





Students were pumped to get their muscles toned. On Workout Wednesday, everyone showed how they dress to go for a run, to lift some weights, or to just power through the day.












CONTRARY to popular belief, a Lincoln student does not spend all of their time hitting the books. When free time arises, there are plenty of places around the city Lincolnians explore.


PRIZED possessions can range from family heirlooms, childhood trinkets, objects that you have gathered throughout your life, or simply something that has been given to you by a loved one.

in other classes. For example, they learn to use different Microsoft programs, such as Excel and Word, which can be very useful in life.


"Learning how to use computers appropriately will be the best life tool a student can have. These are skills will help them manage their future," said Ms. Griesbach.





> "Debate is very busy. I enjoy the team because they are all intelligent students, and I never truly realized





Being able to push yourself comes with the intensity of the sport. In addition, the team seem to work well with one another. But, they also have to remember to be competitive and challenge themselves.






