

REFLECTIONS


In reflections the ripples circle—



In return for all the service she rendered to the school paper, Judy gave the school top honors from Columbia University, New York City: All-Missouri from the University of Missouri-Columbia; and International First Place from the University of Iowa, Iowa City.

During Judy's after school hours she roller skated at the Antioch Rink. Since she was three years old, Judy practiced several nights a week to enable her to go to city, state, and district meets. Judy proved her superior talent in skating, by earning the Gold Bar. The only higher achievement is the Gold Medal, where Judy failed to attain it in Little Rock, Arkansas last summer. "Maybe next time," she said.

All of those who knew Judy, will always remember the many favors that she carried out without undue attention to herself. She was a very gracious lady. Perhaps Judy's greatest asset was her friendly smile and truly warm personality. No one will ever forget her.

This season's cross country runners, under the guidance of Coach Shepherd, achieved second place in the district, tenth place at the state meet, and third place in the conference. The overall result this year, of four wins and three losses, was an improvement over last year.

The team broke three of their own records by first, improving their position in the state meet from 13th to 10th place. Second, also in the state meet, they set a record by scoring 185 fewer points than in any previous year. The third record was set in the district meet. In 1967 the team scored 59 points in the district. This year the team improved by 12 points by scoring 47.


Takes 10th

He reduced the school record from 10:36 (set by Bill Geary) to 10:04. At Swope Park, Doug broke his brother's record by making a 10:23 run. In the conference meet, Doug broke the record by 14 seconds, and in the district by 55 seconds. On the new Macken Park course, he now holds the record of 10:06. Sophomore Joe Valenti also broke two records, reducing the N.K.C. all course record at the state meet to 10:36.

The team must be congratulated on their improvement over previous years and with their present enthusiasm future progress is assured.








Dale McEowen drives to the base line for a shot before the half.



















