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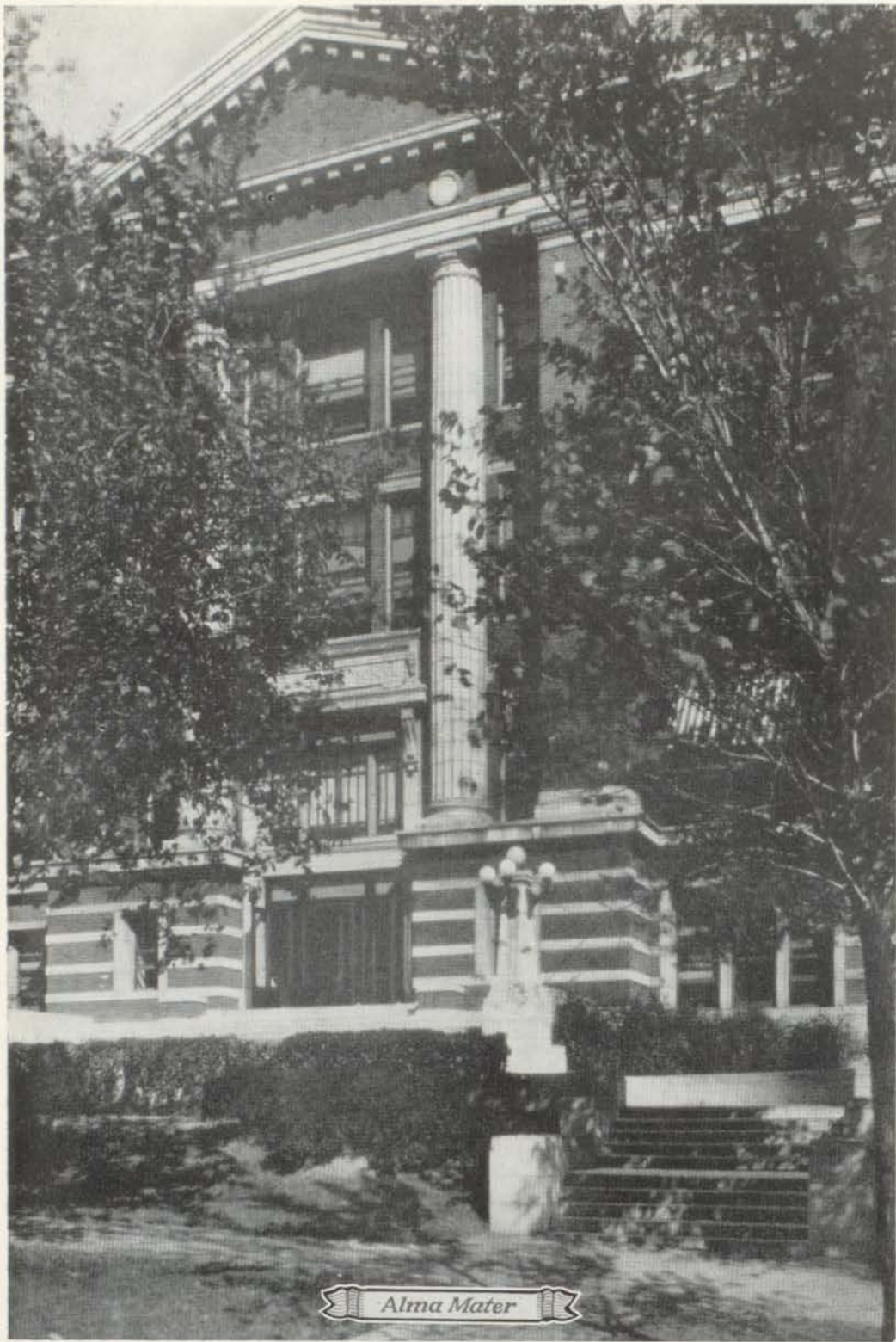

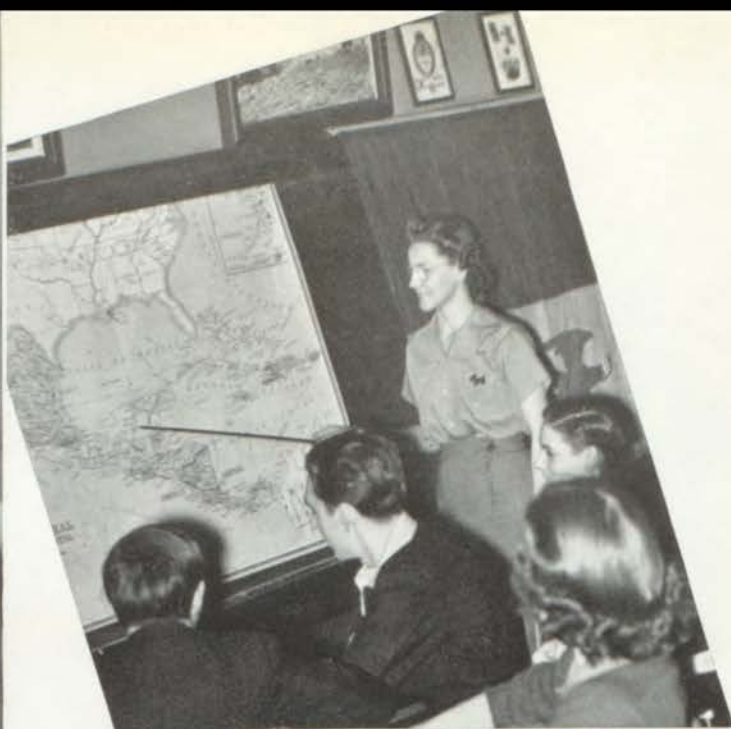

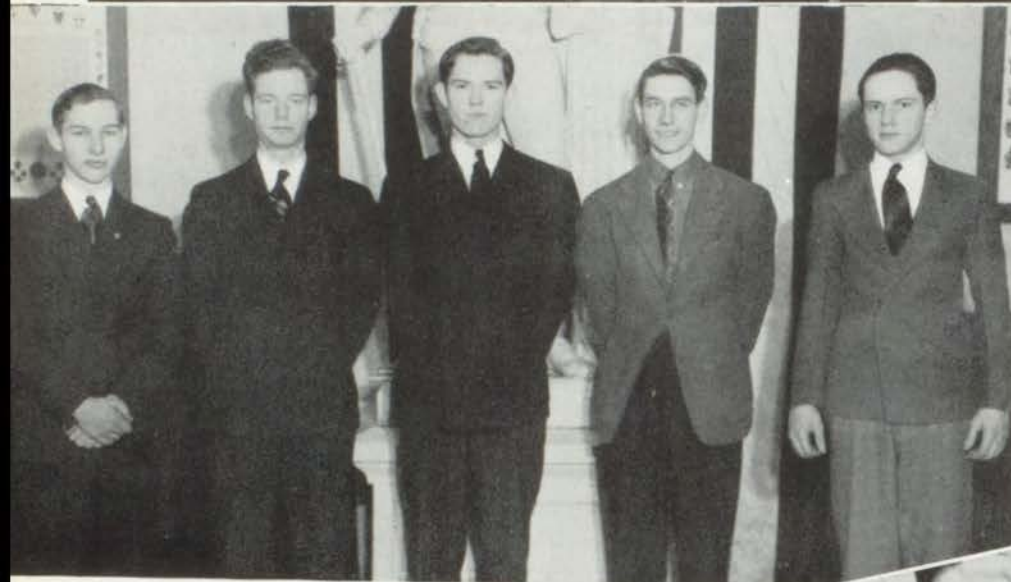

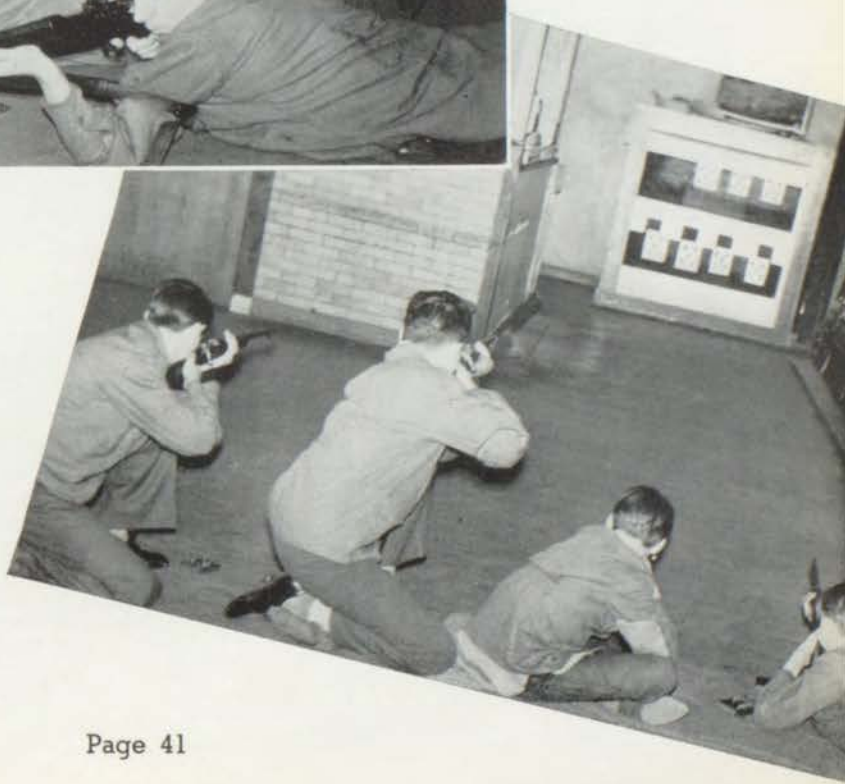


Battalion Inspection—After School

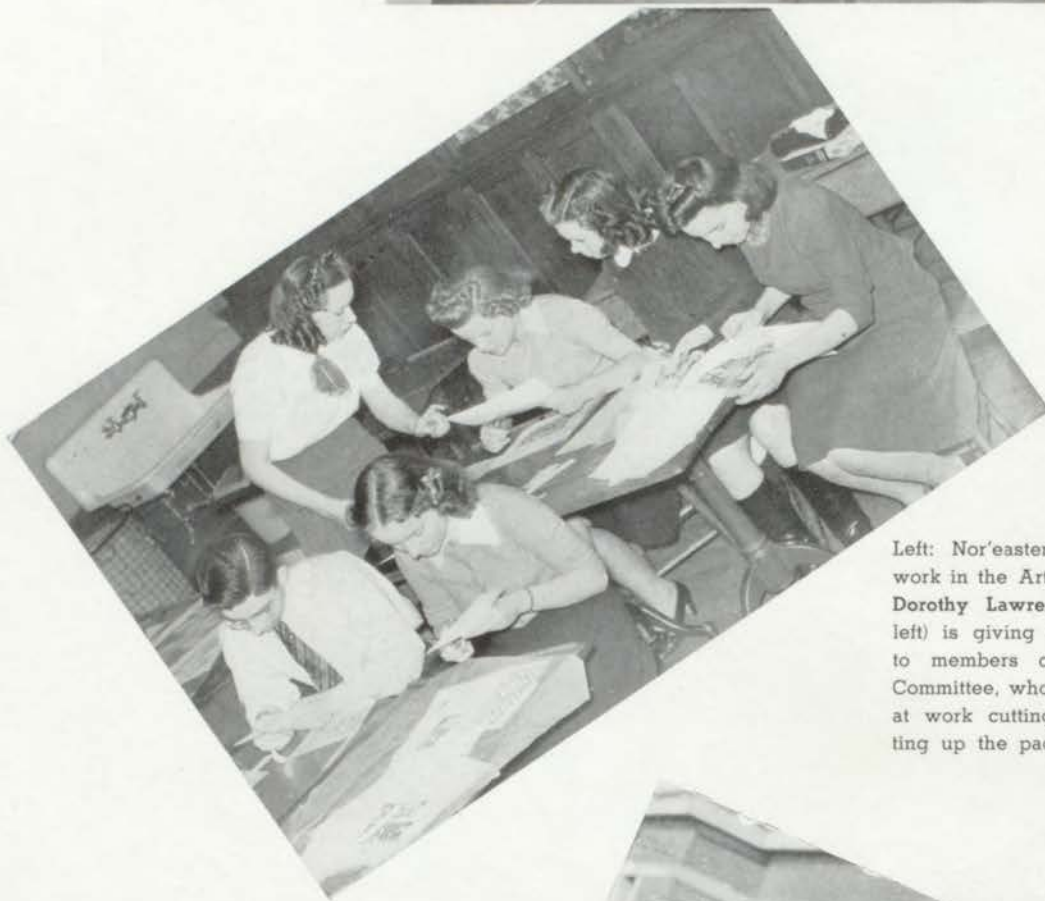

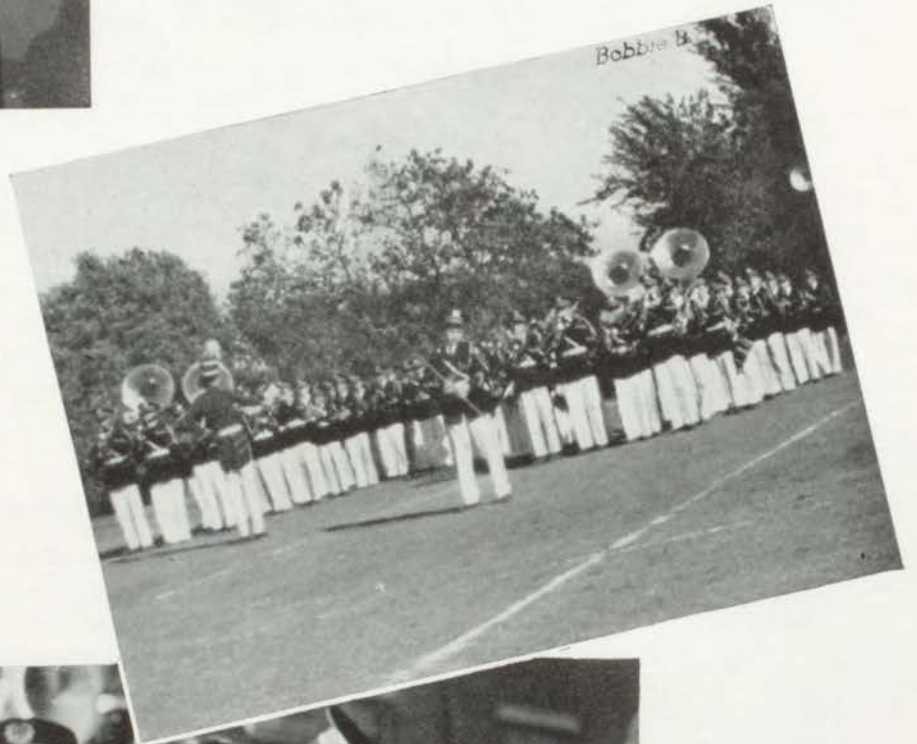

The Band Does Its Part To Make a Successful Football Season

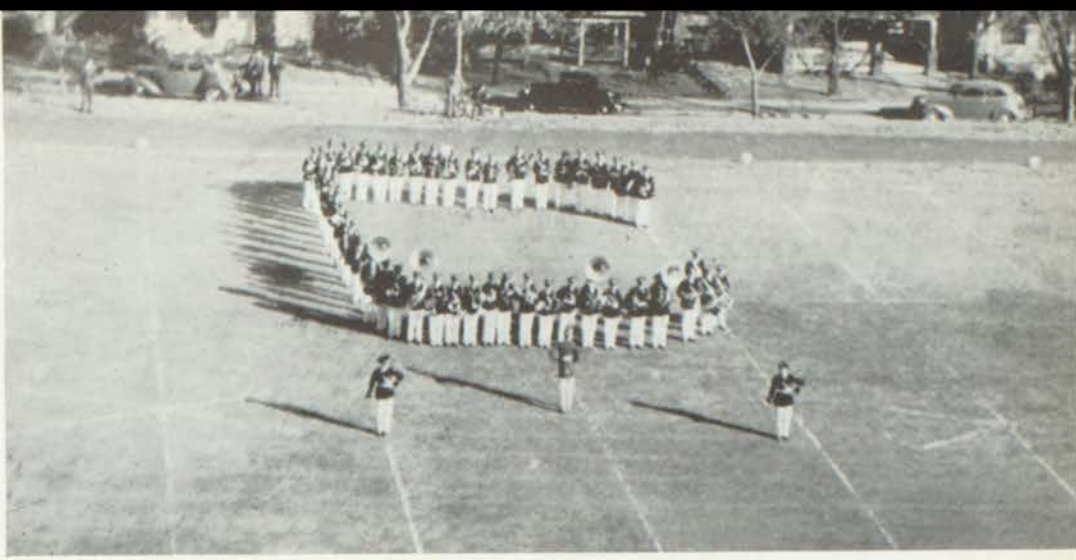

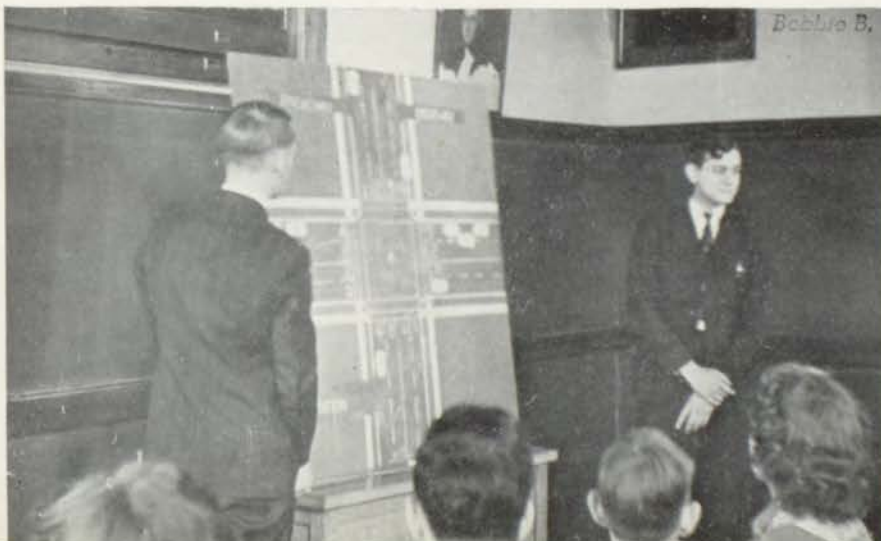

The six Literary Societies provide a major part of the social life at Northeast. The societies were formed for the purpose of developing literary ability and appreciation.

Student Clubs play an important part in the school life. They are among the most valuable organizations in Northeast. They were organized for the purpose of supplementing the regular class study. These clubs not only encourage study in various subjects but they also promote the interest of the student along certain lines. They are used by the student as a means of social contact and provide an opportunity for him to put his knowledge into a practical use.

A student may join only one club during the semester. These clubs meet bi-weekly. A membership in a club is, indeed, something of which to be proud.

Northeast has three language clubs, French, Latin, and Spanish. These clubs were organized because of the students' desire to acquaint themselves further with the songs, manners, customs of the countries whose language they are studying.

The Art Club, organized to develop a more extensive appreciation of art, gives the student a chance to specialize in many types of work which are not carried on in the regular class study.

With the purpose of assisting the pupils further in their speech work, the Dramatic Club was organized in 1918. It has been very helpful with school plays, assemblies, and special programs.

Newly organized this year was the First Aid Club, under the direction of the school nurse, Miss Brown, and

physiology teacher, Miss Maude McElwain. The girls are taught how to care for simple injuries and apply all types of bandages.

The Printers Club develops more interest in printing and the relative industries, and acquaints printing students with one another as well as with people actually in the industry.

The Physiography Club, first organized as the Mineralogy Club, was enlarged to include some astronomy, structural geology and the study of fossils.

The program of the Commercial Club consists of business talks, readings and visits to some places of interest. Their slogan is "Efficiency Wins." The membership in this club is limited to members who have had some form of commercial work.

Certainly the advisers of these numerous clubs are to be thanked for the time and efforts which they have given for the development of the clubs and we congratulate them for that which they have accomplished.

Under such organizations as the Student Clubs the interest in school studies is bound to increase. An opportunity for leadership is offered through the club and a general betterment of the student is effected. May the clubs of Northeast continue their advancement and provide even greater opportunities in the future.

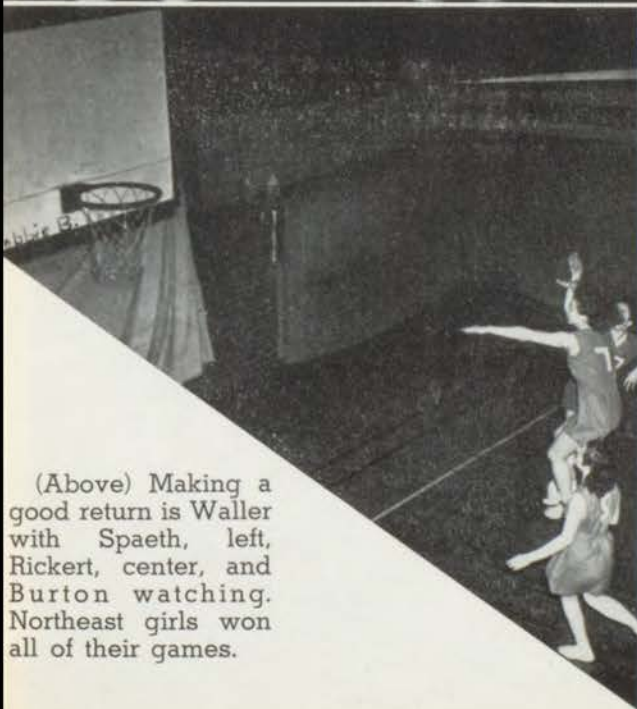

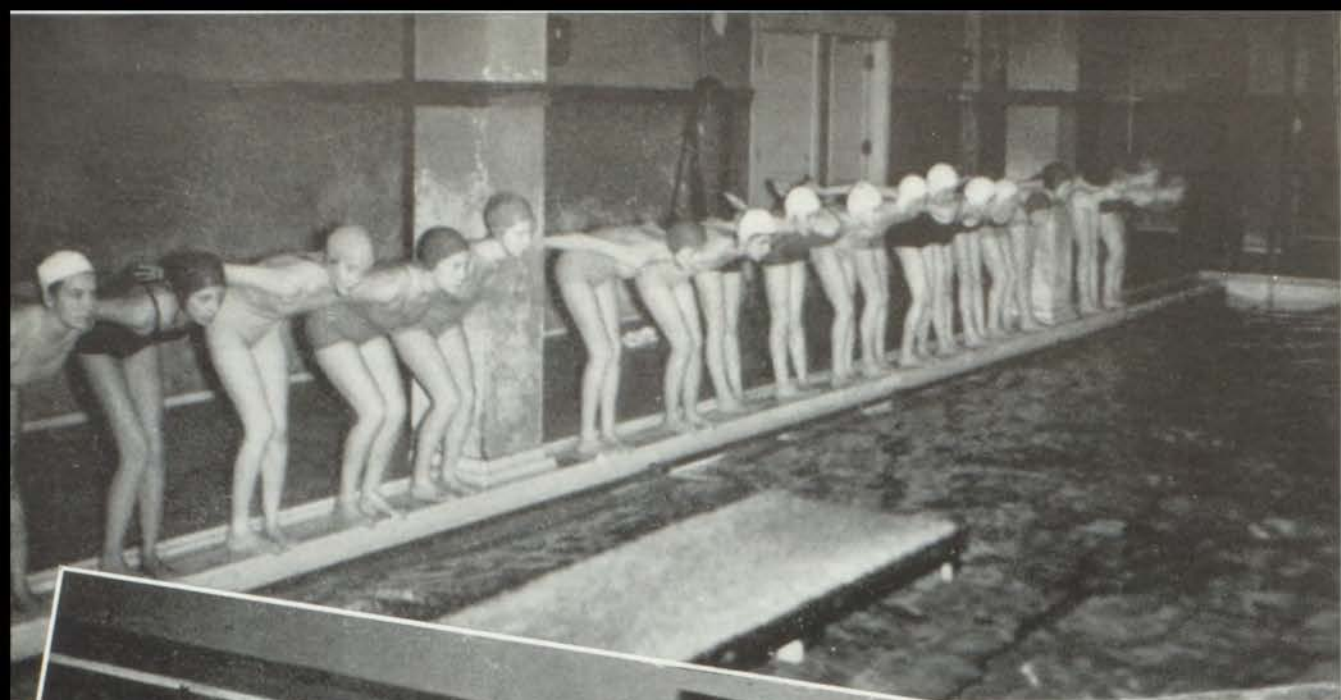

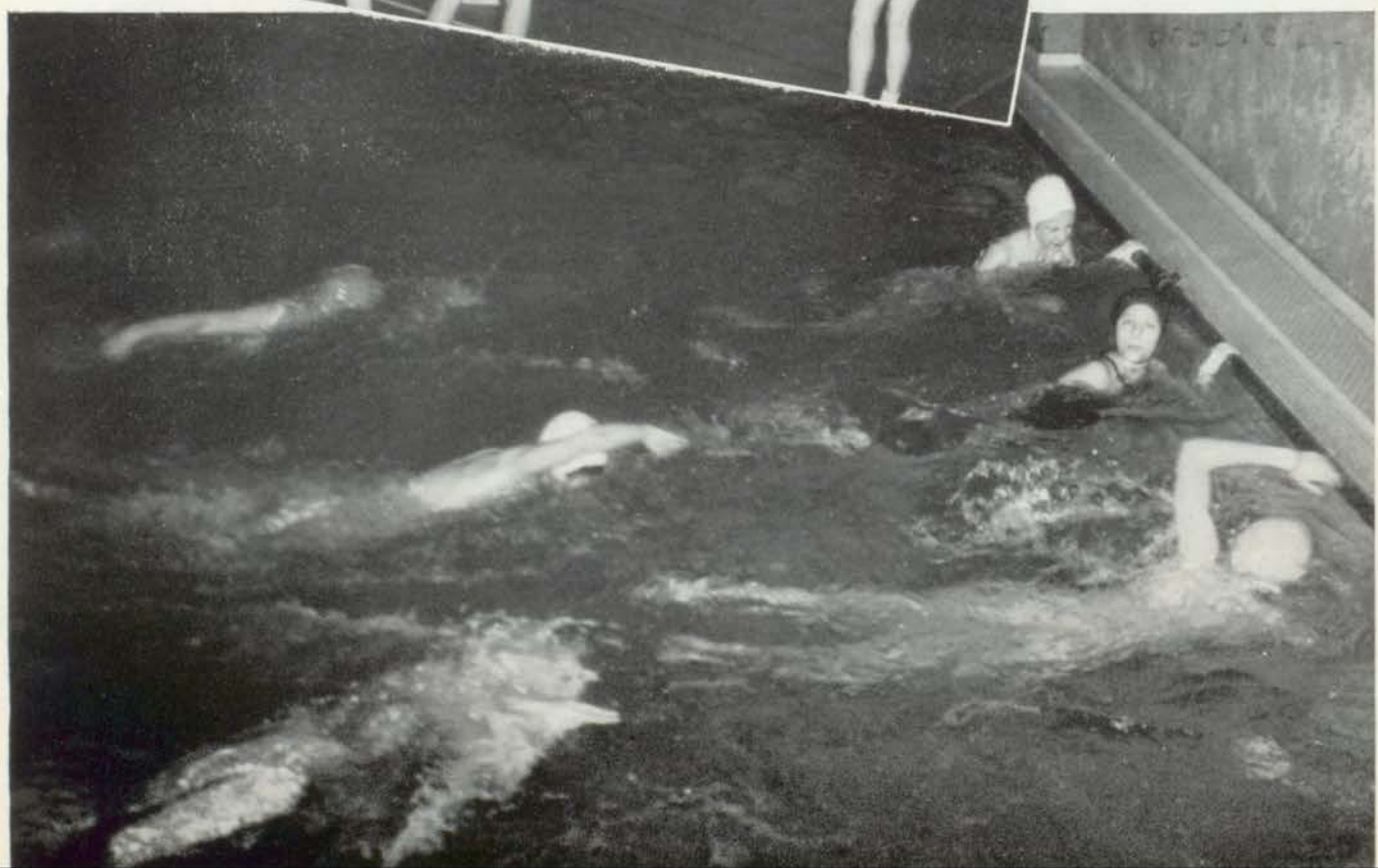

The members of the 1939 football squad were each so outstanding that a thumbnail sketch of each will now be undertaken:

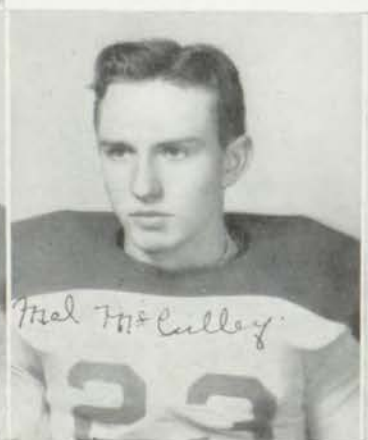

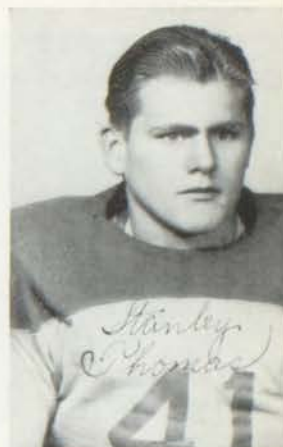

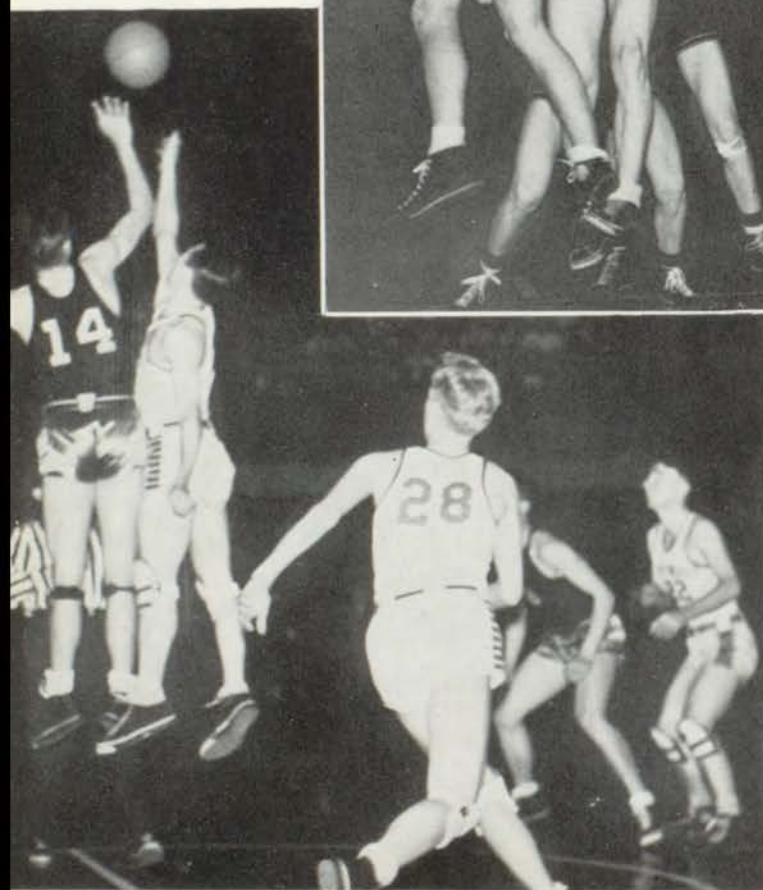

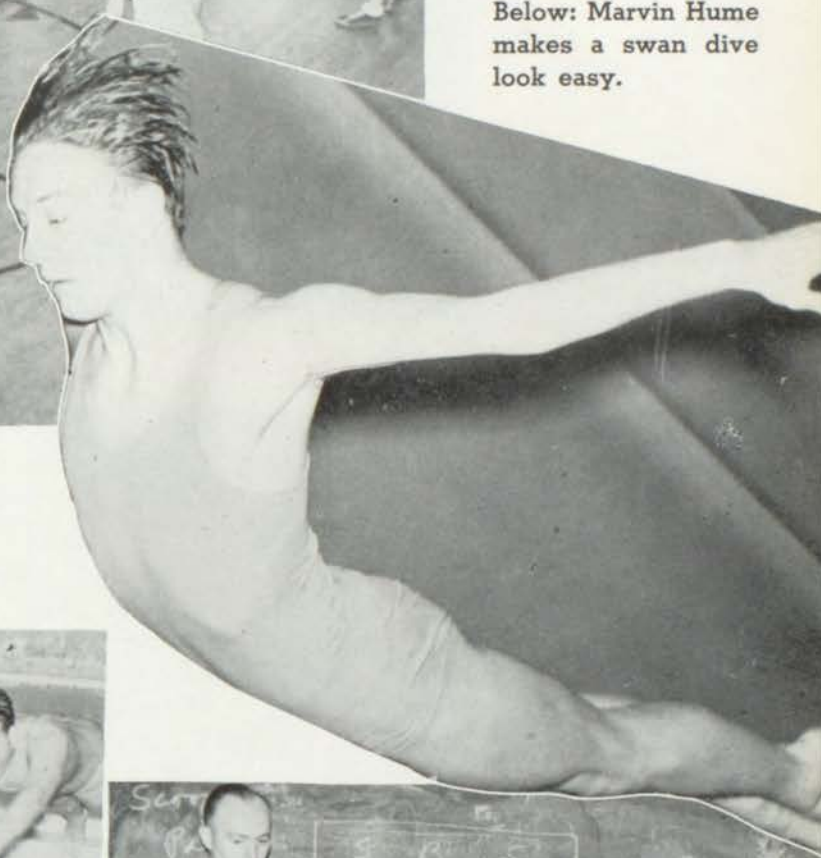

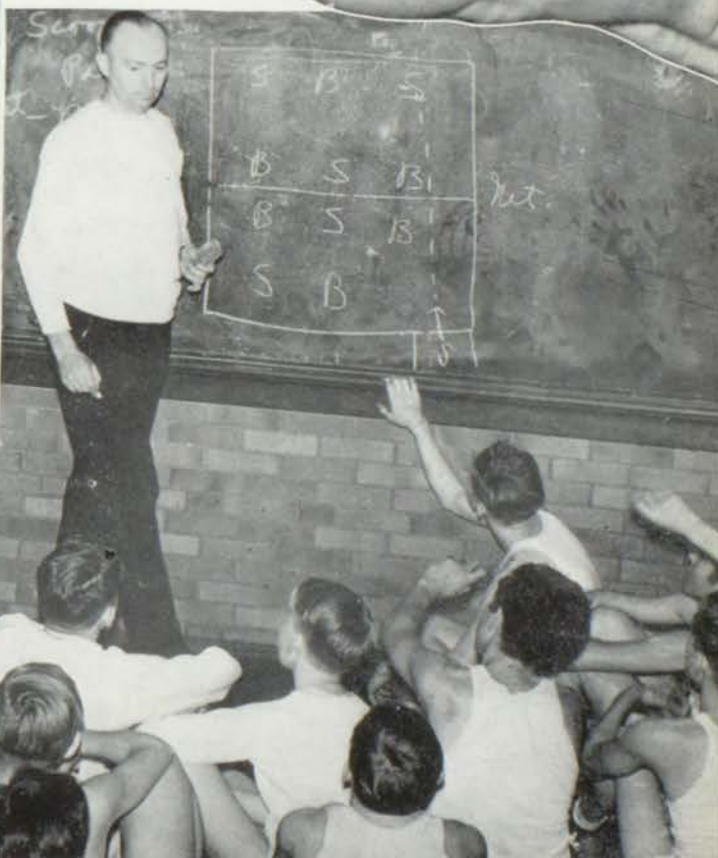

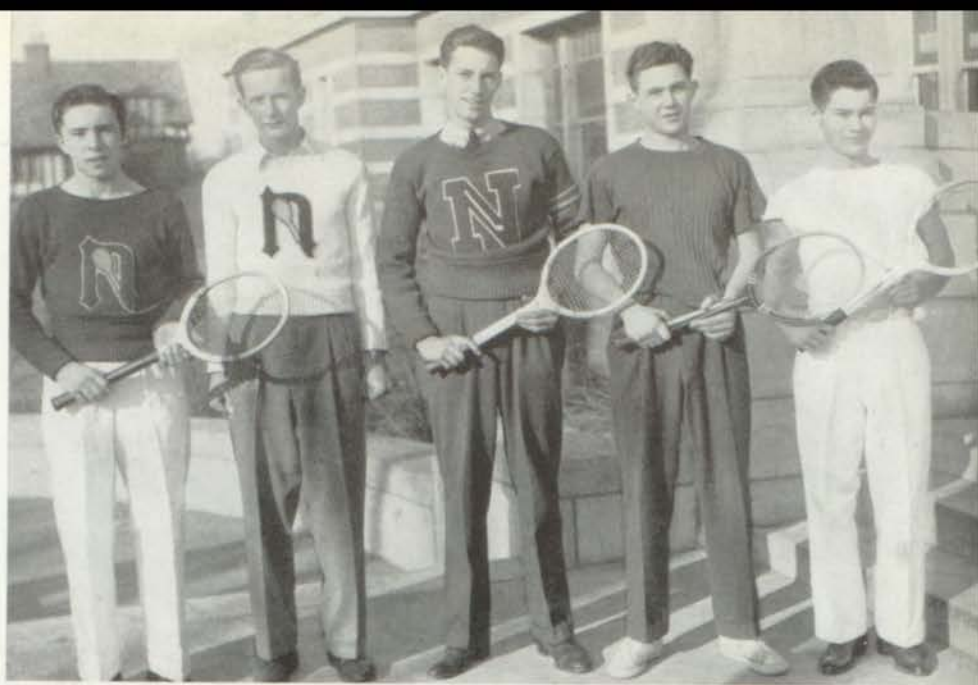

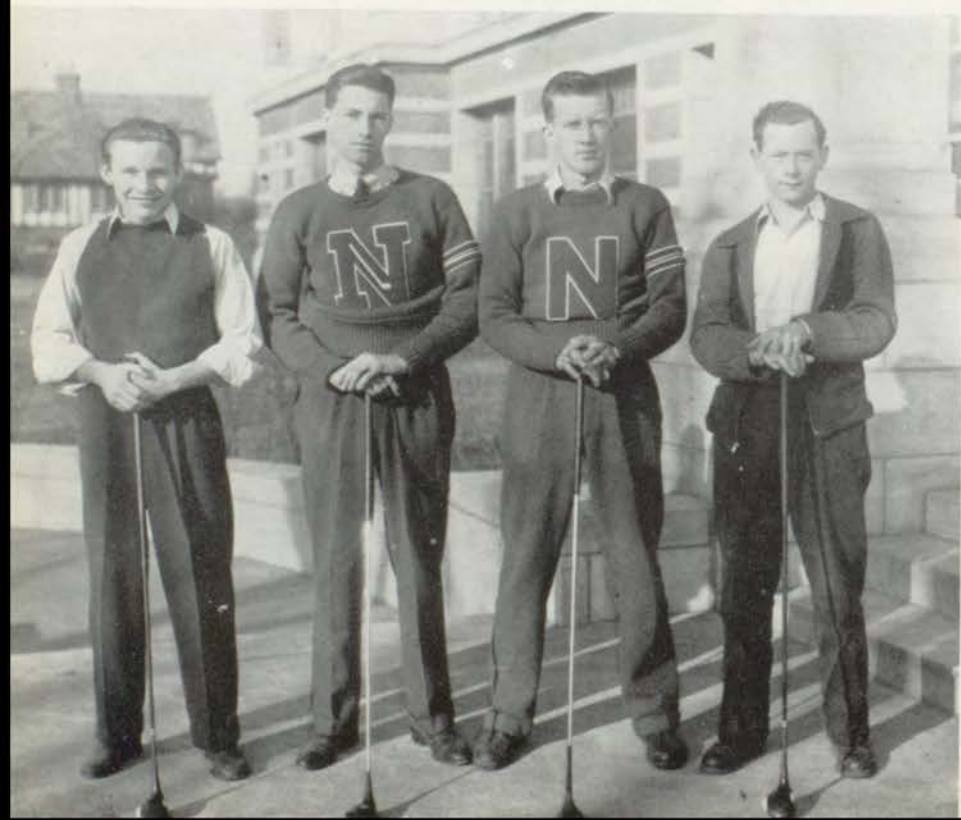

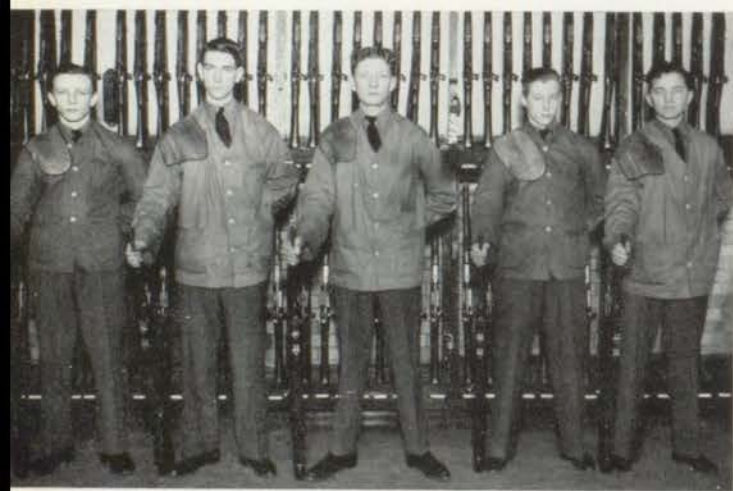
