




Feb. 26 . . . The Pep Club sponsored a swell "Leap Day" dance. All this time we've been waiting and at last we got our chance!





A man of great wit, sportmanship and helpfulness for all is Coach Shofstall. Improving our basketball team steadily is his main objective.


Coach Cirrincione has been doing a splendid job of coaching our swimming team and also the second team in football.



Manual started its rifle season with five experienced cadets, Adair, Gepford, Morrow, Russell and Smythe. The first match of the season was against Central High School, the Red-Birds defeated the Eagles. Then came victories over Paseo and East High Schools. We lost our first match to Northeast, 839 to 830. Then came a win over Wentworth Military Academy. We lost a match to Westport, 861 to 860. The team came back with victories over Southwest and Southeast High Schools. We dropped the next contest to a team from Nevada Mo. 886 to 869. January 31 we took the measure of Liberty Memorial High School. We fired 885 in the William Randolph Hearst Competition to lead Kansas City Teams. 


The music for the evening was furnished by the Four Aces and the





AIRCRAFT MECHANICS

The job of a grease monkey is very important as shown during the war. In this the students learn to be skilled mechanics and most of them obtain good jobs in their field of endeavor upon graduation.

In this they learn the construction of engines, wings, and fuselage. The engine instruction includes learning the use of micrometers, special gauges and hand tools. The shop has one airplane to work on and many various motors to study. Most generally before going into aircraft mechanics the boys take a year of auto mechanics affiliated with the aircraft shop, craft shop.

The teacher of this vocation is Mr. Scott who also teaches auto lab on the fourth floor.

AUTO MECHANICS

In this three year course the boys learn how to service and alemite most all types of cars and trucks. Many of the cars they work on are brought in by our teachers which shows that the students in this class are efficient mechanics under the instruction of Mr. Jenkins.

COMMERCIAL ART

This is the study of color, composition and design in advertising and other types of commercialized art. The young men and women in this class make posters for some of the downtown stores, other organizations and our school. All the art work in our year book "The Builder" such as title pages, cartoons, and borders are created by Miss Leedy's commercial art department on the fourth floor of the shop building.

CARPENTRY

The object of this course is to teach boys all the basic operations in carpentry so that they can go out and work on construction projects and other types of jobs which fall in this catagory with ease and skill. During their instruction in this trade they learn how to use all kinds of power and hand tools.

One of the most important ideas stressed by Mr. Brinton in this trade is safety when working on the job.

LINOTYPE AND PRINTING

The linotype and printing shops work in unison, that is, students after studying and working two years in the regular print shop go into linotype operation their senior year. They learn how to operate and repair these machines under the capable instruction of Mr. Kunz, the printing teacher.

There are four linotypes in the shop and are of the model 8 type. They will handle most all job work such as catalog, newspaper, and books. Also, there are many numerous types of job presses throughout the printing shop.

DRESSMAKING

Girls in this course learn how to use power sewing machines with skill and ability in the making of dresses, slips and other types of wearing apparel. They also make many garments for the Red Cross and other creditable organizations. These students are taught by Mrs. Farnsworth and Mrs. Eckles.

MACHINE SHOP

This shop purchased quite a few new lathes, drills, and other types of machines for the working of raw metal. This influx of new equipment which was obtained through the War Surplus Board has made this shop one of the most modern and exclusive.

The students in this shop learn the many different operations which are performed in the shaping of metals. Among these are the use of the mill and turrent lathe, and as the boys advance they learn bench, tool, and die work, boring, profile sawing filing, heat treating, radical drilling, and layout.

Mr. George Berner, the shop teacher, uses the most modern methods to stimulate interst in working with metals.

SHEET METAL


Sheet Metal is a three year course and during this period the shop students learn how to use the many tools such as punches, shears, and breaks. Persons majoring in this course will find many jobs on graduation in this field because there are hardly enough workers to meet the expansion of this field.

ELECTRICITY

The electric shop has all of the most modern and up to date equipment such as tube testers, etc. The students of the electrical shop do all the repairing and fixing around the school which falls under their line of work such as running new circuits and repairing lights. Last year this shop changed all the wiring on some surplus war machines which saved the school about three thousand dollars.

For any high school boys wishing to learn the electrical trade in any manner, shape, or form, Manual's electrical shop is the best bet. Because here we have the equipment and the teacher, Mr. Mathis, who hasn't been absent or tardy once in his 26 years of teaching.

The Craftsman Staff of 1947-'48, with Mrs. Adron Phillips and Miss Helen McDonna as advisers, is composed of students who enroll in newswriting. Our school paper, published bi-weekly, tries to give adequate publicity to all departments of Manual; newswriters in Room 205 keep a record of publicity each teacher and organization receives every issue so that those "low" in copy get represented next time.

After assignments are made for an issue, editors make a "dummy" of each page. Each piece of news published must go through at least five steps, often many more: the reporter's pencil copy, corrected, typed, is marked by editors on a dummy (a plan of a page in duplicate-one for the printshop, the other left with editors): sent to the printshop to be set in type, it returns on a first proof, revised proof, later on a page proof which often is corrected several times before all is made right.

The Craftsman advertising staff in Room 205 serves as many as forty advertisers, in addition to writing news. Here an advertising manager has the responsibility of procuring ads (often after three of four attempts) arranges cuts to be made and built into ads, payment for which finance The Craftsman's expense.

Special numbers include an Award Issue to give recognition to all those winning honors, letters, scholarships; we also printed 5,000 copies of our April 23 issue which included material on the school levy to be voted on April 27. These papers were distributed to all ward schools in Manual's district and to Manual students, all whom get the paper regularly as partial return for their incidental fee.

The Health Service of Manual High and Vocational School is continually being expanded and improved. More and more emphasis is being placed upon a preventive program.

Expansion of services to students is made possible through the cooperation of both teachers and students. Many of the services such as simple first-aid, weighing and measuring, vision testing and such office routines as answering the telephone, filing records, and recording test results are being done by student assistants.

The five student assistants in the Health Center this year are shown in the above picture performing some of the duties for which they have been trained. They are Juniors and Seniors.

The qualifications for becoming an assistant are:

- 1. Satisfactory scholastic rating.
- 2. Superior citizenship rating.
- 3. Willingness and ability to follow directions.
- 4. Neat, well groomed appearance.
- 5. Desire to serve one hour a day.
- 6. Pleasing personality.

Aside from rendering an invaluable service to the school the Health Center Assistants receive pratical personal benefits. Those girls who plan to go into office work upon graduation have opportunities to practice the skills such as typing, taking dictation, filing, and other office routines, that they are learning in preparation for such work. They also develop self-confidence in meeting the public.

Red Cross



The Junior Red Cross served this year under the sponsorship of Miss Mildred Meuser. Students selected by Miss Meuser served as official delegates at Red Cross headquarters for occasional inter-city meetings. They also helped with distribution and collection of materials.

The first project of the year was the filling of gift boxes for the children of war-torn Europe. Manual contributed thirty-five boxes containing school supplies and toys for the boys and girls who have suffered the privations of war.

The woodworking classes of Mr. W. M. Brinton turned out twenty-five folding chairs, twenty-five floor lamps and ten card tables. The above articles of maple are now in use in veteran hospitals.

The boys of Mr. James Newell's classes made twelve recreational tables for veterans' hospitals. Two of these together may be used for pingpong. They are of plywood and pine and have an enamel finish.

The girls of the sewing classes of Mrs. Nelle Eckles and Mrs. Effie Farnsworth made numerous articles which are in great demand for Red Cross distribution. These articles include baby blankets, dresses, gowns; pencil bags and sewing kits for European children, and men's bed jackets and lap covers for hospital use.




