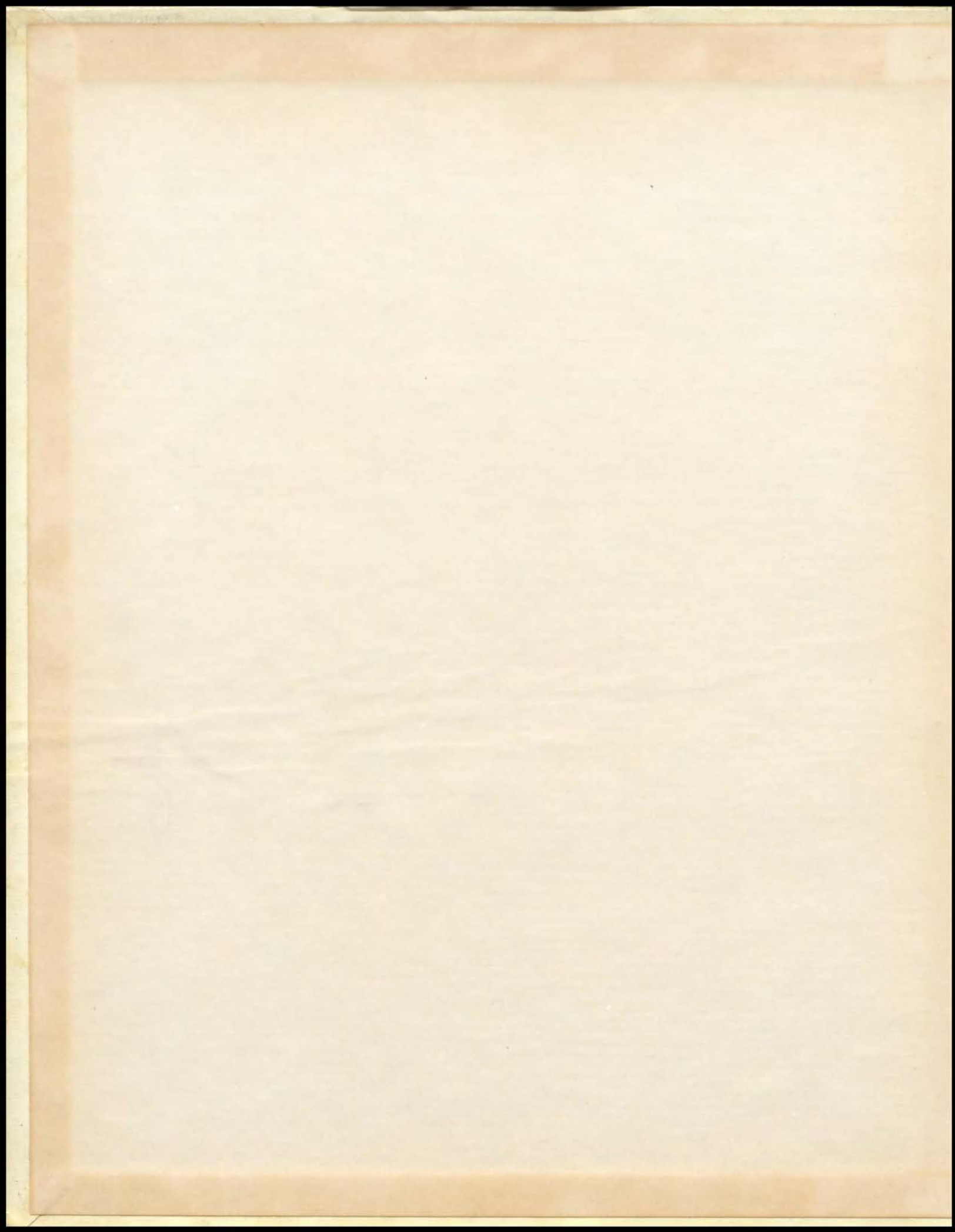
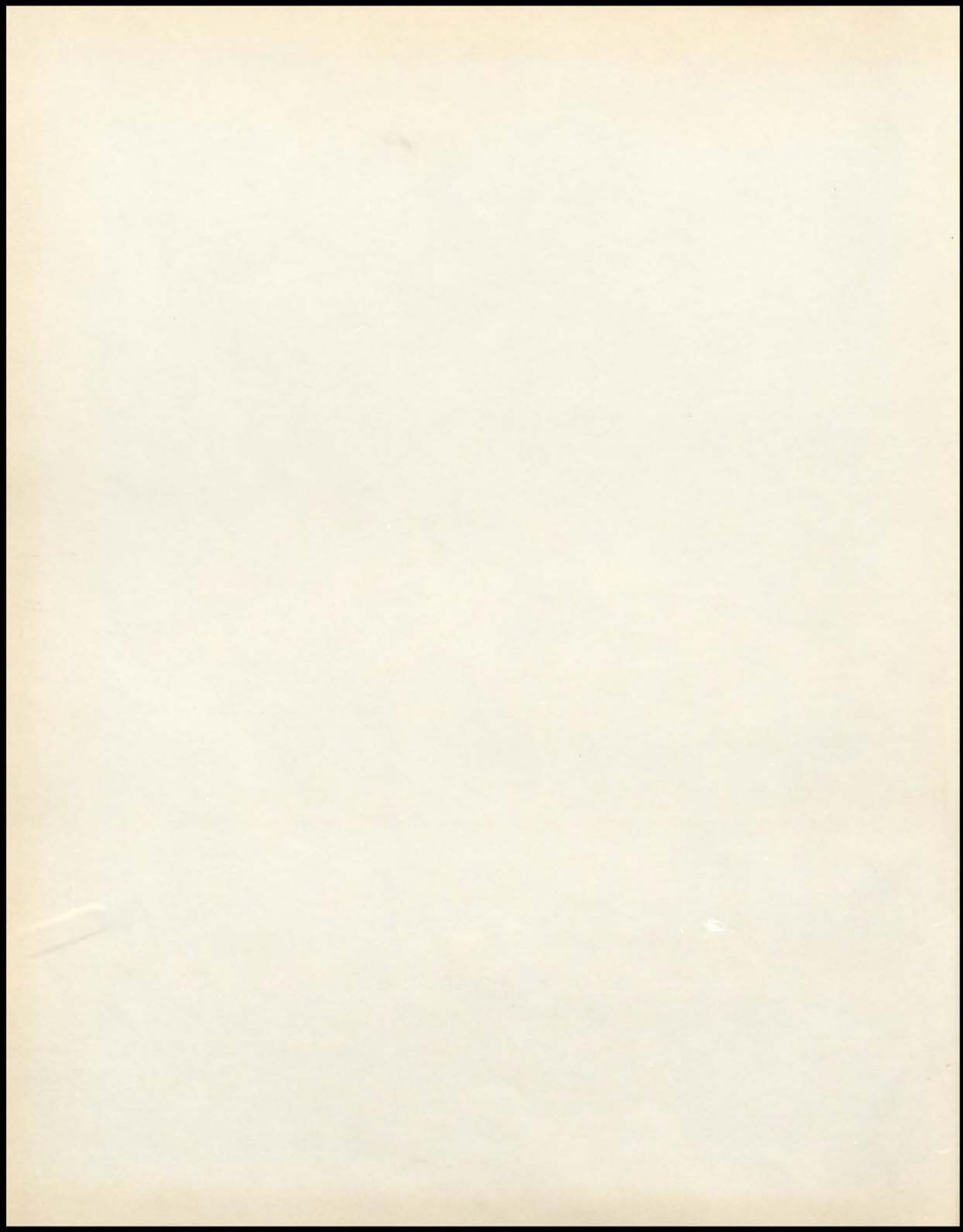


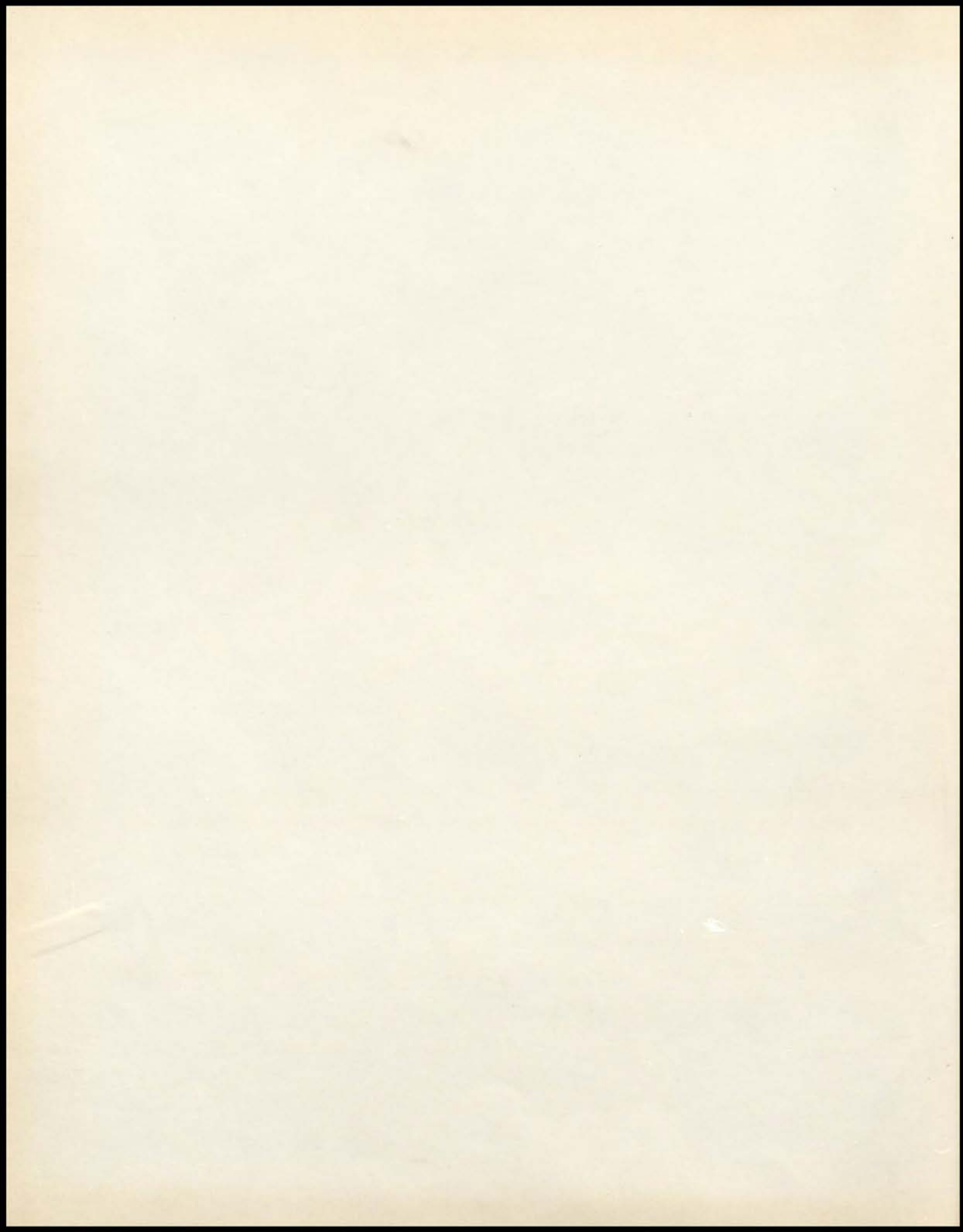

Three score years have passed. Now we see a most democratic school, all creeds--all races--all nationalities--all integrated with many objectives:

1. To promote within the student body public sentiment which builds good citizenship through self discipline.
2. To have a social organization that is democratic.
3. To give training that will increase ability to think rationally, to express thoughts clearly, and to read and listen with understanding.
4. To acquaint students with the rights and duties of citizens in their community, and a familiarity with the activities carried on in their city and state.
5. To give an understanding of their place in human living.
6. To develop and maintain good health and physical fitness.
7. To give opportunity and incentive to work in some field of special interest--such as art, music, speech, literature, mathematics, science, industrial arts, or vocational training, as a means of self expression and personal growth.

In Conclusion: To work with mind and hand sincerely and justly.

Our City's History

The history of Kansas City, Missouri, goes back to 1821, when a trading village was established at the "Great Bend" of the Missouri River.

This village was the starting point for many of the famous trails to the West and Northwest; the Santa Fe Trail, the routes of the '49ers.

The advantageous location on the river was the impetus for the growth of the great city now known as Kansas City, a crossroads of the nation and gateway to the agricultural and mineral resources of the West.

History Of Our School

1897 - - - - 1957

September

Our school was originated as Manual Training High School in 1897. The enrollment was gradually increased to 2200 pupils, half of whom were enrolled in the a.m. classes and half in the p.m. classes. The gymnasium and shop buildings were enlarged to accommodate 2500 day pupils and 1100 evening pupils. Jane Hayes Gates and Lathrop Polytechnic Institute were combined with Manual Training High School in the fall of 1939; and the new name of Manual High and Vocational School was adopted.

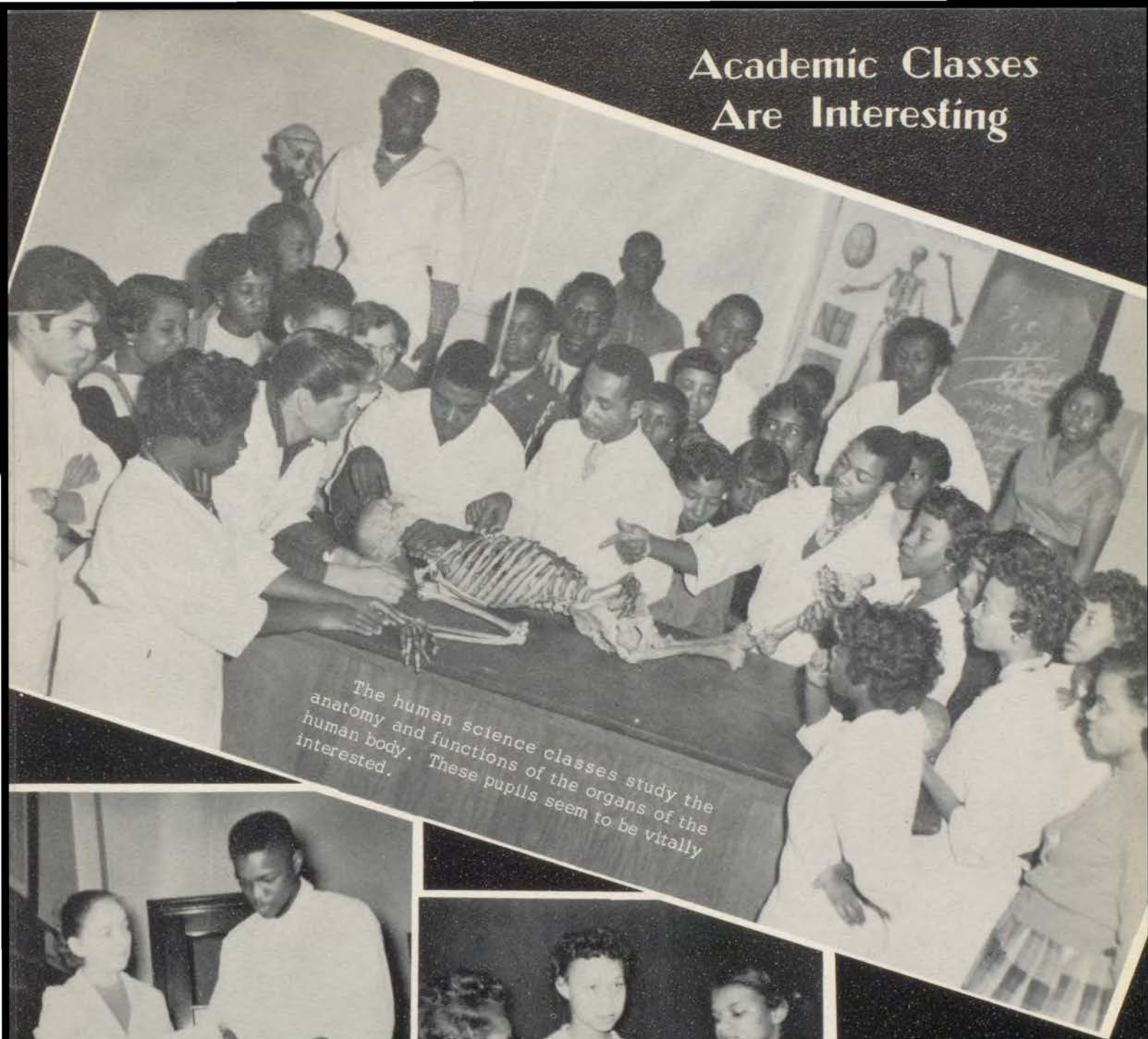

Manual's band under the direction of Mr. Leo Davis contributes music to most of the assemblies. During the "Fun With Facts" assembly the band played several musical selections.





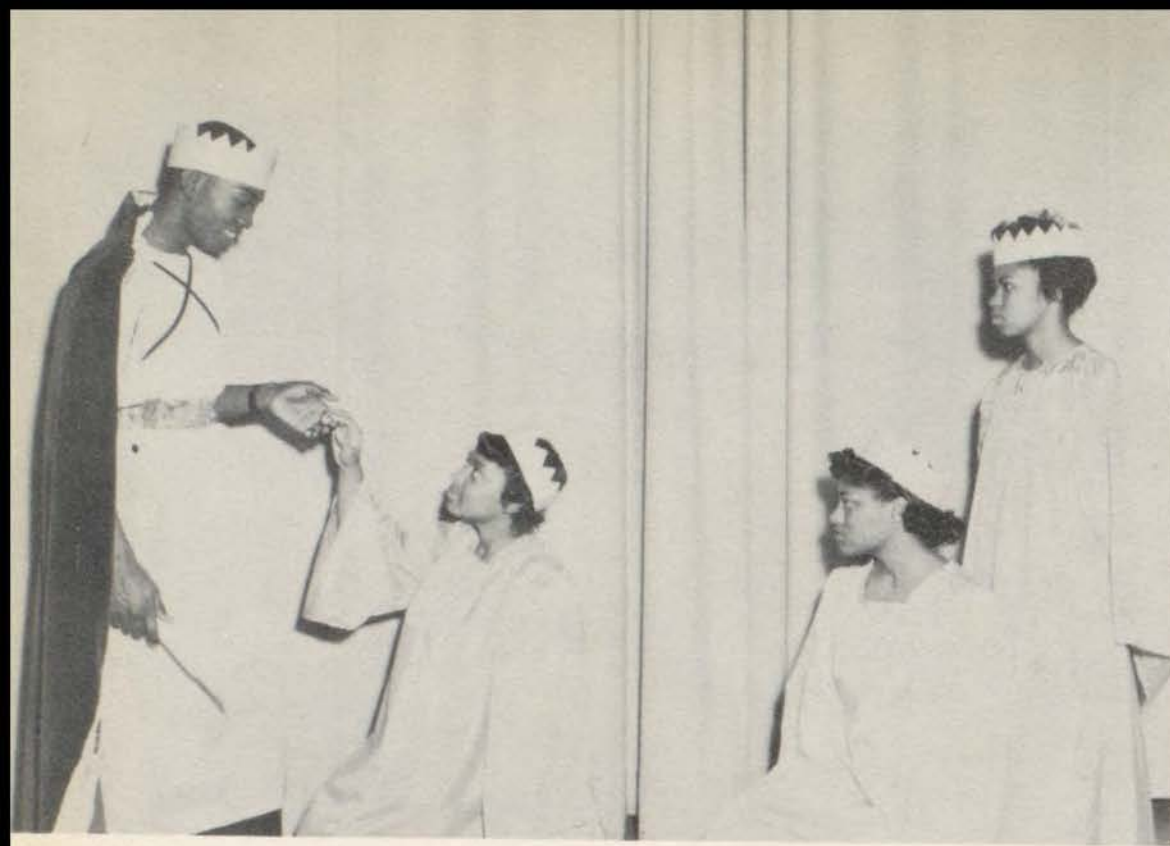
