## August 28, 1972, Marks Opening of HMHS

The history of Hickman Mills High School had its beginnings in 1902, when the growing community of Hickman Mills constructed Ruskin in the area of Edwin Hickman's old grain mill. The Board of Education made two purchases of land in 1958 and 1966 totaling 66 acres near the old Santa Fe Trail, as a future High School site. In 1967, the school received its name and Mr. Douglas Lawrence was appointed its planning principal.


Actual construction began in

September, 1968, when a contract was awarded for the first phase of building. Construction was financed by bonds and special building levies voted by the patrons of the district.

Beginning in the fall of 1970, finished portions of the building were occupied by the students of Santa Fe Elementary School. During the fall of 1972, the elementary students were gradually phased out of the high school classrooms as the elementary school neared completion.



# New Ideas, Innovations In New High School

When school convened at Hickman Mills High School for the first time, students were introduced to 44 classrooms, a cafeteria, media center, and instructional center. Each different department was grouped and specialized according to its needs.


Apart from the classrooms, there were several "special features" which Hickman Mills High possessed. One such feature was the Foreign Language Lab equipment which could be moved from room to room. A 225-seat Instructional Center was used either for activities by the speech and drama classes or for lectures to large groups by various speakers. Another attractive


feature was the Media Center. Besides 7100 books, the Media Center contained areas designed for both private study in carrels and for small group study in conference rooms.

The story of Hickman Mills High School is not complete—indeed, it is only beginning. It will become a full senior high school in 1973 with the addition of seniors. Its first graduation exercises will be held in the spring of 1974.

Other features such as a new academic wing, auditorium, and swimming pool are still in the planning stages. With the addition of these features, Hickman Mills High will become one of the largest and most modern high schools in Missouri.






## Chess Club Makes Its Move




## Cougars Have PRIDE


# HM Marches to the Beat Of a Different Drum










# Grappling Chanters


## Another Victory




#### To Celebrate St. Pat's





### And to Lose

The team was at a slight disadvantage as many of the stronger sophomore players were used on the varsity team. The overall team record was 1-6-1.





### JV Battles for an 11-10 Season






### Begins
