




thought it would be. While in the other side of the world war was in the making as Iran and Iraq bombarded each other making gas prices dart sharply upward.

All of the queen's court were driven in corvettes.









"On Broadway": Homecoming Theme











Yearbook Records Year

Joyce Carter and Carol Batson set a precedent by becoming the first junior co-editors of the Aerie. Both Batson and Carter agreed that a change in design was necessary in order to give the book a "new look." An increased use of graphics was installed.

The yearbook staff again renewed its pledge to have the bulk of the book out in the spring. Preliminary shooting of pictures began in the spring of 1980, in order to meet deadlines for the currect year.

"We wanted to be a bit more informative than last year," said Batson. "Pictures can't tell the complete story." Therefore, a stronger emphasis on copy was placed in the 81 Aerie. This change made it necessary to keep better records of school events.


Another change was creating a better balance between the main part of the book and the supplement. The supplement was increased from 16 to 24 pages.




The Thespian society is an honorary acting society which is national in scope. Members must meet a minimum of theatre hours back stage or on the stage.


SAC SERVES STUDENTS WITH MOVIES, DANCES AND REFRESHMENTS






PEP CLUB SPONSORS BIG EVENTS



These individuals are extremely helpful in keeping the daily routine on course.














Passing Highlights Hawk's Attack






HAWKS Concerned With World Affairs
