As our five years of studying, preparing for the future and participating in all the various school activities come to a close, we look back upon all the happy times spent here at Manual.



Vocational Shops

Press Room

Upon approaching the afternoon printing shop we were intrigued by the busy hum of the job presses. Job presses, automatic presses, folders and stitchers are all run by our high school students under the efficient guidance of Mr. White. It would be a difficult task to list all the jobs our printing shops do but we shall give a few. Many of you would be surprised by the fact that all the school diplomas in the city are made by our boys. They make counselor cards for our office and forms for our Library. The most important job of this vocation is the printing of our Builder each year. They do a professional job.



Machine Shop

The \$150,000 worth of machinery has made Manual's Machine Shop one of the most modern and best equipped machine shop ever.

The training under the able direction of Mr. Allen Pollock is both extensive and modern. He shows methods of machine operation, handling and care of tools and interesting up-to-the-minute information about materials, to create interest and understanding about the tools. First the boys are taught to use the power hack saw, lathe, shaper, band saw, drill press, drilling machine, turret lathe, and then bench, tool, die and gauge work. As opportunity presents itself they are taught profile sawing, filing, radial drill, heat treating, and boring.

This course not only gives them the experience required to later obtain a good job but also helps the student to earn while learning.

Dressmaking

Dressmaking is a course in which the girls learn:

Use of commerical patterns. Cutting and fitting. Alterations, Re-modeling, Selecting of materials. Finishing. Assembling and constructing garments. Hand sewing. Combining colors. Selecting designs in patterns and fabrics to suit individual types and occasions. Copying garments from illustrations. Tailoring. Selecting and applying trimmings. Use of power machine.

The girls make clothes for themselves and do order work as well, such as: clothes for other members of the family or school people; Red Cross work: aprons, caps, and towels; costumes for school use and Christmas gifts.

Not many schools are lucky enough to have sewing classes. Manual, however, is the only school in Kansas City that offers a vocational shop of this kind. This course is quite an asset to Manual and we are very proud of it.

The teacher of this course is Mrs. Effie Farnsworth.

Some of the girls take this course for three years which entitles them to a certificate showing they have completed the dressmaking course. With this certificate they can easily get a job as a seamstress.



Art

Drawing, principles of art, and color theory with work in and emphasis on contemporary trends in Commercial Art make up the daily schedule of this shop. A student is allowed to specialize in his senior year and may work as an apprentice. This paid apprenticeship often leads to a full time job after graduation.

Printing

In the print shop the students learn the fundmentals of printing such as hand composition which includes make-up (setting the type up), and lock-up (locking the type up to be printed in a press).

Printing is very interesting and prepares one for a lucrative job. Every printing student who has graduated from Manual now holds a job. Mr. Homer Kunz stated that the boys taking printing in our shops have an advantage because they receive direct experience. One would have to spend two or three years in any other shop before touching a machine.



The printers, linotype operators, and other boys working in the Manual High and Vocational School print shops have done a splendid job in preparing the "Craftsman" for each issue.

These boys not only work for our own school but have outside jobs, all jobs being done for the Board of Education. Their work chiefly consists of composition and assembling type for the "Builder", "Craftsman", and other various printed material. Each boy is instructed how to operate each machine, and every boy is given a certain job to do. Some do their work faster than others, but everyone concentrates on doing the job well and accurately.

When a boy earnestly starts a course printing, it is not long until he finds that printing is a fascinating business, for each job is a little different from its predecessor,

Carpentry and Cabinet Making

Because of the shortage of lumber this year, the carpentry and cabinet making shops have done about the same work. Cabinet Making in the morning and Carpentry in the afternoon are both taught by Mr. Wallace M. Brinton.

The work this year included the making of

1000 standards for the Amendment Number I Drive, a box for the Junior Red Cross boxes that we filled to be shipped overseas and each student in both classes made Christmas projects.



Electricity

The electrical course in Manual is offered for four years. In the four years with study and the help of Mr. C. H. Mathis, the students learn the fundamentals of electricity. They then expand to Motor Winding, House Wiring, and Radio Servicing. The advanced students also do electrical maintenance work for the school.

Students in the electrical shop receive work certificates at the end of their third or fourth year.

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Carpentry

During the year the carpentry class, under Mr. James Newell, finished studying a unit on wall framing and did some fundamental jobs on roof framing. Two groups framed walls; Robert Engler, Claude Hatton, and Williard Krahenbuhl in one group, and Joe Lombardo, Charles Cash, and Dean Hopper in the other group. Ralph Williams, Billy Howell, and Donald Ferguson laid out a building and framed the sills, joists, bridging, and sub-flooring.

James Doolan and Edmond Holt built new partitions for the machine shop tool room and Leonard Weeks, Duane Webb, and Sanford Bordman finished a storage balcony in the print shop stock room.

Others members of the class worked on individual jobs.



Metals

In the past few years the field of the metal worker has become more extensive due to the increased use of better metal working tools and equipment. Metal in place of other former building materials is now being used. The field is

not crowded and developments in the building trades offer increasing opportunities. The boys, under the guidance of Mr. C. K.

The boys, under the guidance of Mr. C. K. Harris, have made many items, mostly Christmas gifts.

Linotype

The last year of the 3-year printing course is spent by the student in the linotype depart-ment. The first two years the printing student learns to set type by hand but in his senior year, which is the linotype course, he learns the delicate task of setting type by machine. This shop is equipped with a battery of four

Model 8 kinotype machines. They are fully equipped to handle newspaper, catalog, book,

and job work. This course is taught by Mr. Ritzenthaler in afternoon shop. The shop is now training war veterans in addition to the regular vocational students




Auto Mechanics

The student enrolling for the Auto Mechanics course is given one semester of training in Junior Auto Mechanics. Here he learns the names of the parts of the automobile, their locations and their functions, and also proper selections of tools for each job. The planning of the job is important, as is also ability to in-

terpret a blue-print or cut, showing sections of an automobile.

The student spends the second year gaining experience in the various phases of repair and service work. During the third year, the student learns motor tune-up, automotive electricity, and later mechanical work.

THE ATHENA LITERARY SOCIETY

The Athena Literary Society was reorganized October 15, 1915 when Porter Graves was principal of Manual Traning High School.

Mr. Graves was an ardent believer in clubs and societies. He was well aware of the "Bad effects on long established powerful clubs and societies by limiting their charters to three years. At the end of that time, no more than twenty-five per-cent of the members of one society can compose the membership of the new organization."

At this time, many organizations developed. Some grew, and some disintegrated. The Athena Literary Society was the first to be chartered. It has survived all other organizations that were chartered about the same time.

The Athenas have an older brother Society, the Manual Society of Debate which was chartered in 1898, and is still active. The two societies frequently have joint meetings for the purpose of literary fellowship.

The membership of the Athena Literary Society was limited to girls who had an average of G grades which is equivalent to the S grades now in use. An Athena was required to have G grades in English and citizenship; she was automatically dropped from the society if she made an F grade in any subject. Such requirements are attained today by all Athenas.

The dues were ten cents a month. Now the dues are one dollar a school term of ten months and paid within the first three meetings of the school year.

The purpose of the society is to promote further study in various forms of good literature. Through the years, Athenas have written beautiful literature.

The following are examples:

MANUAL'S SYMPHONY

- To love life for ourselves and others; To face the conflict with open heart
- and ready hand;
- To give each man a chance, and good service praise;
- To honor the effort as well as the victory;
- To train the hand and heart as well as the mind;
- To weave truth, honor, and intelligence into character;
- To lay a lasting foundation for all the future years;
- This is Manual's Symphony.


Cheerleaders




In 1920 the government established a system of Reserve Officers Training Corps and the following year introduced it into the nation's high schools and colleges. There are two sections of the R. O. -T. C.; the high schools form the junior division which is the preliminary training course, the cadets may enter the senior unit with the three years of junior training counting as one year in the senior unit. At the completion of the senior course the cadets are commissioned Second Lieutenants in the Reserve Corps. In the colleges the Cadets may take Air Force, Army or Navy R. O. T. C.

R. O. T. C. cadets are trained in discipline, organization, administration, alertness, and obedience; all of which are invaluable qualities in every day life. Keeping uniforms and rifles in spotless condition form habits of order, care and cleanliness. The cadets are subject to inspection at any time, and their uniforms and equipment must be in perfect order. Drill regulations in the R. O. T. C. are the same as those in the regular army.

Near the end of each school year the various high school units undergo a government inspection. At that time is held the annual field day when units compete in individual, squad, platoon, and company drill. This year during field day the Sergeant Major will be chosen from all second year non-commissioned officers in the eight high schools. This cadet will be the highest ranking non-commissioned officer in the city.

The Manual R. O. T. C. battalion started in 1921 as a small unit but grew larger through the years. Our school has the honor of having had more all-city Colonels and Lieutenant Colonels than any other Kansas City high school. The Colonel holds the position of regimental commander and the Lieutenant Colonel that of regimental executive. Both ranks are won through stiff competitive examinations.






















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The Service Society



COOPERATIVE OCCUPATIONAL EDUCATION

The Cooperative Occupational Education program provides an opportunity for supervised work experience while still in high school. This program is provided for the boy or girl who is sixteen years of age, and is especially nice for the ones that know that they will not attend college. These students will have the privilege of making adjustments from "school to work" under the guidance and supervision of the coordinator, Hollis W. Lancaster.

In many cases the student is on a job which would not be available if he were not on this program. The coordinator visits the home during the summer and talks over the program and the student's possibilities before placing him. The coordinator makes job contacts for the student. During the school year he makes periodic visits to the place of employment. During these visits the coordinator learns of the progress of the student and what the school may do to help the student to become a more efficient worker.





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
