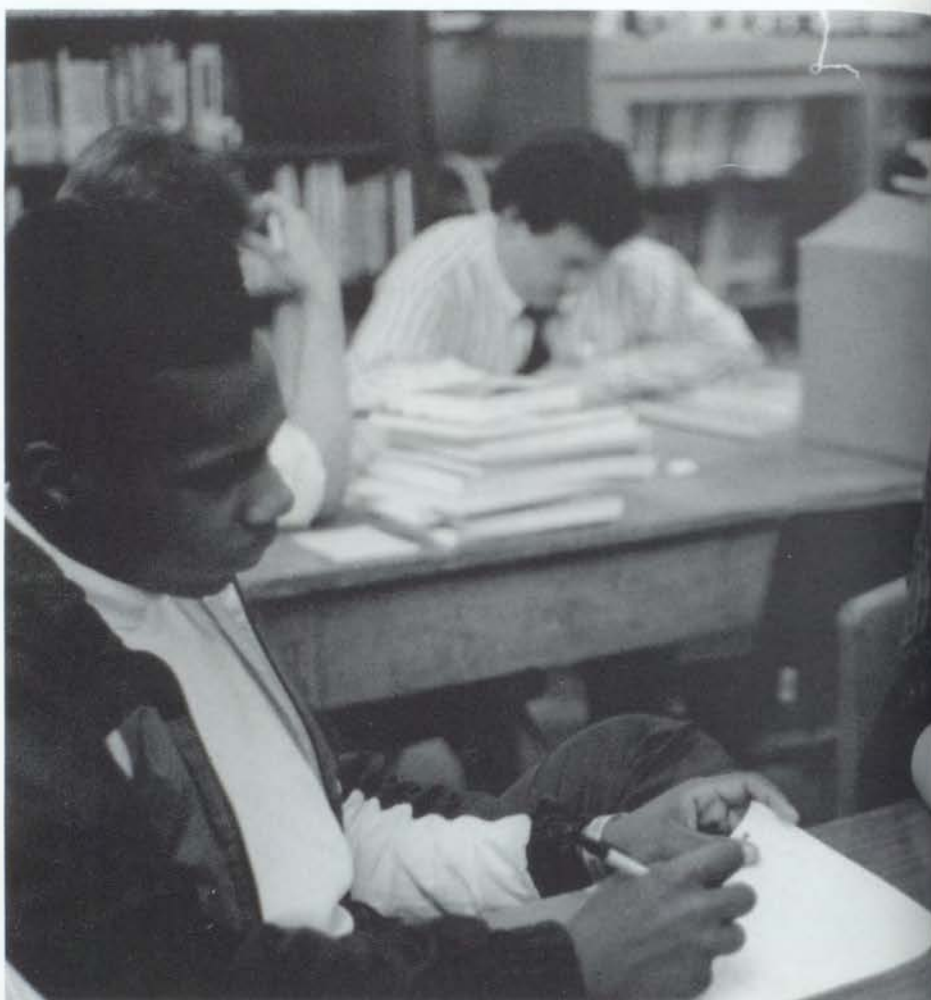

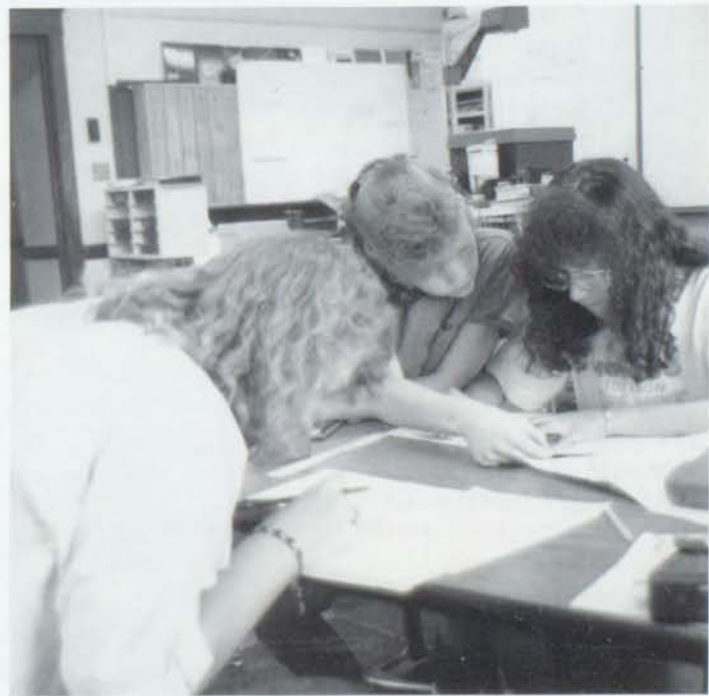

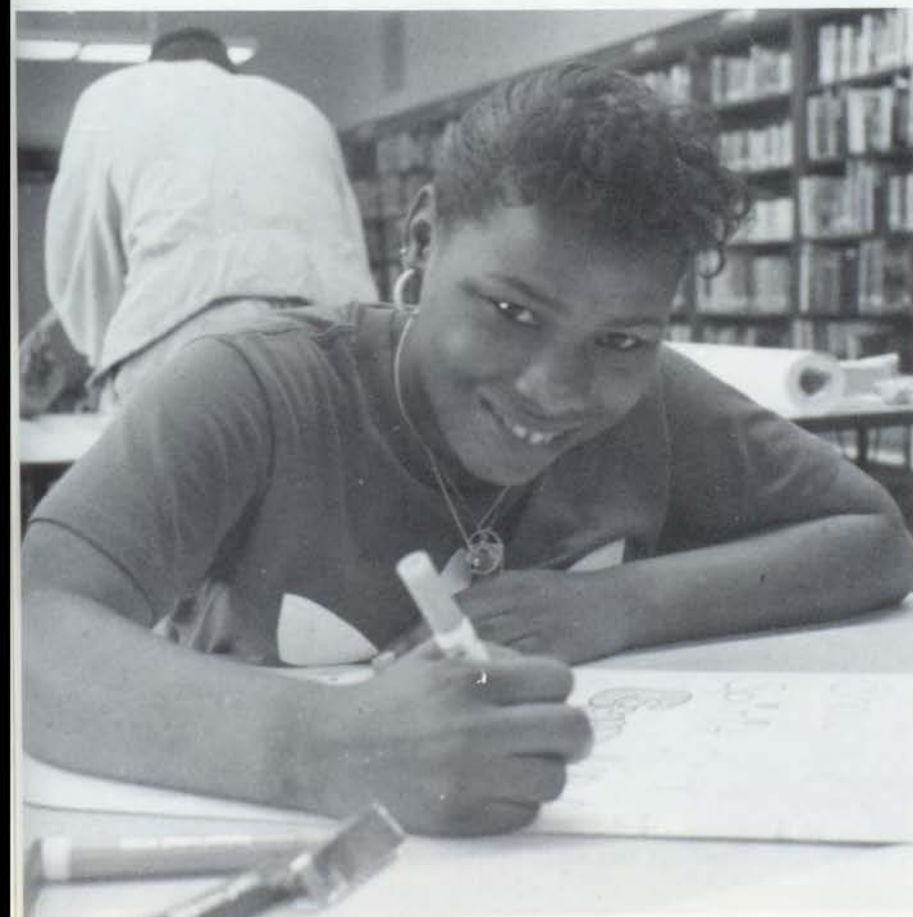
