We all appreciate his dedication and concern for the betterment of our school.







This year the Spirit took on new dimensions, as it was changed from a six-page newspaper format to a 12-page magazine.


1975-76 also marked the the addition of a page featuring student body reaction (Feedback) as well as a regular column written by various school leaders (Insights).

Heading the staff was Eric Fawks, editor in chief; Randy Weinstein, co-editor.









DECA and VICA are the cooperative work/study programs within the school curriculum. Both help teach the skills of, and involve students intensively in the business world.


DECA's program requires students to take three to four hours of classes a day, and then leave for their respective jobs.

VICA students follow a similar program, but their jobs involve vocational work.


In both cases, students are given an opportunity to seek out their personal interests and realize their own capabilities.

Members of the Chess Club numbered about ten this year. Sponsor of the club is Mr. Le Hedstrom, social studies instructor at GHS.





Next year looks good for the team with several returning varsity runners.










Determined girls carry through season




Close games see victory and defeat

Talent on the team started with 6'8", All-Metro center, Tom DeMaio.




Grapplers finish irregular record


Desire overrides team's lack of depth





Coach Smith went on to say that participating in an extracurricular activity is a privilige but that selfdiscipline and personal sacrifices are important aspects of involvement.




