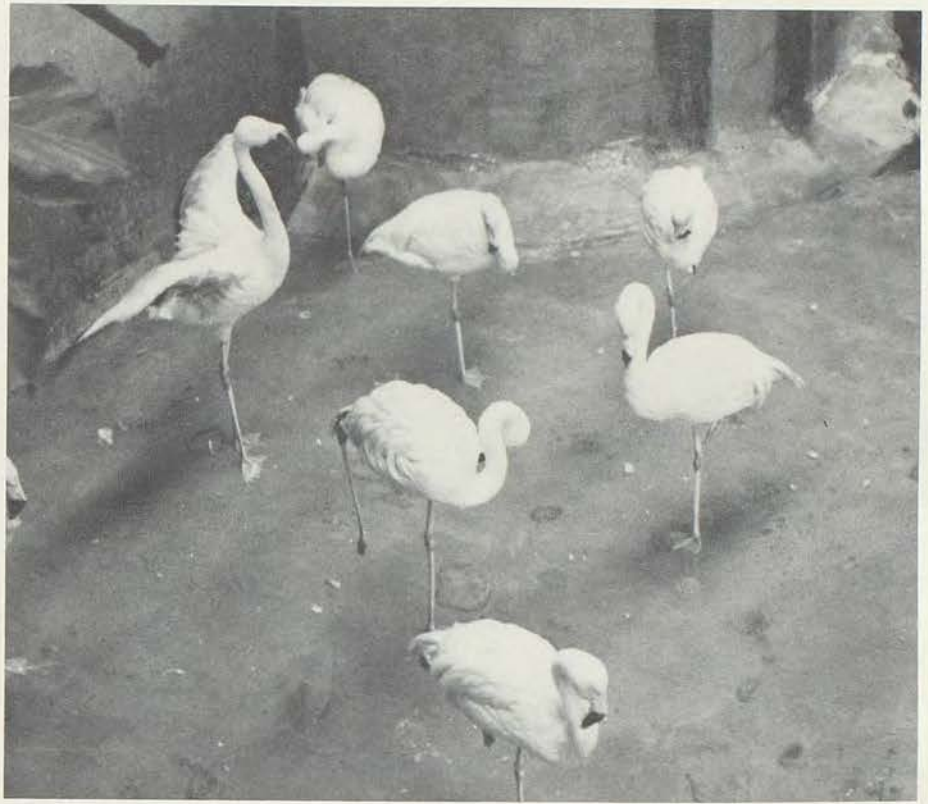


Weekends Are A Spice Of Life

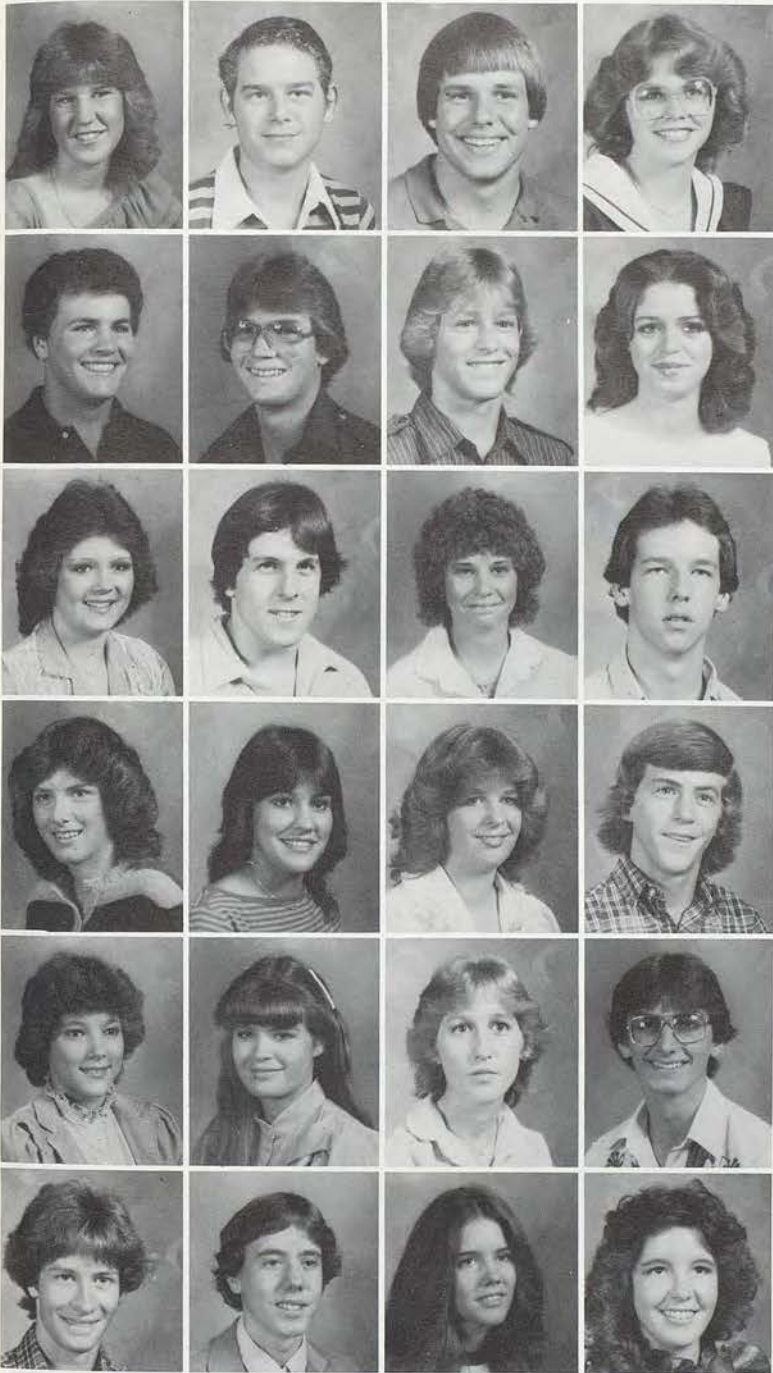
On the Upbeat

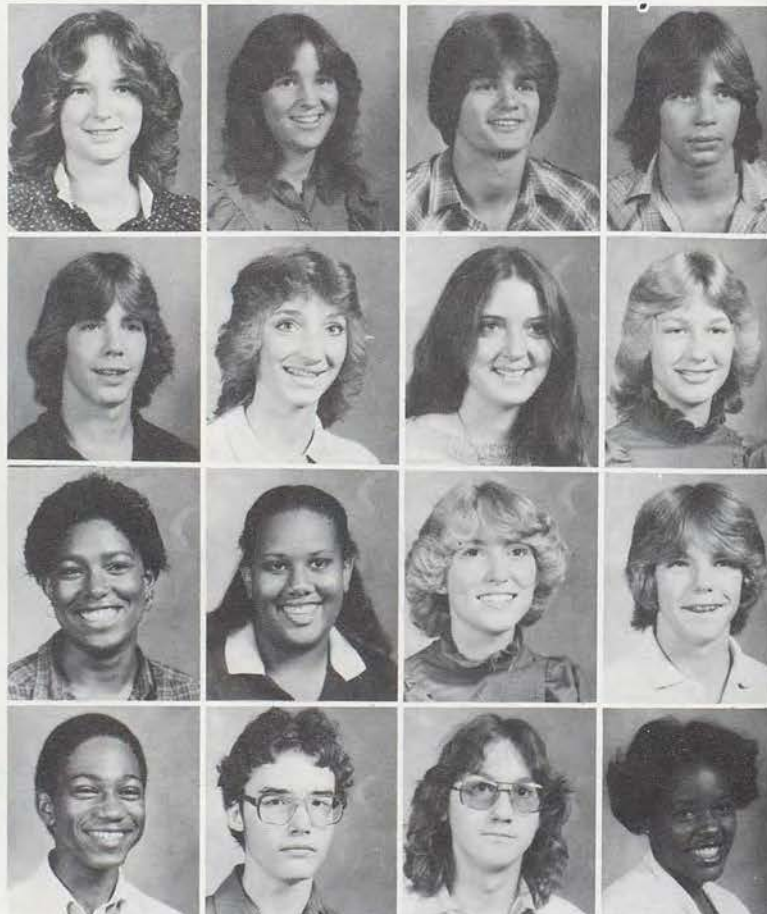
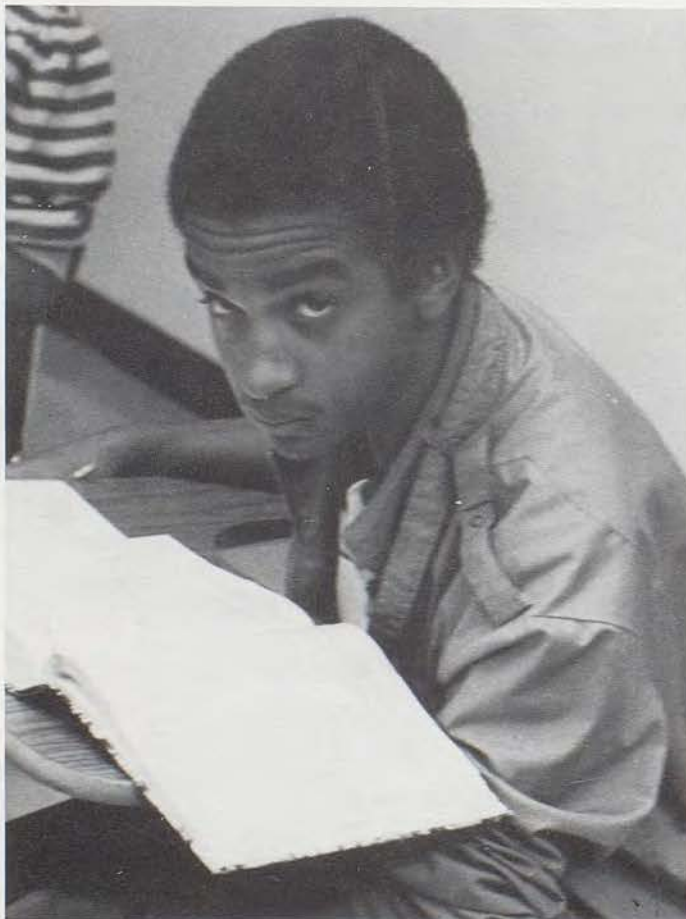
Annual Sale Brings Many Rewards

"E.T." was a great movie for all ages. At times you wanted to laugh, and at times you wanted to cry. It was a very touching show." Kim Linville, 9.

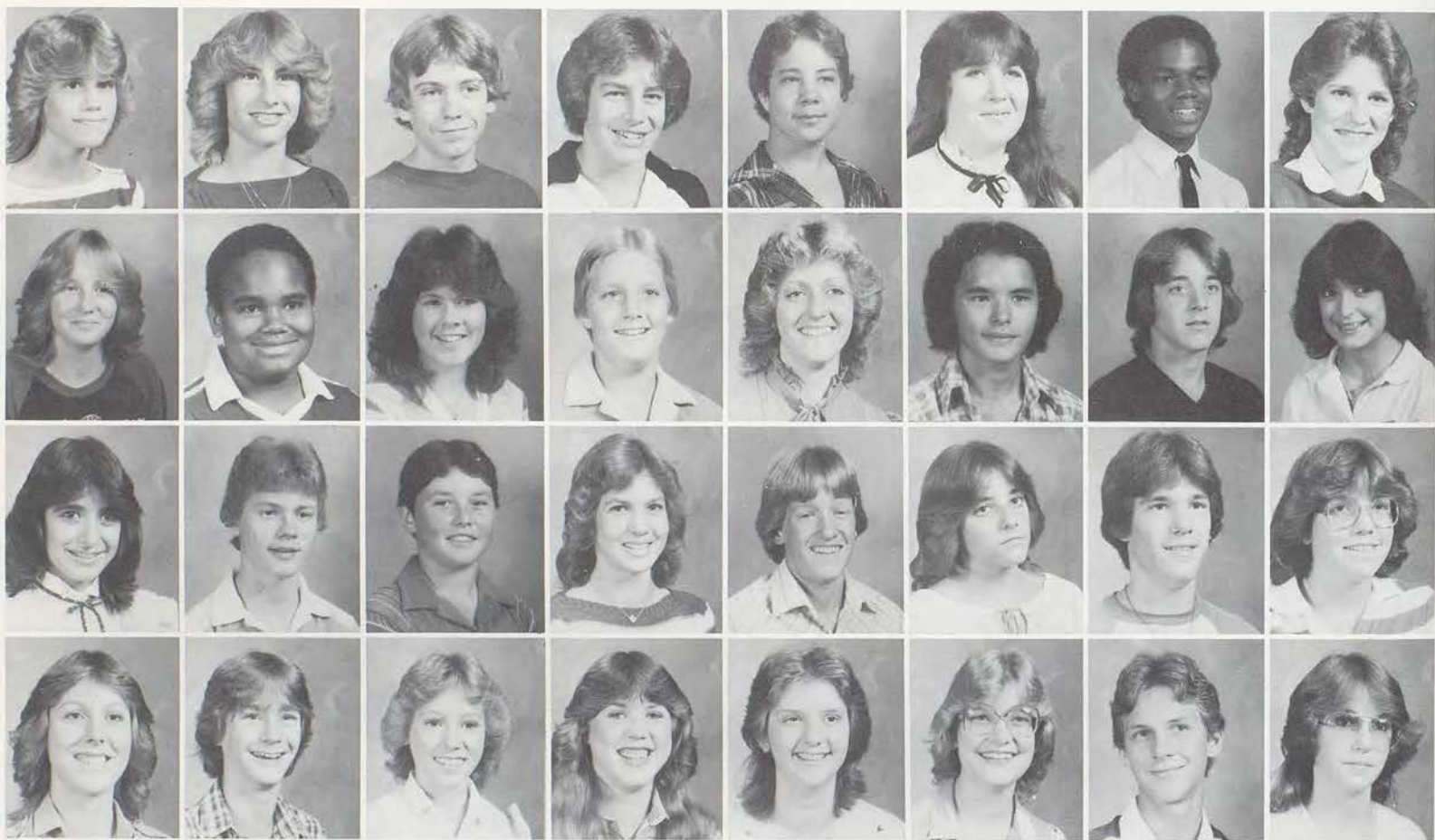

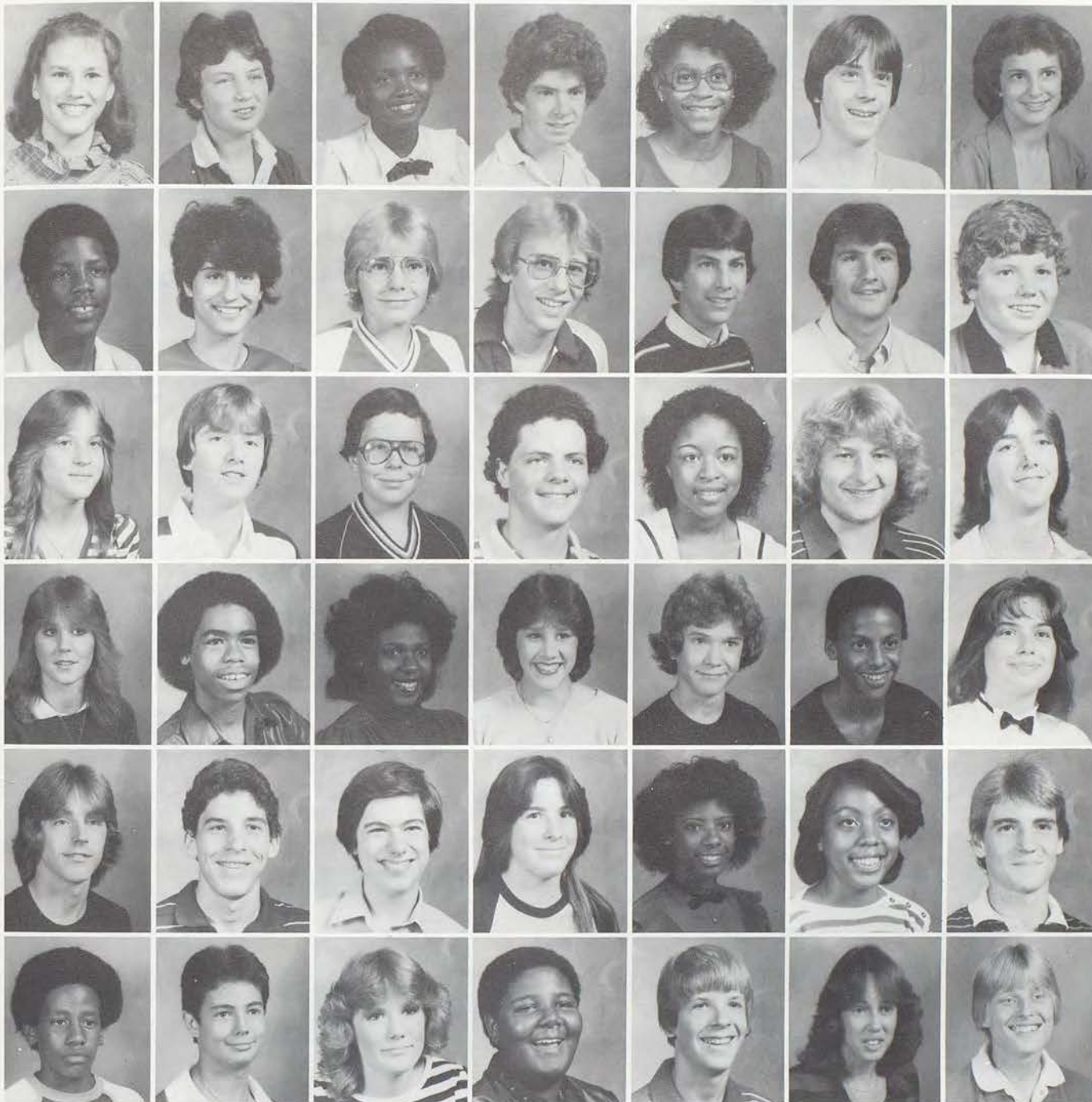

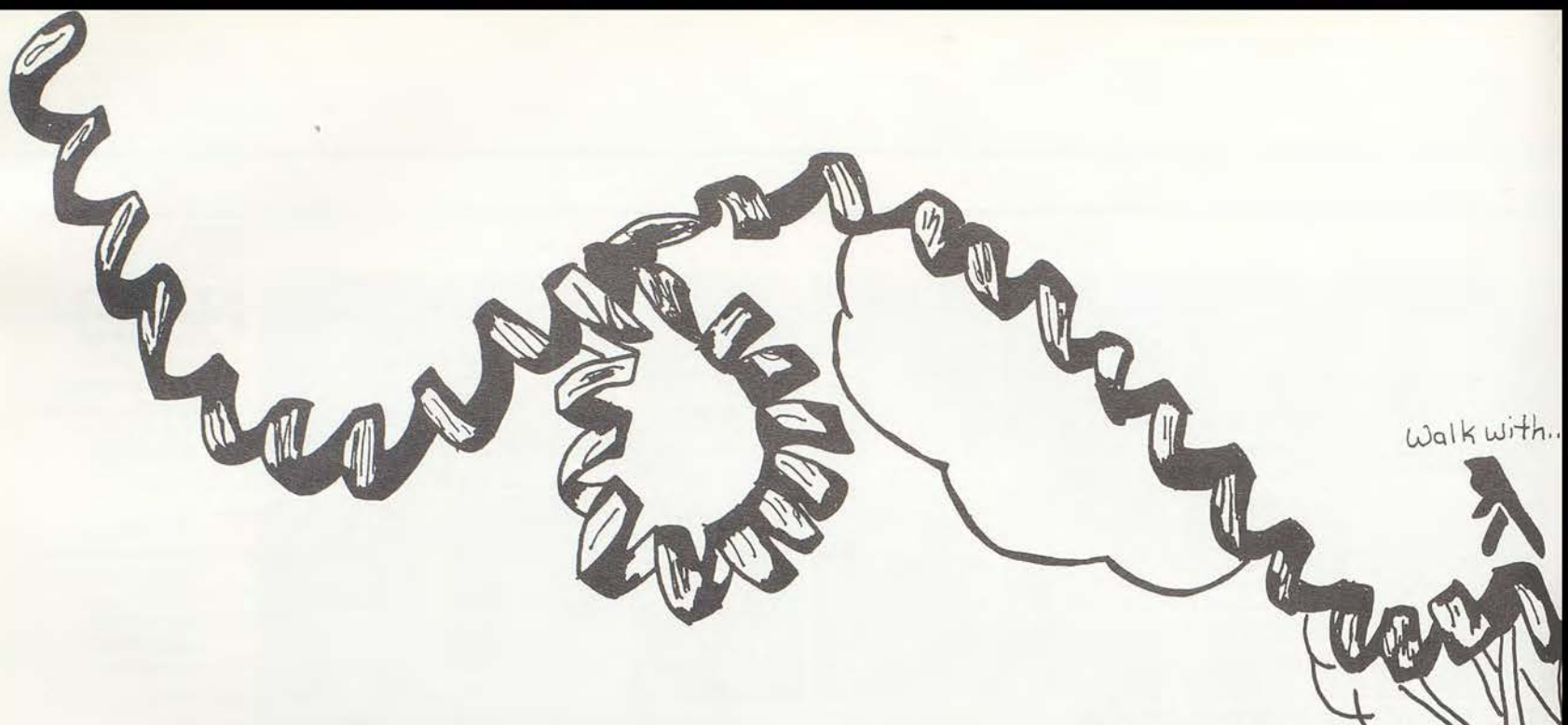

Mr. Lawrence was the senior class sponsor and spent most of his time working with the senior class officers. He was also busy in planning for graduation among his many other administrative duties.

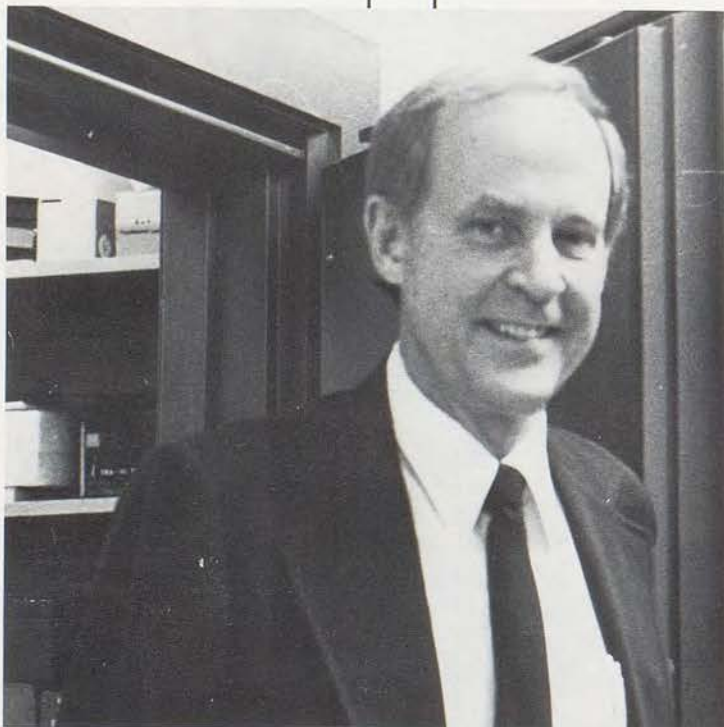
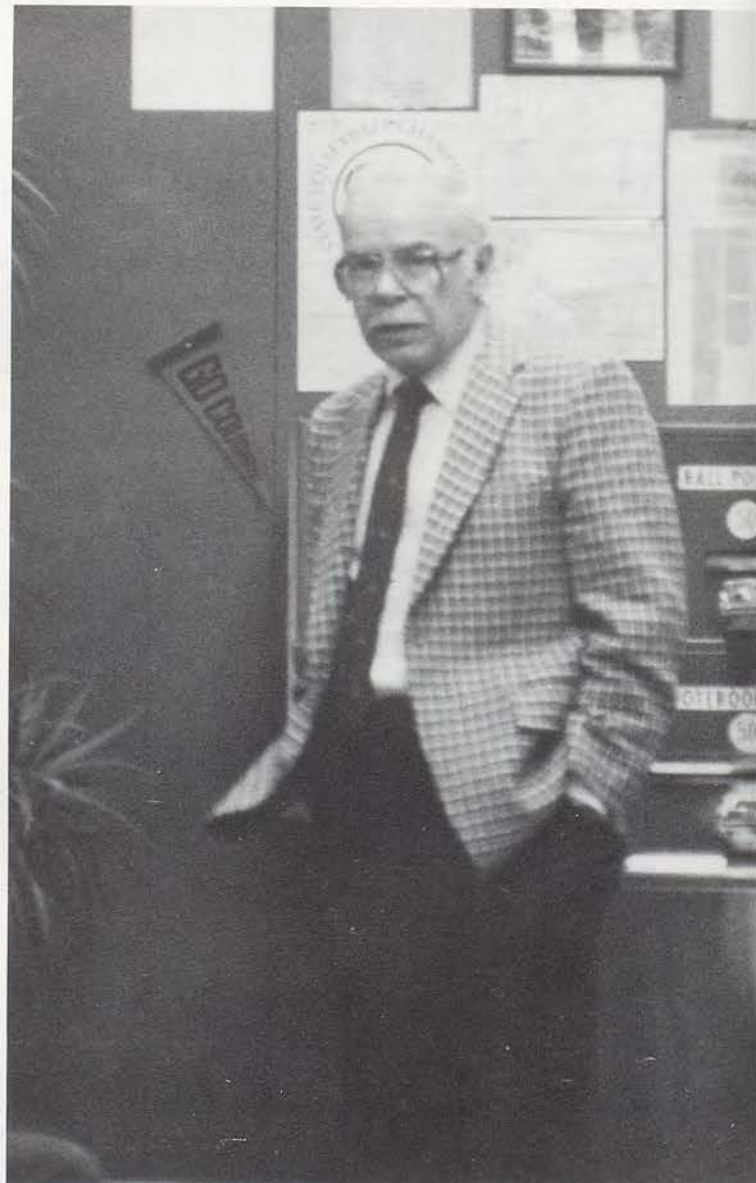

Each one loves her job and wouldn't trade it for more excitement. Working here at Hickman gave them a chance to meet teenagers and adults alike.



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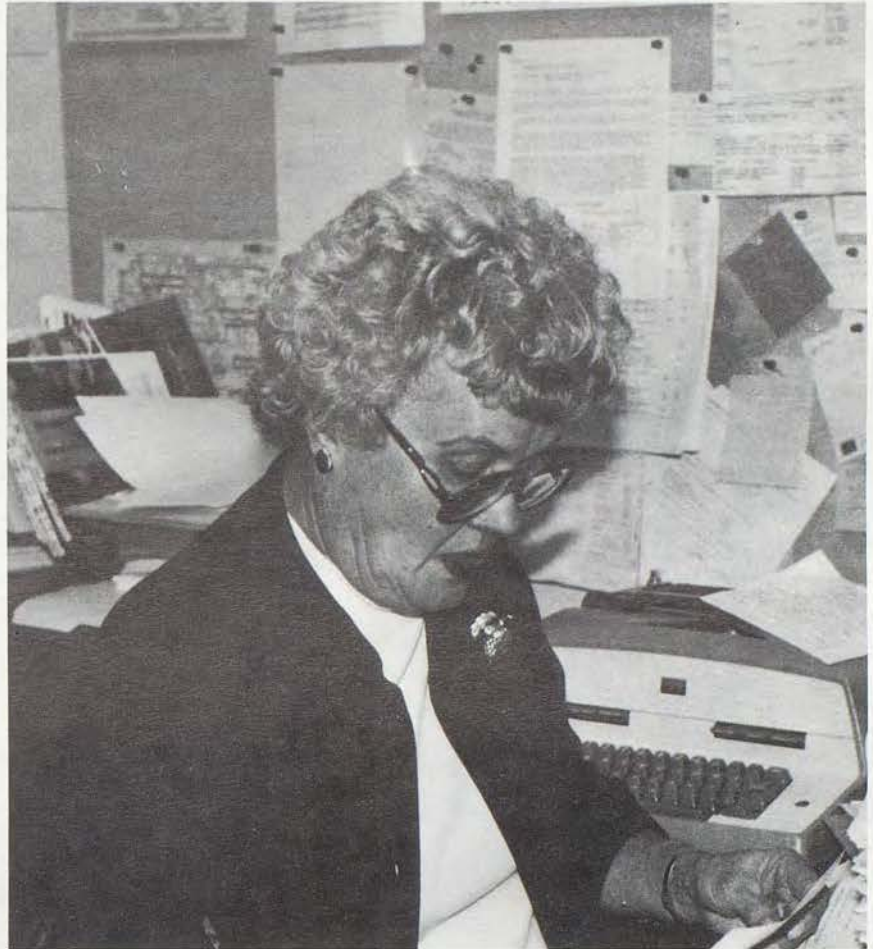
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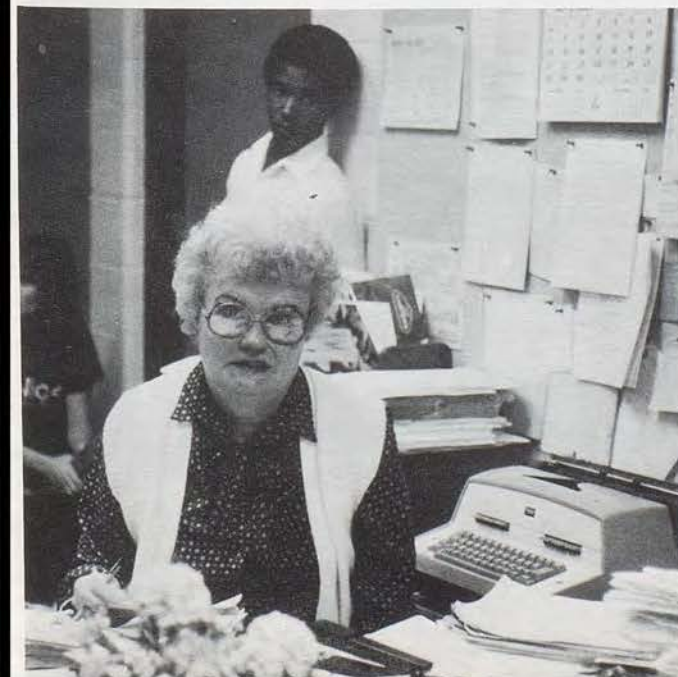
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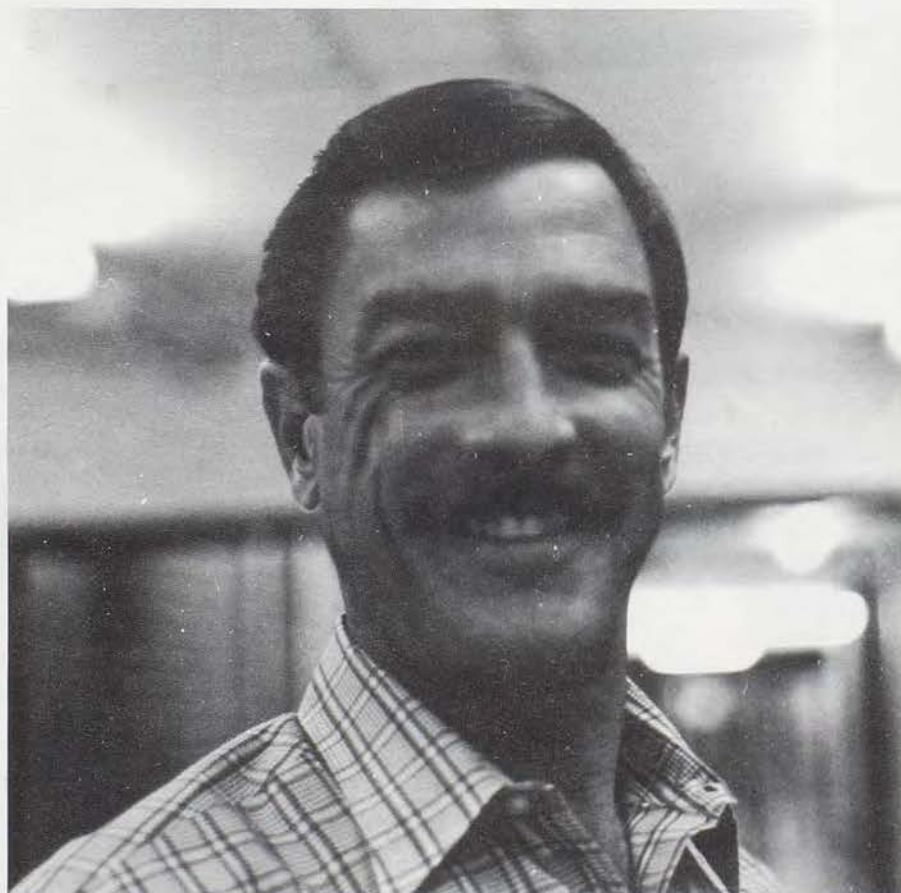

Counselors Fulfill Many Student Needs

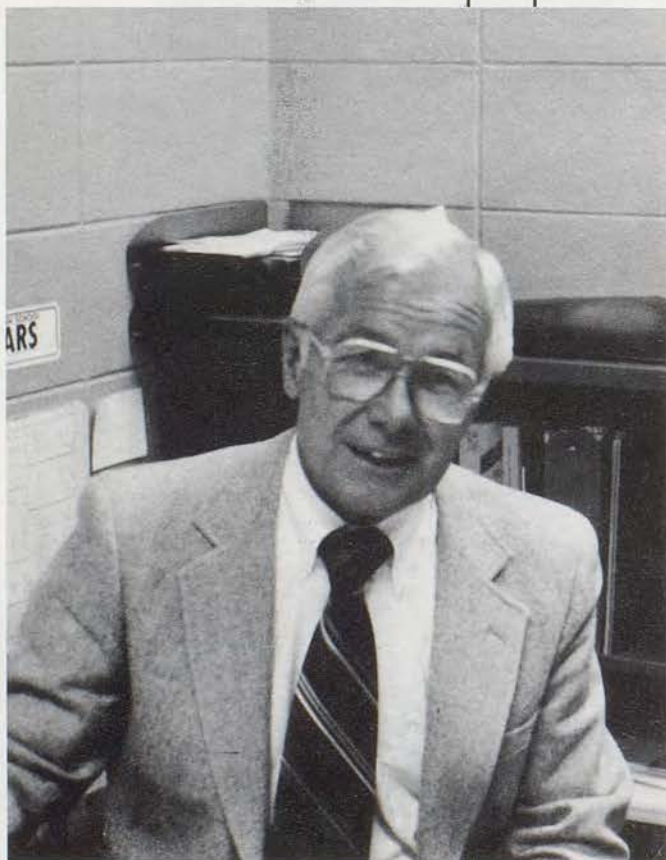
Counselors helped students this year advising them about numerous concerns: careers, college, grades, jobs, personal relationships and many others.

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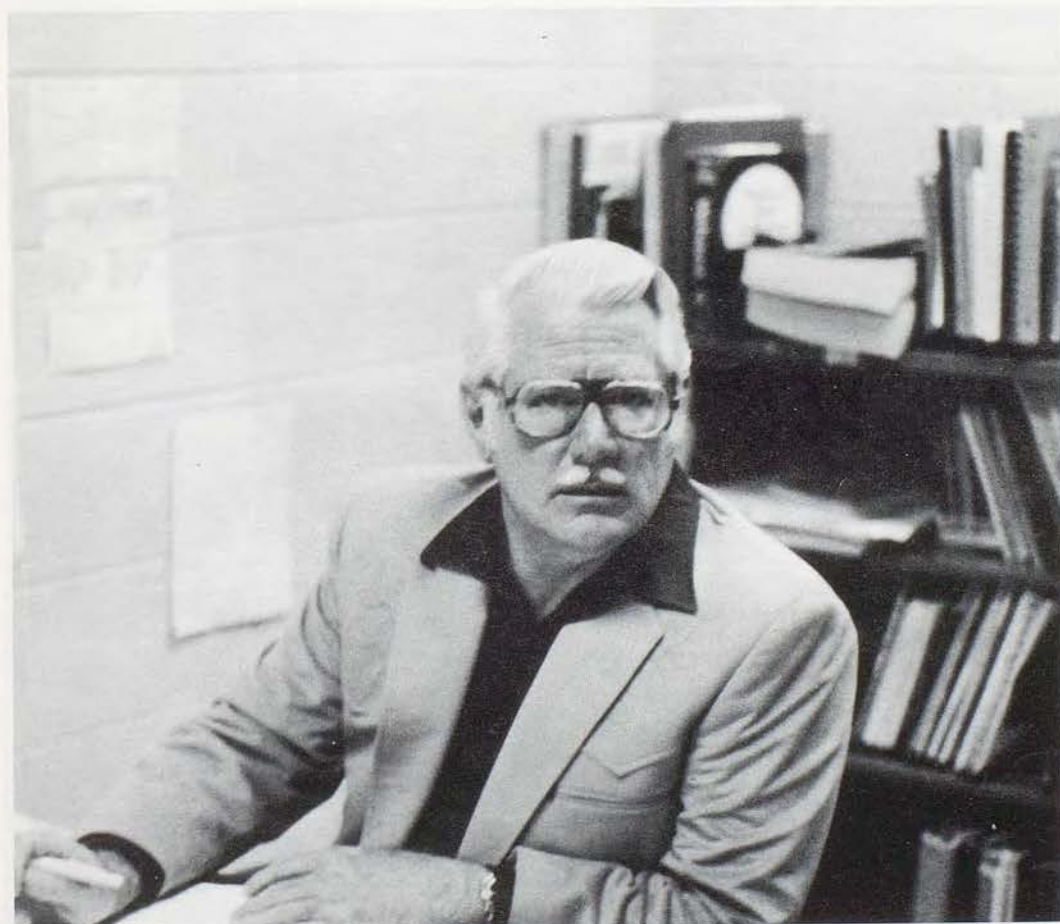

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Cooks and Custodians Make School a Better Place

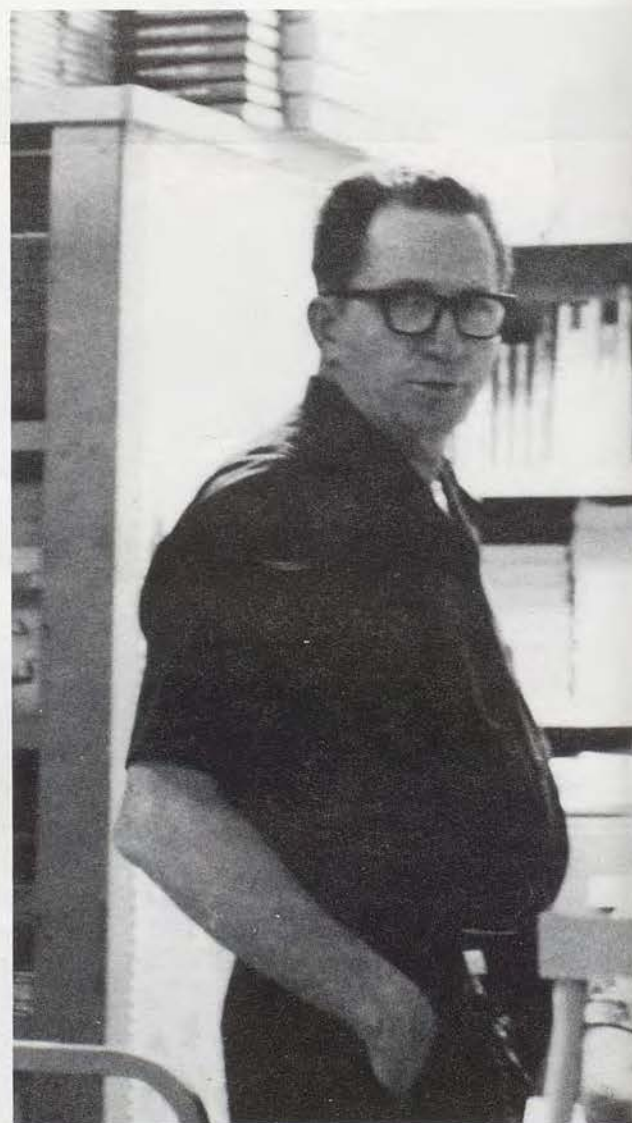

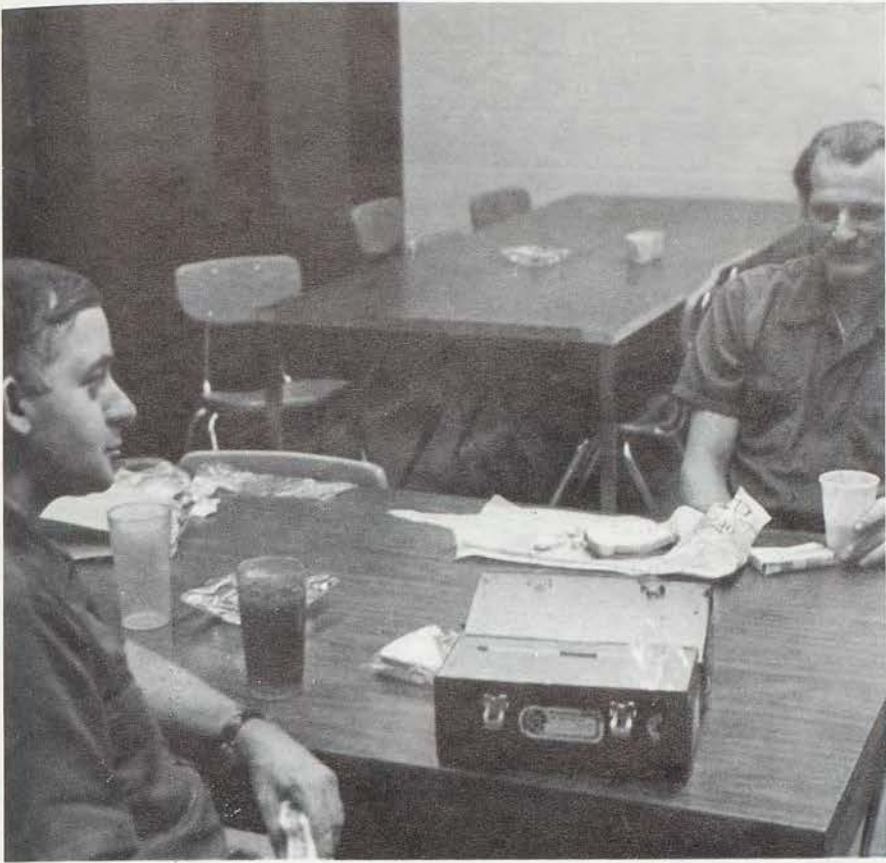
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Library Provides Information

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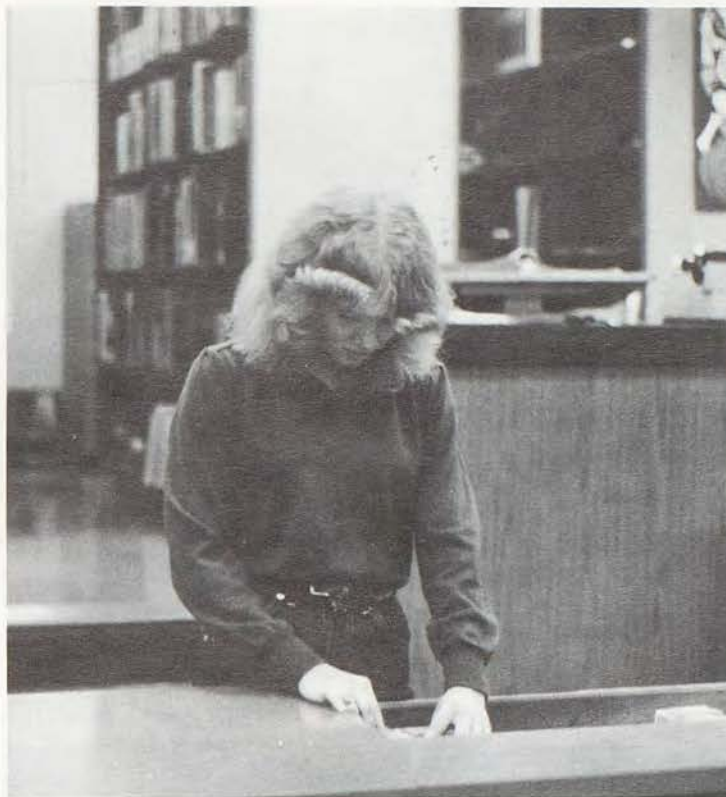
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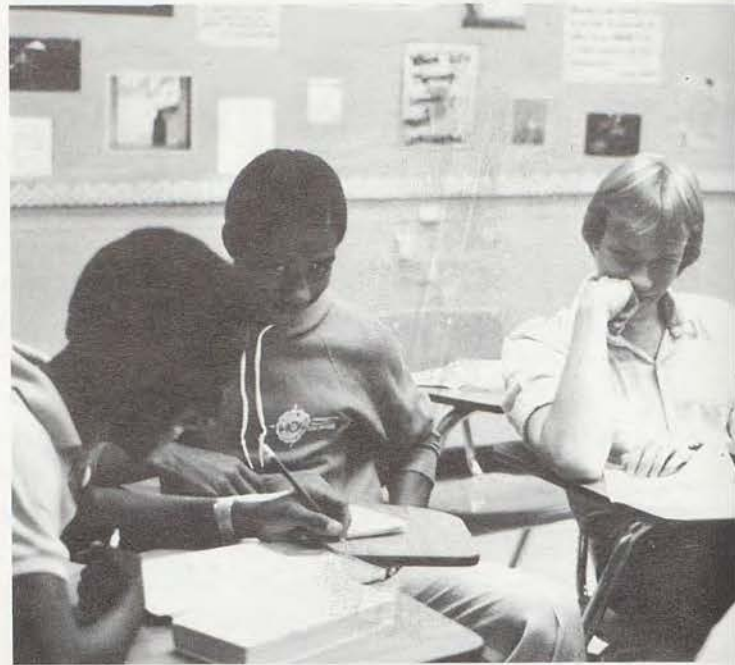

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Communication — Our Way of Living

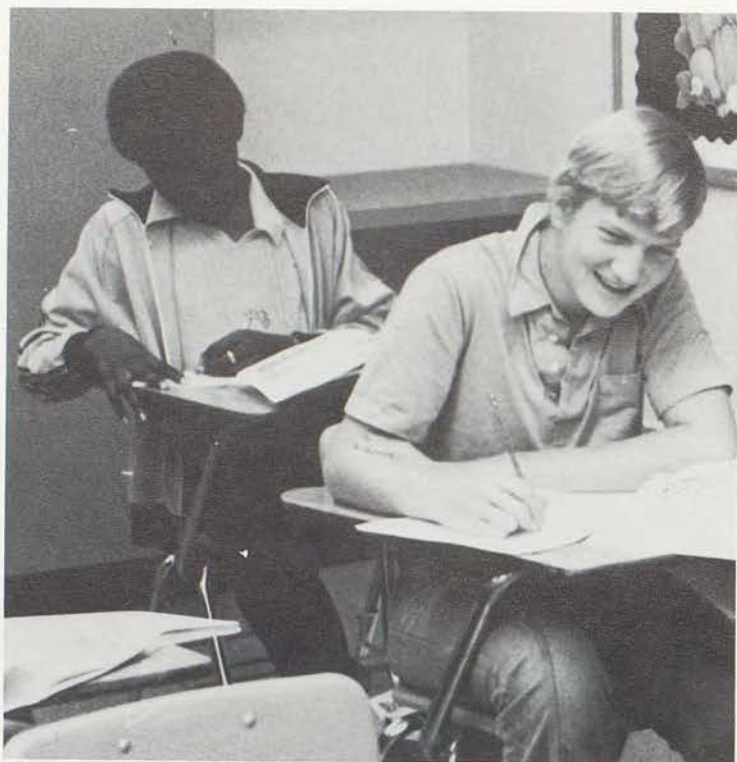

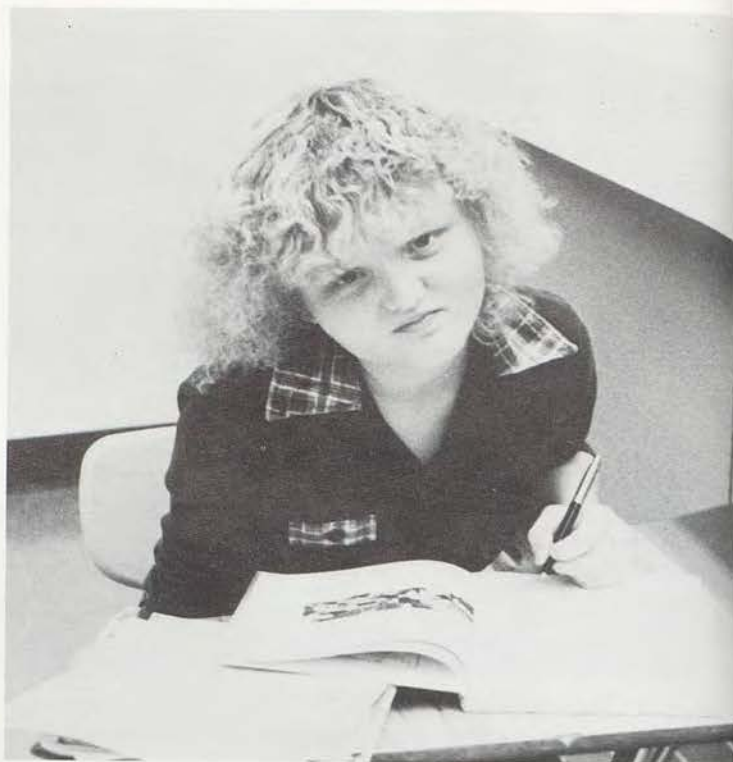
The students should learn confidence and ease in both public and one-to-one speaking situations.

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Service With a Smile

Special service classes were designed to meet the special needs of students who had difficulty in social, academic, and/or behavioral adjustments.

Programs for the visually impaired were also made available with the use of special material ranging from large print books, to books on tape.

The functional education classes consisted of a variety of math courses, language arts, and vocational study.

The program was primarily designed to meet the individual needs of the student. A student might have worked in the program as little as 10% of the time for support in regular class. On the other end of the spectrum another student may have worked 100% as a total academic program. The basis for all programs was independent living and successful vocational placement.



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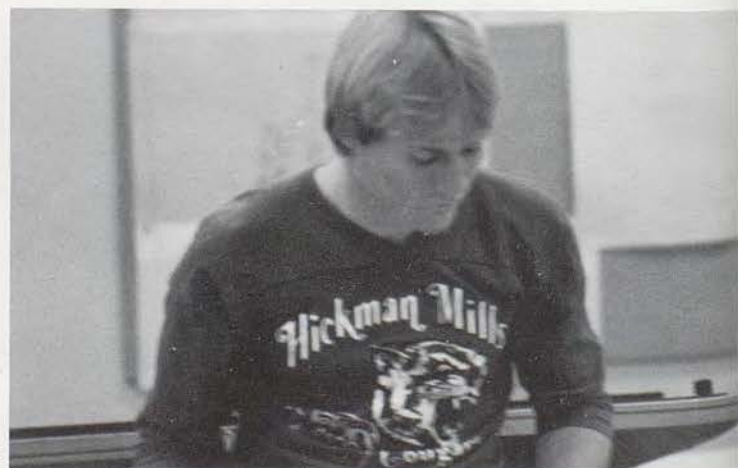

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Vo-Tech Explores New Opportunities in Business

Hickman Mills has been active in the Joe Herndon Area Vocational-Technical School for the past nine years. Hickman is one of nine area schools that participate in this program. Of the 650 students enrolled at Vo-Tech, Hickman Mills had 75 students in attendance.

In this program, the students learn marketable skills for lifetime careers. After graduation, a placement plan is set up for seniors to locate jobs which they may obtain and further their skills. And the students aren't forgotten after graduation, since the Vo-Tech school has a 120 day — 3 yr. and 5 yr. follow-up study to keep in touch with each individual to see how successful they have become in their respective careers.

The students gain both knowledge and skill from this kind of training. Vo-Tech is a quite expensive program because of the equipment needed. Each student who attended Vo-Tech developed a skill, but they shouldn't have been the only ones to gain a skill. Every high school graduate should have obtained a skill which would be helpful in the world of work.



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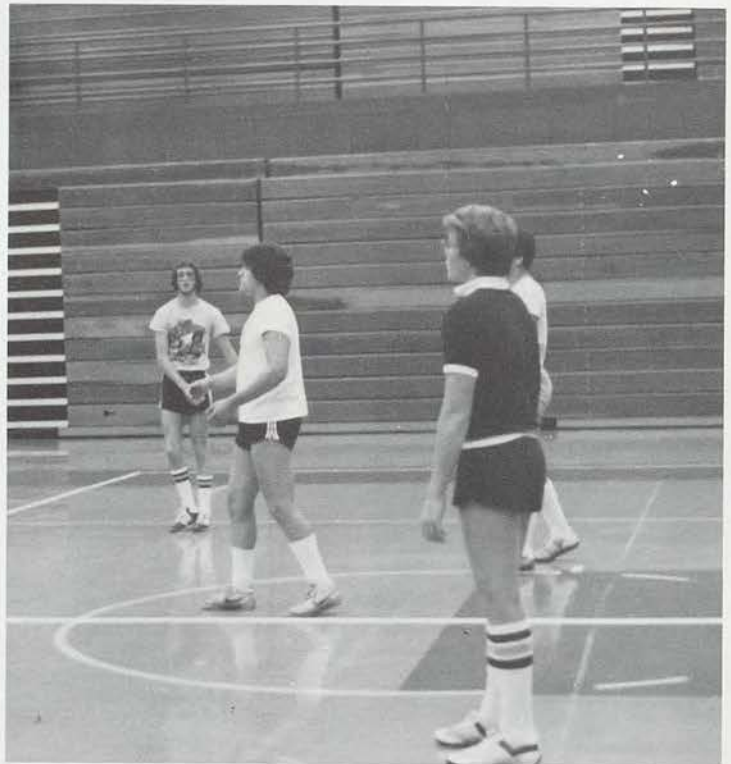

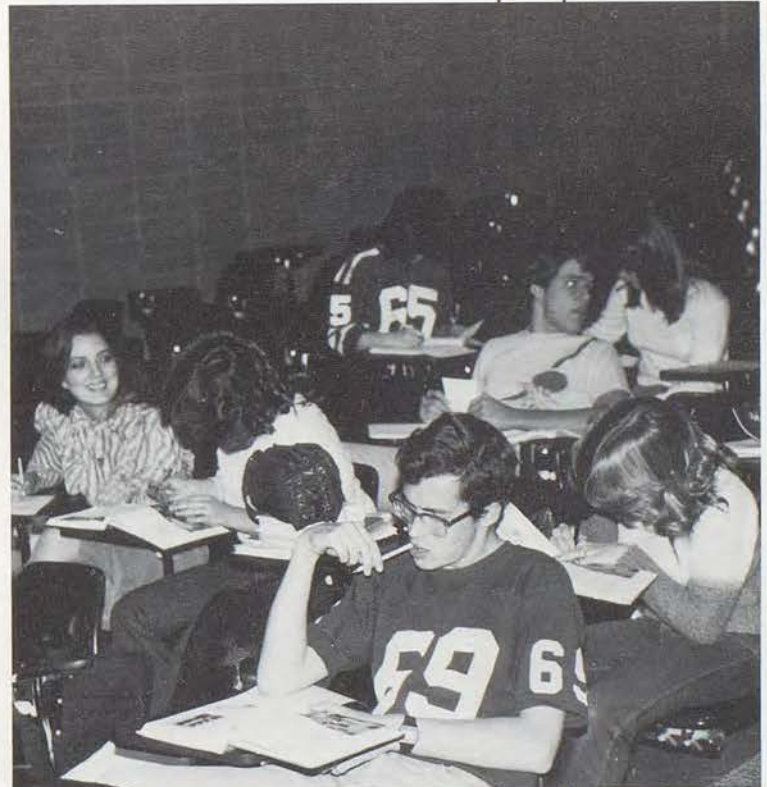
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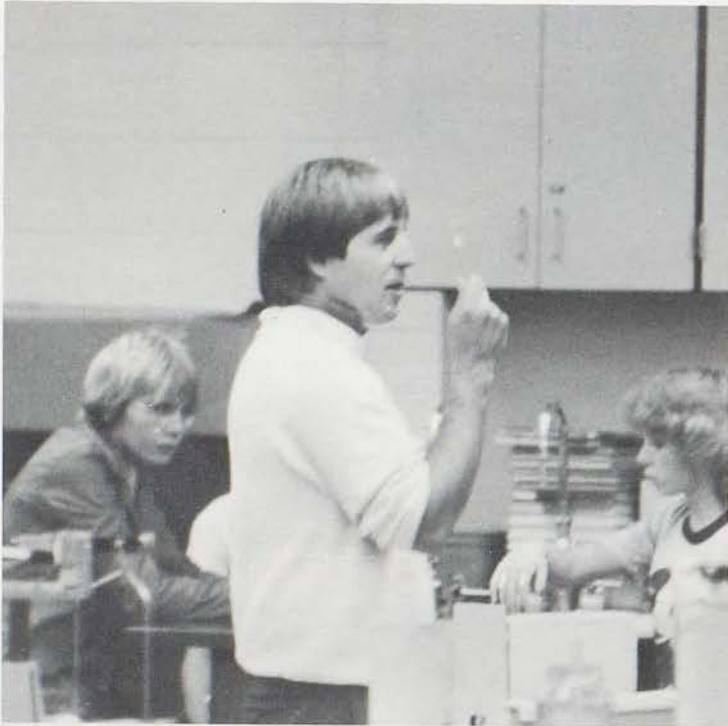
Drivers Education . . . Skills For the Future

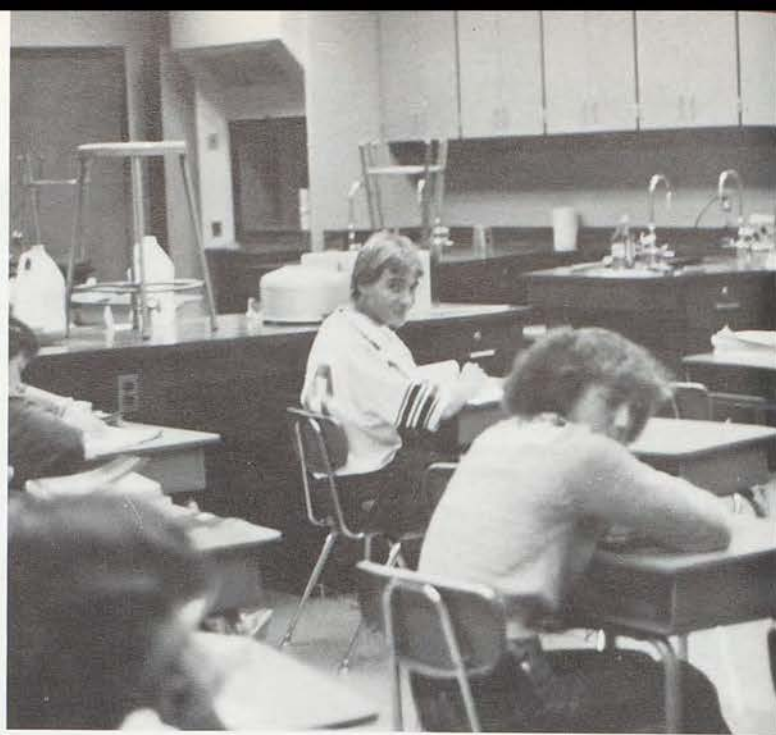

There was one class added to the schedule this year, and that was general science, which is offered only to freshman students. In addition to this class, freshmen could also take physical science.

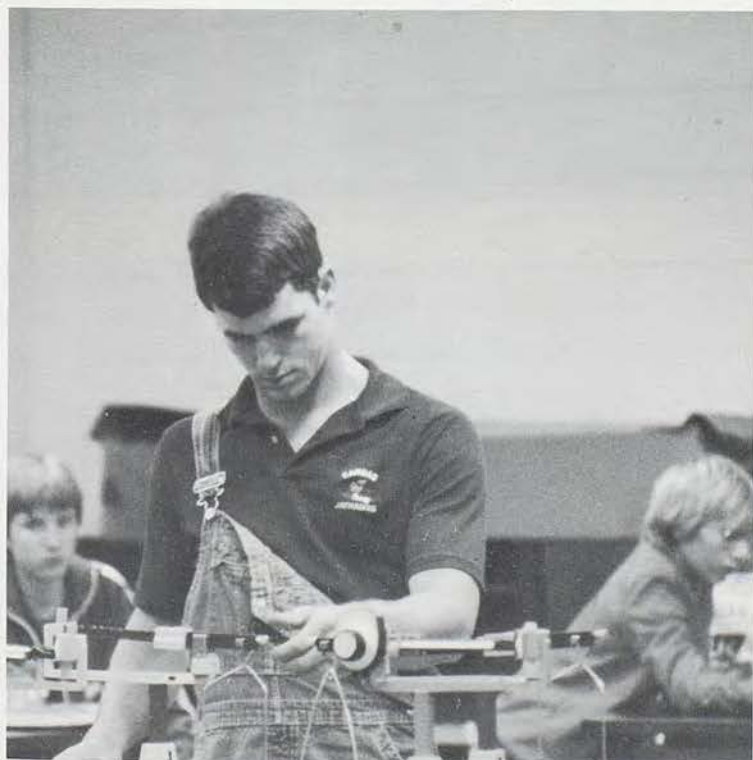

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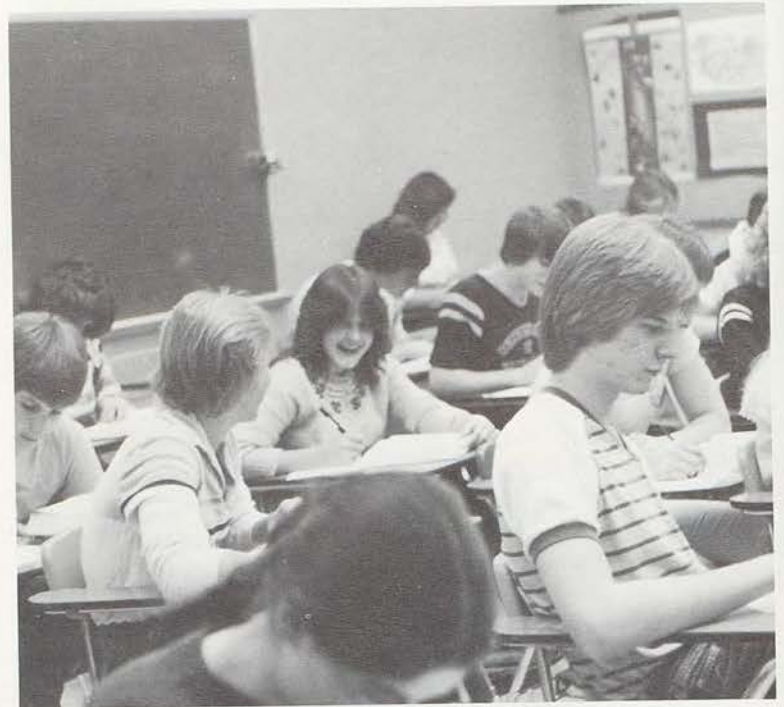

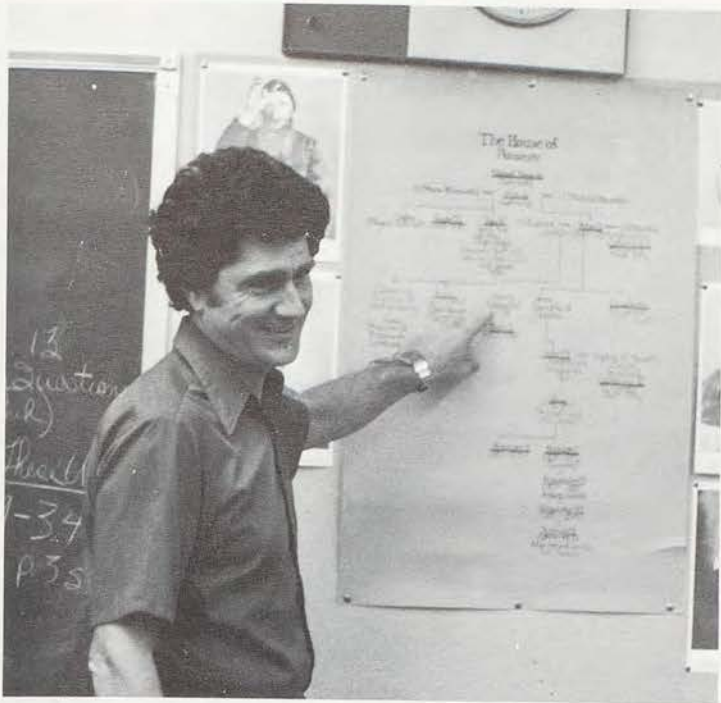


Social Awareness

Social studies was one of the largest departments for the 1982-83 school year, consisting of eleven teachers, and seventeen classes. He thought economics was important because it prepared students for the future, and gave them a different viewpoint.

Mr. Gier, the instructor for contemporary issues, said his course was important because it prepared students for the future and helped them keep up with current events. Mr. Gier felt the class was important because we need more intelligent, well informed citizens to remain a democracy.



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Math: A Different Subject

Although there were no new classes added to the math department this year, it was a little different because freshmen were added to the student body, and four new teachers were added.

When the teachers were asked if they thought this year's freshmen had any advantage or disadvantage over last year's freshmen, a few thought they were at a disadvantage due to the mixing of freshmen and upper-classmen in such classes as Algebra I, and the disadvantage of oversized classes. Others felt, however, they had an advantage because of the improvement in quality of some classes.

When the four new teachers, Miss Mynatt, Mr. Banta, Mrs. Hayse, and Mrs. Barger, were asked how they like working at Hickman the overall response was that they enjoyed working here.

"What did the teachers that worked here last year think of working with freshmen?" was a big question. Most teachers thought they really didn't seem out of place, because for the most part the freshmen were mature young people. They also saw, with the addition of freshmen, more school spirit.

This was the advice Mrs. Barger gave to her students, "Math is different from all other subjects, it works a different part of your brain; it feels different. Give it an honest chance."

It will not be difficult for students to find jobs if they have had a shorthand background. It also will be useful for taking notes in college classes."



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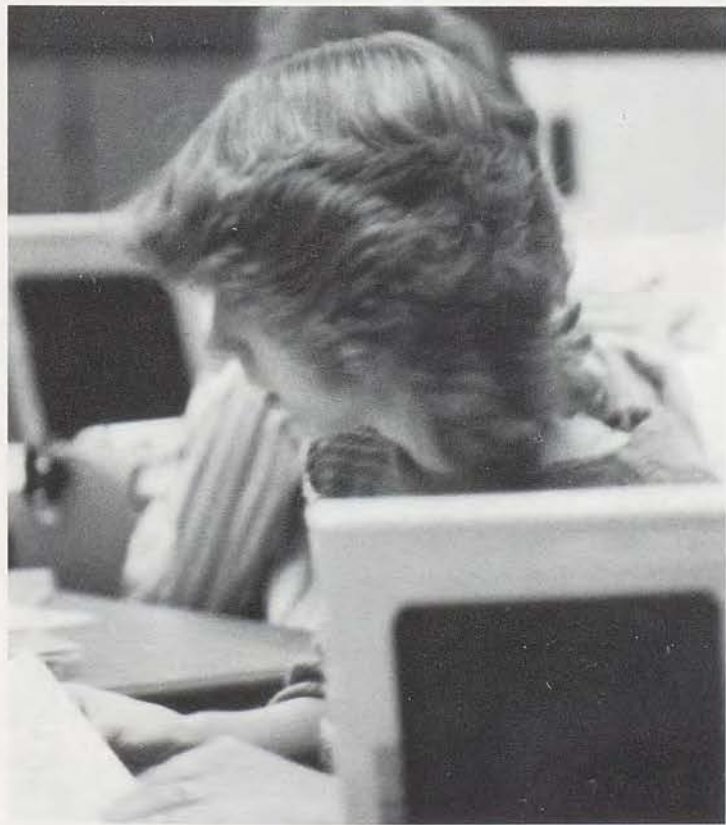

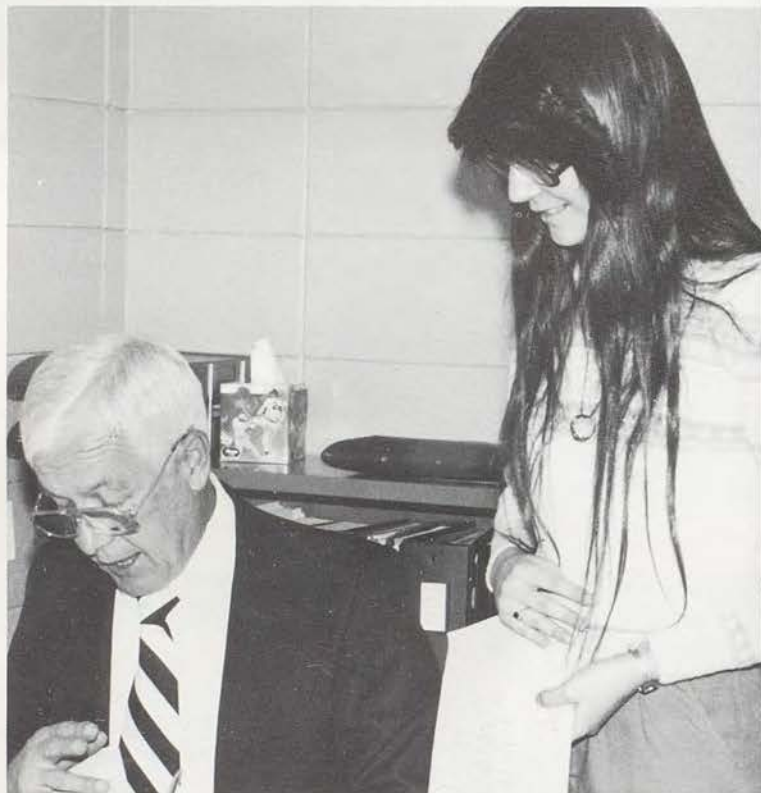

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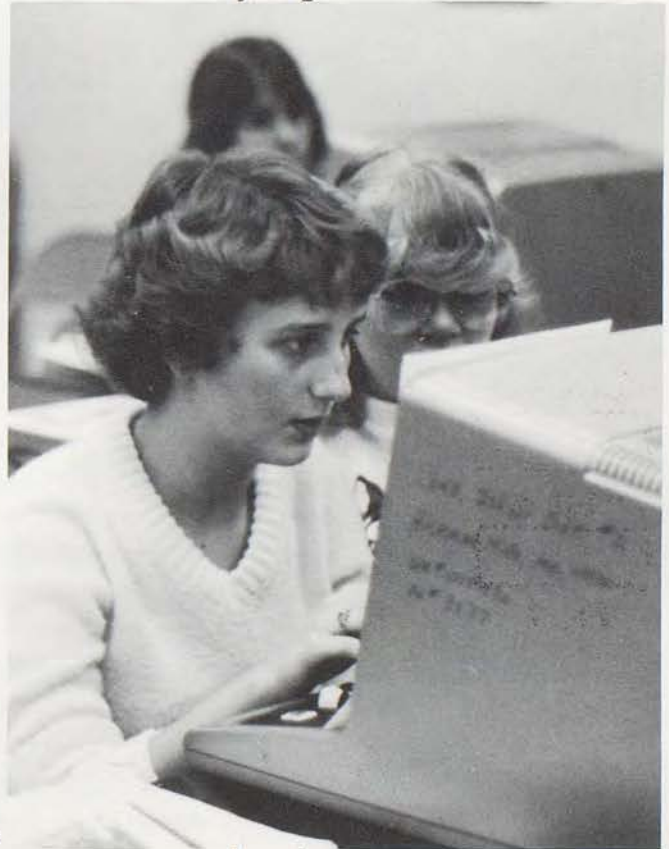
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New Classes Add Variety

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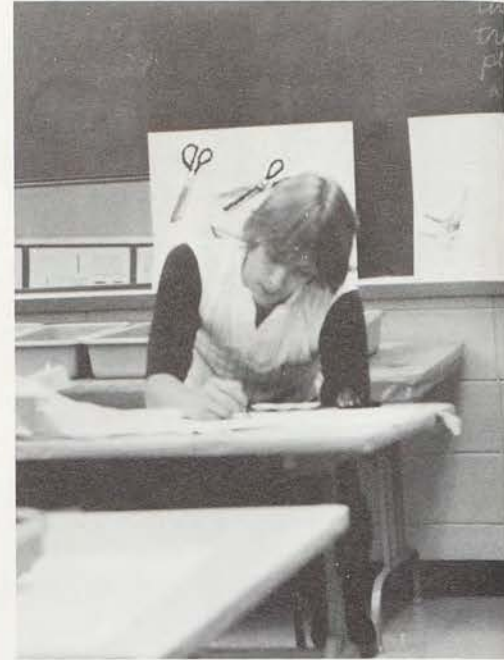
Home Ec Gives Students Preparation for Future

"These classes are really good classes to take. You learn a lot from them," said Mike Magana, 12.





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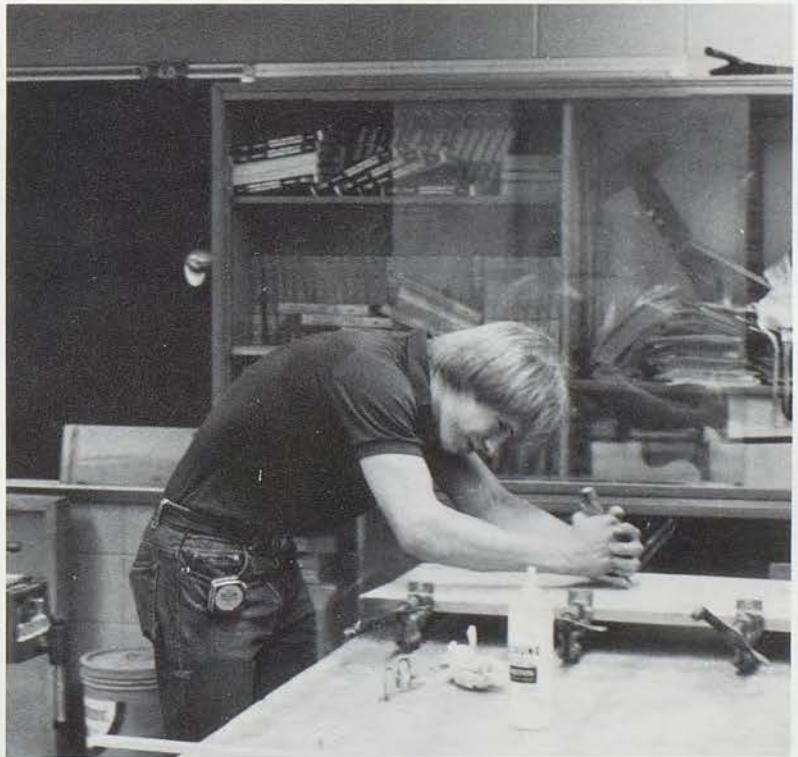

Tony Kottenbrock said: "Playing on JV was a great experience, and it helped to get me better prepared for next year."



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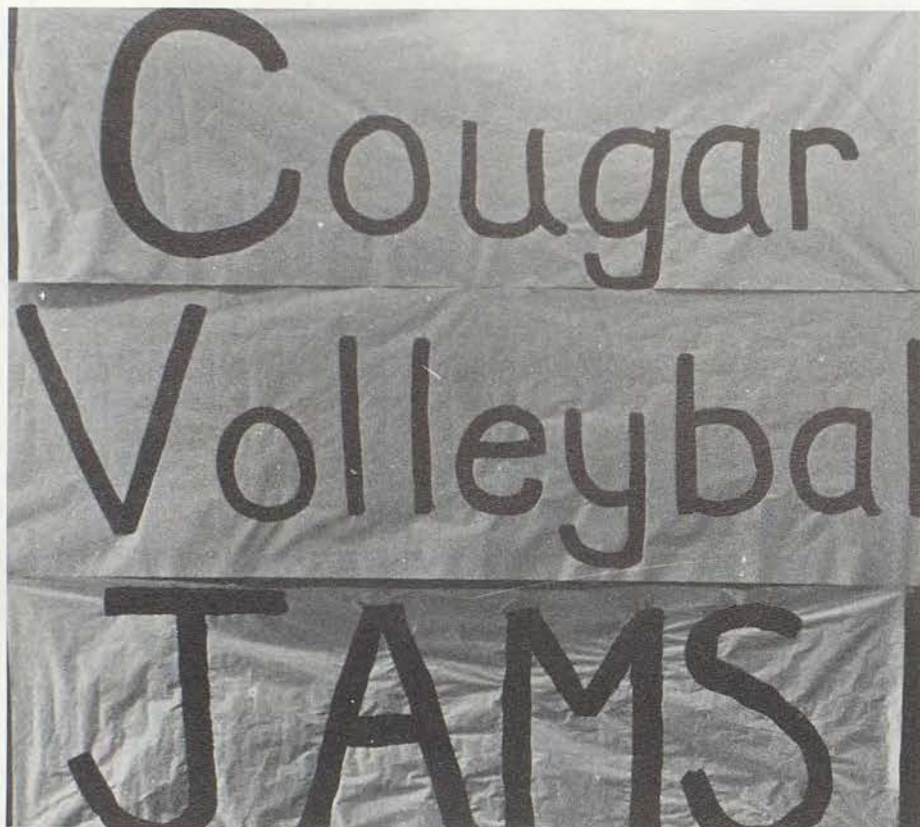

Coach O'Brien also stated that next year's team would be one of youth and inexperience. But from those five seniors, hopefully they will have learned a great deal about the game of tennis.

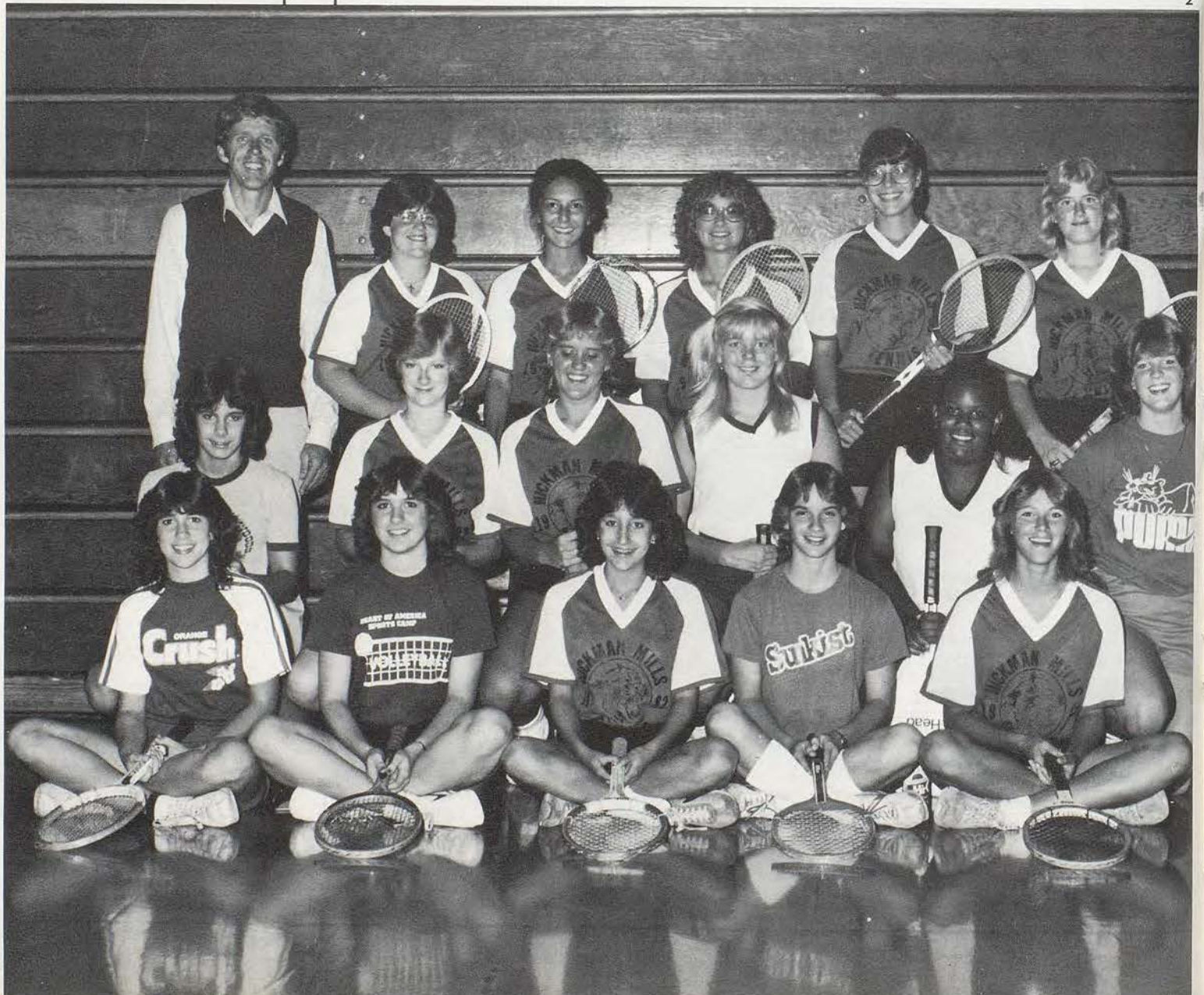
"The outlook for the Varsity is quite good, and we should do exceptionally well in conference," stated Coach O'Brien at the beginning of the season.

"The team will be a young one but this starting season should help gain some knowledge of the sport," commented Mary Stichnot, 12.

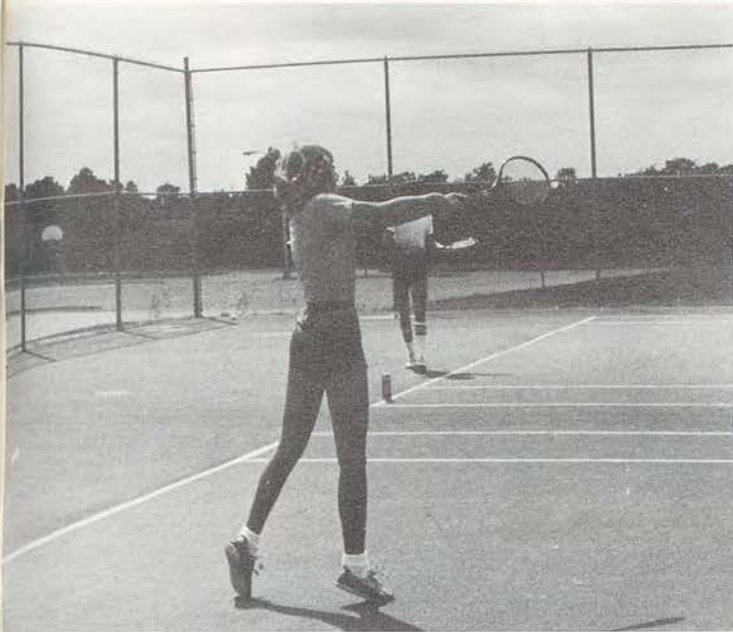

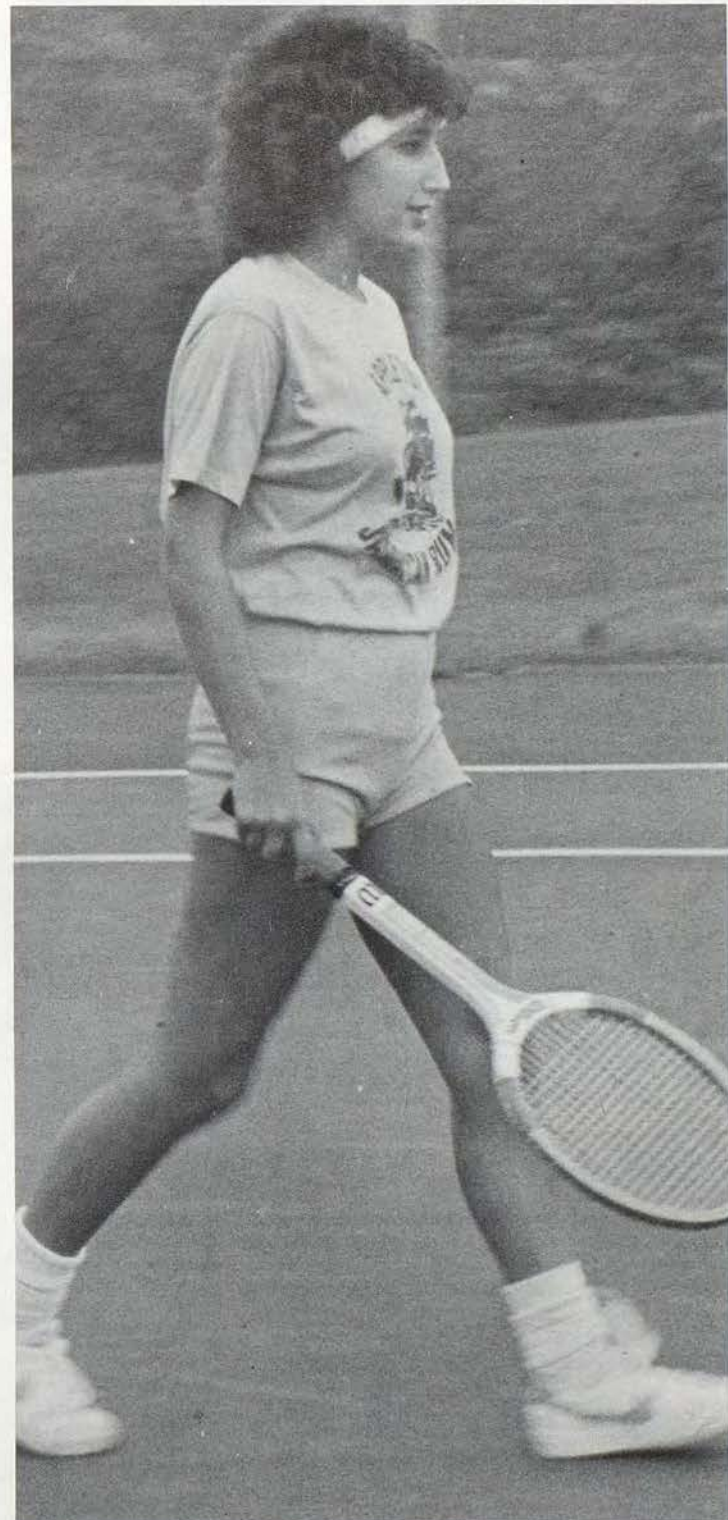

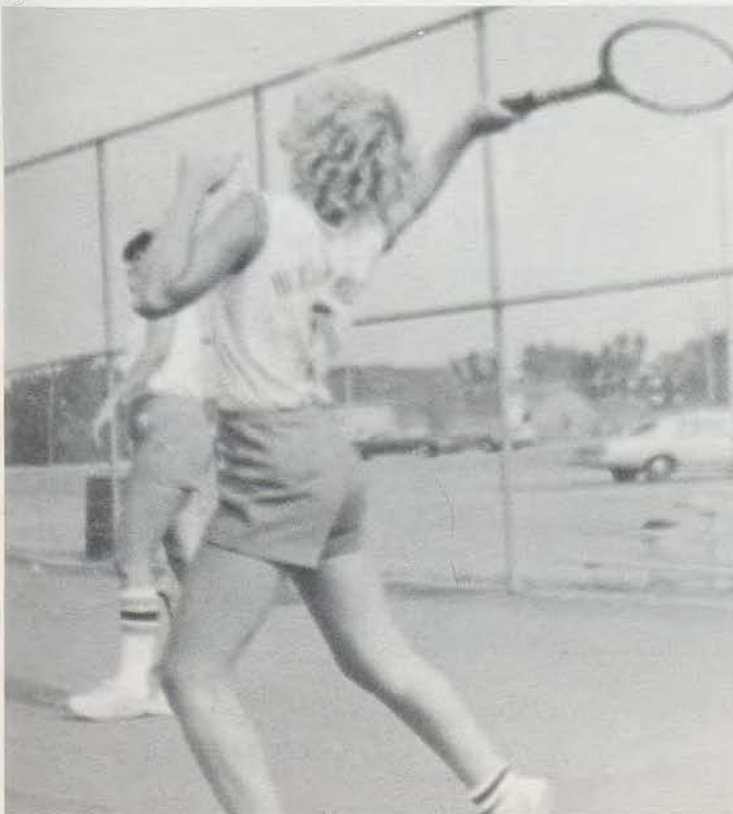

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Making the Effort

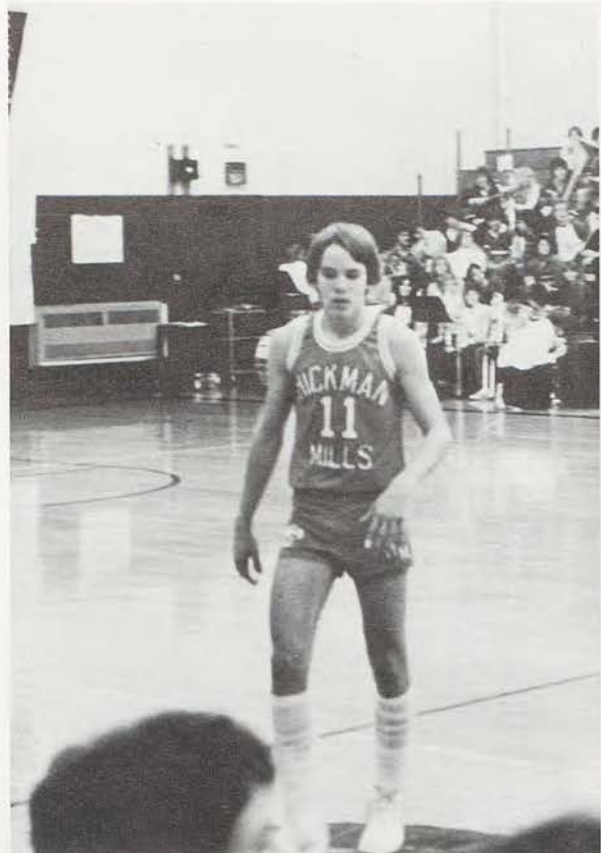

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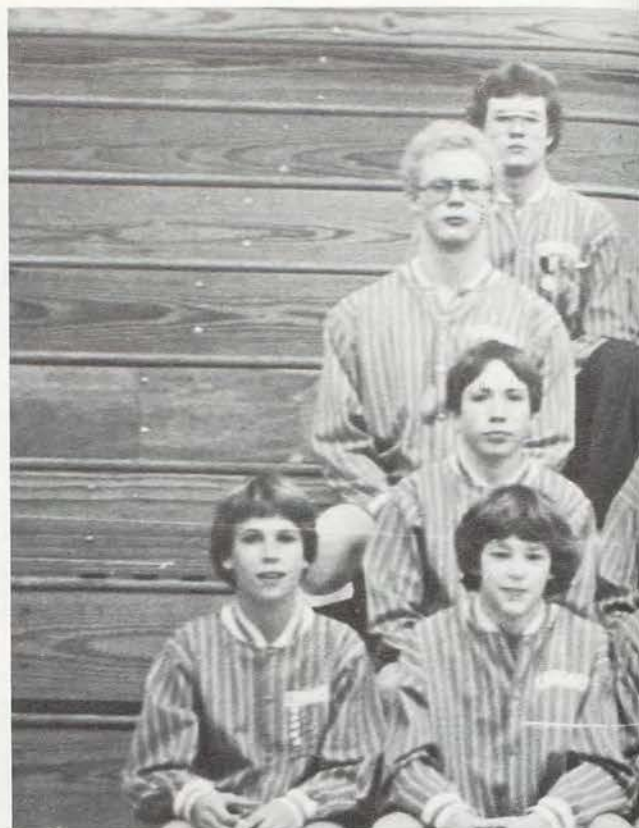

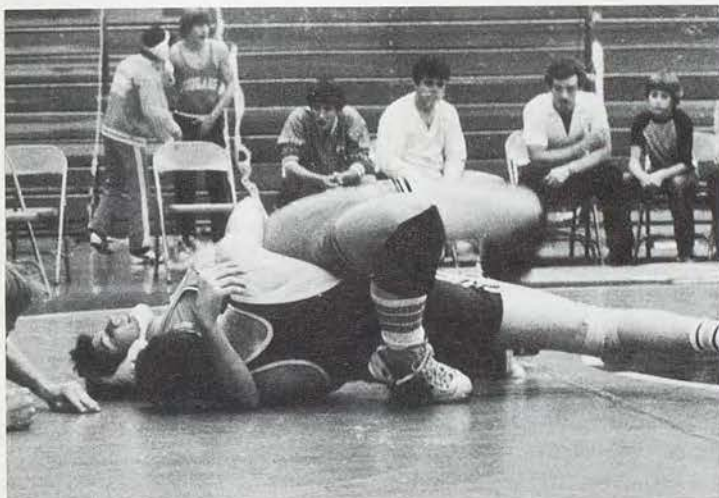


Wrestling Squad Finds Key to Success

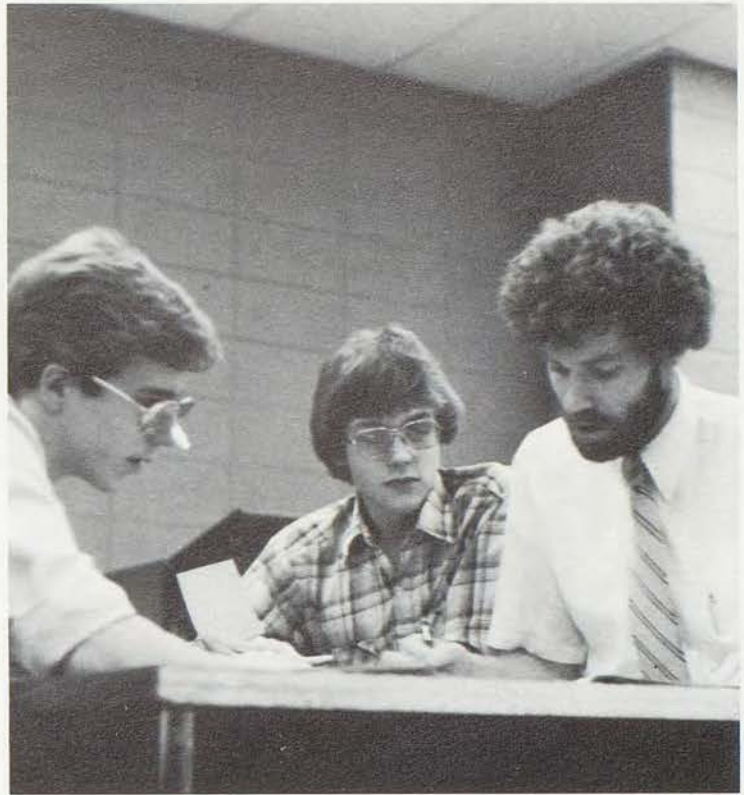

After Christmas, the choirs worked on both contest and Cougar Cabaret music.



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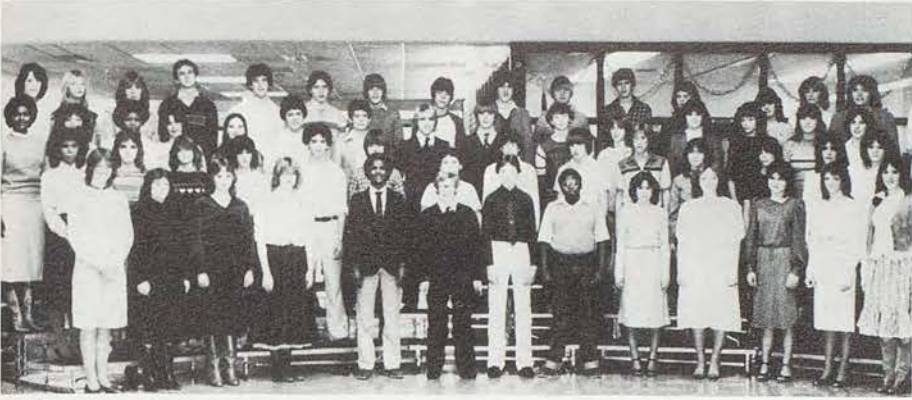

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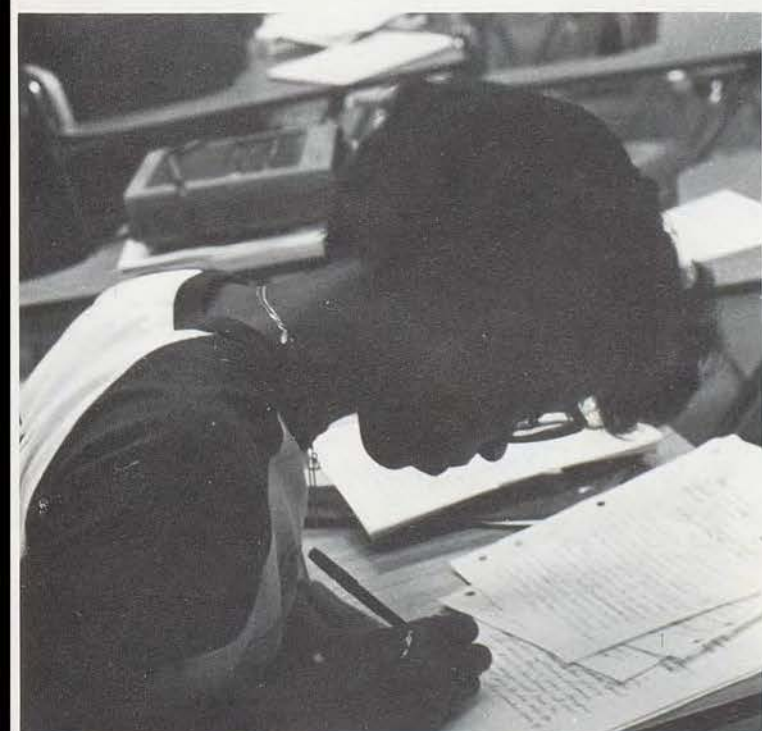

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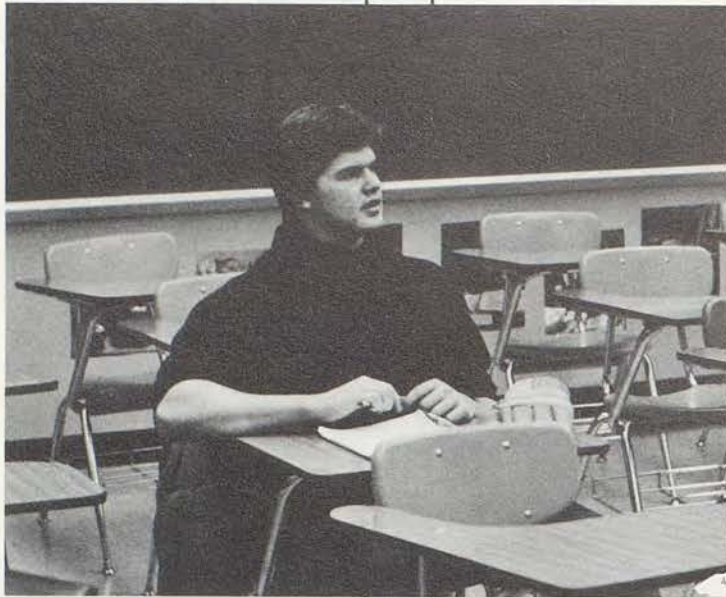

The officers were: president — Paul Posner, vice-president — Debbie Swearingin, secretary — Barbara Martin, and treasurer — Jeff Hayob.



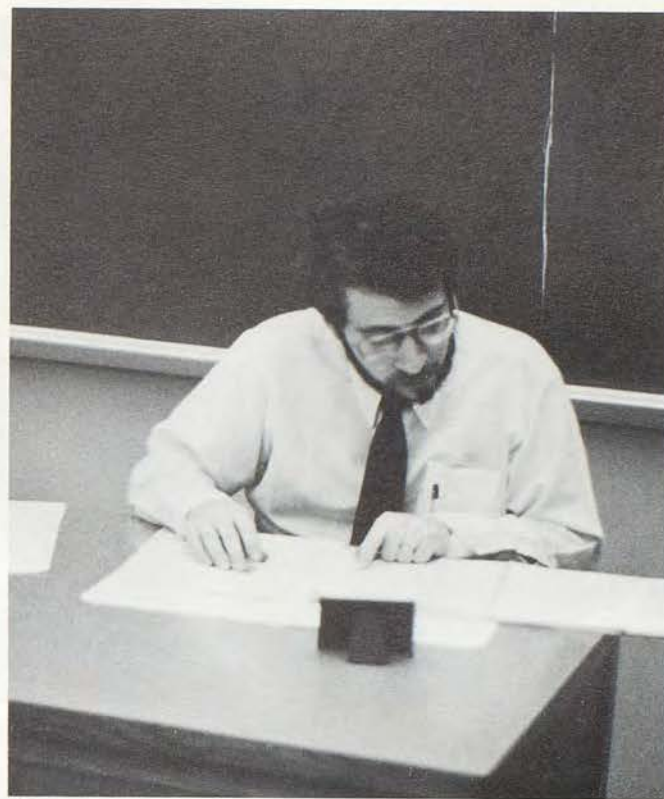
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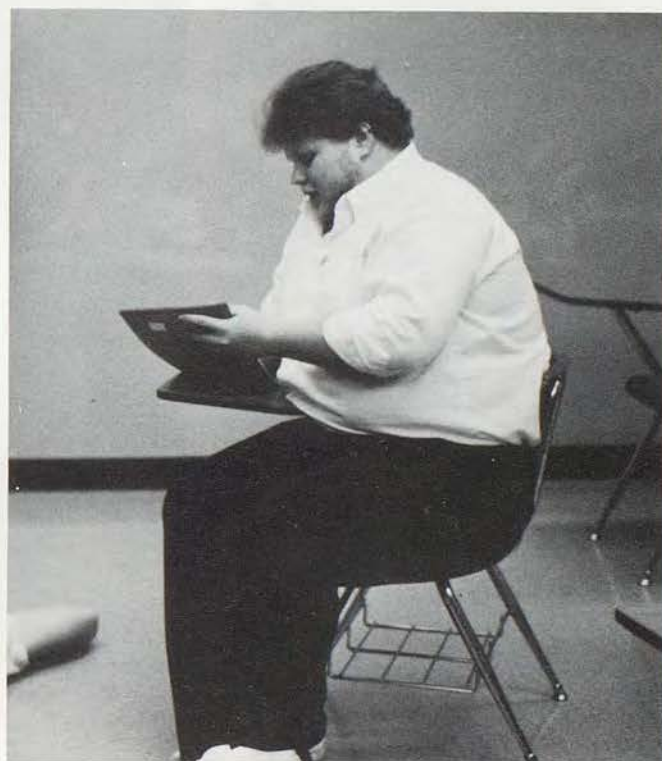
