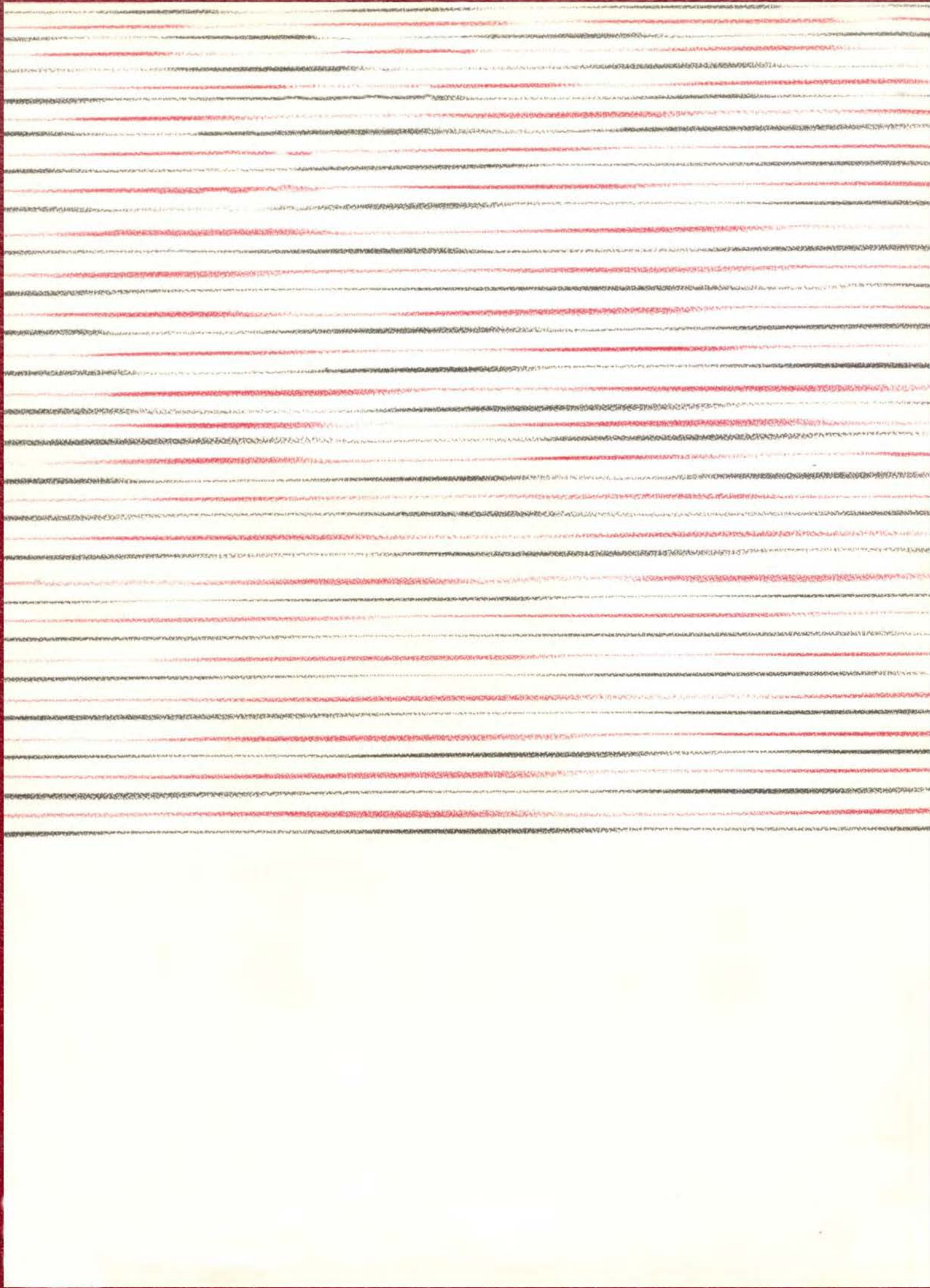

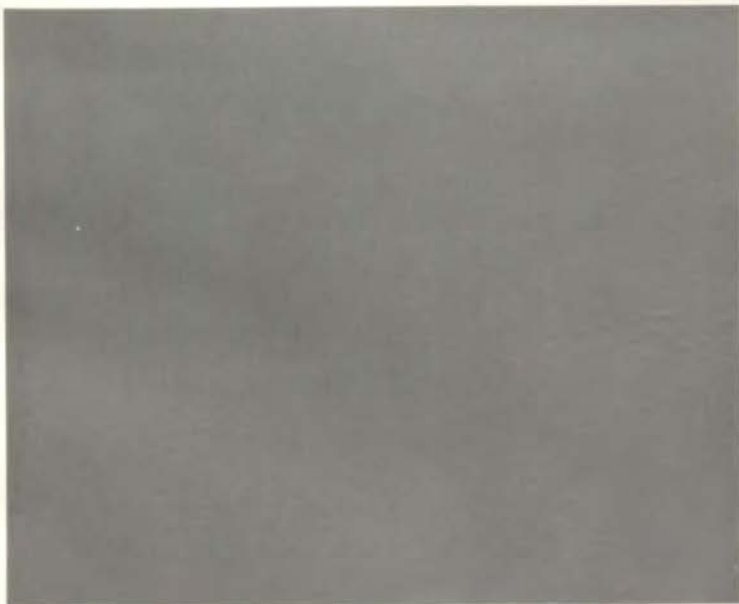

Lawrence High School – Class of 1952

A good businessman and a top athlete is the type of combination that proves the adage — "a sound mind and a healthy body." In Lawrence High's Bill Nieder, a 1952 graduate, the adage is personified as the husky former shot putter is now a representative of the 3M Company in a challenging position with a future dealing in new products.

Back in 1951 when young Bill Nieder was a lineman for LHS and coach Al Woolard, he was an All-American gridder at center and voted the outstanding lineman in Kansas. A rugged player, Bill was typical of the All-Americans produced by that Woolard magic.

Basketball also intrigued Nieder as he was the Lion pivot and was named second team All-NEKL. Track found him at his prime as he was the state high school champion shot putter and held the interstate scholastic record of 60'9/8".

At the University of Kansas, a promising football career was cut short by a knee injury but only after he had been named to the 1952 All-American Freshmen team. However, there was still track and the former champion went to work and became the first college shot putter to plow a furrow at the 60 foot mark.

Next came the Olympics for Bill as he joined the squad of 1956 and won a silver medal in the shot. By the 1960 Olympics in Rome, Nieder vowed a first and came home to national recognition with a gold first place medal for the United States. Later, in Texas, he fired off a toss of 65'10" to set a world record.

The versatility of Bill Nieder was already taking shape in college as he was a representative of the Provident Mutual Insurance Company in Lawrence and after graduation went to San Francisco as an officer in the United States Army. At present he is a 3M representative on the West Coast.

One word of advice Bill Nieder leaves for aspiring youngsters is "If you really desire something then it's worthwhile working for. Don't give up. Work always comes back to you in the form of satisfaction and success." So said Bill Nieder, the epitome of his motto and a credit to Lawrence High.

Lawrence's up-and-coming trackster in 1965 was Doug Milroy, the only state track representative. A basketball player and a top trackster, Doug is only a junior and is predominant in the high jump. The only requirement for success is, as Bill Nieder terms it, "Work . . ."



Following in the footsteps of famous graduates, 1500 Lawrence High students look eagerly to the time when they too can delve



into the rich and rewarding future as did they who went before them. Perhaps they, too, will be known as national congressmen, scientists,



administrators, All-American athletes, and just everyday people.

Lawrence High School of years ago is no more; it is the time and the place for the present generation. It is the modern, the seeking, the quick, and the responsive generation of young people who walk through the halls of Lawrence High.

They are not content with the past and the present; they are



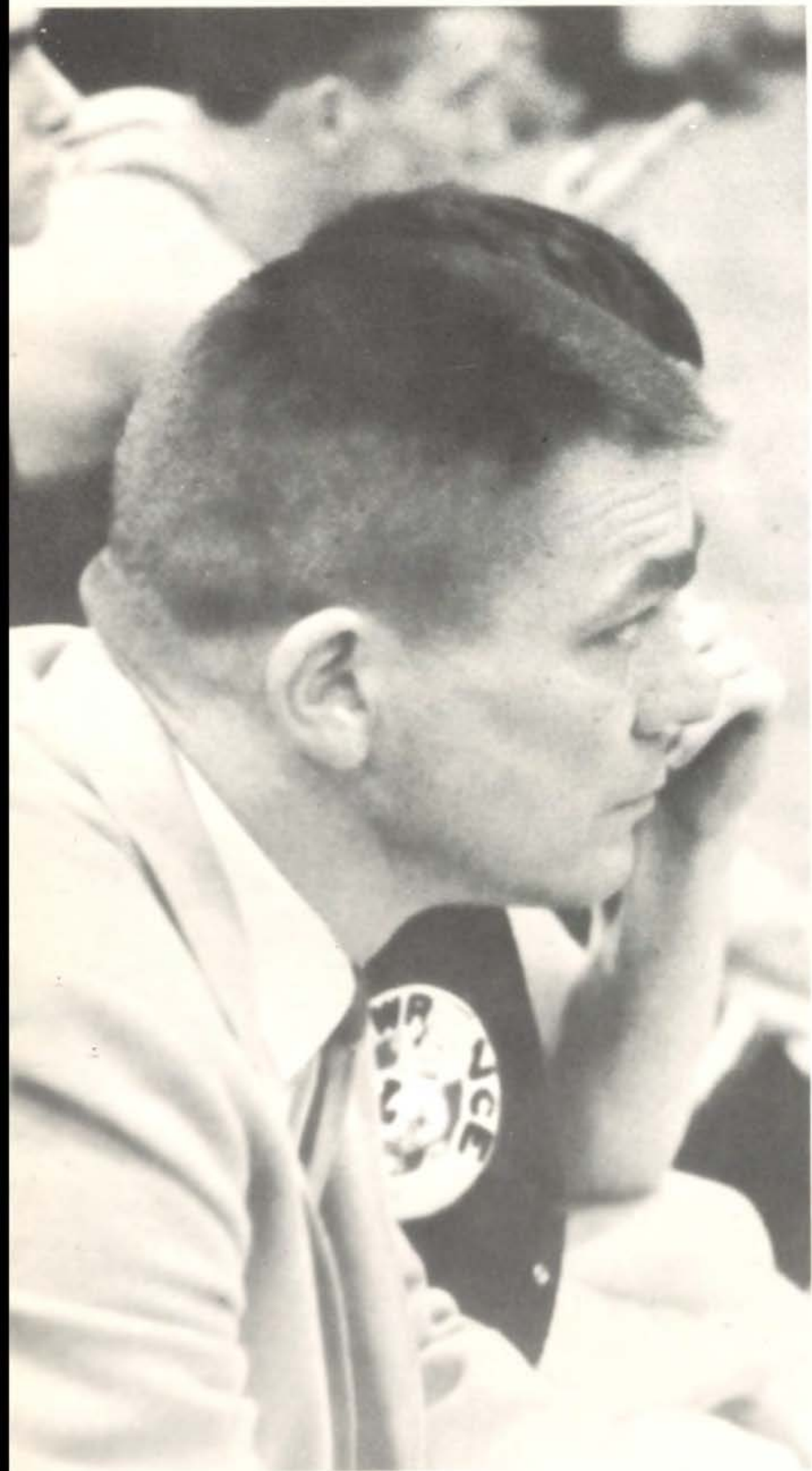

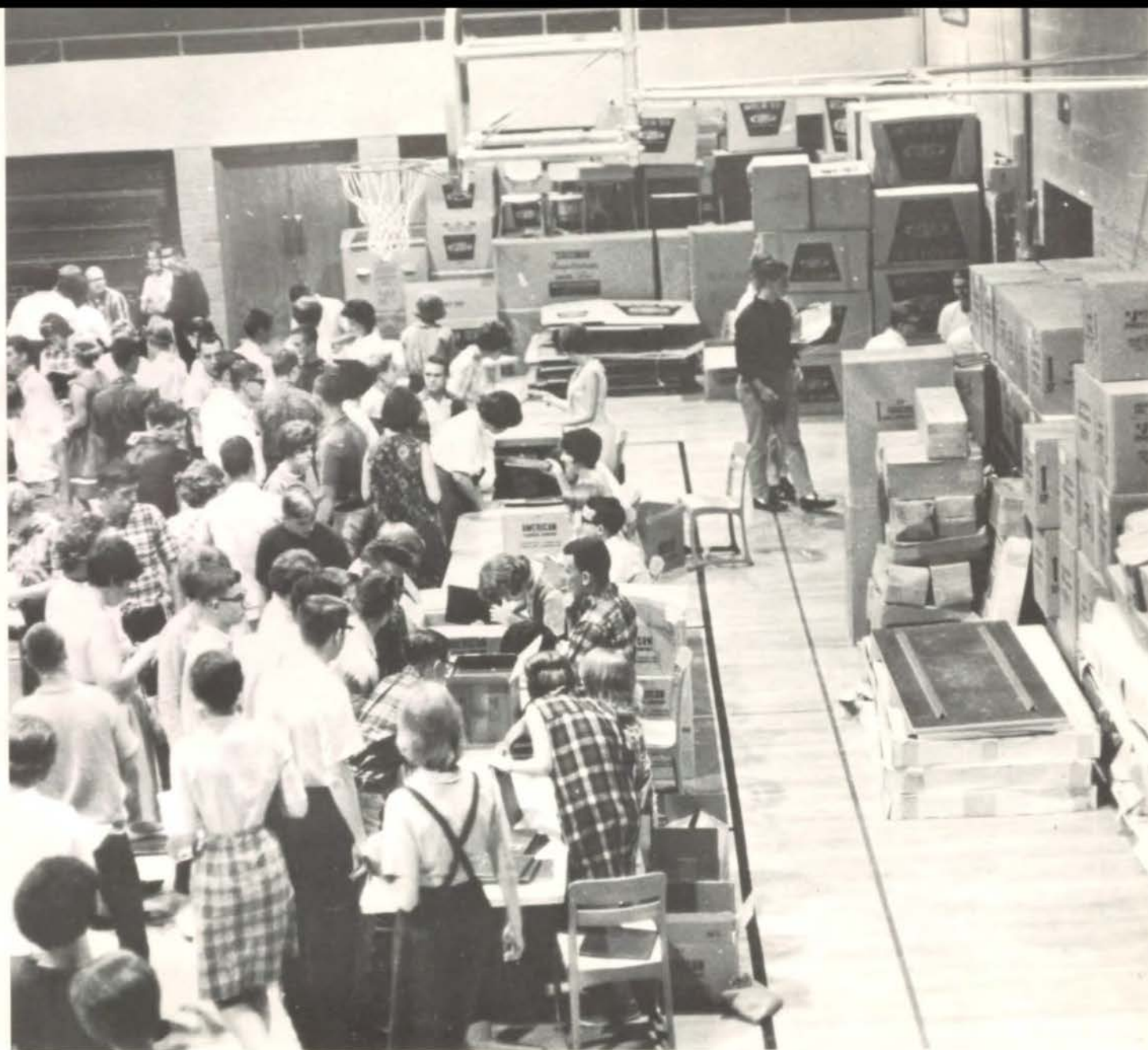
ever aware that the future lies before them; they are ready and willing and waiting for the chal-

DEPARTMENTS



Dr. Elmer Verner McCollum —World Famous Scientist

Lawrence High School—Class of 1900

Dr. Elmer Verner McCollum, a 1900 graduate of Lawrence High School, indeed has been one of our most distinguished and famous citizens. After graduating from LHS, he went on to KU where he received his BA in 1903 and his MA in 1904. In 1906 he received his Ph.D. from Yale University. Besides these impressive degrees, he also holds several honorary doctorates which are Doctor of Science, University of Cincinnati; Doctor of Laws, University of Manitoba; Doctor of Laws, Johns Hopkins University; and Doctor of Humane Letters, Brandeis University. In 1942 he was listed as being one of the men in North America who had made the most important discoveries in the medical sciences by the Rochester Academy of Medicine Committee. Dr. McCollum is one of sixteen living Americans who have been honored by being made a fellow of the Royal Society of London.

Some of his most important investigations in the interest of science are as follows: he was the first to study the nature of the deficiencies of individual natural foods; he discovered with Marguerite Davis in 1912 the first of the fat-soluble vitamins – Vitamin A; in 1922 with several associates he discovered the existence of Vitamin D; he discovered with Dr. Elsa Leiles that magnesium is an essential nutrient; he is the author of five editions of *The Kewer Knowledge of Nutrition*, and six editions of *Food, Nutrition and Health*, and *A History of Nutrition*. Several of the awards which have gone to Dr. McCollum are Osborne and Mendal Award, 1955; Borden Federation Centenary Award, 1958; Charles F. Spencer Award, 1958; Howard N. Potts gold medal "for distinguished scientific work" in 1921; and an award from *Modern Medicine* for 1960.

Dr. McCollum has gone from a Lawrence High School graduate of the class of 1900 to a world recognized scientist among the best of his field. His accomplishments should surely serve as incentives to LHS science students to go on and strive for nothing but the best. As Dr. McCollum's record shows, he settled for nothing but the best and unconsciously he has set goals for Lawrence High School students to admire and for which to strive.

Following in the footsteps of an eminent graduate, senior Alice Fitch and sophomore Walter Stromquist have bright and promising futures. Alice was awarded one of the highest awards a graduating senior of science can receive, the Bausch and Lomb Award. This is given to an outstanding high school science student planning to enter the field of science.

Walter was a finalist in the National Science Fair held at St. Louis, Missouri. Out of 418 students he was awarded a certificate for his project: Pascal's Triangle In Any Modulus. These awards by our science students can easily show that Lawrence High has kept up with its tradition of academic excellence.

English—

Variety Spices Class Offering

Adverbial clause, noun clause, rhyme scheme, onomatopoeia, alliteration, and assonance were words which bewildered English students this year at Lawrence High. Grammar and themes, those banes of mankind, were an integral part of the teaching of English.

Literature was approached in different ways by the various grades. Sophomores studied a variety of literary compositions. The various forms of literature of the United States were given to the juniors to absorb. And the seniors, by the end of the year, had acquired a new knowledge of the wonders of English literature. Beowulf to Edna St. Vincent Millary to Sir Winston Churchill brought in focus some of the world's greatest masterpieces.

Language—

Learners Live Language

Students of the German language translated shorter works and as their knowledge increased, they graduated to more difficult literature. The advanced classes put on plays several times.

The Spanish students used the aural-oral method of learning, as had been used in the past. Several classes wrote term papers about the Mayan, Aztec, and the Inca Indians. Spanish Club was held Fridays with the students preparing the program.

French students learned about the painters, authors, and museums and landmarks of that Gallic country. Grammar and pronunciation were very important, especially for the beginning students.

Math—

High Standards Set Quality

For those intrigued by the higher forms of arithmetic, the mathematics department of Lawrence High School set the standards high. Courses in Algebra I or plane geometry were offered as preparatory courses to students. Trigonometry, probability and statistics, and calculus were available for more ambitious students.

Accelerated courses were offered in geometry, Algebra II and calculus. Advanced geometry consisted of plane and solid geometry; algebra, of algebra and trigonometry; and calculus, of probability and calculus. One of the requirements in the course probability was to write and present a report concerning any mathematical subject.

Adding lustre to the math program at Lawrence High, teachers Lowell Bailey, Mrs. Margaret McReynolds, Darrell Falen, Jack Hennington and John Racy provided instruction that guided the LHS students to a first in the state math contest. Walter Stromquist topped the individual math contestants while the combined efforts of the LHS students tallied 201.75 points for first in the school competition. The contest was sponsored by the Mathematics Association of America and the Society of Actuaries.

Science—

Variety Spices Offering

Students interested in science have a wide selection of courses to choose from at Lawrence High. The courses were divided into two main areas—physical science and biological science.

Industrial science and biology were the classes offered in the biological science area. Organic evolution and physiology are studied by our aspiring biologists. Some students studied in the Biological Science Curriculum Study program testing. Studying industrial science includes a general background of all the science fields such as biology, chemistry, and astronomy.

Physics and chemistry are the sum of the physical science courses under the discipline of LHS instructors. Physics courses gave the students knowledge of the physical phenomena of the universe and the laws of physics as chemistry did the knowledge of organic chemistry, descriptive chemistry, and qualitative analysis.

Social Studies—

Students Enjoy Participation

Discussions, simulations, and lectures were important parts of the social studies department. The general courses had the instructors lecturing most of the time, while the team-teaching students participated by reporting, discussing, and simulating.

American history students were thrilled with accounts of the Civil War, the French and Indian War, and the World Wars. World history found the sophomores treated to ancient Greece and Rome, and modern Russia and Africa. American government students studied the intricacies of politics, world situations, and simulations.

WASP, the World Affairs Study Program, held several afternoon seminars with guest speakers who discussed such topics as the split between Red China and the Soviet Union, the Arab world, and the Moslem religion. During the presidential campaign, the group studied the different political parties.

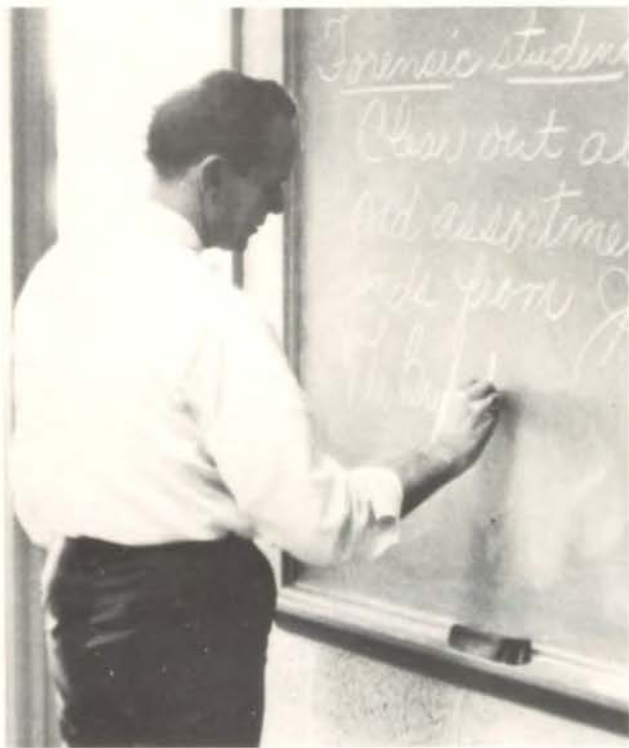

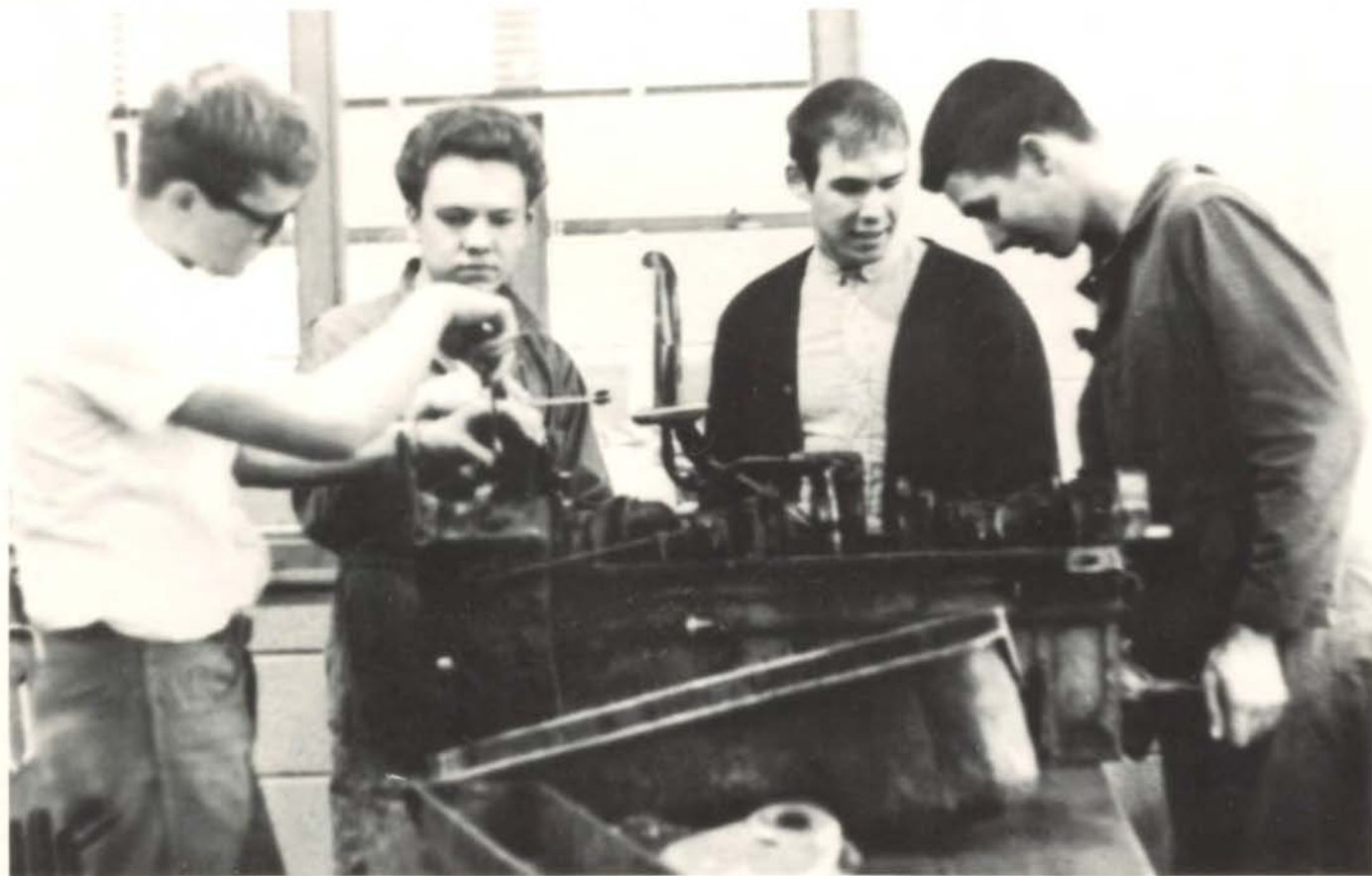

Take a card field and collate but first run them through a sequencer to get them in ascending order and process the result in the collator and throw out the garbage.

If that sounds confusing, it should be unless you're in the new data processing class at Lawrence High School. The fourth school to use the data processing method and the first to employ the initial student teacher in the field, Mike Ater, LHS is in the process of converting the school system to data processing, automation for clerical chores.

Students learn to operate machines and work projects while the data processing personnel handle the grade cards, enrollment, statistics on grades, address labels, and even publish the student directory. Six of the machines in use are the 402 accounting machine, 085 collator, 514 reproducer, 082 sorter, 548 interpreter, and the 024 card punch.

Ralph Houk – General Manager of the New York Yankees

Lawrence High School – Class of 1938

Ralph G. Houk, class of 1938, has indeed shown his qualities of leadership in his chosen field. While at Lawrence High School, he participated in student council, football, basketball, intramurals, chalk talk, Hi-Y, track, acted as the FFA basketball coach, was president of the FFA, and was the State Farmer from LHS in his senior year.

After his graduation from Lawrence High, Ralph Houk continued to demonstrate his ability as a leader. Eventually he wound up as General Manager of one of baseball's greatest professional teams, the New York Yankees. Through perseverance, aggressiveness and intelligent application he moved through the Yankee chain to the apex of achievement.

However, Ralph Houk started at the bottom of the ladder and worked his way up the hard way. He was a rookie catcher in 1939 and came up through the minor league system with stops at Neosho, Joplin, Binghamton, Augusta, Beaumont and Kansas City before he finally was assigned to the Yankee club in 1947. He has spent four full seasons in military service and came out a decorated combat hero with the rank of "Major," a nickname that stayed with the amiable Houk.

Now, after eight years, he was a Yankee. But there were more disappointments. There was a young catcher by the name of Berra who was just starting and so, Ralph went back to K.C. Blues for most of the 1948-1949 seasons. He came close to quitting but his desire to be a Yankee kept him in baseball.

Then came the opportunity to manage Denver and a Little World Series triumph in 1957. In 1958 he was the first base coach of the Yanks and was named manager in 1960. In 1961, he won THE SPORTING NEWS designation as "American League Manager of the Year." In the Yankee yearbook, the caption reads "He has earned the confidence and respect of his players and the admiration of his opponents." One of Lawrence High's greatest graduates—RALPH HOUK, GENERAL MANAGER OF THE NEW YORK YANKEES.

Lawrence High School — Class of 1958.

Coach Al Woolard has produced many top high school football players but one of the gridirers rose to the heights and is still there. That player is Lawrence High's John Hadl, a graduate of LHS in 1958. John Hadl was a halfback on the state championship football team of 1957 and went on to the University of Kansas and finally to the San Diego Chargers where he now quarterbacks.

In 1957, Hadl was a 6'1", 183 pound halfback who had tallied 42 points the previous season and rated honorable mention on the NEKL team for the area, a member of the NEKL All-Stars, and an All-State baseball player. For the 1958 season, John was quoted as saying, "We have a good chance to be named state champs unless hampered by injuries and illness." Of course, his prediction came true as the veteran halfback romped through the year with 84 points tallied, NEKL All-Conference player, All-Area, All-State, and to cap it all, All-American, as named by *Teen Magazine*.

While in high school, John Hadl rated in football, basketball and track and was an All-State American Legion baseball player for the Legion Hawks. A tri-letter winner at LHS, he was also active in Hi-Y and several other activities in the whirl at Lawrence High.

Next came the move to the University of Kansas and as a sophomore, John Hadl was a top punter and considered one of the prime prospects for football immortality. So it was. In his senior year, Hadl exhibited the traits that won him his spurs in high school—the ability to perform with ease and grace. The result, he was named an All-American for the University of Kansas and led his team to a victory over the Rice Owls in the Bluebonnet Bowl, capping a great high school and collegiate career.

From the college ranks, John Hadl turned professional and is now a quarterback for the San Diego Chargers. After three seasons with the professionals, John Hadl is the top young prospect from LHS. 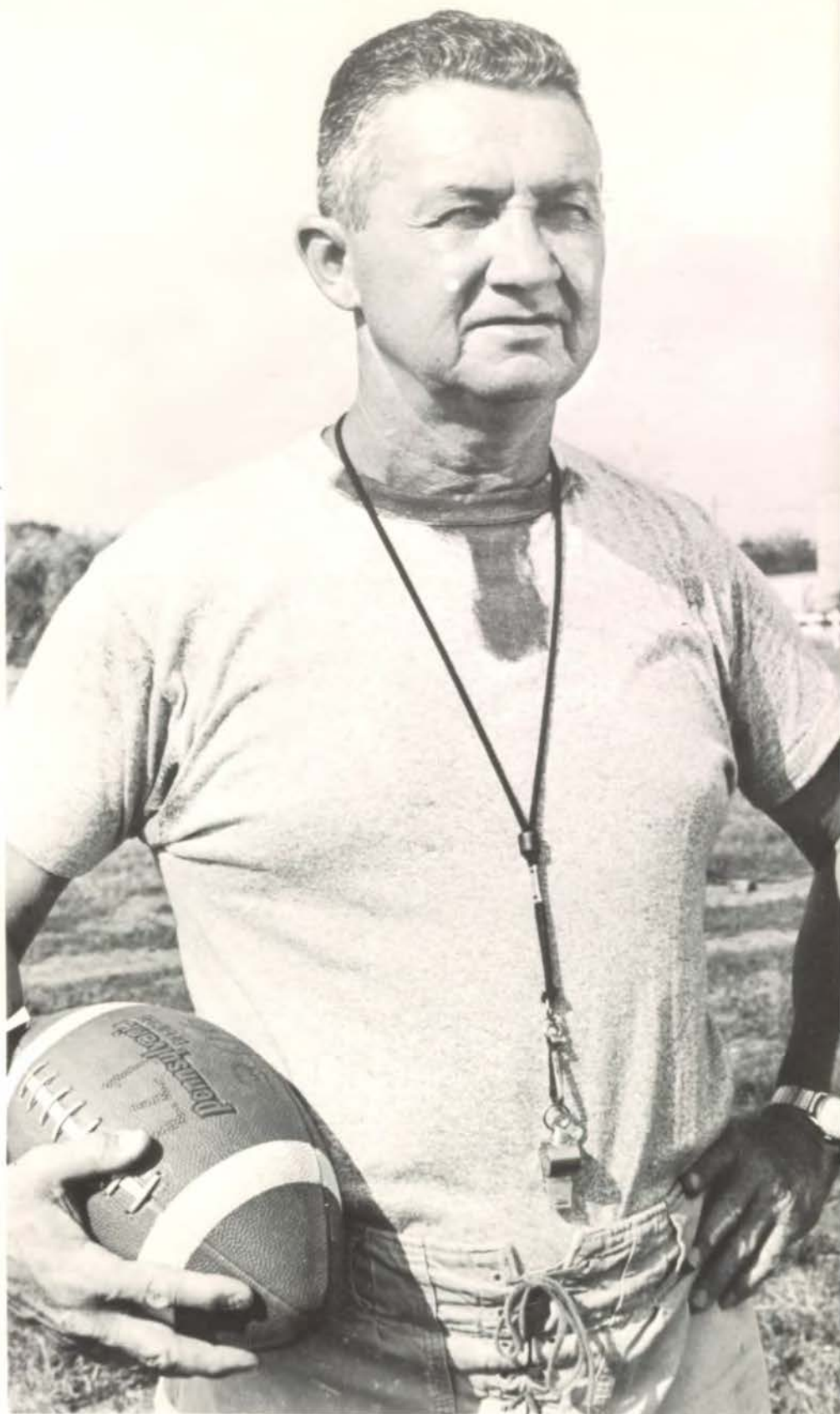

This was the year when the Lawrence Lions ran their winning streak to 32 games and 80 victories of the last 82 games played. It was also the year for the All-American as Rod Taylor and Kenny Wertzberger were selected for the high school All-American team. With the selection of the two Lion stalwarts, the Lawrence High All-American honor roll increased to 15. The *Lion of the Prairie*, Al Woolard, increased his won-lost record at Lawrence High to 121-9-4 over 15 years and a lifetime mark of 224-34-13.

With one of the toughest schedules the Lion have played, Lawrence's grid squad had a few anxious moments as Ottawa and Shawnee Mission East went down swinging, 7-6. Lawrence plied the ground game with 2,344 yards rushing to opponents 486. With the tradition of Lawrence High football as it is, the 1964 Lions added to the lustre with a perfect 9-0 season.

Lion Brain Trust Rates Credit For Coaching Job

Head coach Al Woolard works the principle that a good coaching staff is a necessary ingredient in winning football. With his veteran sidekick, Jerry Rogers, at his side for his fifteen year tenure, Woolard relies heavily on his aids for hard work, evaluation, and necessary instruction under the guidance of the master-builder, Al Woolard.

Rated as the state champion in 12 of the past 22 years, the Lions ended the 1964 season with a 32 game winning skein for the third best winning streak since the 47 games in 1955-1960 and a previous 39 in 1944-1948. Part of that success lies in the coaching ability of the staff gathered by Woolard. Jerry Rogers, 15 years at LHS, graduated from Washburn University and has been a key to the Lion success story. Darrell Falen is a 1955 graduate of southwestern College and started at West Junior in 1959 before making the shift to the High School. John Forbes and Jim Lewis handled the Little Lions and are graduates of Pittsburg State and William Jewel College respectively. The newest member of the team is Bob Fulton, a 1964 graduate of Pittsburg State College.

Cats Start Victorious

In the opening game of the season, the Lions were prepared for anything but a 25-0 win but with Rod Taylor pounding out 116 yards of the 283 the Lions gained, the start was a step toward an undefeated year.

Coach J. W. Emerson of Ottawa brought a fired up crew of Cyclones to town for the second fracas of the grid season and the Lions met the attack with everything they had. In the third period, Ottawa took charge on the Lions 34 and tallied with 2:47 left in the frame. The extra point failed and Lawrence faced a tough situation.

With 1:51 showing on the clock, Mickey Allen took the reins of the Lion offense and promptly hit Larry Stanclift with a TD pass and then returned with the PAT for a 7-6 win.

One of the reasons Rod Taylor earned his All-State and All-American honors was evident in this gallop against Parsons as a dozen Vikings hit Taylor but couldn't stop him.

Power, Pressure Key Success

The homecoming bout with Derby turned into a rout as Lawrence bounced to a 33-0 win. However, the next time out, it took Randy Finrock's toe, hard charges from Steve Ridgway and a save by All-American Kenny Wertzberger to salvage a 7-6 win over Shawnee Mission East.


Leavenworth was the fourth victim of the season as the Cats had their most impressive win with 366 yards gained while holding the Pioneers to 47 in a 35-0 contest.

Kenny Wertzberger earned himself "Lineman of the Week" from the Topeka Daily Capital by dropping a Shawnee Mission North runner on the eleven yardline to preserve a 19-13 Lawrence lead and eventual victory.

Tearing into the Wyandotte Bulldogs with the violent slashes of a reckless Lion, Lawrence garnered a 27-12 win against a hot air-minded club.



The final two games of the season found the Topeka Trojans down 33-14 and Parsons suffering the worst defeat of the season 47-12 to give Lawrence a perfect 9-0 year and a 33 game winning skein. Rod Taylor had his best night of the year with 119 yards for the game.

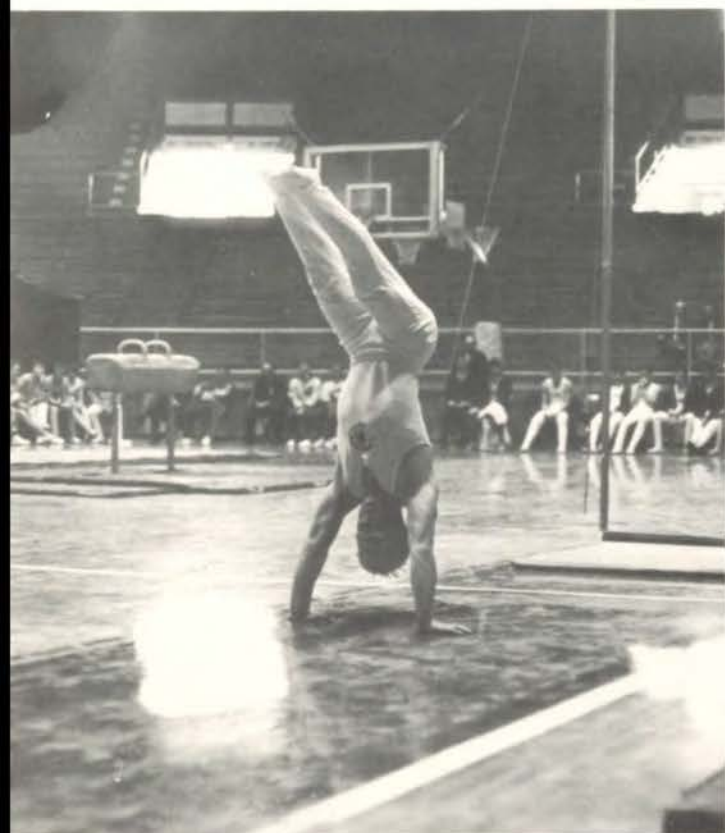

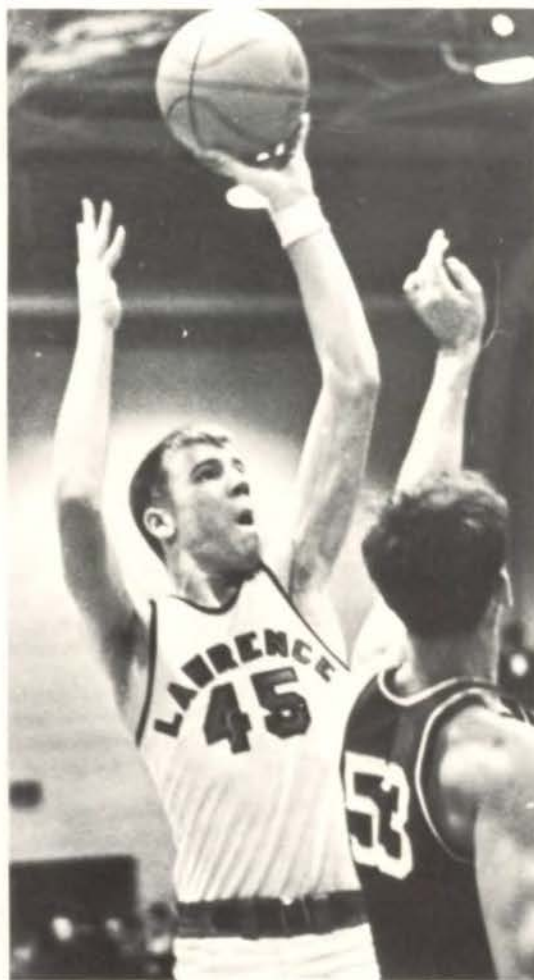

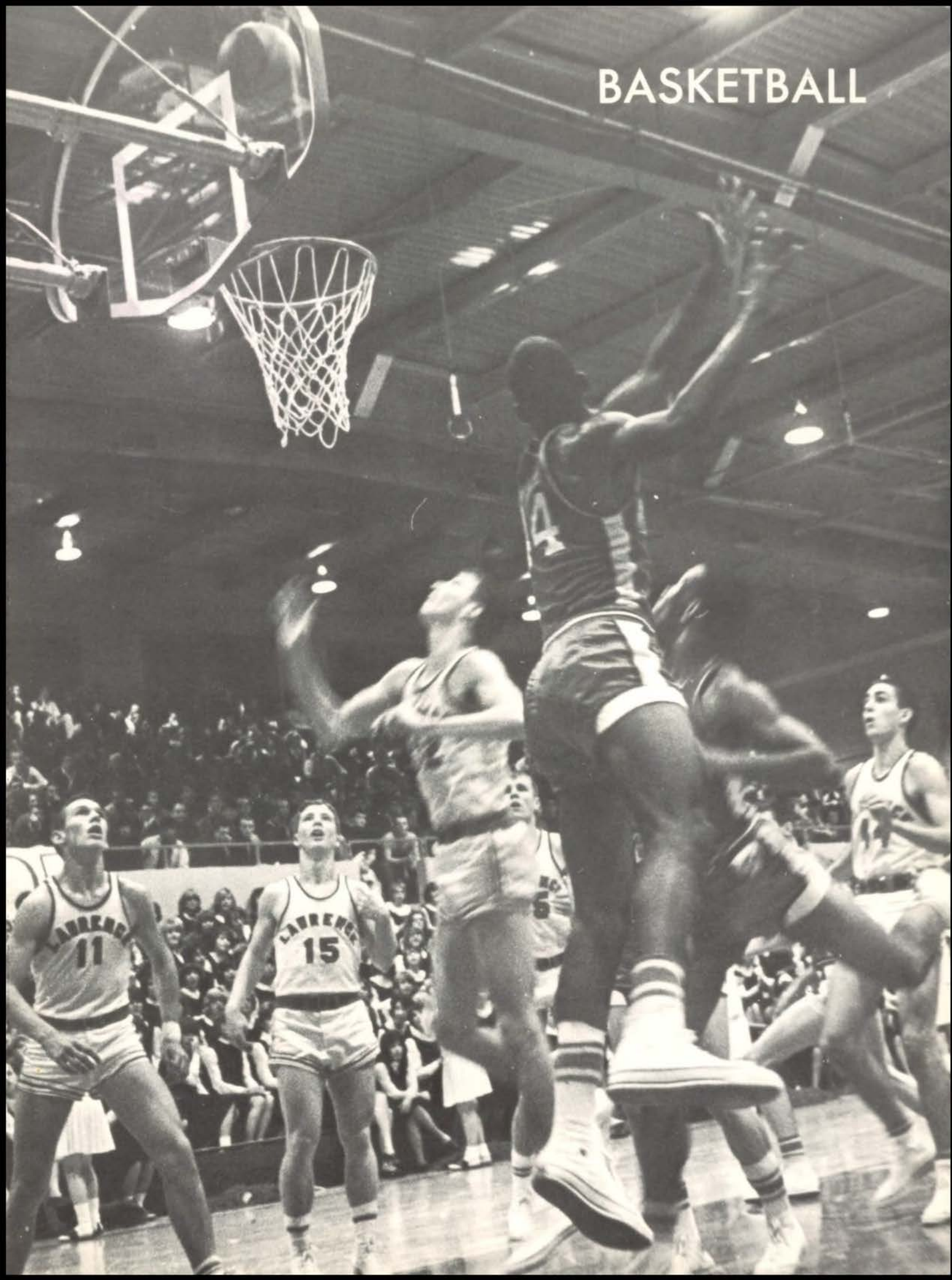

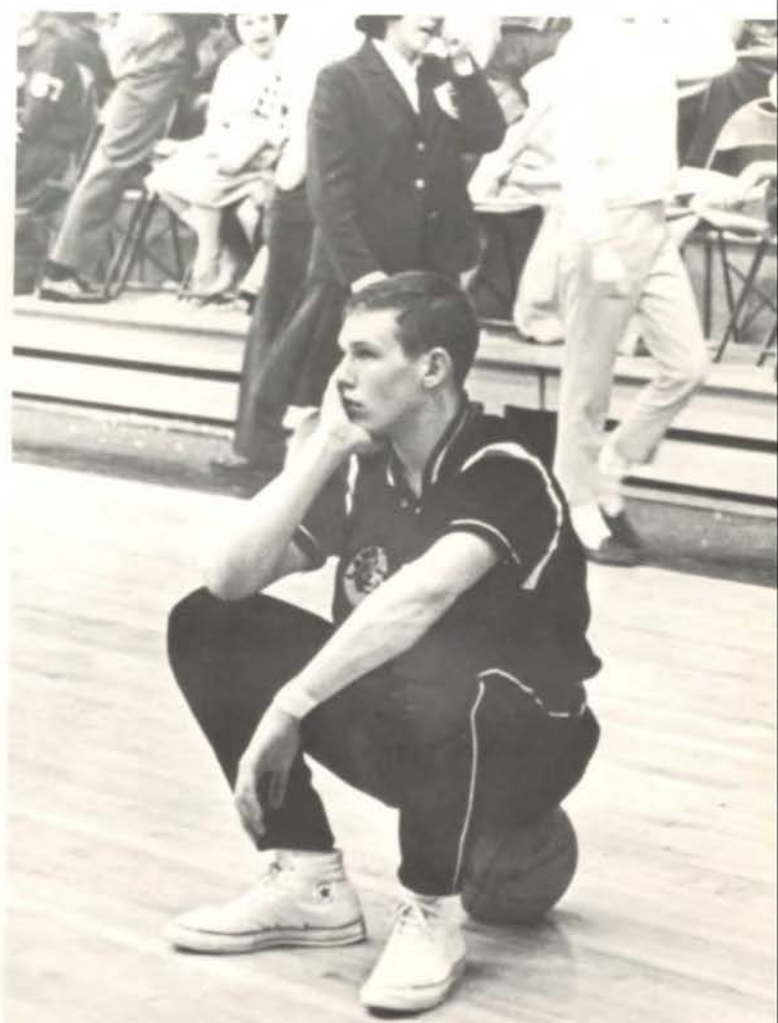

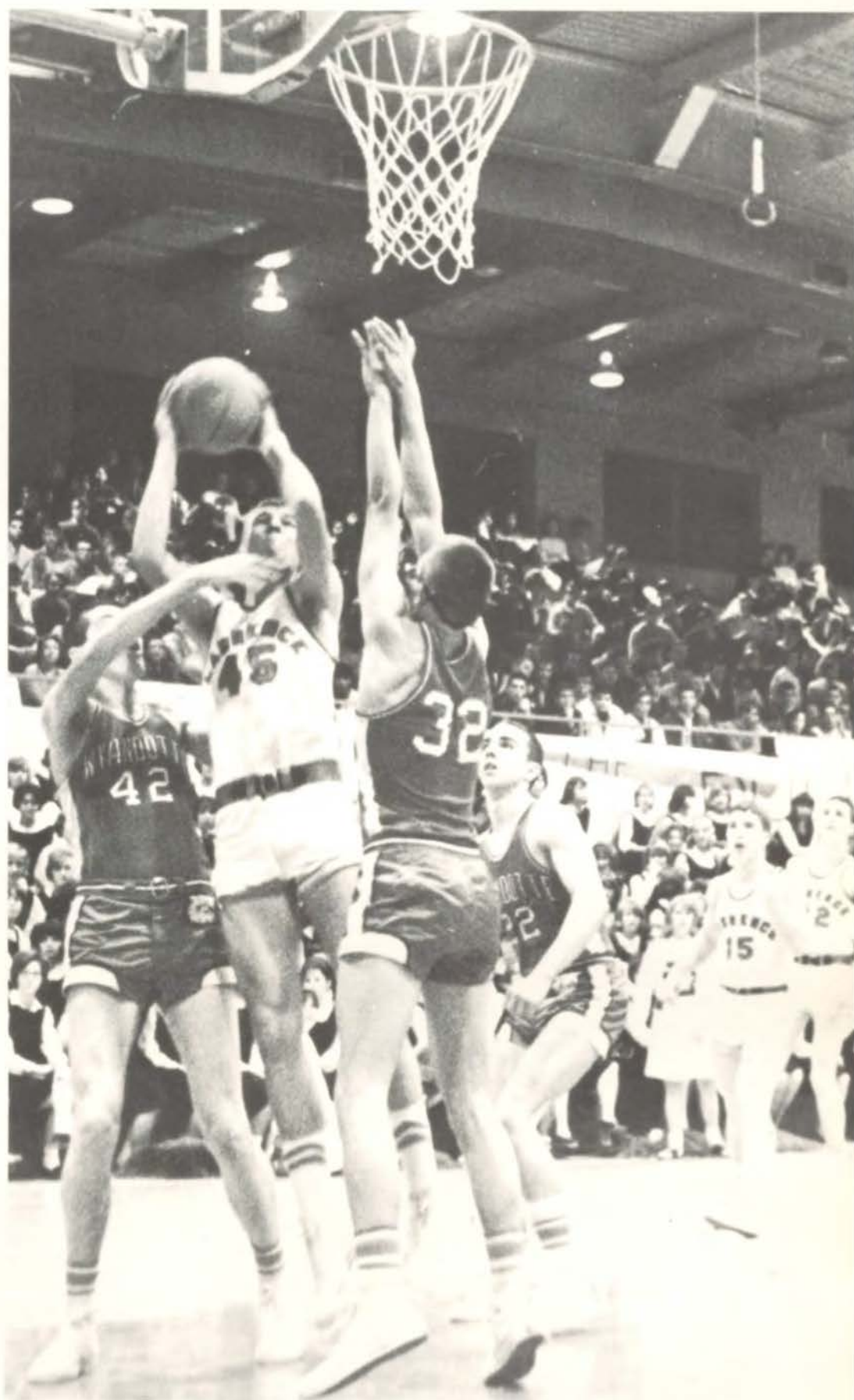

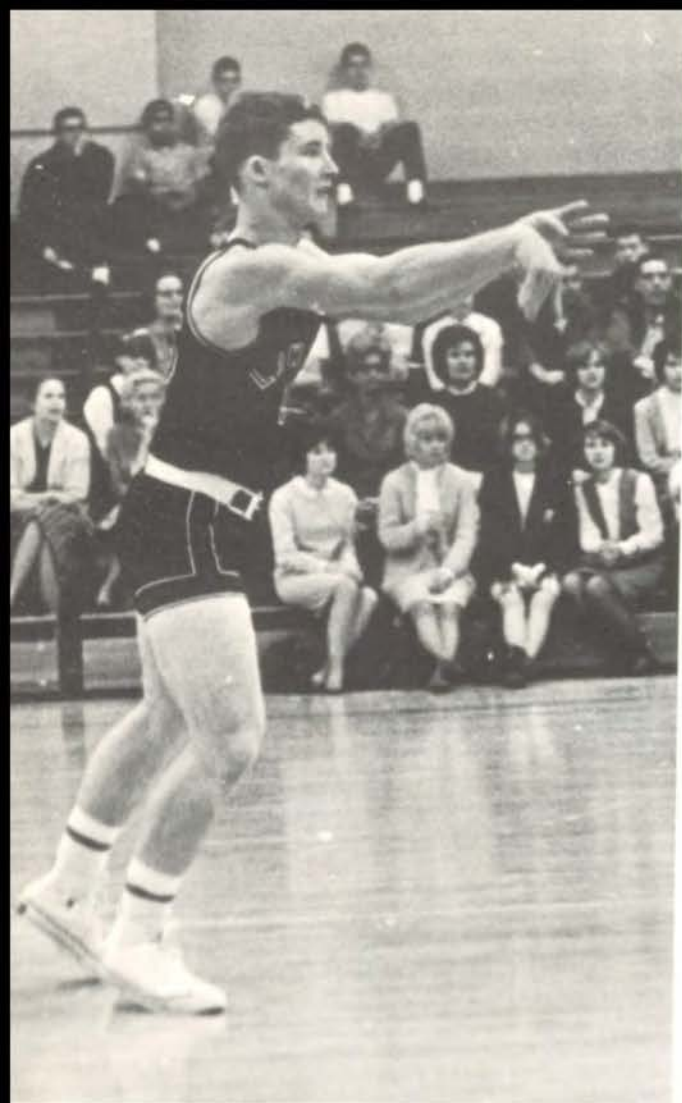
Team Produces Greatest Lion Scorer In Lawrence History

The best scorer in the history of Lawrence basketball and the top rebounder as well as one of the greatest free throw shooters would be high praise indeed for a cager. However, it fits the amiable Steve Kandybowicz who etched his name in Lion basketball annals with a season's average of 19.68 and a 14 rebound average.

Being left-handed seemed no bother to the 6-4 pivot as he shoveled close-in shots through the hoop with regularity from either side of the goal and sometimes from behind. With 132 goals in 285 attempts, Steve averaged 47 percent and 83 percent at the free throw line.



Against Wyandotte, Steve Kandybowicz chucked in 22 points while Lucius Allen had one of his lowest nights in scoring with 15 counters. Kandy pulled in 276 rebounds and had 11 against Allen and company, the state champions.

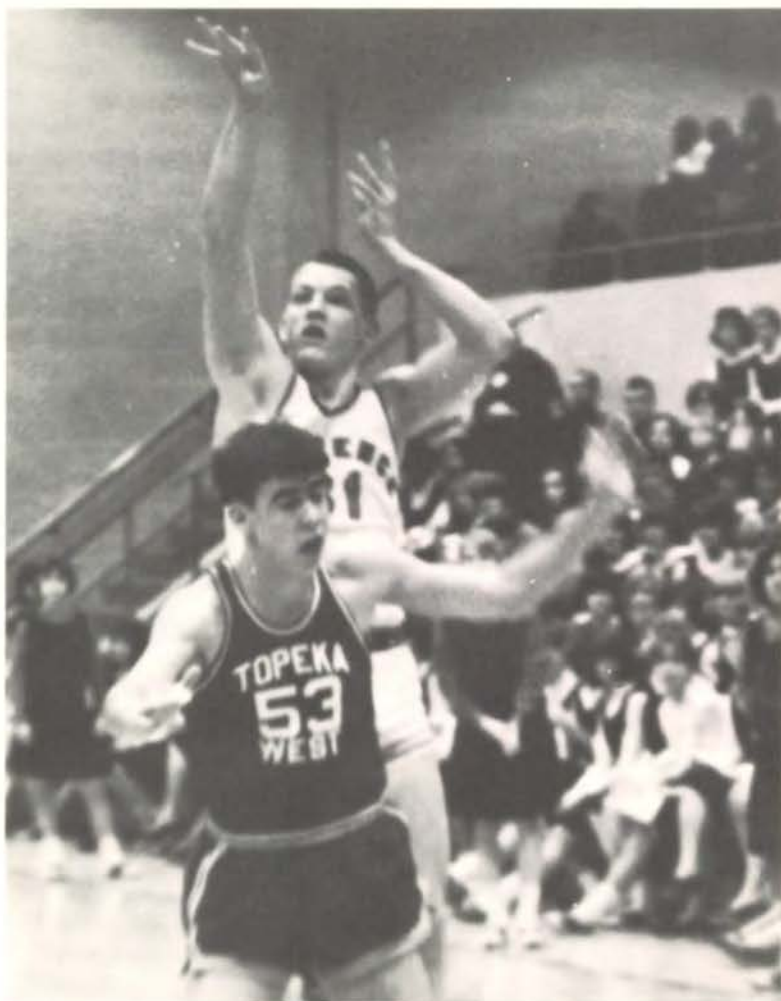

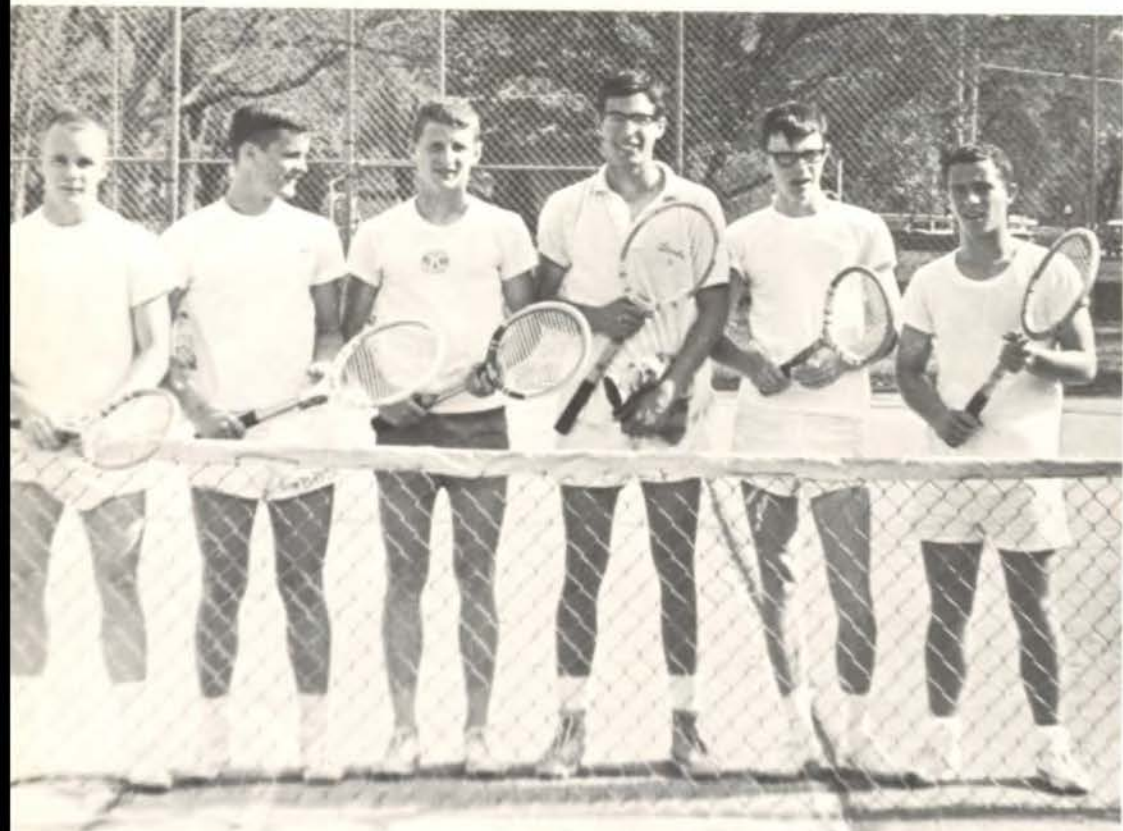

In the confusing years around 1943, a young man was graduated from Lawrence High on May 20 but he had already moved to the University for his studies. That youngster turned out to be Congressman Robert F. Ellsworth, Republican member of the United States House of Representatives.

Outstanding as a student, Robert was a Summerfield Scholarship candidate, a student council member and treasurer of his junior class. He entered KU the second semester of his senior year and was later graduated with a BS in Mechanical Engineering. He also graduated from the University of Michigan with a law degree and was admitted to the Massachusetts bar in 1949 and began his law practice in Springfield.

In 1953 and 1954, Representative Ellsworth was legal assistant for maritime affairs to the Vice Chairman of the Federal Maritime Board of the U. S. Department of Commerce. He was also admitted to practice law in the highest state courts of Massachusetts and Kansas, the U. S. Patent Office, the U. S. Treasury Department, the U. S. District Court and the U. S. Supreme Court. He was a member of the University of Kansas faculty of the School of Business in 1956 and 1957.

During World War II and the Korean conflict, Bob Ellsworth was a Lieutenant Commander in the U. S. Navy Reserve. He is a member of the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, the Mental Health Association, the Heart Association, the Optimist Club, the Rotary International, the Masons, Douglas County and Kansas Bar Associations, Beta Theta Pi and the Phi Delta Phi.

Representative Ellsworth was elected to the 87th Congress November 8, 1960 and was reelected to the 88th and 89th Congresses. While in the House, he has served on the Joint Economic Committee, the Post Office and Civil Service Committee, and the Veterans Affairs Committee. He also has been a member of the House Republican Policy Committee special task force on NATO unity and the executive committee of the Congressional Campaign Committee.

Congressman Robert F. Ellsworth has truly shown his leadership in many ways as well as serving his community and country. Lawrence High School students have been given by him a career guide and a hope for the future.

Following in the footsteps of such famous grads as representative Ellsworth, Steve Ridgway and Paula Winn have displayed leadership during their years at LHS.

Steve Ridgway was a member of the student council, treasurer of the Hi-Y, member of the physical science club, A Cappella, football letterman and co-captain, basketball and track participant, and a National Merit finalist. Also Steve received the Olney Scholarship, was president of the German club, a member of ensemble and chorus and was Governor of Boy's State in his junior year. Steve was awarded the Good Citizen's Award and the Best Mannered Senior Boy award this year while being the valedictorian of his graduating class.

Paula Winn was active in governmental affairs as the youngster was Lieutenant Governor of Girls State in her junior year and was a member of student council, treasurer of Y-Teens, member of pep club, girl's city league, girl's sport show, feature editor of the BUDGET, member of Quill & Scroll, vice-president and treasurer of Spanish club, and Red and Black choruses. She has shown consistent leadership qualities in the past and, along with Steve Ridgway will become a living example of the excellence that has given Lawrence High School many such graduates to be proud of.

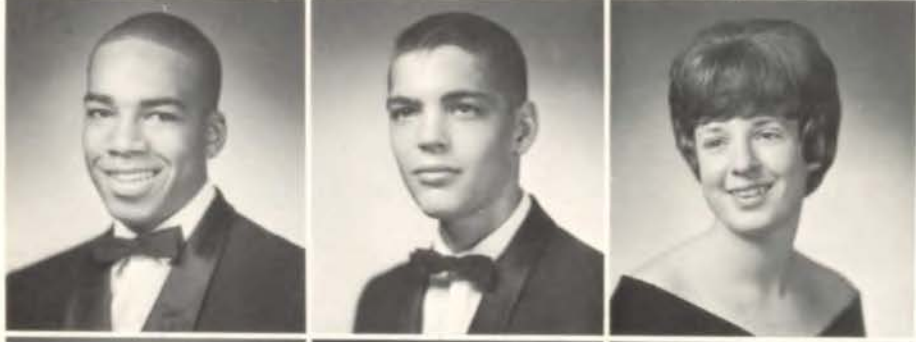

Dr. Knox still has music as his main interest but he gets out to do some golfing and gardening. An active man, the outdoors intrigues the veteran educator and his family life is an example to be used as a guide to a happy home.

A hard-working editor-in-chief, Bill spent several hours daily at his job. There is always a custodian in the building due to the fact that they work in shifts. Many thanks are owed to these harworking people for beautifully kept building and grounds.

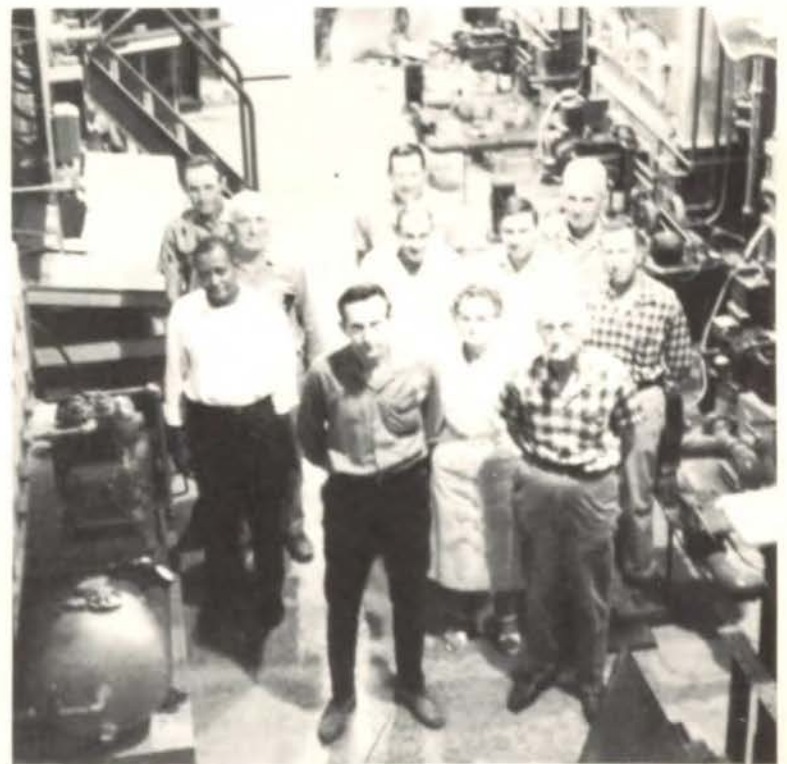
