Our Teachers Encouraged and Helped Us

The members of the Northeast High School faculty have many duties to perform during each school day. Even with a very busy teaching schedule, the instructors take time out to help a student who is behind in his work or who needs additional training in order to go on to college. There are many ways in which an idea may be expressed in order to get it across to the minds of the students, and the Northeast faculty seems to know most of them. A funny story, a laboratory experiment, or a diagram on the blackboard may be used to explain the answers to what might otherwise be perplexing problems.

The students at Northeast feel that our teaching staff is interested in them and that it is doing its utmost to help them obtain a good high school training.


















The Enthusiasm of the Attractive


nights when a basketball or football game is played, the Village is open from 9:00 to 11:00 o'clock. People from other schools are admitted only if they are with a person who has a pass.



THE ANNUAL Junior-Senior basketball game is on! It's always exciting. The seniors won by a score of 17 to 13.




"WATCH FOR THE BIRDIE!" A game of badminton in the girls' gym is lots of fun and affords healthful exercise.



Vikes Finish With 2-2-2 League Record

The Northeast Vikings started out the 1956-57 football season with a new head coach, Mr. Kenneth Hawthorne. Although there were but two returning lettermen, Coach Hawthorne, with the skillful assistance of Line Coach Fred Heine, directed the Vikings through a season in which they suffered only two defeats at the hands of Interscholastic League opponents.

In nonleague tilts, Northeast started off slowly, dropping the first two games of the season to Raytown and William Chrisman.

At the first league game, Southwest held Northeast to a 6-6 tie, the Indians stubbornly denying the Norsemen the right to cross the Southwest goal line more than once.

In the second league game Northeast, with many players already sidelined by injuries, was defeated by a strong Central team, 13-6.

Northeast next took spectators completely by surprise, with a 33-7 rout of East High School, defenders of last year's title. Northeast thus dealt the Bears their first league loss since 1953.

Then came the Southeast Knights, chosen by many of the high-school coaches as the team most likely to take this year's Interscholastic League title. Northeast, following in the footsteps of all of Southeast's opponents, was overpowered, and lost by the score of 34-7. The Vikes scored their lone touchdown on what was possibly the most exciting play of the evening—an 86-yard kick-off return during the second quarter.

The following week the Westport Tigers sadly watched their 13-6 lead vanish when Northeast tied up the game with only a little over a minute remaining. The Vikings almost added a winning score, but were stopped on the 3-yard line as the game ended.

In the last two games of the season, Northeast switched, for the first time in fifteen years, from a split T formation to a single wing. Perhaps owing to this change in of-


Fleet-Footed Vikes Have Good Season



Through the R. O. T. C. training, the cadets have learned much about army life, especially the importance of discipline and teamwork.



The honor of being in the National Honor Society is one that will not be readily forgotten by any of the students who have been elected to its membership.


