






















Along with practice once a week, the cheeleaders cheered for at least three activities per week. Senior co-captain, Jodi Larson, said, "It feels good when they (the


















The National Honor Society sponsored



































ophomore class officers contributed a great deal over the past two years by organizing and bringing the sophomore class together through their strong leadership.







A Teacher's View

B eyond the crowded halls lie the classrooms. Inside these rooms of knowledge are the people who make learning possible--teachers.



A ll you seemed to hear from many seniors was how much they wanted to leave high school and go to college. College was where the fun life began, according to many high school seniors. Seniors often got caught dreaming about their future.

If the senior attended Lee's Summit High School he had a better chance at reaching his dream. Lee's Summit High School students consistently scored higher than the Natonal Average on the A.C.T. Assessment. The test covered English, math, social studies, and natural science. The average composite score of a student at Lee's Summit was 20.1, while the average of high school students across the nation was 18.8. Possible scores on the A.C.T. Assessment ranged from 1 to 36.

Lee's Summit students also scored above the national average on the English section of the assessment. Students who scored high on the A.C.T., had a wider selction of colleges to chose from. The high scores of Lee's Summit students on the A.C.T. Assessment demonstrated the high qualities and values of education held at Lee's Summit High School.











Students who did well in math were able to take many advanced courses, including Calculus, for college credit. Students were able to leave the high school ready for any mathematical problem before them.







s a preventative measure during a measles epidemic, students were required to receive MMA (Measles-Mumps-Rubella) shots. During a two-day period, students anticipated the needle which was to make them immune. While waiting in line to be inoculated, one could study the haunting words on their yellow forms which read: "As with any vaccine or drug...even death could occur." Yet, those fears subsided as all students received their shot and school continued as normal. The result was, Lee's Summit High School increased its immunity, and a serious epidemic was avoided.


Congratulations
