


THE MADRIGALS

The colors are purple and white. White represents purity and loyalty to the club.






The defeat the Tigers handed the R. T. Coles five annexed for them the 1947 City Basketball Championship.

Under the guidance of Coach Mason, who returned after a leave of absence, and Mr. Anderson, the Tigers were strongly guided, and always praised whether they won or lost.


