In September they assumed a sophisticated air since they were juniors. Knowing all the "ropes," they came to the conclusion that nothing would stop them from being the best class of juniors that Lincoln had received. Under the leadership of Ernest Blackman, whom they called President, they planned the junior and senior reception which was a success. Those that were dramatically inclined produced a Junior Play that will be long remembered. All during this time the class was venturing nearer and nearer to the "Heights of Knowledge." Some of the band met with failure on the way, however, and were on the verge of despair but ambition took a hand in things and with the help of courage they tried again and succeeded. The weak one that met with failure sank deeper and deeper itno despair until the "Heights of Knowledge" were no longer within their reach. The fortunate were promoted and became seniors.

The word senior meant dignity to the class of "46," and how they needed it to elect class officers, for year books, pictures, fees, and invitations all added to their worries and frustrations. Everything was piling up but as usual the class was willing to carry the load. Ernest Blackman was elected class president again, Geneva Shakespeare, vice president; Lavern Blagburn, secretary; Conrad Buckner, treasurer. During this time every member of the band strode forth to do the very best he could; for low grades were dreaded by all and this was their last chance to make good before leaving the Land of Knowledge.

But during the journey the class's eyes had been opened to many thing and they will advance. With ambition urging them, truth guiding them, the knowledge they have gained ahead will push them.

The Tigers played three games at the Ruppert Stadium. They were Muskogee, Sumner and Coles. The lat-


ter was the only one we heat.




