


This Is Our Story

"Readin', Ritin', and Rithmetic"





The family centered homemaking program encourages projects which broaden the pupil's interests, foster wholesome attitudes, develop more discriminating tastes and help to improve techniques and skills. These activities tend to make life richer and more meaningful for girls and boys.

Homemaking I and II is a general or family centered homemaking course. It consists of 16 weeks in Managing the Family Meals, 16 weeks instruction on Clothes for Young Moderns, with three short units on Laundry, Home Care of the Sick, and Living With Your Family.












Tigers Take Inter


scholastic Title 17-0, Record for Season




