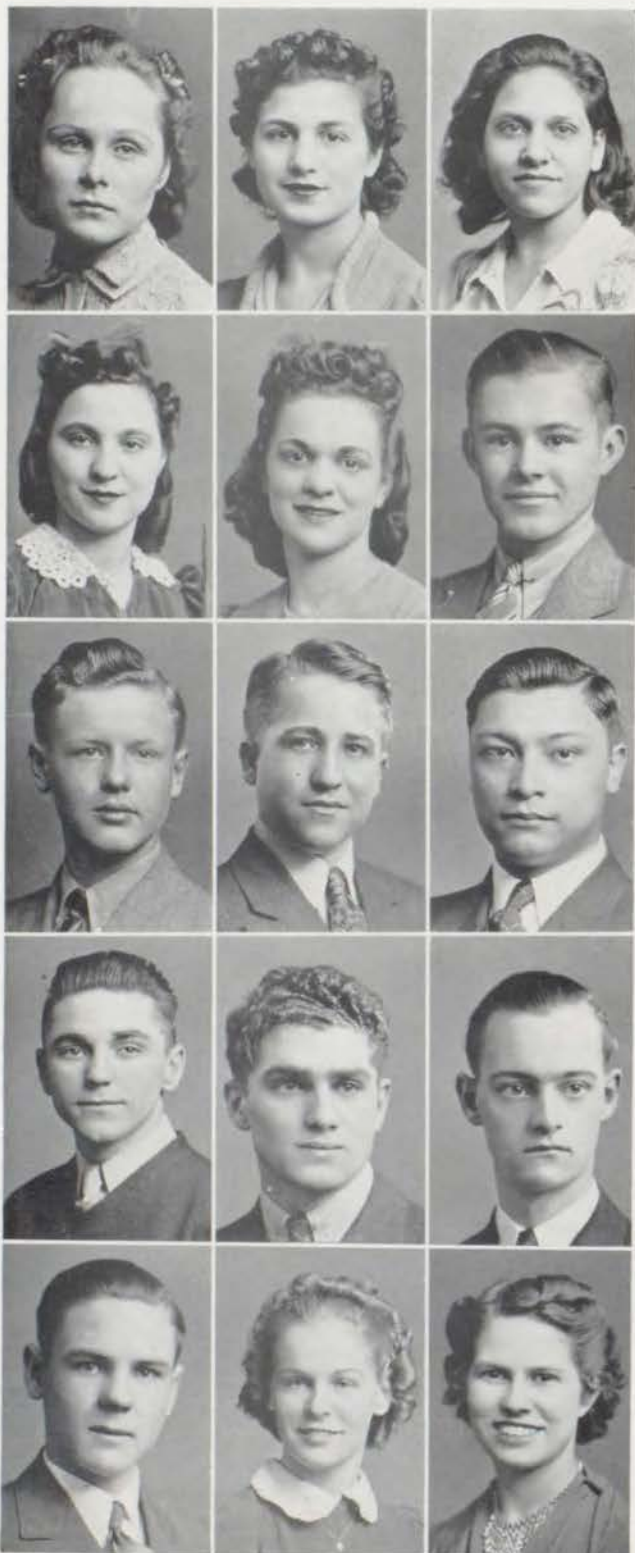
## *Seniors*

## *Student Council*

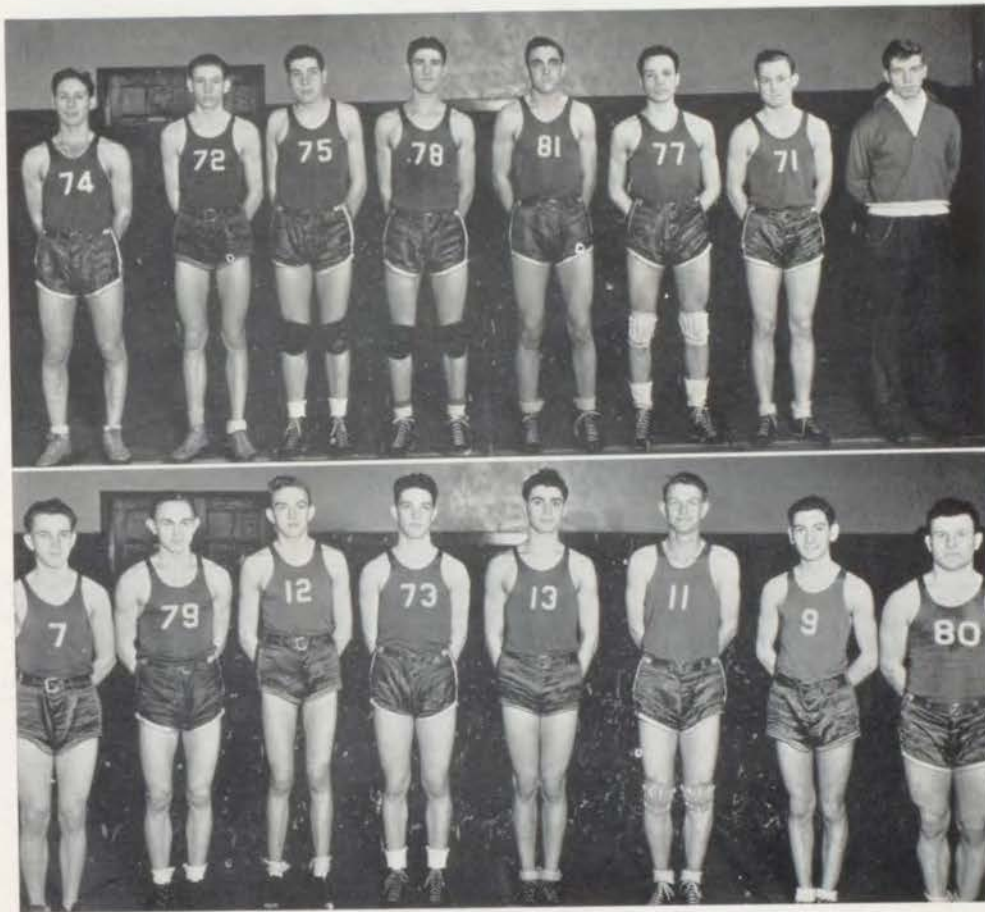

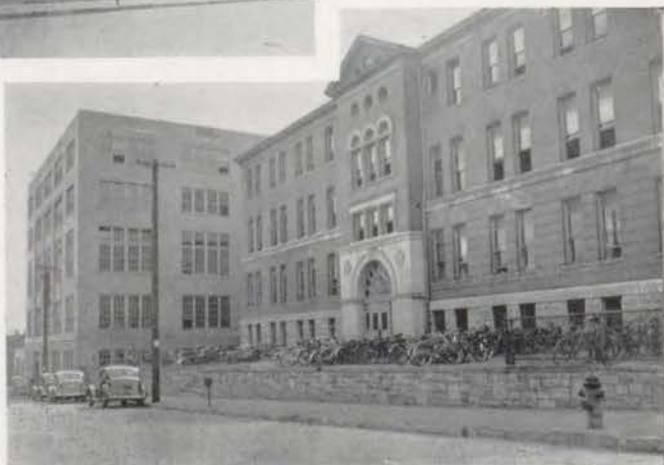
