



LSHS remained a unique high school in 1987-1988. Student attendance hit 2,503. The number of administrators grew by one, and the faces changed. Mr. Tom Flint became the full-time activities director, and Mr. Stan Elliott was promoted to assistant principal in Division II. Division I also welcomed a new assistant principal, Mr. Scottie Grisell.

New to LSHS were four mobile classrooms, added to accomodate the increased number of students. One hundred thirty-four teachers, thirteen secretaries, six teachers' aides, two healthroom aides, eighteen custodians, and seven counselors were employed at LSHS. Five foreign exchange students attended school, and fifteen students visited for three weeks in the fall from Italy.

to break from the daily routine, lunch and seminar provided the half-way mark for the school day.



a successful Homecoming








Monday found students "skinning the Bears" with their clothes inside-out.

Lee's Summit students put cavemen to shame on Tarzan and Jane day with their prehistoric attire.





Eighty-five students and members of the faculty were involved in PLUS. A two-day session was held to train new members in active listening skills.


A new student luncheon, during fourth and fifth hours, helped the new students feel more at ease. PLUS students also showed new transfer students around the school.





Debaters were expected to maintain a B average and attend tournaments held on Friday nights and Saturdays.


Students in these classes averaged two hours of homework each night, researching their cases and memorizing.

"We spent a lot of time and effort on various activities, but overall I think it was worthwhile and also a lot of fun," NHS member Kelly Cahill, senior, said.






A HELPING HAND












Changes Benefit Students




The Industrial Technology department separated into two departments. The department chairpersons are Ken Holmes, Division II; and Mr. Jerry Young, Division I.

"A predominately sophomore team with one freshman shows much potential for the upcoming


years. Skills were developed, and we saw improvement in every player. This was the primary goal," Coach White said.











For some, it was their first high school season of basketball and for others, a second; but, for everyone--a season of accomplishments.


"The boys are young and inexperienced but are full of potential," Coach Picerno said. "The future holds promise."

Coaches Kim Rohlfing and Kimble Akard led the freshman boys to a victorious season.








The Junior Varsity Wrestling Team had a season of excellence.




The Junior Class, known for being the largest in LSHS history, consisted of approximately 657 students. It will be the 100th class to graduate since the founding of LS high school in 1889.

The class of 1990 could reflect on their sophomore year as a time of change. A time in which students became more involved with school activities.




















Frosh On T. V.
