A principal's job is not necessarily an easy one. It is a job that requires a lot of time and hard work. The man who meets and exceeds these requirements is Mr. Douglas Lawrence. He has been the principal of Hickman Mills since the school's opening in 1972. Prior to this he was the sophomore principal at Ruskin and Smith-Hale. His job consisted of various duties, with the most important one being curriculum. Evaluating staff members, the scheduling of classes and the over-all operation of the school were just a few of his many responsibilities. All final decisions were made by him. He was also responsible for many senior-related activities such as the graduation ceremony.

School Board Making Important Decisions



Behind the Scenes





Typing, shorthand, business classes, operating office machines, and patience were all required attributes for being a secretary



When asked what was most liked about Hickman Mills, each commented on the friendly faces and working with the students.










Turn the Page




"There has been a real big push to improve listening and comprehension skills. This is an area that many speech professionals feel there is a real deficiency," commented Mr. Knowlton.

The term "Special Services" included many areas of meeting the individual student's needs.



Placement in a special program was handled through a referral to the counseling staff.



Working for the Weekend



For Dan Emerick, Vo-Tech offered experience in learning a trade for his future career.









She Blinded Me With Science



Students and teachers learned a lot from social studies. The classes helped inform the students about society and responsible citizenship.






The average number of students in each class was twenty-five. Girls were not the only ones to make up the classes. A number of guys also took some type of home economics class.









The music department worked together during long rehearsals to insure a good performance. One notable example was the presentation of the fall musical "Barnum".


Many performances and contests encouraged students to do their best and feel a sense of accomplishment after a good concert or a high rating at contest.




Argue to the End Debate




NFL Does It All

















This year they also performed in competition at the Music Bowl on October 22 and then in Blue Springs on October 29.











The paper has always done well in spring contests. Senior Joe Pence said, "We have a good chance again this year."








Later they began fund raising in order to finance their trip to the Art Institute, in Chicago, during the spring. Some fund raisers included bake sales and candy grams around Christmas time.












COUGARS BATTLE TOUGH OPPONENTS
















JV/FRESHMAN STEP UP








A Glorious Night . . . but Not for All


