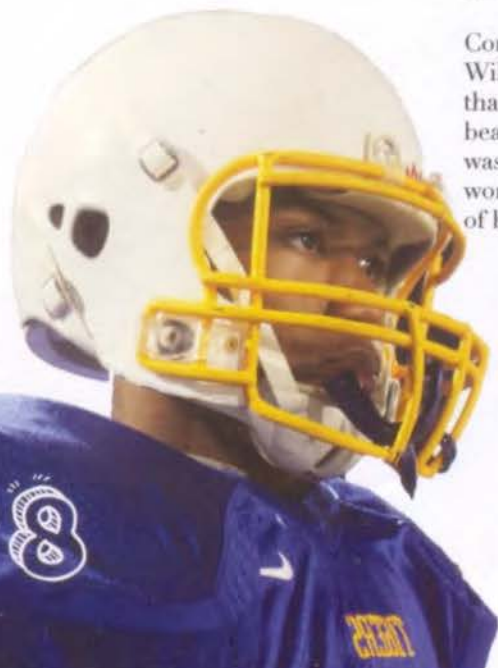
# *a star-studded night* HOCO CHAMPS

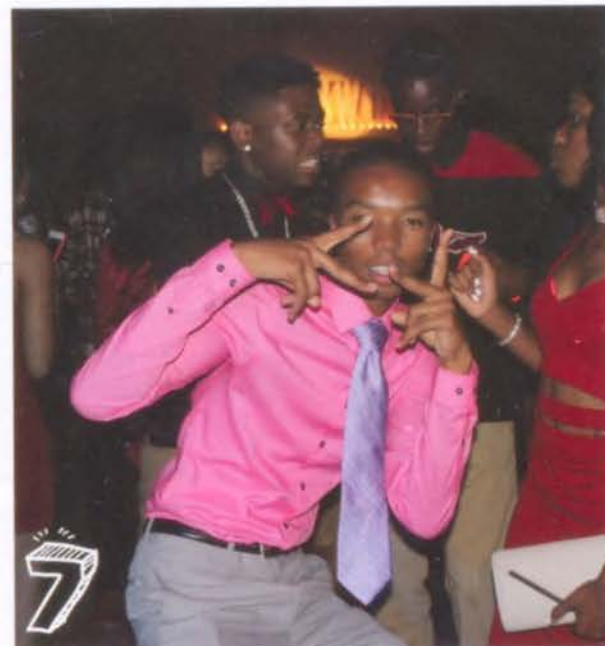
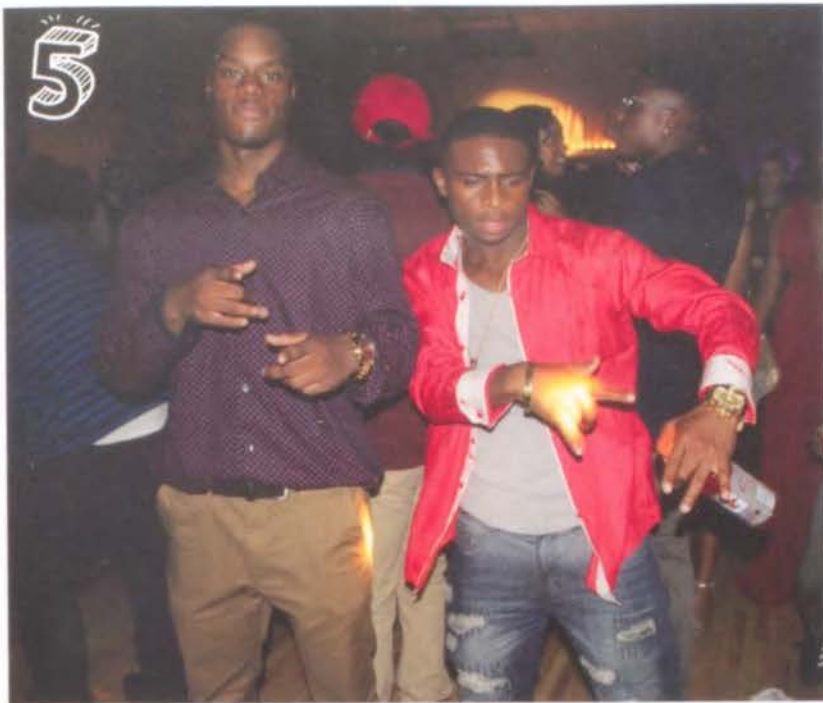

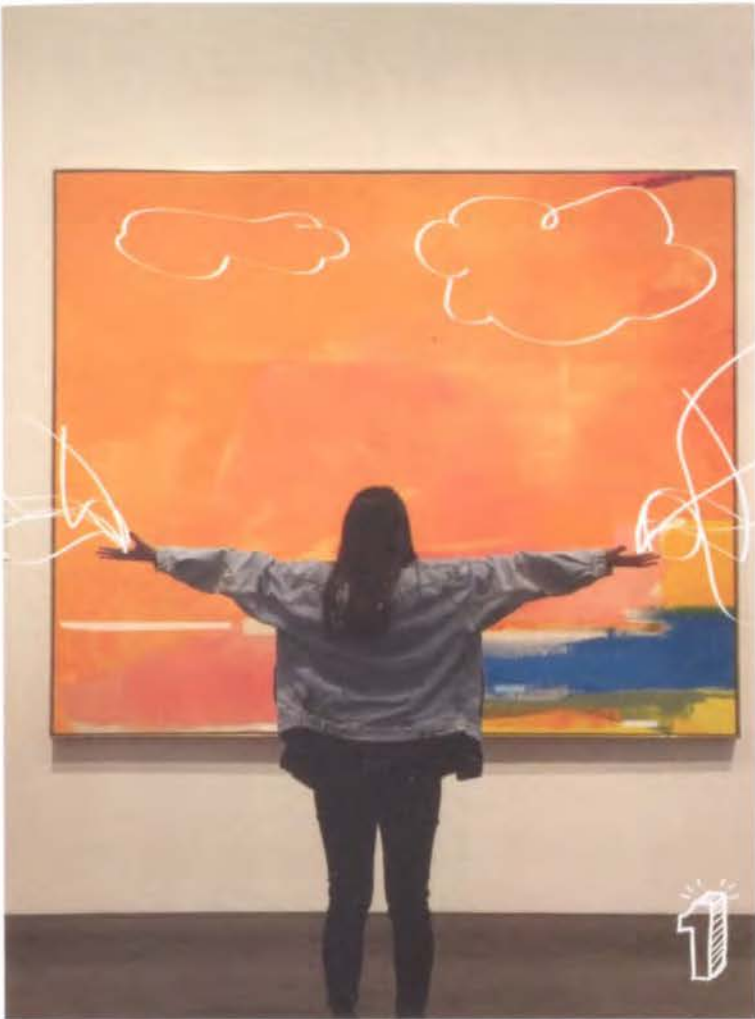
# the grand spooktacle FALL BASH

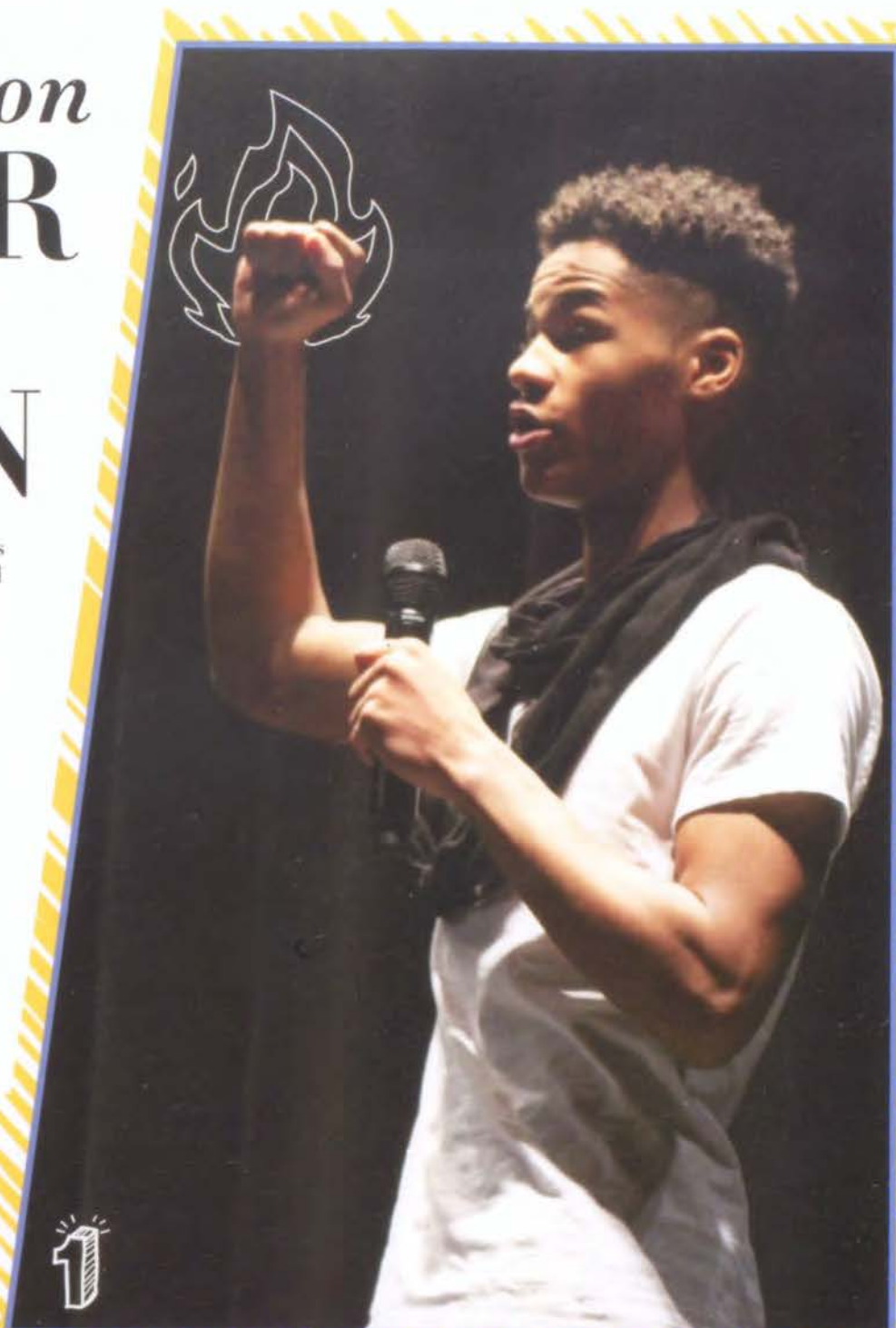


# have a vision NEVER BACK DOWN

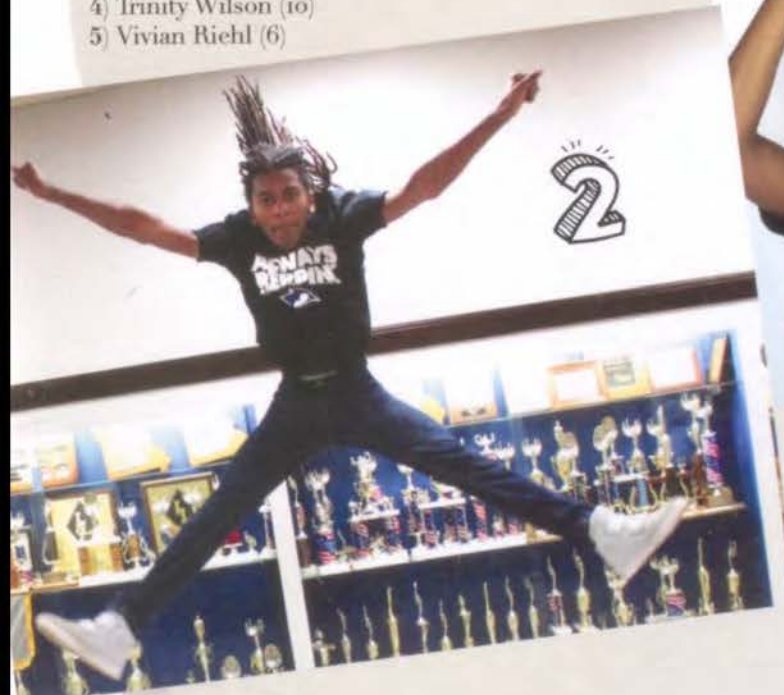
and following the wrong path, I realized that there is more to life than being in someone's shadow."

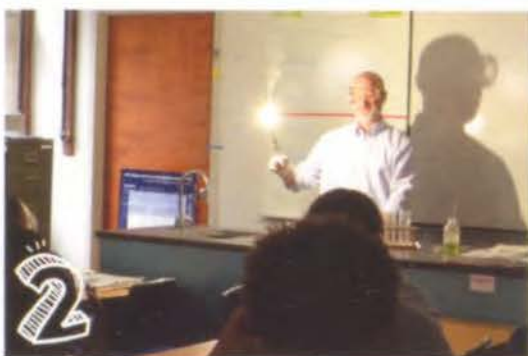
# *gaining momentum* SCIENCE

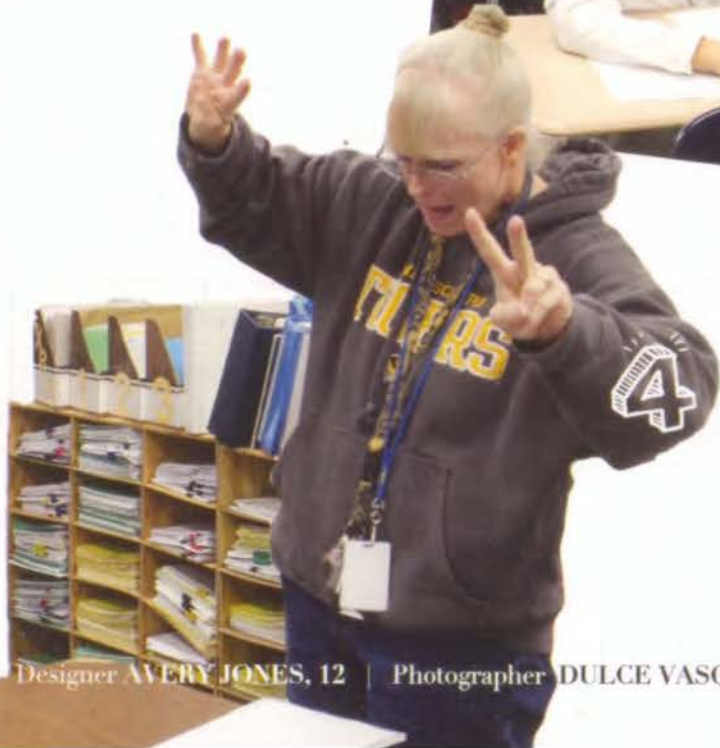
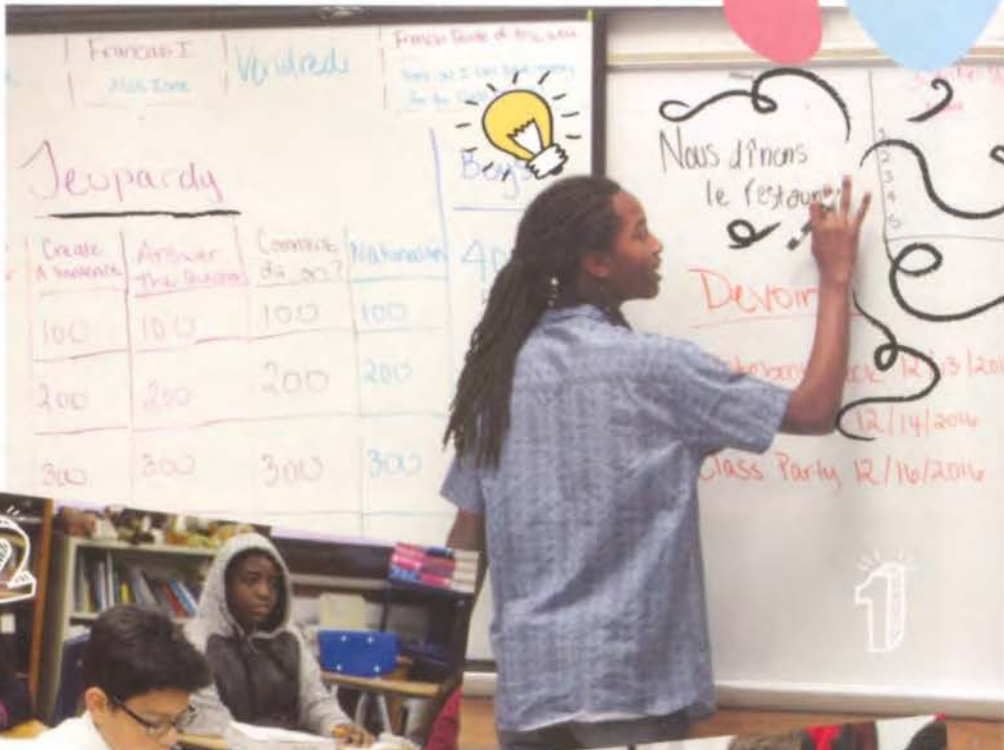


# around the world IN FOUR CLASSES

*INFLUENCING* great health has come in different forms at Lincoln College Prep. It goes from the health class, where you not only learn things about physical health, to social health to weight training.

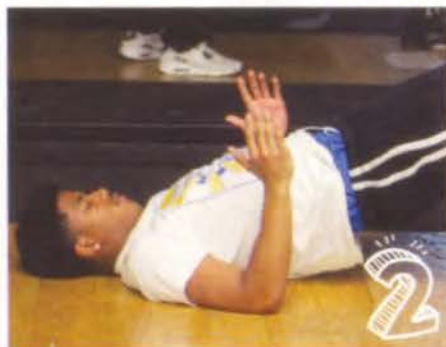

## DIGITAL IMPACTS

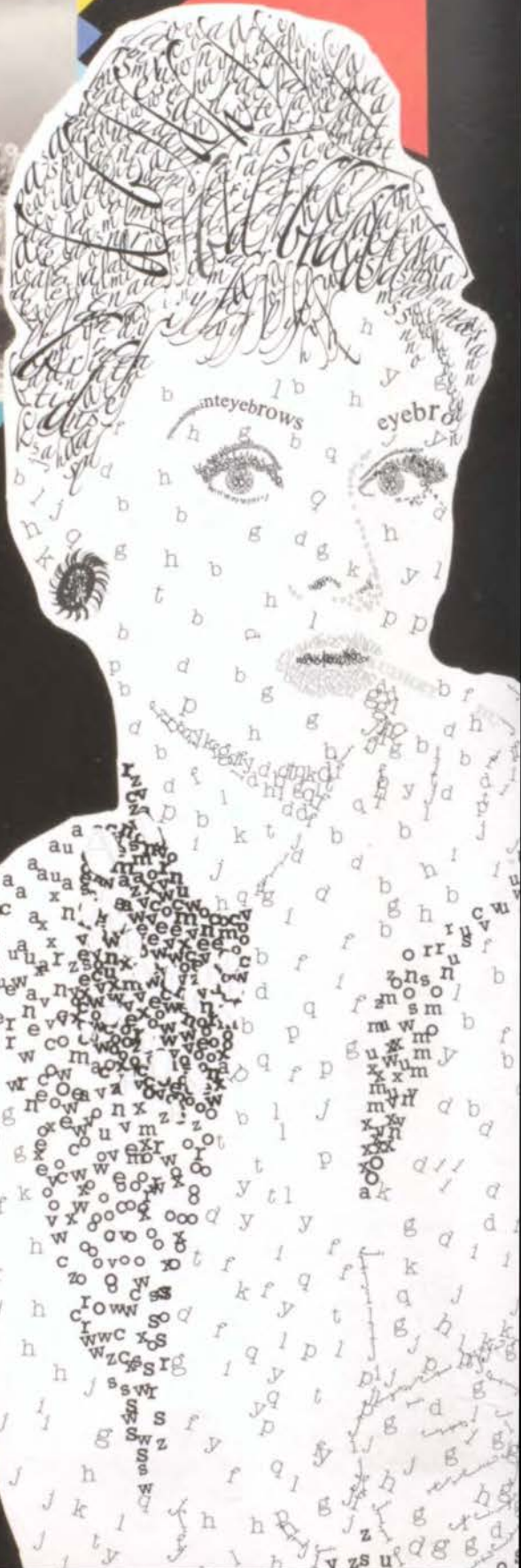

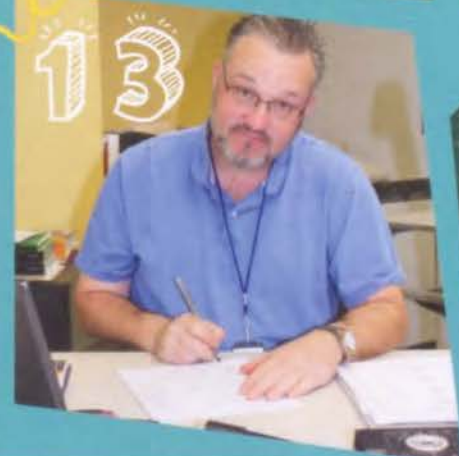

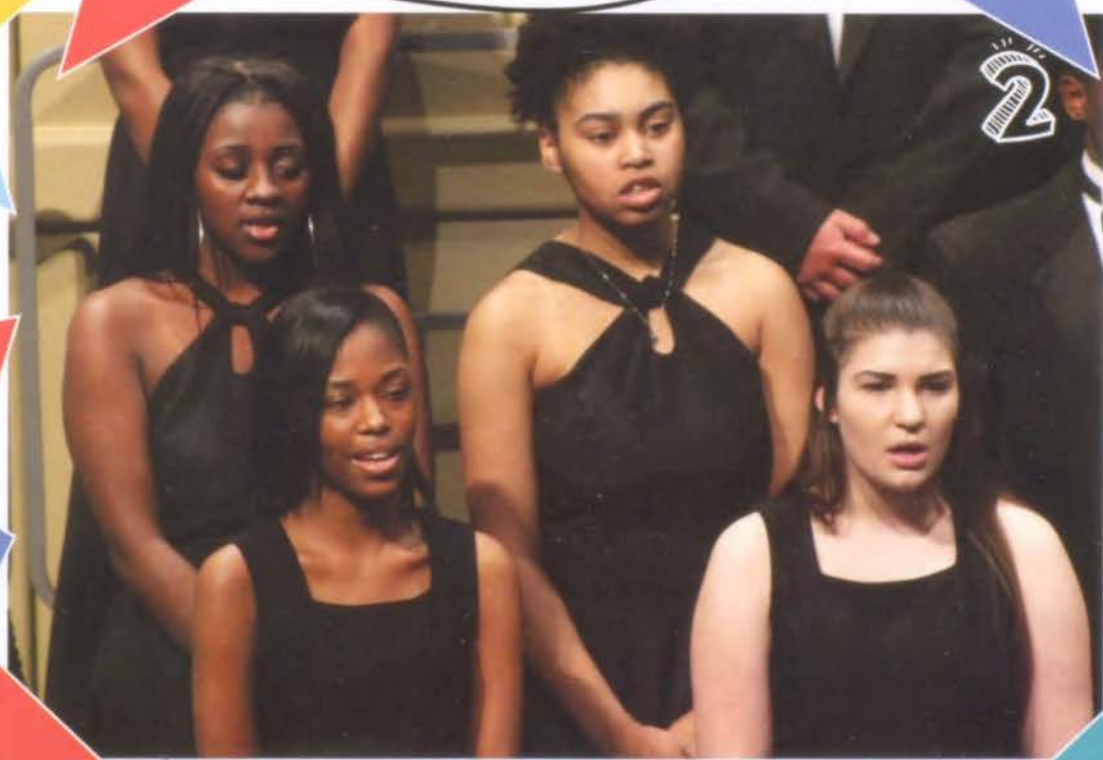
what the singer was like when they wrote it and about the message they meant to send." So, choir has meant more to the singers and the listeners because it truly has meaning.

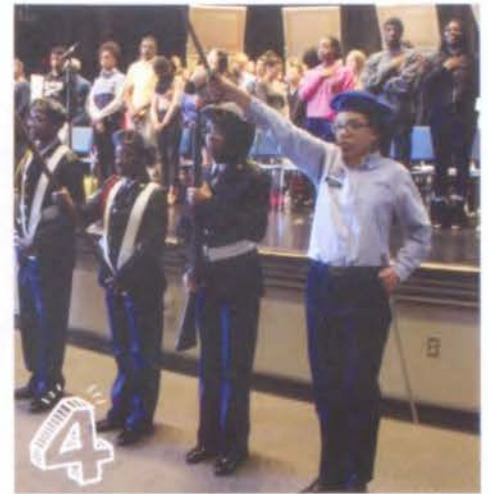

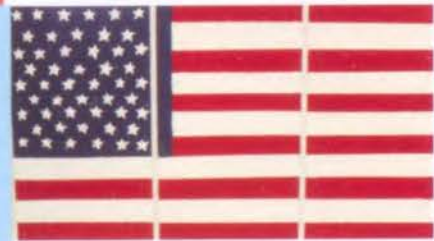

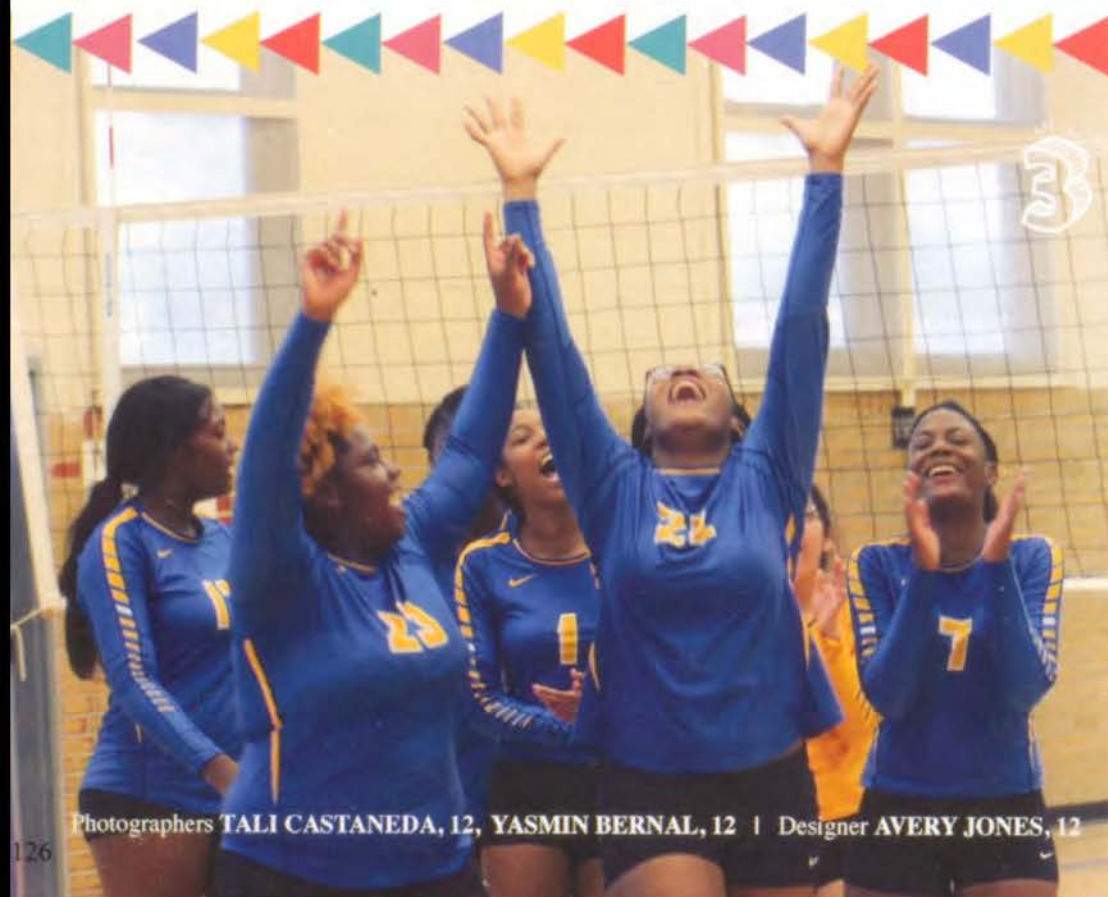
Evans also commented on their unity. "If something isn't right, we always say it, like if you have an attitude, we'll say hey, lose the attitude, it's like a family thing."

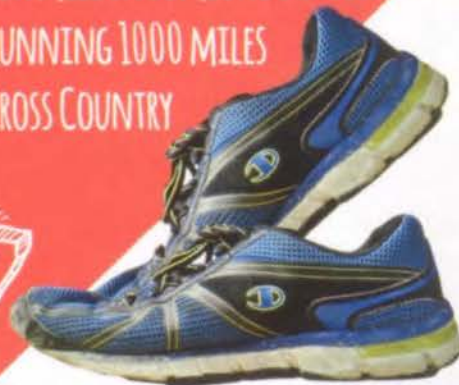
Being able to push yourself comes with the intensity of the sport. In addition, the team

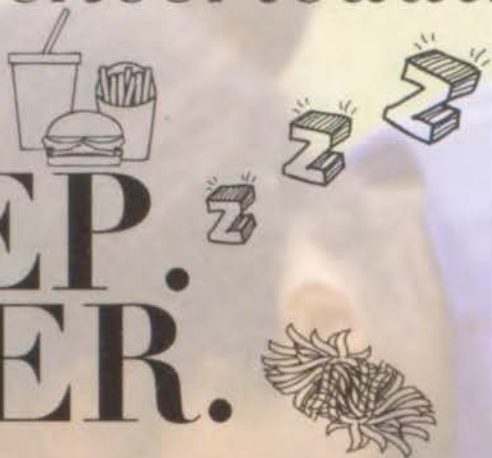

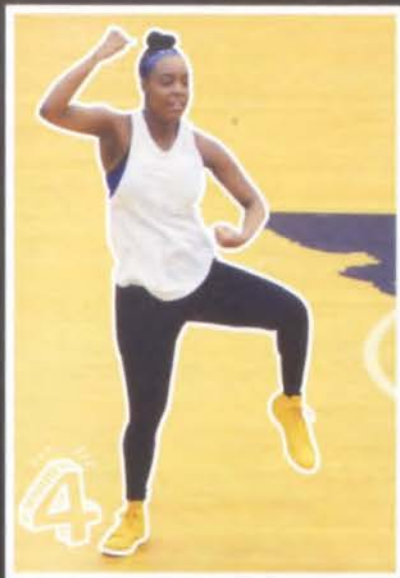
# *tiger dance team* SHAKING THINGS UP

# under new management MAKING GOALS

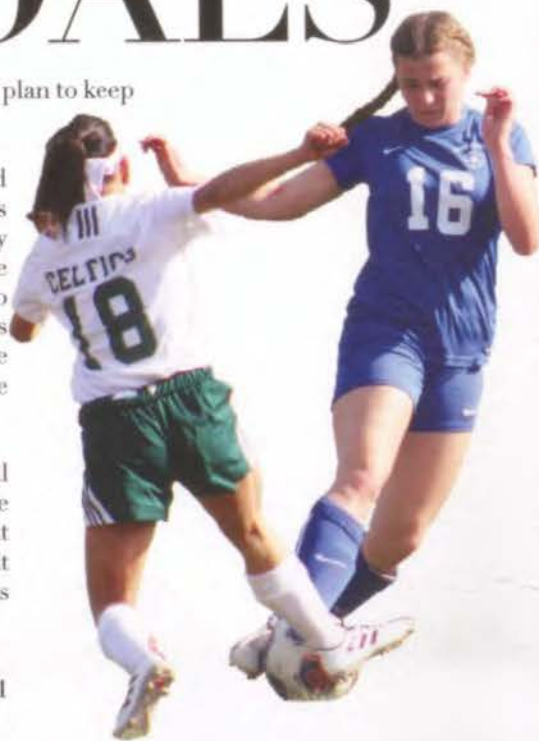

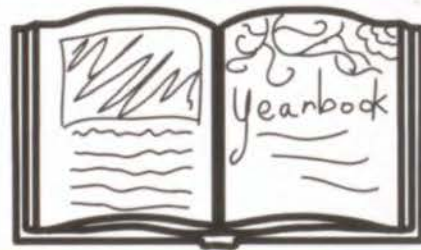

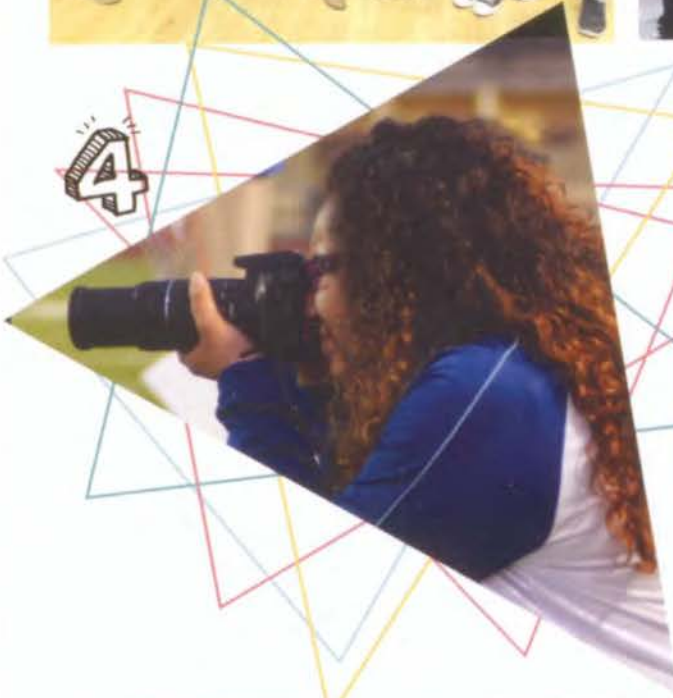

## EDITORIAL PHILOSOPHY

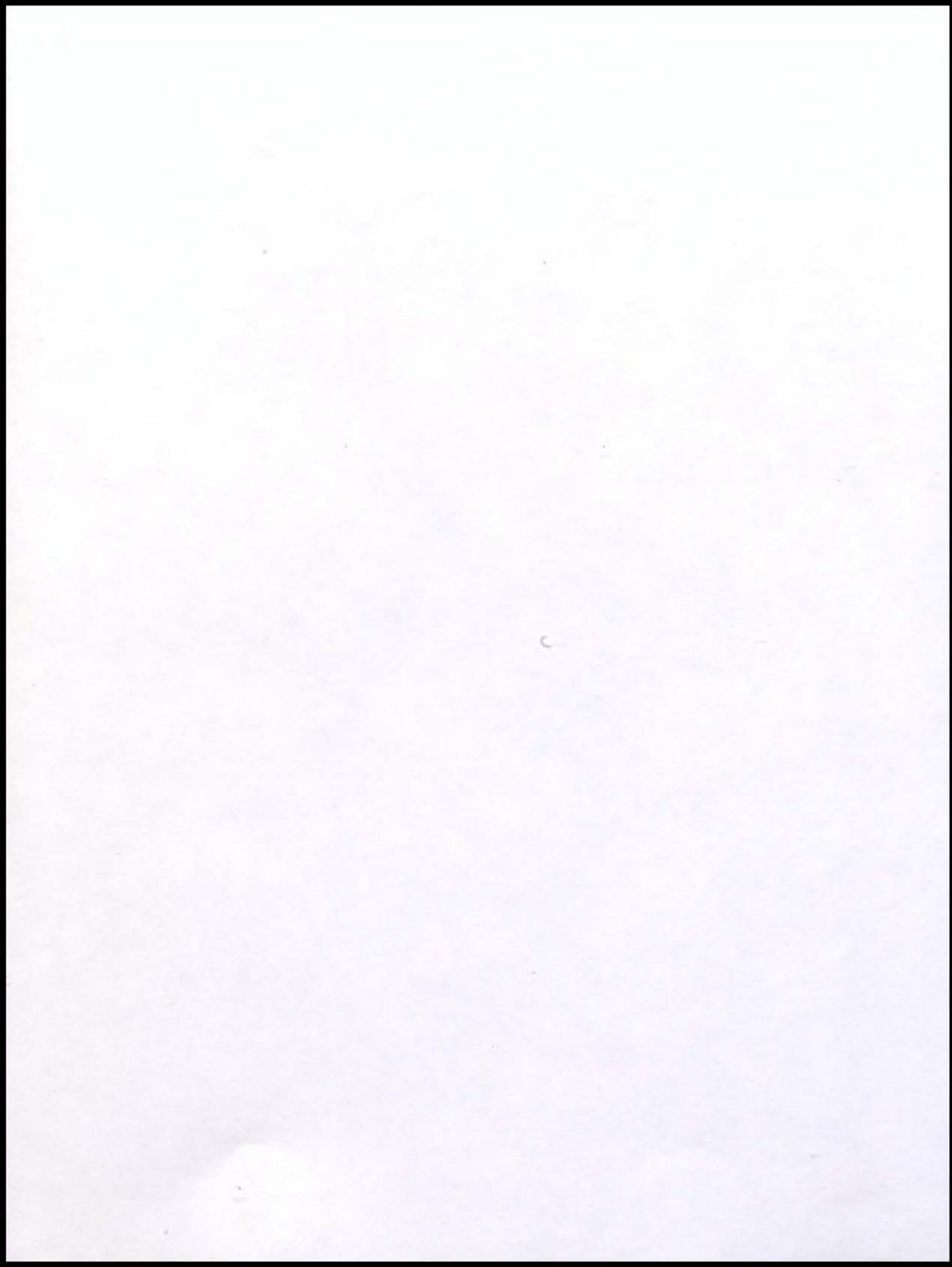

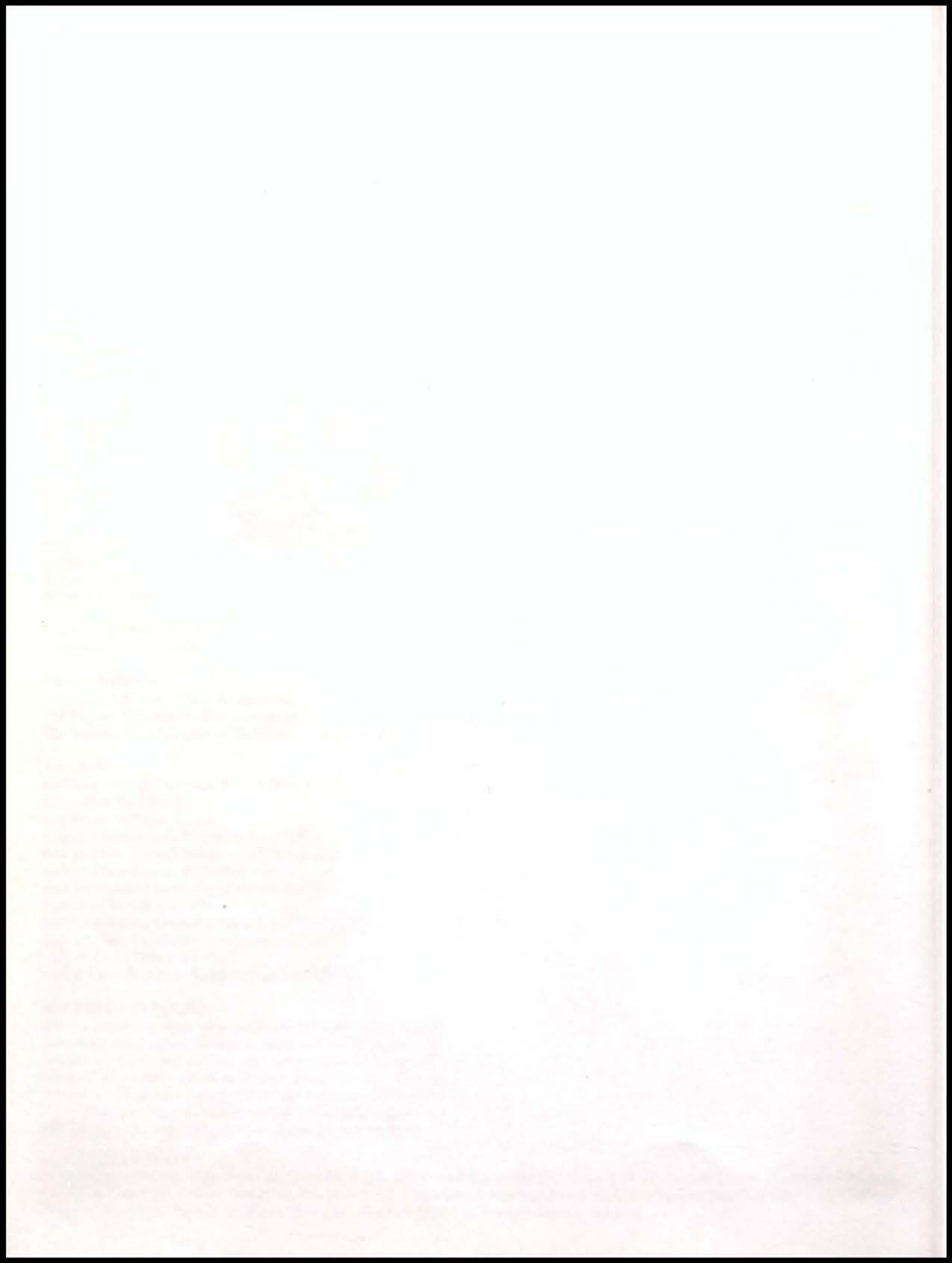

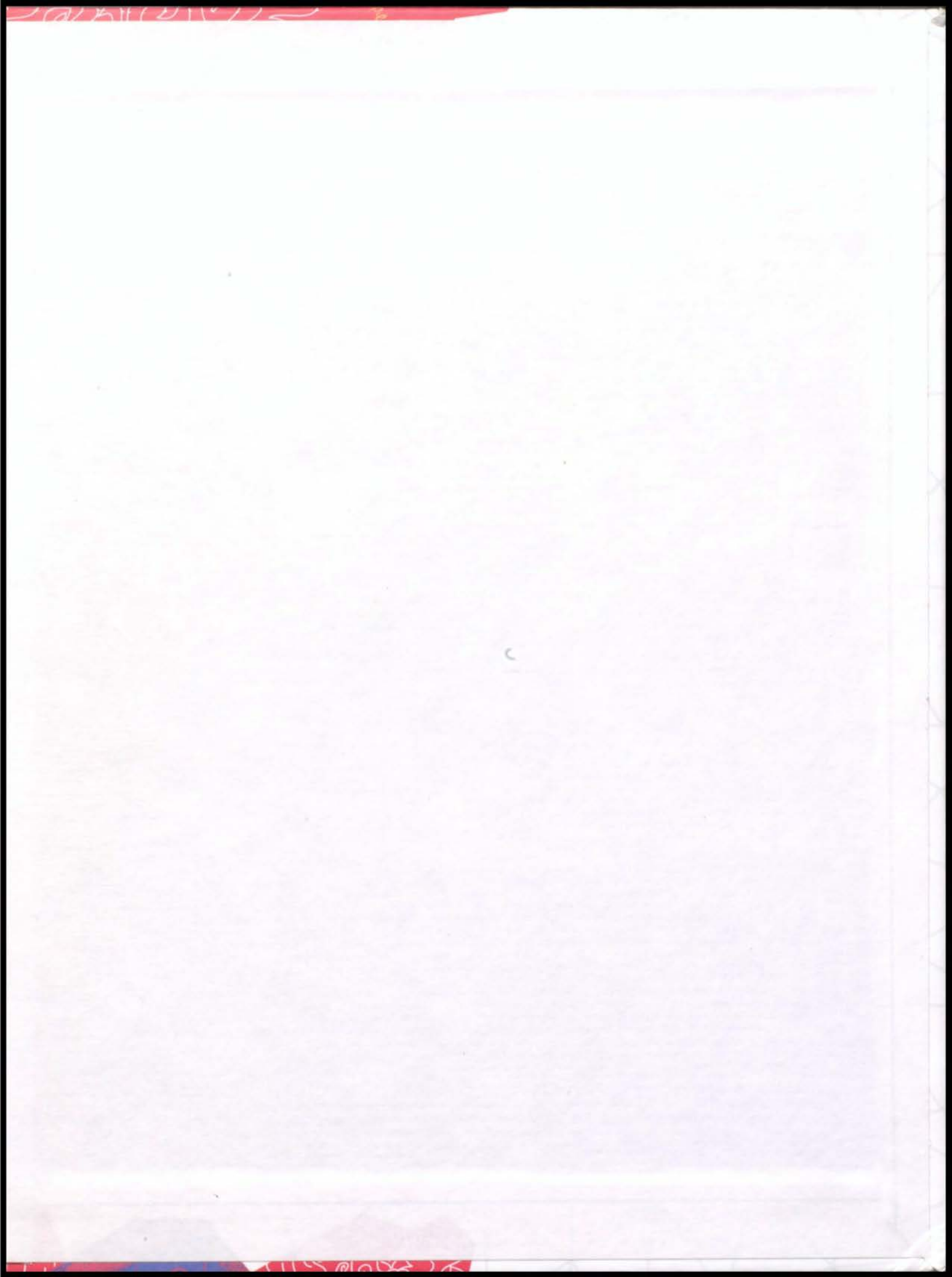
