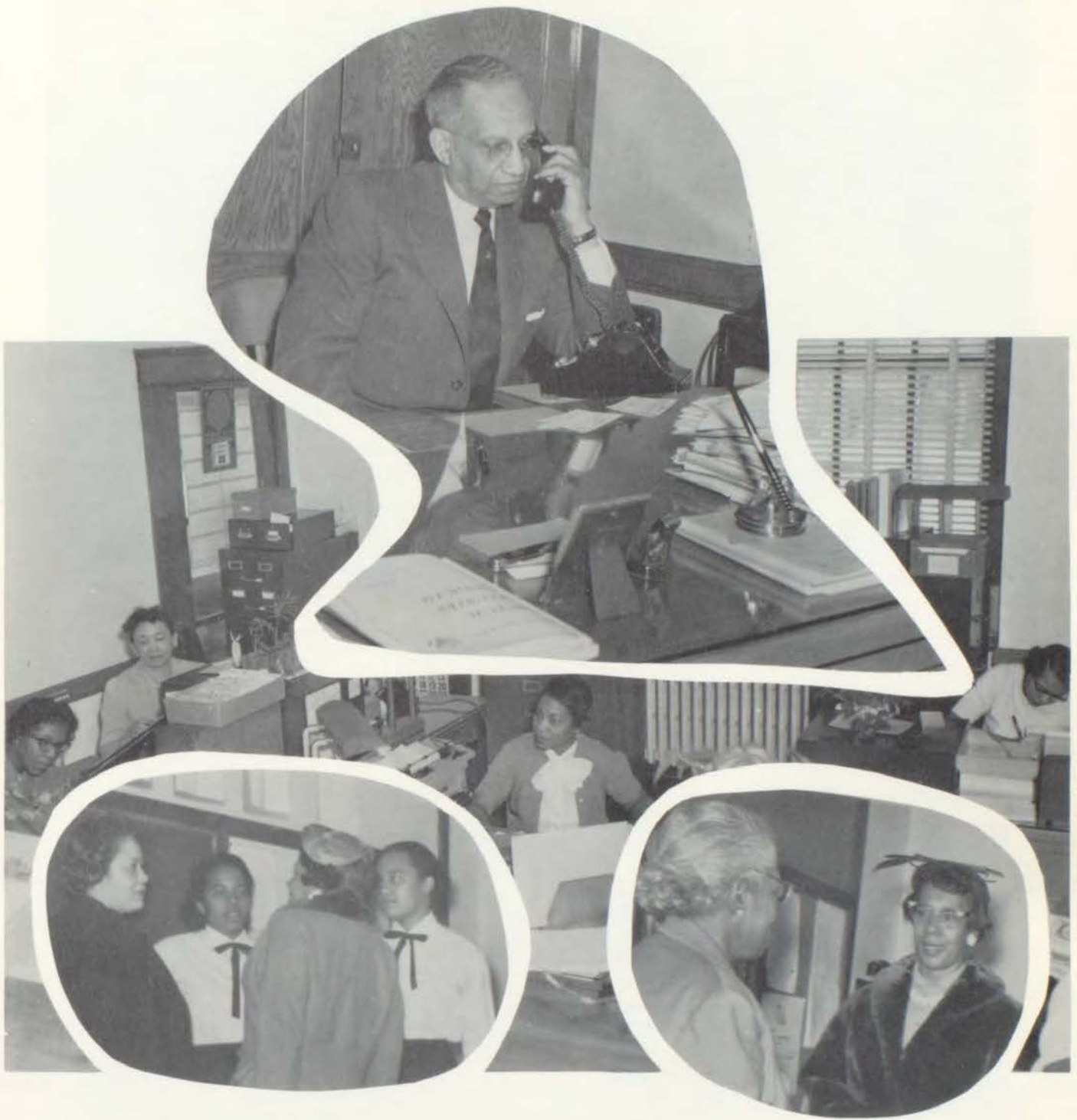
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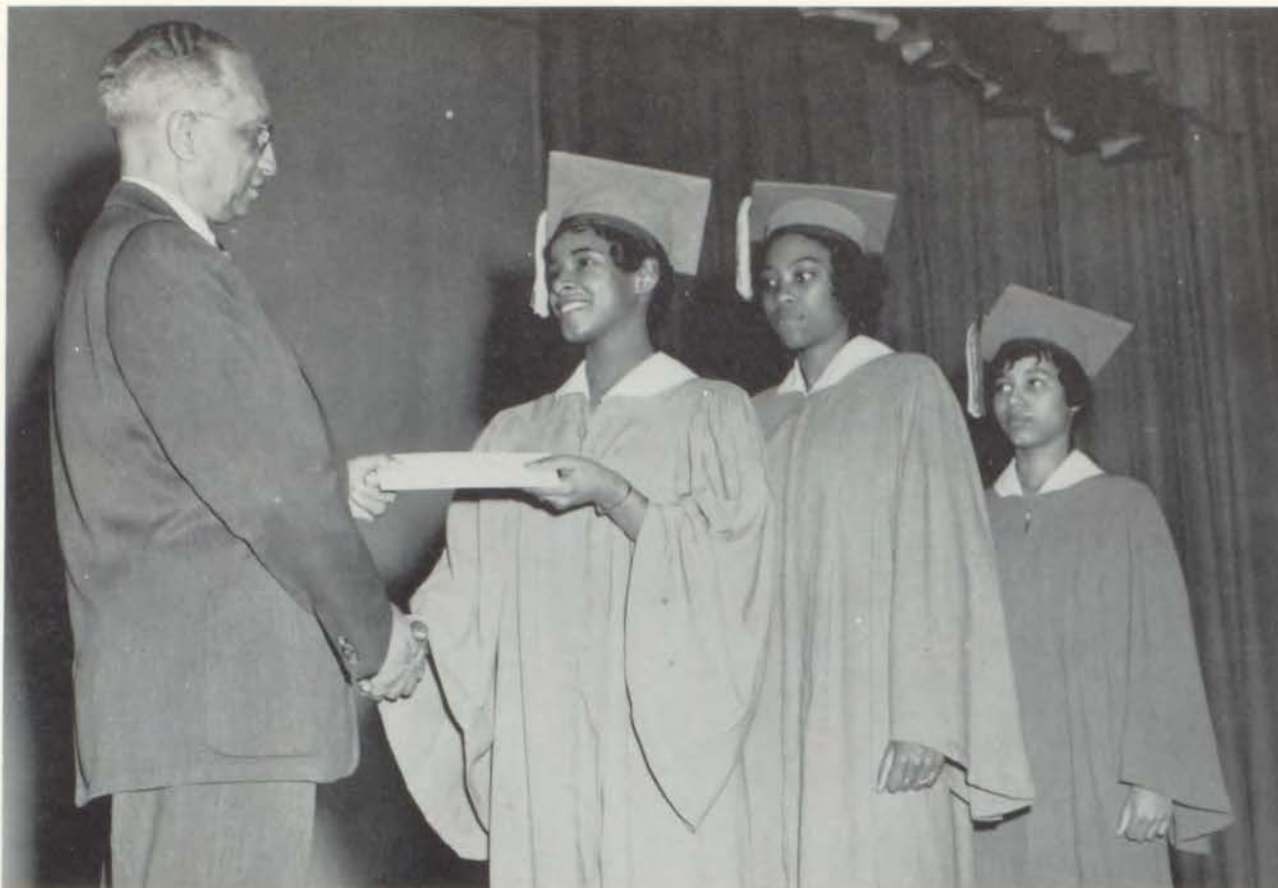
## *The Story Of Sixty*

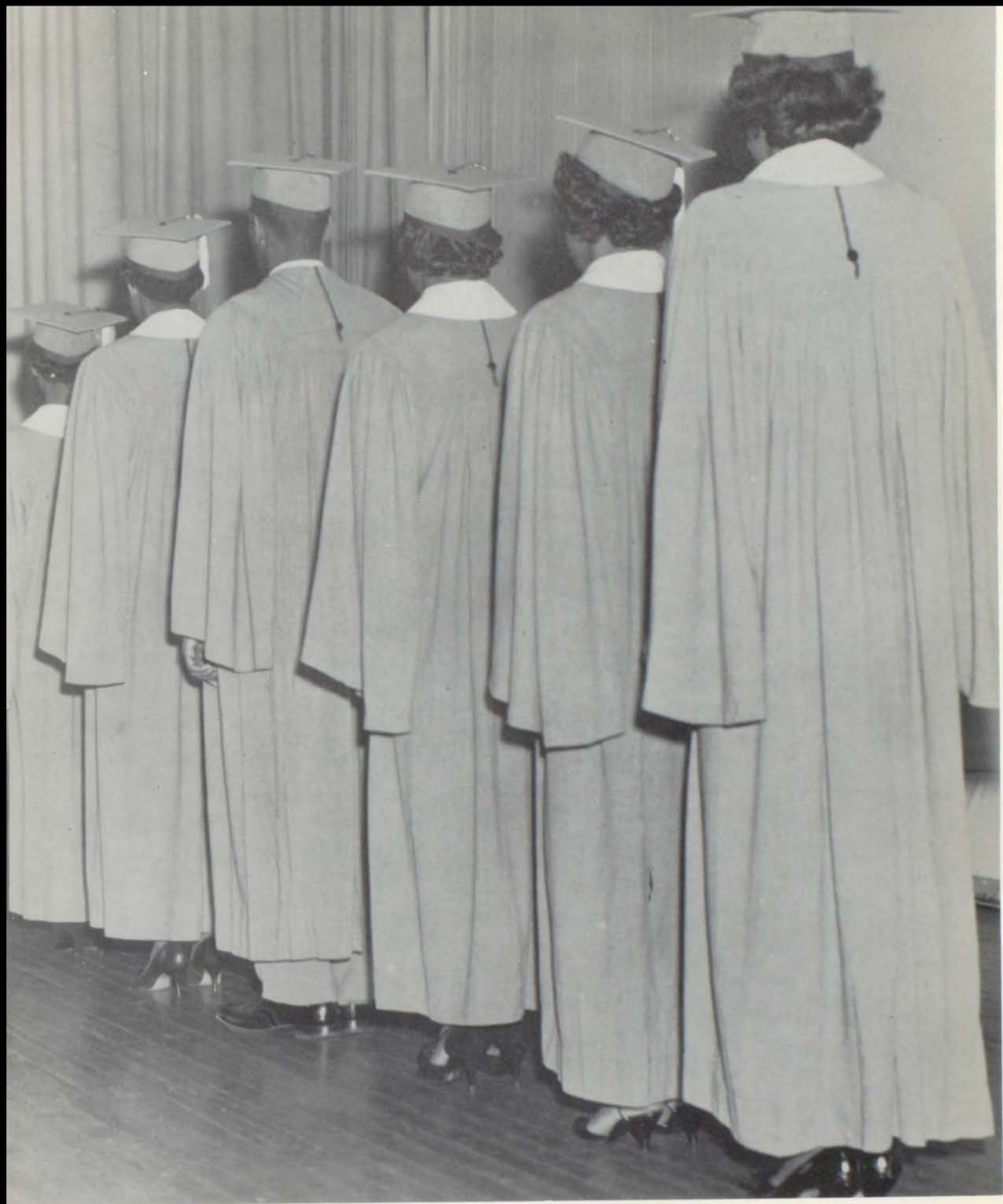

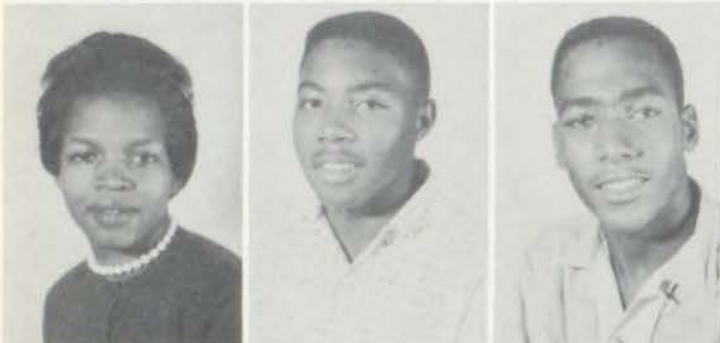

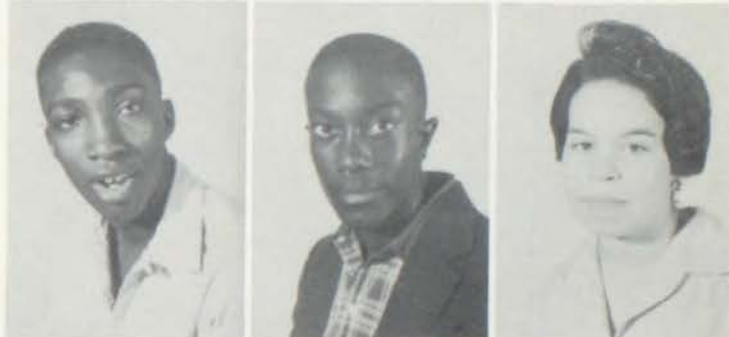

## *The Story Of Sixty*

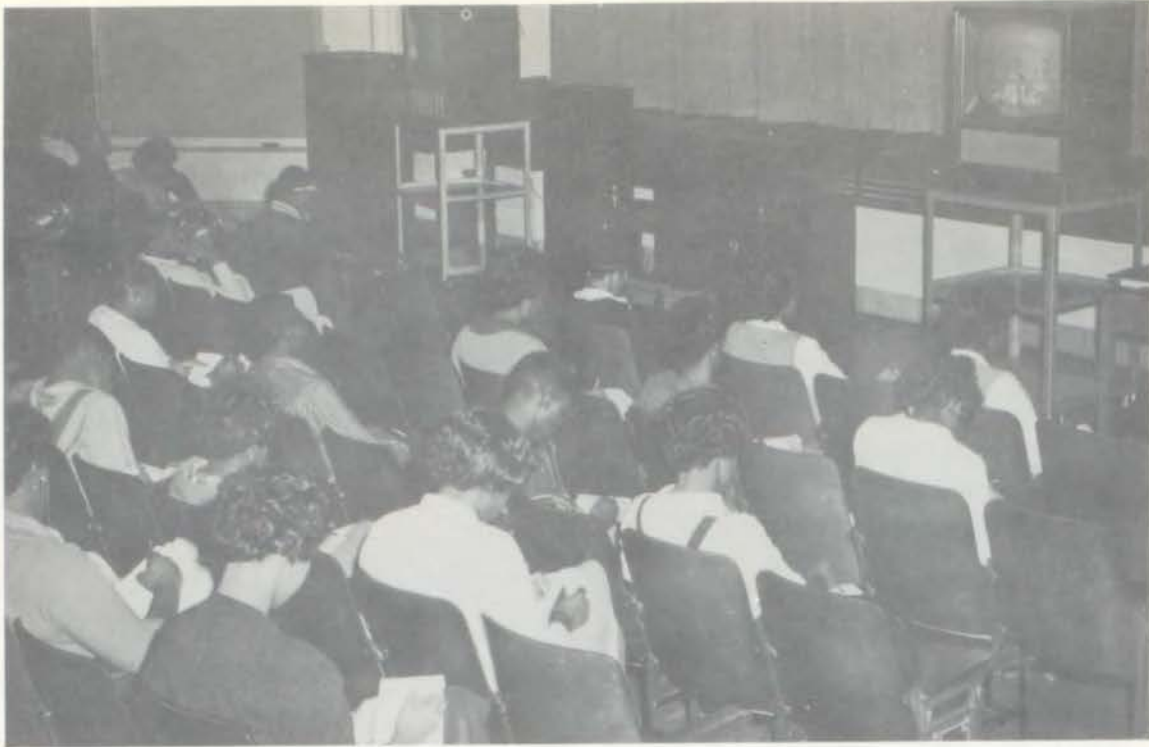

## *American History By TV*

Pupils enrolled in American History are now part of a nation-wide experiment in direct teaching by T V. Everyday at the 4B to 5A period, a large group of pupils gather in the auditorium to see "Tele-School" with Mrs. Geraldine Workman as their TV teacher. The program lasts twenty-five minutes after which Mr. Kirkpatrick and his assistant teacher, Miss Mayfield, conduct follow-up activities such as discussions, oral reports, and assignments. In addition to the regular textbook, pupils use work sheets and tests constructed by Mrs. Workman and the participating American History teachers.



# Special Help For Needy

A Special Education curriculum is designed for very slow pupils who need concentrated help academically and vocationally. Functional learning-experience units are based on pupil needs, interests, abilities, purposes and problems rather than on strict subject matter. Pupils receive training in skills, habits and attitudes which will enable them to be useful citizens and earn a desirable living for themselves. Pupils who are weak in basic reading skills are enrolled in special reading classes where they receive individual instruction and are allowed to advance at their own rate of speed.
