#### A TRIBUTE TO PROF. E. A. HUPPERT

BY AN

APPRECIATIVE EMBER OF THE FACULTY



The third member of Northeast's faculty to be lost by death is Prof. E. A. Huppert, who died last March 10, after a prolonged illness which compelled him to retire from teaching three years ago.

Prof. Huppert experienced a long, interesting and successful career as an artist. As a student he was blessed with the best of preparation in the art academy of Paris, where his natural talent and honest efforts won for him the highest praises and enviable prizes of the Art institute.

On returning to America, he made rapid progress, both as a teacher and as a portrait and landscape painter. After teaching art in the Liberty Mo., "Ladles' College," he established a popular art school of his own in Kansas City, but closed it in order to accept the position of supervisor of grawing for the Kansas City schools till 1913, when he accepted the position as head of the Art Department of the Northeast High School, which place he filled creditably until forced to retire on account of the illness that finally caused his death.

While serving as director of art and design in our school, he greatly aided the young art editors of the Nor'easter Magazine in producing its illustrations and cover designs.

During Prof. Huppert's long career as teacher and supervisor of drawing and painting, scores of young people and teachers have been successfully started professionally, either as artists for art's sake or as commercial artists. artists.

He was devoted to his beloved profession and should be remembered as one of the ploneer art teachers who aided in establishing in our community and schools an artist's love for the beautiful. Thus to have lived in the memory of his students and friends and thus to be recorded in the history of Kansas City—is not to die. His masterpiece is an ambitious and large painting illustrating a pathetic and dramatic scene in Chateaubriand's romantic story of "Atala," the Indian maiden who committed suicide lest she be tempted to break her oath of virginity by marrying Chactas, a handsome Christian Indian, with whom she had fallen in love.

This painting is owned by the "Jones Dry Goods Company," in whose store it is on exhibition, but should ultimately be preserved in the Kansas City Fine Arts Gallery.

Prof. Huppert was a martyr to his beloved work as a teacher and a producer of art. For him to have scattered along the highway of life artistic creations of beauty for the human eye to gaze upon and to have cultivated in the hearts and minds of a generation of young people real love for the beautiful and an ambition to develop their creative talents along artistic linet—is to be classed among the enviable benefactors of the human race, and to be honored as a good and faithful servant in the public schools of Kansas City.

June, 1921-"Here":

Every Girl stood alone on Conference Point looking out over the river, red and gold from the reflection of the last flaming sunset she would see from this point. Through ten days she had followed the gleam of the H. S. C. conference slogan, "Here, There and Everywhere, Keepers of the Light we shall be." Through months as a Senior leader she watched the unfolding of the program and its effect upon girls. She dropped into enthusiastic Freshman meetings to see a dramatization of a Chinese wedding, and a handbook meeting where scrapbooks were being made for children hospitals. She was an interested listener to absorbing Sophomore discussionals upon "The Girl Reserve and Her Family; Her School; Her Community"; an interesting demonstration of First Aid and Nature Studies. In the Junior Triangle meetings she learned the width of her world through a compelling service program and found them reporting upon their contributions to different charitable organizations and planning special good times. In her own Senior group she joined in the search for deeper things of the spirit-the search for a suitable vocation and for her opportunities as a future citizen. With a deepening sense of the value of the whole four-year program, she returned to the larger triangle meeting to give her support to the social events, the songfests, the Camp and Conference rallies, the Senior Farewell. Surely, in her school world she had not found it too hard to be a Keeper of the Light.

### June, 1922-"Everywhere":

Commencement and Every Girl stood at the cross roads filled with the inspiration of four years of gaining, growing and giving. The real test lay ahead, she knew, in the great "Everywhere" to which she was going. There, most of all, must she be a trusted "Keeper of the Light."

Pep, jollity and geniality, but beneath the surface something deeper. The G. H. S. C. meetings this year have had all this and more. They have had meetings from which each girl might take uplifted and helpful thoughts, meetings full of fun, spirit and inspiration.

We have had a membership of about 300 girls. On the first Monday of each month, the big open club meetings were held; on the second and fourth Mondays the various

Triangle meetings in their respective rooms, and the Cabinet Girls met on the third Monday. The big meetings have included such programs as the brilliant social welcome for the Freshman Girls; the Christmas service, with an interesting story by Mr. Nowlin, and a jolly good time to start the holidays; a gay Song Fest at which our spirits found expression in a most delightful manner; the World Fellowship meeting at which the girls pledged as many as 360 shares; the Camp and Conference Rally, when we saw movies of typical girls' camps and heard animated talks on experiences at Camp Hollister by girls acquainted with such thrills; the impressive Senior Farewell meeting, and meetings at which we had special outside speakers.

The topics discussed in the Triangle meetings were all very interesting. Some afforded great pleasure and amusement, and some prompted a deeper chain of thought on a more vital subject. The final Triangle gatherings were held outdoors, with talks on the following nature subjects: Freshman Triangle, "The Hosts of April"—Birds; Sophomore Triangle, "The Comradeship of Trees"; Junior Triangle, "By-Ways—Trails and Trailmaking," and, Senior Triangle, "Star Light, Star Bright." This meeting was held at night.

We had a membership contest in which the Triangle with the greatest percentage of attendance was entertained by the other Triangles with a May Day party.

This year the Club had thirty girls working for honors. To be an honor girl they must have fulfilled the requirements classed under health, knowledge, service and spirit, and it is certainly a gain worth striving for!

The officers for next year are: Mary Agnes Patterson, president; Helen Gruver, vice-president; Frances Kerr, secretary, and Dorothy Jackson, treasurer. These girls, together with all the other active members, are looking forward to a big year for the G. H. S. C. next fall, and hope, through combined effort, it may be recognized as another outstanding figure of school life.


## INVINCIBLE

The commissioned and non-commissioned officers were well chosen and have con-


tributed their full share to the success of the organization.


#### TO "A" COMPANY.

Despite the handicaps that always manifest themselves in this work, we have all put forth our best efforts to be a credit to the Northeast Battalion of R. O. T. C., and


we believe that we have accomplished our object.





Thus military training prepares a nation for either war or peace.





# FIRST INTERSCHOLASTIC BASKETBALL GAME


Basketball is more popular in Kansas City than any other city in the United States. A record crowd assembled in Convention Hall, January 14,

to witness the opening games. In the first contest Northeast won from Manual, 25 to 9, while Central beat Westport in the second game, 30 to 25. Northeast, with only one letter man, Captain George Deniston, succeeded in gaining a victory over Manual, who has three veterans, which was not only a surprise to Northeast but to most basketball fans.

Deniston played a fine floor game for the Purple. He and Nick Onofrio were responsible for most of the points. Koonse and Miller hung to their men like leeches. Griggs got the jump on McDonough of Manual most of

the time.

In the second game, January 28, Northeast bowed her head in defeat for the first time in two years and the second in three. But it took Central an



extra five minutes to win the victory, for the score stood 23 to 23 at the end

of the regular playing period.

Fully ten thousand people witnessed two of the hardest-fought games ever played by high school teams in Convention Hall. In the opener Westport won over Manual, 25 to 20, after which Central beat Northeast by three

points, 26 to 23, in a play-off.

In the first game Manual showed a great improvement over their showing in the first round. They had confidence in goal shooting and they had fight and speed, but they did not have the ability to stop Westport. O'Sullivan of Manual was put out of the game for unnecessary roughness, and Brewster of Westport for personal fouls. However, it was a closely-fought game, Westport forging ahead in the last quarter.

The second game, Central and Northeast, was the event of the evening. Northeast, being the undefeated team for the past two years, was not popular. From the start to the finish this contest was so even that neither team at any time held more than a 4-point lead. It was seldom that great. At the end of the first quarter the count was at 8-all; at the half mark it found Northeast holding the upper hand, 13 to 10; at the third quarter Northeast retained its three points, 19 to 16.

The last quarter was a whirlwind for action. The crowd, unable to restrain itself, gathered about the court. The time was drawing to a close when Bacchus of Central made a goal. The score had been: Northeast 23, Central 19. That made Central 21. Again Bacchus made the goal which


Referee F. C. Allen was aided by "Red" Brown, who was used as an umpire, and as a result considerably more fouls were detected, Manual mak-



This all but unanimous victory was won after long and hard work by each individual debater and by the finest kind of team work. Both teams were at their best, and merited the approval and praise that was forthcom-

ing both from faculties and students where the debates were held.

This is the first time that the girls' debate cup has been won from Manual Training High School. Students of Northeast, let us see to it that the cup is covered with the name of Northeast in the years to come.

## Botany



The trees were almost bare last fall when I decided to make an experiment which proved successful. I gathered three green leaves of the cottonwood (Populus deltoides), took them home and put them in a pan of water.


After a time the leaves turned black in color, meanwhile adding water enough to keep them covered. When they had been in water for almost a month, I laid them on a smooth piece of porcelain and brushed them very lightly with a soft nail brush. A very little of the epidermis came off. I put them back into the same water and repeated this same brushing process every two weeks.

The last time they were brushed was in the latter part of January. I took them out of the black, slimy water, rinsed them, laid them between

heavy blotters and pressed them.

This network of vascular bundles remaining makes up the water-mains of the leaf, as it were, and in return, through parallel tubes, carries the sugar, made in the leaf, back to the stem.

This drawing represents one of the oddest of plants, Spirogyra, commonly called pond scum. It is a clear, green, silky thread, which is so fine that with others it seems to form one solid mass. It grows in still water. When the day is suinny it floats on the surface of the water, floated by tiny bubbles of oxygen which it produces in making its food. The chloroplast is the organ that performs this process and is spirally wound inside the cell. This enables the chloroplast to be exposed on all sides to the sun. The nucleus is the center or life of the cell and is supported by threads of cytoplasm which extend to food reservoirs in the chloroplast.
